Censured!

Board Approves Censure By Evan Kramer

Note: Any opinions and commentary in the following article are mine only and not a collaborative effort with any other person.

What did you expect the School Board would do at their January 22 special meeting? The meeting was called with one item on the agenda, that of considering a resolution of censure for school board member Valerie Kramer. She was served with the two page Resolution of Censure on Friday afternoon and that was the document and subject under consideration. To set the stage, what started this is a one page letter Valerie wrote entitled "Notes from the School Board Executive Session, January 16, 1996." It concerned remarks made by board member Marc Farmer at this session which affected the employment of three employees of the school district. The one page letter was only distributed to those employees and they were asked not to disclose its contents.

School Board Chairman Larry Blount read the resolution which was written by David Dorsey, a lawyer from Coos Bay, who was retained on behalf of the school district. The resolution was the personal opinion of Chairman Blount. Dorsey was present at the meeting and led off the evening with a detailed and lengthy discussion of what can and can't be talked

about at an executive session. Dorsey noted that Farmer's discussion should have been cut off at the beginning.

Valerie Kramer then was given the time to read a seven page document rebutting the school board's charges step by step.

I have a few observations about the meeting and opinions. Board member Mike Knapp twice complained about the amount of money being spent on attorney Dorsey in light of current budget problems. Chairman Blount hired Dorsey and I think he's to be commended for this action. Mr. Dorsey brought a level of knowledge about Executive Board sessions that was sorely needed. I questioned whether Knapp was concerned with the many thousands of dollars the district spent paying off Ray Davis, the four year sweetheart contract given superintendent Dick Wold in May of 1993 one year before his contract was due to expire, the game of hide and seek with the S.A. T. scores and the belated release of the Lutheran Brotherhood study of the students.

Superintendent Dick Wold was present at the meeting on Monday night. The usually aggressive and talkative Wold had nothing to say. He also had nothing to say at the executive session meeting where the comments were made which led to this censure. When school board member Marc Farmer brought up the inappropriate comments concerning

school employees the superintendent could have and should have spoken up then with force.

Several members of the audience spoke against the board's censure resolution. Many made the point that the school board even by holding this meeting had already spoken strongly about their feelings. However Larry Blount was emphatic that a message had to be sent to the individuals named in the document and that message was the censure. Board member Marilyn Cuthbert said Valerie should have come to the board with the problem rather than the employees.

Flo Lichtig said what Valerie did was morally right. She had notarized the one page letter Valerie had written and been told at that time it was only intended for the three people mentioned in it.

I heartily commend Chairman Blount for making sure everyone got a chance to speak and many spoke more than once. Once everyone had their say a motion was made by Mike Knapp to accept the following paragraph:

"Now, therefore, it is hereby resolved: School Board member Valerie Kramer is censured for her breach of confidentiality regarding the January 16, 1996 Executive Session and for her false, inaccurate and misleading statements of what happened at the Executive Session."

Board Approves Censure Continued from Front Cover

The following Board members voted for the motion. Mike Knapp, Marilyn Cuthbert, Larry Blount and Shirley Van Loo. Marilyn Haga was absent but did submit a letter criticizing the notes on the school board meeting that Valerie wrote as inaccurate and false statements and that Valerie "was not speaking for me". Valerie voted against the motion and Marc Farmer abstained from voting. Farmer said he wanted to explain his abstention and walked over to Valerie, shook hands with her and apologized for his remarks at the board meeting and said he wanted to continue to work together with her. Farmer had earlier apologized to everyone present for his remarks in the executive session and said he made a mistake. He said he had met personally with one of the people mentioned in the note and would when time permitted meet with the others.

People have asked what the significance of a school board member being censured. I looked up the word censure in the Webster's New World dictionary. It was defined as a blaming, condemnation or to criticize adversely. The censure does not affect Valerie's standing on the school board nor does it come with any penalties.

I had spoken with Dick Wold earlier in the day and requested two pieces of information which he promptly responded to

the same day. The following 2CJ school board members terms of office are up in 1997: Larry Blount, Marc Farmer, Marilyn Haga and Valerie Kramer. Superintendent Dick Wold's four year contract expires on June 30, 1997. There were many people at Monday's meeting. One way for them to participate more directly in the affairs of the school district would be to run for one of these four positions.

My opinion and mine only is Superintendent Wold's contract should not be renewed next year. His tenure as superintendent has been marred by ongoing controversy and financial cost to the district, the extent of which the public has been

unable to determine. President Harry Truman had a sign on his desk saying **The Buck Stops Here**. The buck never stops on Wold's desk. He deftly passes it on to various board members, teachers and private citizens who take the blame for problems in this district. We were told at the meeting that Mr. Wold is the chief administrative officer for school district whose job it is to carry out the policies of the board. We were told the school board is in charge of the school district but try convincing many of the public of that statement.

All in all it wasn't a fun meeting for me and if I seem a little hard on our school superintendent so be it

Chamber Hears From Yocum

The Port Orford Chamber of Commerce met on Monday and heard from Bruce Yocum, President of the Port of Port Orford Commission. Yocum spoke about the planned acquisition of the Cape Blanco State Airport by the Port and the Coquille Indian Tribe. The two parties have agreed to a cooperative management agreement for the airport. However, the State Division of Aeronautics has made no decision on this acquisition but they did recently conclude a public comment period. Yocum said they were looking to make it a viable airport in 10 - 20 years though they had no immediate plans for the airport. Yocum spoke about the 60 acres of land adjacent to the airport. This land is mentioned in the management agreement between the Port and the Coquille tribe but is the Coquilles who are attempting to secure and develop this county owned parcel independently. Yocum said this land would be used by

the Coquille tribe for a processing plant and cranberry bogs.

The Chamber heard from David Wilkens. He spoke about a mountain bike race that will be held in Port Orford on Saturday, July 6. It was suggested that the bike race be included with the publicity for the Fourth of July Jubilee celebration.

Viola Cuatt spoke about the Preservation Field School that will be held at the Coast Guard Lifeboat Station this summer. The three two week sessions will be held from June 24 through August 3. Viola asked for help from Chamber members in readying the building for the school this summer.

Tickets are available now for the Chamber of Commerce Annual Awards Dinner on Saturday, February 3. The dinner takes place at 7:00pm at the American Legion Hall with a no-host cocktail hour starting at 6:00pm. Tickets are \$15.00 per person and include a choice of main

Letter To The Editor,

The old-growth forests in the North Fork of Elk River are once again being clearcut. The North Fork was described by renowned US Forest Service fisheries biologist Dr. Gordon Reeves as the most productive salmon fishery he'd seen in the Lower 48. It is some of the steepest, most unstable land on the Siskiyou National Forest, and it is a pristine Roadless area. This is some of the last best fisheries habitat in the United States.

The area being clearcut was in two old timber sales that were abandoned by the Forest Service five years ago because of the threat that they posed to the fishery. Then, in a most despicable piece of treachery, certain western congressmen pushed a bill through Congress purporting to hasten the salvage of dead trees to "improve forest health", but which in reality was a sneak attack on the 5% that remains of the old-growth forests of western Oregon and Washington. The so-called "salvage rider" not only ordered the Forest Service and BLM to release all timber sales offered but not awarded from 1989 on, but it also took away the rights of citizens to appeal the decisions or seek redress in court for any timber

School Reorganization by Valerie Jean Kramer

School Board members, please forgive me but in this article I must take off my Board Member hat and speak as a newspaper reporter. This material represents only my own personal opinions and observations and in no way represents the opinion of the board or its members.

On Tuesday, January 9, 1996 the Port Orford-Langlois 2CJ School District held a public meeting to inform the community, and get its opinion, about an opportunity to reorganize our schools in order to qualify for additional funding. The District passed out booklets with an explanation and example figures and attempted to provide further explanations

and answer questions.

In this process it was discovered by a member of the audience that, given the information presented, the dollar amounts in the booklet were incorrect. Superintendent Dick Wold acknowledged this discovery and explained that new information had been received after the booklets were printed. An attempt to recompute the numbers was made but the results were not presented clearly.

Why didn't he explain that to the public before they worked it out for themselves? Why didn't the district have the new numbers computed and ready for discussion? Even without the use of a computer or calculator, the computation takes only a few minutes.

This meeting wasn't a "board meeting" and no board discussion was held.

On Tuesday, January 16, 1996, the Board held its monthly meeting. At this meeting, a motion was made to have grades 1-5 at Driftwood and grades 1-8 at Blanco. The motion was immediately seconded, the question was called, a vote taken and announced. In fact, it was done so quickly that my negative vote was ignored until I spoke up loudly and objected. No discussion was held by the board as a whole at any time.

Why was there no board discussion? How was the board able to reach such a consensus so quickly with no discussion? Is it fair to the public that the board take such a serious step without discussion? Doesn't the public have a right to see the correct figures prior to giving their opinions?

The idea of this plan had been discussed privately by Superintendent Dick Wold and individual board members as early as September 1995.

Why wasn't public discussion started earlier to give time to investigate alternatives? Why did the district wait till the last minute? (Indeed, after the last minute since Mr. Wold said the figures were supposed to have been submitted by December 31!)

See accompanying table for figures computed using the formula supplied by Business Manager John Phillips. In all cases, Blanco would have grades 1-8 and Kindergarten and Pre-School (which don't affect the formula) would remain at Driftwood.

Superintendent Wold has stated that the District will receive about \$185,000 less next year. Factoring in the expected \$185,000 loss, but not the cost to implement changes, gives the "Effect on Budget" numbers. Notice that adding grade 6 to Driftwood yields about \$91,000 additional income to the district.

Board Member Censured by Valerie Jean Kramer

Note: These are my personal opinions and observations on the subject and should not in any way be taken as a statement by or for the entire school board.

The Port Orford-Langlois 2CJ School Board met in special session on Monday, January 15 to consider the censure of board member Valerie Kramer. Sitting with the board in the front of the room was Superintendent Dick Wold, Administrative Secretary Gloria Koski who took minutes, and David Dorsey, a lawyer from Coos Bay. Board member Marilyn Haga was unable to attend due to prior plans. The room was packed with an interested audience.

Board Chairman Larry Blount began the meeting by asking all parties to stick to the issue of whether or not board confidentiality and policies were breached without getting into the content of the material that was disclosed.

Larry then turned the meeting over to Mr. Dorsey who explained the Oregon Public Meetings Law and how it applied to the present situation. Following his presentation, the board was given a chance for discussion and then the meeting was opened to public input.

Many people offered their opinions, observations, and statements of their feelings on the various matters. It was apparent that our school employees, at least those in question, have a great deal of support from the public.

I do not believe that there is anything to gain from a blow-by-blow discussion. I learned a lot from Mr. Dorsey's discussion of the Meetings Law and I believe the rest of the board, and the audience, did also. I now understand clearly that any discussions of individuals must be scheduled on an agenda and they must be notified and given a chance to request an open hearing. I understand that anything not on the agenda of an executive session

cannot be discussed. I understand that executive session may be used only:

To discuss initial hiring of specific individuals,

To consider disciplining or dismissal of an individual,

To hear charges or complaints against an individual,

To review and evaluate job performance of individuals,

For deliberations with persons designated by the board to conduct labor negotiations,

To conduct labor negotiations,

For consultation with counsel concerning current litigation or litigation likely to be filed,

To consider student expulsion or confidential student medical records,

To deliberate with persons designated to negotiate real property transactions,

or a few other topics which don't seem to apply to school boards.

Where applicable in any of these cases, any parties to be discussed must be notified and given a chance to request an open hearing. Such proper notice has not always been given in the past. Now that the law is understood, this will be corrected.

With the board in compliance with the law, and with the statements made by various board members at the meeting disavowing any intention to act against certain staff members in any inappropriate manner, I feel I have accomplished my goals. Our staff is assured of fair treatment and the district has averted the possibility of an expensive mistake.

The board, on the other hand, accomplished its objective also. They expressed their displeasure and made me realize how many people's feelings were hurt by my actions. Despite good intentions, my

actions had unintended repercussions which I regret. The board made clear its concern that I work within the constraints of the board policies.

The vote to censure passed (4 in favor, Marilyn Haga absent, Marc Farmer abstained, and Valerie Kramer opposed) Marc Farmer was the first to begin the healing process. After the vote he came to me, shook my hand, and said he hoped we could go forward and continue to work together. Other board members followed suit after the meeting adjourned.

I would also like to applaud Larry Blount for his fair handling of a difficult meeting. He kept the meeting focused and assured that all concerned had a chance to be heard. Mr. Dorsey was an invaluable addition to the meeting and his input will help us all.

I did not leave the meeting elated and vindicated nor did I leave depressed and humbled. Instead, I feel re-dedicated. I feel the meeting was handled by all parties in a professional manner. We all learned something. The public showed its concern for the school system. We will go forward with better procedures and more openness for all. I look forward to the coming year.

School Reorganization Continued

In the school Board packet for Jan. 16, the district estimated the cost to implement Grades 1-5 or 1-6 at Driftwood to be \$80,000 and the cost to implement Grades 1-8 at Driftwood to be \$143,000. It was noted that a favorable distribution of students could result in no implementation costs for the Grades 1-5 or 1-6 plans.

Finally it is my understanding that we had to have our *estimated* enrollment figures in to the state at this time but that we will be paid based on the *actual* enrollment next year. In other words, the Board can, if it chooses, re-open this discussion at any time and confirm or change its policy. I have asked the Board Chairman to re-open this issue for further discussion and re-consideration at our Feb. 13 board meeting.

If everyone is happy with the current plan to have grades 1-5 at Driftwood, this matter can be dropped. If not, be sure to let the board members know.

Respite A Rainbow of Hope By Dynelle Lentz

Respite! What does it mean? So many families struggle each day with their special needs children. Other families struggle with drug or alcohol addiction, single parenting, poverty, unemployment and mental illness. All of these factors create stress not only in the adult, but also in the children. 


