Dennis Gehrke Resigns By Evan Kramer

Port Orford city public works supervisor Dennis Gehrke announced his resignation from that position as of Friday, February 16. Gehrke told this to the city council and public at the council meeting Monday night. He is taking a position with Georgia-Pacific in Coos Bay. He has worked for the City of Port Orford since he got out of high school 16 years ago. City Manager Dotti Myers announced that the city was hosting a goodbye and good luck going away party for Dennis on Friday afternoon, February 16, at 3:00pm, in the council chambers. Everyone is invited to stop on by and visit and share a piece of cake and cup of coffee with Dennis.

Port Orford is losing a valuable employee. One who knows where every piece of pipe goes to, who operates the city water treatment plant and sewage treatment plant and who is always there when needed 24 hours a day. One of Dennis' many tasks is attending council meetings where he reports on the public works department and answers questions. I've always appreciated the skill and knowledge level he's brought to the job and the way he handles the public's concerns.

City Faces Grease Problem

At this same council meeting, Dennis presented a public works report. He said there had been a serious problem with a grease build-up at a manhole on Arizona Street. The blockage resulted in a sewage backup into the basement of a home on that street. Gehrke strongly urged the council to get the grease trap ordinance written and in force.

Councilor Carl Eskelson said that curbside recycling will begin in Port Orford on July 1.

Councilor Ralph Donaldson said he had met with H.G.E. representatives on the city master water plan engineering study. He spoke of three ways to pay for the improvements. They are user fees, property tax increase, and a state sponsored bond. Donaldson spoke with urgency about the recent grease ball incident on Arizona and that the council has to deal with this problem.

Councilor George Kennedy, who serves as the council person on the grease trap ordinance committee, said they hadn't met in the previous month. They will meet on Wednesday, February 14. A cost of \$882.00 was mentioned as the price for a commercial grease trap, not including installation. It was announced that Alan Wagner has been promoted to take over Dennis Gehrke's job on a 6 month trial basis. During this 6 month period the city will not fill Alan's position. Robert Warring complained that it smacked of the good old boy network at work. He did state that he wasn't challenging Wagner's abilities to handle the job.

Dotti Myers is working on the 1996-97 city budget. The first meeting of the budget committee will be the end of March.

Port Orford Youth Center

The council heard from Teri Tronson. N.C.F.C.C. coordinator and Charles Steak from the Curry district attorney's office about a proposed youth center for Port Orford. This would be funded by a grant from the state. The impetus for the grant came from a desire to deal with alcohol related traffic deaths and giving children alternatives to alcohol. They asked the council for the use of the A-frame cabin in Buffington Park without any encumbrances and with water and sewer provided by the city. The grant money for this youth center will be enough to pay for a part-time coordinator and some startup expenses. Dotti Myers told them she

had spoken to the city auditor and he felt it was not proper for the city to hire and supervise the employee for the youth center director. The insurance issue was also raised. Carrie Cheney, newly appointed student representative to the council, said she strongly supported formation of the youth center. A motion was made and passed to let the youth center use the building without encumbrances and pay for water and sewer with an addition from Robert Warring that the other groups seeking use of the A-frame, the Cub Scouts and Arts Council, also get to use the building. Dotti Myers will




meet with Tronson and Steak and work out the problems with insurance and hiring of the employee.

Al Affonso spoke to the council on behalf of the bed tax review committee. He said the committee came up with a recommendation to abolish the bed tax ordinance. Affonso had polled all the motel operators except for the Castaways and they all supported elimination of the ordinance. Bed tax review committee member Robert Warring suggested that people and groups pay for their projects themselves. It was pointed out that to abolish the ordinance the council would need to write an ordinance repealing the ordinance. A motion was made to start the process of repealing the bed tax ordinance. It passed 4-2 with George Kennedy and Martha Weaver-Britell casting the two dissenting votes.

The council moved on to development of policy and criteria for the city manager's evaluation. A motion was made and passed to table this topic until the workshop meeting on February 26. The council then tabled work on amending three ordinances.

The council discussed the watershed committee. The public learned that watershed committee member John Mayea had turned in a letter of resignation. Mayea said in his letter that the state is not supporting the watershed projects. Ralph Donaldson said he wants the weir project which Mayea had been working on to be a success. Martha Weaver-Britell spoke about a letter written and addressed to Governor Kitzhaber urging

City Seeking Police Chief

The council has drafted a job description for the new position of Port Orford Chief of Police as well as an advertisement for the job. The position will begin on April 15, 1996. A motion was carried to accept the job description.

Port Orford Mountain Bicycle Race

A presentation was made by the Port Orford Jubilee Mountain Bicycle Race committee member Murleen O'Hearn. The races will be held on Saturday, July 6, starting and noon. Ghosts at Pacific HSt

The 2CJ School Board held its regular monthly meeting Tuesday, Feb. 13. Several important topics were discussed.

Jerry Cox spoke briefly about the standardized tests taken by our district students. For the last ten years he has been responsible for the Statewide Assessment Tests and the CTBS tests.

The Statewide Assessment Tests are designed by the state to have a 100% correlation with the material we are required to teach. Thus, they are an excellent way to compare schools within Oregon but cannot be used to compare Oregon schools with those from other states. The CTBS tests are given nationwide and have only a 16% correlation to the material being taught by our district. (This 16% is typical for any given district.) When asked how we compare, Jerry said we're a little worse than average in some areas and a lot better in others. From the various score sheets it looks like if the statewide average in a given subject is 233, our



scores might be in about a 4-5 point plusor-minus spread. In other words, we're doing a pretty average job compared to other Oregon schools. I didn't see any comparisons to national figures in the materials I looked at.

Despite a lot of interest in student test scores a few months ago, there were few questions for Jerry from the board or the audience.

The board voted to hire Bob Lemerande as Baseball Coach for this spring season.

Rebecca Disbrow reported that the video lab is working on a new tape to be shown at the upcoming Skills Day in Coos Bay. Last year PHS won the competition despite getting a late start. She apologized for being a bit hoarse but explained that in the film, she plays a cheerleader who encounters a ghost and she'd worn her voice out screaming. I can't wait to see it!

Speaking of seeing it, Superintendent Dick Wold has advised me that the previously made PHS tapes are being reproduced and should be available to the public soon.

The March board meeting was pushed back a week and will be held March 19 instead of March 12 because Mr. Wold will be out of town on the 12th.

A joint workshop meeting will be held between the 2CJ board and the City of Port Orford at City Hall on Monday, Feb. 26. Mr. Dorsey has been asked to come to provide further information to all parties regarding the Oregon Public Meetings Law.

February is "National Love of Reading" month. Don't know about you but I'm holding up my end. Aside from my extensive business reading and reading computer screens full of Internet info, I've just finished "Time Patrol" a sci-fi book partly authored by one of my favorite authors, Robert Asprin. Letter To The Editor

A couple of weeks ago you printed a letter from me concerning the Elk Fork and Boulder Krab timber sales being logged in the North Fork of Elk River under the so-called Salvage Rider. Jim Parsons responded to this letter with some erroneous information. I want you to be aware of the truth.

Mr. Parsons stated that, "these sales were bid on in good faith by the mills, the sales were awarded and then rescinded." The fact is, a lawsuit had been filed prior to the auction and the bidders were informed that the sales might not be awarded, pending the outcome of the suit. The sales were never awarded. The Forest Service withdrew them and Federal Judge Owen Panner ordered that if they wanted to re-offer the sales, a new auction would have to be held and the new sales would have to demonstrate that no harm would come to the fisheries. The sales were never re-offered. They were dead and forgotten. Six years later, the Salvage Rider ordered their release.

Mr. Parsons stated that, "all of the area encompassed in these 2 sales is high ridgetop terrain with all class 4 streams." While this is true of some of the units, approximately half the volume from these sales comes from steep mountainside units on class 2 or 3 streams that cascade down 90% slopes directly into the extremely productive spawning beds of the North Fork.

Mr. Parsons gloats that the "no appeals" portion of the rider was instituted because the "preservationists" keep winning in court! That's a fine way to keep the American citizens from winning in court - just take away their First Amendment right to "petition the Government for a redress of grievances." It's certainly more effective than obeying the laws.

Mr. Parsons responds to the contention that only 5% of the old-growth timber that was in western Oregon remains, by




stating how much land is in wilderness, wild & scenic rivers, etc. The bulk of the old-growth that was here when the white settlers began arriving was destroyed in the forest fires of 1868, which were started by settlers burning slash. Much of the remainder was logged in the 30's, 40's and 50's. The big timber companies -Weyerhacuser, Georgia-Pacific, U.S. Plywood, etc. finished off most of the rest by 1980. Logging on Forest Service and BLM land has concentrated almost exclusively on old-growth. I believe the figure of 5% remaining to be fairly accurate.

Letter to the Editor,

There is great interest in Port Orford again having its very own police department. There even is going to be a new judge in town.

But before we start spending the thousands and thousands of dollars the new police officer and new judge are predicted to collect from speeders, I suggest a pragmatic look at what probably will actually happen.

The ONE police officer the city plans to hire will work a forty hour week less holidays, vacations, sick leave and training days. Lieutenant Mike Andall of Curry County Sheriff's department was reported in the Curry Coastal Pilot on January 10, 1996 as saying "We'll (the sheriff's department) still offer some assistance, but 90 percent of the law enforcement will be handled by the Port Orford officer." What is this work load?

It includes infrequent traffic patrols except for DUII enforcement and includes most criminal investigations from murder and burglaries to spousal abuse complaints and barking dogs. What does this mean for our city? For example, if the officer is called to investigate a spousal

abuse complaint, it could entail at least a day of the officer's time if there is an arrest. The officer will spend considerable time investigating the complaint and making the arrest, transporting and booking the defendant into the Curry County jail and preparing the paper work and reports that will be required. If the matter goes to trial, there will be additional time spent by the officer assisting the District Attorney and testifying at the trial. Even if there are no other criminal matters to deal with, there will be little time for traffic law enforcement. Speaking as the retired judge of you old justice court, when officers do not cite traffic cases into a traffic court, no money is collected to pay for the officer and court.

We need more police presence in Port Orford but it would appear that those making the decisions on this matter may not have sufficient facts to guide them in making the most cost effective decision. I suggest they look coldly, objectively and skeptically at the dollar figures presented to them and not become swept up at the prospect and glamour of having our own city police officer operating our city police car on our own city streets. Even though these are federal tax dollars, they are still our tax dollars. Just remember, there is no such thing as a free lunch.

Thank you for considering my thoughts.

Skywatcher's Diary

Thursday, February 15: On Friday about 3/4 hour before sunrise, look for a slender crescent Moon low in ESE to SE with two planets nearby: Bright Jupiter, and fainter Mercury. Saturday, February 17: This weekend, Earth passes nearly between Regulus and the Sun, and that star, marking Leo's heart, is visible all night. As you face Regulus at this time of year, you are looking out of our solar system, directly away from the Sun. Look for Regulus low in E at nightfall, high in S in middle of night, and low in W at dawn's first light.

Sunday, February 18: The Moon is New today and can't be seen tonight.

Monday, February 19: As the sky darkens and the Moon sinks toward the horizon, look for Saturn 11° to Moon's upper left and 19° below Venus.

Tuesday, February 20: Tonight brilliant Venus is well up on WSW with the crescent Moon about 16° to its lower right. (Look again on Wednesday!) Note earthshine on the Moon's dark side, and Saturn 5° to Moon's lower left. Tonight Saturn's rings are tipped ½ degree from edgewise, but the planet's low altitude at dusk may make observation difficult.


