



### Preparations Underway For Port Orford Grand Prix

Gentlemen...Start your engines! Well, very shortly at least. With less than two weeks remaining until the first Port Orford Grand Prix, organizers are hurriedly preparing Cape Blanco Airport for the sports car races to be held August 7th and 8th.

Preparations for the races, sponsored by the Port Orford Chamber of Commerce and Team Continental of Portland, a member of the International Conference of Sports Car Clubs, actually began July 10th, when volunteers started constructing temporary barriers from 2,000 tires delivered for the event.

This past weekend 15 members of Team Continental returned to the airport along with family, friends and local supporters to continue building the tire barriers. In addition, the workers unloaded 28 concrete barriers, erected a race officials tower and laid out the actual race course.

Bill Rose of Grants Pass had the honor of being the first participant to run the race course, helping officials test the viability of the track design.

The Port Orford Grand Prix is believed to be the first time sports car road races have been staged in Southwestern Oregon. The event will begin Saturday. August 7th, with qualifying races for the various divisions. There will also be a novice Saturday, August 7th with qualifying races for the various divisions. There will also be a novice race Saturday afternoon for competitors who have not logged the necessary races needed to be eligible for the main events. Time trials will continue the morning of Sunday, August 8th, with the final races beginning at 1:00pm. Competition will begin at 9:00am both days and will last until 5:00pm.

Admission passes good for both days of racing will cost \$7.50 for adults and \$5.00 for children 12 and under, if purchased in advance of the competition. Admission at Cape Blanco Airport will be \$8.50 for adults and \$6 for children

Located on Airport Road off Highway 101, directly opposite Pacific High School, Cape Blanco Airport has previously been used for drag races. However, the racing on August 7th and 8th will be nothing like the airport or Southwestern Oregon has seen before.

In the current case, the voters have already made changes, the Superintendent's contract will not be altered by recall...in short it seems silly and unnecessary to divide the community on this issue.

### Southwest Oregon's Native Americans Had a Rich Culture

"Southwest Oregon has some of the most important archeological sites in North America" Reg Pullen told a standingroom-only audience in Port Orford last Friday night. He told those gathered for the first talk in the Port Orford Arts Council lecture series on Native Americans that very few are aware of the high level of Native American culture that was in the area prior to the arrival of Euroamericans.

Pullen, an archeologist and planner for BLM in Coos Bay, covered the impact of the founding of Port Orford and the Rogue River Indian War on the indigenous population. Very few people survived the removal to a reservation at Siletz.

The recent discoveries at Blacklock Point are some of the oldest in North America, and Pullen emphasized how important it is to preserve this and other unique sites in the area. Artifact hunting destroys the information these sites can provide. And, artifact collecting on public lands or the disturbance of any burial sites is illegal.

He showed slides of some of the artifacts from the area that are now at the Smithsonian and other museums around the country. The exquisitely carved wooden spoons, for instance, were every bit as special as the family sterling. A carved stone head of a bear brought ooh's and ah's from the audience.

The next speaker in the series will be Robert Kenta, of Shasta decent and a member of the Confederated Tribes of Siletz. He is scheduled to speak August 28th. 



#### White Building

As of the 1988-89 school year drew to a close the school district hit a low of 424 students. With the advent of kindergarten that next fall school enrollment climbed to 450 students. Now, four years later, our schools have reached an enrollment of 540 students - a 28% increase in students. The last time our schools had this many students was 1979. We had four schools open then including the white building. The white building was closed in 1985 when school enrollment dropped to 408 students.

When the kindergarten opened in the fall of 1989 Driftwood experienced a student increase in all grades. At mid year another teacher was added to grade 5 and suddenly Driftwood was lacking in space and the kindergarten was moved to Pacific High School. The enrollment was increasing at each grade level, Blanco Junior High was nearing its maximum in the placement of physical bodies into the building. Pacific High School continued to graduate classes smaller than those entering in grade 9.

On May 2, 1990 a board appointed Facilities Advisory Committee held its first meeting and was charged with the responsibility of investigating, exploring and recommending to the school board its findings on the status of the district's facilities. tified short and long range needs at each building with a recommendation to keep the white building open. The report said, "The committee is not entirely sure about the future growth patterns within the school district. The members felt the white building might be needed as an overflow unit for the junior high school.

In January of 1992 the Facility Advisory Committee, in a work session with the school board, recommended an independent structural engineering analysis be conducted of the white building prior to the committee proceeding with further work. Endex Engineering, Corvallis, Oregon, was hired and reported to the board structural repairs required. The building was found to be in sound condition. Thus it became the consensus of the Facilities Advisory Committee, Budget Committee and the School Board that district budget funds be made available to open the building as soon as possible to relieve overcrowding. The next step was to design a time-line and consult with staff to analyze the best possible use of the building. trict architect and State Department of Education officials, the school board established a budget to open the white building by the Fall of 1993.

The work will be completed with an expenditure under \$200,000 providing five additional classrooms, a library technology center, a lunch room, a staff room, principal and counselor offices, four restrooms, a handicapped restroom, health room, custodial area and storage areas. All of this being completed while taking no money from our educational program. The board only using dollars that would have gone elsewhere in the state. At a time when school construction costs are high, (over seventy-five dollars a square foot including modular buildings) we will be providing needed space for our crowded schools. This total remodel and opening will cost less than fifteen dollars a square foot.

Sounds like good planning and management to me.

#### Letter to Editor

In 1984, our son arrived to spend his high school years with us, 3 months later we were trying to explain to him and ourselves, how we could live in a community that would close its schools for lack of funds. So began our 9 year involvement with our local schools. For 5 years we watched enrollment dip to 408 students, schools merged or closed, busing was eliminated for a short time, the south wing of Pacific High burned, programs and staff were eliminated, maintenance and bus replacement was minimal, and salaries fell below the state average. This was not because our board was antischool, anti-kids, they simply had less that bare-bones budget and were delivering the best possible education for what the community was willing to spend.

4 years ago, Dick Wold was hired. The following spring, through his efforts and that of the staff, the board and a committed group of parents and citizens, a tax base was passed. For the first time our school district had stable funding and could budget and plan for the future. Our antiquated bus fleet was replaced, salaries increased, curriculum and programs were enriched, and buildings repaired and improved. A commitment has been made to staff training, incorporating computers into elementary classrooms, and a talented and gifted program. Test scores have risen each of the last 3 years and our drop out rate declined. All at a time when statewide over 1,000 teaching and professional position have been eliminated. Neighboring schools are eliminating programs, instituting pay-to-play sports policies, and are coping with over-crowded, under-maintained buildings.

Our board had only 3 years of stable funding to rectify the damage of years of underfunding and to prepare for a future of declining revenues and increasing enrollments. They deserve medals, not a recall. Many more changes are coming in the form of HB3565, Oregon's 21st Century School Act. We need this board, we need their expertise, their willingness to tackle hard questions, and their commitment to delivering quality education at a cost effective price. Please vote no in the recall election.

Letter to the Editor

From what I see in the letters to this newspaper, the local Port Orford papers, and on the streets of this normally tranquil town, the school board recall is turning into a very hotly discussed issue with many charges and counter charges being thrown about by both sides. I have long felt that the only good voter is an informed voter. Unfortunately being an informed voter can take effort. I decided to take the time to resolve several of the more controversial issues being discussed. These issues are:

1. Did the renovation of the "white building" result in any property tax increase over and above that which would normaily be collected?

2. Did the passage of Measure 5 result in funding cuts for the 2CJ school district so severe it justified extraordinary measures such as renewing the superintendent's contract a year early, for four years, by a lame duck school board?

Like Diogenes, I set out with my lantern looking for the truthful person. I was delighted to find that candid, well informed people are actually very easy to find in Curry County. I talked with Watt Schroeder, our representative during the time that Measure 5 mandated legislation was being written, Ms. Buchanan of the Curry county treasurer's office, Bob Placp of the Accessor's office, Jay Johnson, Gold Beach superintendent and Joe Taber, a recently retired Gold Beach school superintendent.

The answer to the white building question is, in the words of the treasurer, "Yes, your property taxes went up". The



route they took to go up is circuitous involving actions taken by all of the County superintendents, the County Commissioners, and the distribution formulas for the O & C timber moneys. And no, the money would not have to be returned to the State if it was not spent. It did not come from the State. Instead, it would have remained as a property tax offset benefitting the property owners.

The effects of Measure 5 for the long term are both complex and evolving, with probably no one being able to see into the future with any reliability. However, the short term effects are known with accuracy. Walt Schroeder saw to it in the legislative session that the Curry County schools would be protected for several years, with both the 2CJ and the Brookings districts actually getting more funding, not less. A later conversation with Mr. Wold confirmed this a fact. Incidentally, Walt said he felt that the inevitable decline in O & C timber funds was a far more serious problem for Curry County than Measure 5 will ever be,

For question number 3 I must depart from my Sergeant Joe Friday "just the facts, ma'am" approach and resort to some measure of conjecture and inference. My kids are through school, thank God, but I have talked to several parents of children in the achool system and all in all they are very satisfied with the education they are getting. In terms of organizational efficiency the School seems comparable to other organizations in the Oregon public sector. The test scores are fine.

However, (it had to come) I do remember reading a letter to the editor from the president of POLTA, the teacher's association, urging the school board not to renew the superintendent's contract early. I also remember seeing a teacher's picket line in front of Driftwood school in Port Orford. These actions do not indicate that we have a completely happy staff at the school. I am sure that some are probably quite content, but a sizable number do not seem to be.

Gold Beach former superintendent Joe Taber said a typical contract is for two years, not four. Gold Beach uses two year contracts. Over the objections from the staff and from the public the Board went ahead and renewed the contract for maximum term allowable, a full four years. Why not two? Why early at all? I have not yet heard a satisfactory explanation. If the Board does not listen to the public or to the staff, who are they listening to?
