Council Settles Lawsuit by Evan Kramer

The Port Orford City Council met in special session on Friday, February 17, at 10:15 to consider the City's lawsuit against Ernie and Peter Bussmann. City council members in attendance were Martha Weaver-Britell, Ralph Donaldson, Carl Eskelson, George Kennedy, Robert Warring and Mayor Delaine Kennedy. Also attending were City recorder Norma House, City Manager Dotti Myers and public works engineer Dennis Gehrke.

The Council had met in executive session at 10:00am and, upon completion of that session was, opened the special session and let the public into the council chambers. The council proceeded almost immediately on a vote regarding the stipulated permanent injunction lawsuit between the City of Port Orford and the Bussmanns. The following is how each councilor voted: Councilor Tim Sparks was not present for the meeting. The Mayor votes only to break a tie vote.

Ralph Donaldson - yes
George Kennedy - yes
Carl Eskelson - yes

Martha Weaver-Britell - no
Robert Warring - no

By a 3-2 vote the council agreed to settle their lawsuit and agreed to the stipulated injunction before most people in the au-

dience had the faintest idea what was going on.

Martha Weaver-Britell submitted a request for the City to write a letter to Ron Fox, Coos Forest Practices Coordinator and several other officials thanking the Oregon Department of Forestry for their work, stating the settlement of \$9,500 does not cover the cost of the case which is in excess of \$35,000. She also submitted two other requests. The council voted to send the letter with the \$35,000 subject to Dotti Myers checking and verifying the amount. The letter also requested the O.D.F. continue to monitor the Bussmann repairs over the next five years and requested the O.D.F. to collect the maximum fines from the Bussmanns without offsetting the amount with the Bussmann's expenses incurred during the repairs or in connection with their litigation with the City. As of November, 1994 city manager Myers had compiled a list of total expenses from loss of the City's primary water supply on Hubbard Creek. They came to \$29,242.74. This figure did not include the cost of dredging the city reservoir which was estimated at \$50,000 with part of the siltation problem attributed to actions on the Bussmann property.

Councilor Warring spoke against the settlement and read and presented a statement he wanted put into the record. Councilor Donaldson also submitted a letter to the council. He sighted the fact

that the case would be heard at a "judicial hearing" before a judge, not a potentially sympathetic jury trial as one of the reasons he did not want to proceed further with the case.

There were two paragraphs in the settlement which caused the most soul searching on the council. They are Paragraphs 3 and 8 and are reprinted as approved by the council:

Paragraph 3: In executing this Release and Settlement Agreement, the City understands and agrees that its release extends to and includes any and all damages, injuries, claims and compensation that it now has, as well as those that it did not anticipate or know to exist, as well as any and all damages, injuries, claims or compensation which may develop in the future in connection with the actions of Bussmann alleged in the City's complaint in recital (a), except with regards to claims that the Permanent Injunction is violated, it being the intent of the parties that this release does not apply to future actions or conduct.

Paragraph 8: This agreement is effective upon payment of the above mentioned \$9,500 to the City and filing of the permanent injunction.

The council opened the meeting and voted on the issue before allowing public comment. Several of the 25 or so people in

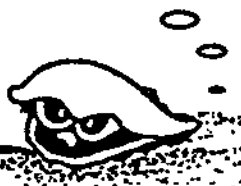

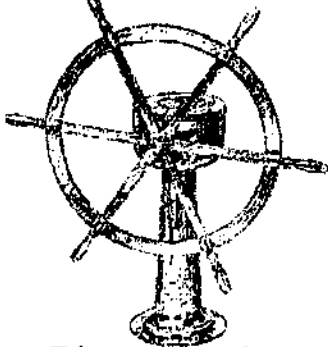

Dear Editor,

On January 23, Mr. King wrote a letter to each member of our School Board and Mr. Wold, explaining that withholding the buy-out agreement between the school district and Mr. Davis from the public is illegal and requested to see the buyout agreement. Not one of the Board Members or Mr. Wold have replied to the letter.

On Feb. 14th at the School Board meeting two citizens stood and asked to see the same buyout agreement and both were assured that they were privy to all the records at the district office. Any citizen has the right to examine the records of the District Office.

On Feb. 15th one of the above citizens went to the District Office and asked to see the buy-out agreement and was shown the General Fund expenditure ledger dated 12/12/94 and was told that this would explain the buyout agreement. What this ledger explains is that year to date the district has spent:

Board Legal Services \$8,542
Board Arbitration's \$2,624
Judgments/Settlements \$30,000

Mr. Wold was again asked for the buyout agreement and the request was denied.

If these numbers truly represent the total agreement, why can we not see the agreement. One wonders if the \$30,000 is to be paid to Mr. Davis each year for five years?

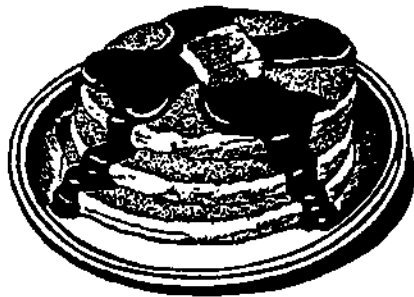

Brice Wagner and I made a trip on Tuesday to inspect the new Port Orford Rural Fire District truck. The truck is being built by H & W Emergency Vehicles in the burgeoning city of Forest Grove. We were met by Jeff Weber, son on one of the owners of the company, who guided us around the tour with the help of Mitch, the chief mechanic on the truck.

Brice and I were surprised by the progress H & W has made on the fire truck. It is far enough along that the company estimates it will be completed by the middle of March and ready for delivery to Port Orford. The truck is powered by a Cummins 370 horsepower diesel engine. It rests on an International chassis and carries 1,200 gallons of water. It will have a five seat enclosed cab with two front bucket seats and three seats in the back for the air pack crew. Its foam proportioning system will be a first for Port Orford. It will come equipped with telescoping lights, a roll out battery tray and a deluge gun.

One of the more unique features and a first for Port Orford trucks its front

mounted pump giving pump and roll capability.

The truck was headed for the paint room later this week and will come out fire engine red with white striping.

This has been a big year for the Port Orford Rural Fire Board with Chaiman Bill Foster, Secretary/Treasurer Lou Cobb, and members Brice Wagner, Evan Kramer and Bill McMullen witnessing completion of the first stage of the new fire station on Elk River Road. The 3,500 square foot structure sits on land donated by the Marsh family adjacent to the older hall which seems dwarfed in comparison. The concrete slab floor and building shell are complete. The next step is acquiring doors for it, installing insulation and electrical work.

During the three hours we spent at H & W we not only got a thorough going over of Port Orford's truck but also got to see some of the other projects the company was working on. The company was completing work on two ladder trucks for the Seattle Fire Department. On one truck the ladder was telescoped to its full height of 100 feet. Fortunately, we weren't invited for a view from the top. The

attendance at the meeting questioned the council's action. However, in researching the issue I found under the Oregon Revised Statute 192.630 it reads as follows: "The right of public attendance guaranteed by the Public Meetings Law does not include the right to participate by public testimony or comment." There are three exceptions to this rule and none applied.

Shortly after the public comment period of the meeting began Mayor Kennedy left to attend another meeting. Soon after that, councilman George Kennedy left to return to work. Carl Eskelson took over for the Mayor and fielded numerous questions along with the remaining council members.

One question came from Orville Laurson regarding the City's option to condemn the Bussmann property. Robert Warring told the audience that Commissioner

Terry Hanscom had told him there was money available for condemnation (not county money). Ralph Donaldson pointed out that if the City condemns the Bussmann property, the owners will want the value of 21 housing sites, not the value of a forestry parcel.

One of the stranger facts to me that came out of this special city council session was that the council voted on a stipulated agreement with the Bussmanns but no one from the mayor to the city manager could provide a copy of it to the public or themselves. The consensus from the council members was they knew what they were voting on from prior letters and memos yet that doesn't square with the fact they still voted on a document that wasn't in front of them.
