### Hire an Expert By Evan Kramer



The Port Orford City Council held a special meeting on Monday night before a full house in the council chambers. They were there to discuss the letter from Councilor Jane Cramer regarding Garrison Lake openings.

Mayor Gary Doran let the council members speak first followed by the public. City Administrator Johnny Alexander updated everyone on the lake situation by saying he is putting together a fill and removal permit for one year with the Division of State Lands and the Army Corps of Engineers.

Jane Cramer read her letter and made some additional remarks including that opening the lake is not the city's responsibility. She said we were very arrogant to think we could control the acts of God. She said opening the lake has let the salt water in. Cramer said she did sympathize with people with problems with the lake level.

Johnny Alexander referred to the March public agency meeting at city hall dealing with lake openings and levels. He said the consensus of that group is what we have been doing in opening the lake is the

only way to go. Councilor Nathaniel Wander said we weren't in an emergency now. He said letting the lake drain washes out the foredune and interrupts the process of healing. He said he would ask for a public hearing on the state permit process for the fill and removal permit.

Councilor Robert Warring said the city had never had a geologist come out and tell us what's going on at the dunes. He wants to enclose studies and a geologist's report with the application for the fill and removal permit. Councilor Ralph Donaldson said his two priorities are first protect lives and second protect the property of the citizens. He said the flooding of people's houses should be avoided. Councilor Norm Leeling had two public health concerns regarding North Shore septic systems leaching coliform bacteria into the lake and that a high lake level would leach saline content into lakeshore resident's shallow wells. Councilor Jim Campbell said the city should obtain the permit and talked about the damage to homes and properties with high lake levels.

Mayor Doran then asked the citizens to speak. Lakeshore resident Nancy Mason said she didn't want to lose her home. She also read a letter from her husband Hal for the record. He ended the letter by saying, "It is totally unacceptable and

irresponsible for our city to deliberately ignore the possibility of flooding." Kenta Worley, a county resident on the lake recommended the city and county continue opening the lake until the state and federal government come up with a better solution. Frank Cramer said Garrison Lake is a state lake and we need money from them to solve the problem. Lakeshore resident Robert Houck read a letter to the council. He said it is the local government's responsibility to maintain the level of the lake. He mentioned the distinct possibility of many lawsuits against the city filed by citizens whose properties were damaged as a result of the negligence of the city. Nadine McWilliams said she has known the lake for 70 years and told the council to put the outlet back where it used to be. Alice Pfand said the city needs to control the lake level but the way they have been doing it was not a good way. She recommended rebuilding the outlet to Haystack Rock when the dunes rebuild. She suggested annexing all houses around the lake into the city water and sewer systems.

Fred McMillan recommended the city get the advice of experienced consultants for solving the problem. Ed McQuade told the council they shouldn't abandon their



## **Logging Begins Article by Evan Kramer**

Much to many people's surprise including my own logging operations were underway by Saturday morning, May 22, on the 140 acres in the North Fork Hubbard Creek watershed formerly owned by Dave Wilken. Ken Sorenson Logging of Roseburg bought the property and is harvesting the trees. The permit #99-60518 they applied for with the Oregon Department of Forestry had to do with logging within 20 feet of the creek in the Riparian Management Area. Sorenson Logging does not need a permit to log the parts of the property that are over 100 feet from the creek. This according to information from both Jim Britell and City Councilor Norm Leeling and confirmed by city administrator Johnny Alexander. The North Fork Hubbard Creek is Port Orford's only current source of water.

The 140-acre Wilken property was sold for \$525,000 according to Port Orford City Councilor Nathaniel Wander. The Wilken's property was originally listed for \$800,000. Wilken offered it to the City of Port Orford for \$675,000.

Here are some responses to the logging:

City Administrator Johnny Alexander wrote a letter dated May 17, to Oregon Department of Forestry. Excerpts were published here last week. Alexander wrote a second letter to Katherine Wiggins, Department of Forestry, dated May 21, 1999. It was similar to the earlier letter but with an additional paragraph to Forestry as follows: "I request that the City be allowed access to the property at all times during all operations that might impact our water supply. I request immediate notification of any activity that requires remediation. I request that the city be allowed to take comparative turbidity readings on the property above and below the on-site logging activity."

Kalmiopsis Audubon Society conservation chairman Jim Britell wrote a four page letter to Oregon Department of Forestry. Britell asks that Hubbard Creek and all of its tributaries be classified Type F streams rather than Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife's Type D classification. Type F offers a higher degree of protection. Britell asks that Forestry "insures that no turbidity whatsoever from this operation be allowed

to enter the streams that feed our drinking water."

The City hired Marianne Dugan, a lawyer from Eugene to write a response to Forestry. Dugan asks Forestry in her letter dated May 21, 1999, to designate Hubbard Creek as a Class F stream because of its use as a domestic water source and the fish ladder below the reservoir. She requests that Forestry **reject** the Sorenson Logging Plan because the section on High Risk Sites/Unstable Areas was left blank.

Thanks to Jim Britell who informed me about the Sorenson logging permit last Monday. It gave me time to interview Johnny Alexander on Tuesday and get some notice of this situation in last week's paper.

I know better than to write about love, but, because writing is a way of learning – I write.



## Fiddle Concert June 12

National Scottish fiddle champions, Hanneke Cassel and Ryan McKasson, will be performing a concert of traditional celtic music on Saturday, June 12, at the Port Orford Community Building, at 7:30 p.m.

Cassel, age 21, from Port Orford, just finished her third year at Boston's Berklee College of Music, and is the 1997 US National Open Division Scottish Fiddle Champion. She has performed all over the United States, in Scotland, and in Cape Breton, Nova Scotia. She has performed with jazz great, Stephane Grappelli, legendary Scottish fiddler, Alastair Fraser, and Irish singer and harpist, Aine Minogue. She opened for Judy Collins at Symphony Hall in Boston, and recently was the opening act for Irish singer, songwriter, and guitarist, Luka Bloom. Cassel is featured on *Diary of A Fiddle*, jazz/bluegrass fiddler, Darol Anger's newest CD, which will be released in July.

McKasson, age 20, from Puyallup, Washington, began studying classical violin at three, and viola at twelve. He has won many competitions including the

1996 US National Open Division Scottish Fiddle Championship. Ryan attends USC and just finished his second year, majoring in viola performance. He has also studied in Scotland and at the Music Academy of the West in Santa Barbara, where he performed with Bobby McFerrin. He frequently is a soloist with the Los Angeles Scottish Fiddlers.

Cassel and McKasson are featured on the CD, *The Wee Hours ... The Future of Scottish Fiddling in North America*. The CD grew out of the friendships of eight fiddlers, formed over the years at music festivals and fiddle camps in North America and Scotland. The fiddlers blended styles from Texas to Sweden, Jazz to Classical, in a common love for the pure joy of Scottish Fiddling. Alasdair Fraser calls *The Wee Hours*, "Free-spirited, expressive, youthfully exuberant, unfettered joy."

Steve Baughman, from San Francisco, will play guitar in the concert. He is an expert at new and unusual Celtic guitar tunings and can be heard on many CDs by various Celtic artists, including *The Wee Hours*. He is the author of the *Celtic Guitar Method* book by Mel Bay Publications.

### Honoring Teen Leaders

Curry County is observing May National Teen Pregnancy Prevention Month by honoring teen leaders who served as mentors in the STARS (Students Today Aren't Ready for Sex) program. STARS teen leaders were honored by the Public Health Department and the Commission for Children and Families at a meeting of the Commission in Gold Beach. Twenty-four teen leaders and their parents were invited to attend the award ceremony. The Curry County STARS project was started by the Public Health Department in 1994 and has been funded by the Curry County Commission for Children and Families since that time.

Teen leaders were recruited from all areas of the county to teach middle school students in their own communities. Pacific High School STARS teen leaders who taught at Blanco School are David Compton, Elizabeth Feldhaus, Kristan Lee, Erica Longton, and Katrina Meeks.

STARS stands for Students Today Aren't Ready for Sex. It is an abstinence based education program which trains older teens to teach junior high age students about the risks of early sexual involvement. Teens inform young students about the pressures communicated through the media about sexuality; students develop awareness about how peer pressure encourages early sexual involvement, and learn assertiveness skills which will aid them in

resisting pressure to have sex.

"We are making real progress in preventing teen pregnancy, but we still have work to do," said Barbara Floyd, Public Health Director. "The economic and social impact of teen pregnancy affects all of us. Oregon spends \$76.7 million a year for teens ages 10 - 17 who become pregnant. Seventy percent of adolescent mothers drop out of school, and children raised by teen parents have more health problems, learning disabilities and are more likely to grow up in poverty."

The Curry County rate for teen pregnancies ages 10-17 was 15.2 per 1000 in the 5 year period from 1993 through 1997. This compares to an earlier 5 year rate of 17.2 for the years 1988 through 1992 for Curry County.

Oregon Health Division reports an overall drop in the Oregon teen pregnancy rate by almost 25% over the last 20 years. Ms. Floyd emphasized that the STARS program is an important piece of Curry County efforts to reduce the number of teen pregnancies. 

responsibility to the residents of the city but instead find a solution to stabilize the lake. Bill Rebhahn suggested several long term solutions including using two pumps to pump water over the dunes into the ocean, using drains along the dunes to drain the lake, and an artificial reef. He said the city should look into a permanent solution by calling in specialists.

Shirley Nelson complimented the people who spoke on the way they made their points. Nelson said Councilor Cramer was right to bring up the lake opening subject now and concurred with her spirit. She said lakeshore residents should get together now and make plans for solution to the problem.

Councilor Warring reiterated one of the main themes of the evening when he said the city needs to hire an expert this summer to study the situation now. He said Dr. Paul Komar had recommended Bill McDougal for the job. Bob Houck asked if the city could take a more southerly approach to draining the lake. Johnny Alexander said the city had been draining the lake using the shortest way out. Councilor Wander said he wanted a firm

commitment to hire an expert. He said though the council talks about it it never seems to happen. Mayor Doran said money was a big problem. He suggested lakeshore residents form a lake improvement district. City attorney Randall Tosh estimated the city would be looking at \$20,000 for an expert opinion. He recommended the city, county and state form an intergovernmental Chapter 190 association to develop a plan of action for the lake.

Councilor Wander made a motion that the city approach Bill McDougal and ask him for an estimate of what it would cost to get a consultation. Tosh recommended the city send out Request for Proposals (RFPs) to five or ten consultants. Wander said try McDougal first. The council voted 5-1 for the motion. McDougal visited Agate Beach on February 15, 1998 with Dr. Paul Komar and is familiar with the situation.

Councilor Cramer said she wanted the city to face facts that we may not be able to open the lake and that the city has no money. She reminded everyone we are under a DEQ order to repair the drain field.

Randall Tosh spoke on the lake improvement district and explained the "benefited" properties would pay the costs. Wander asked if property owners would be willing to go in with the city on the cost of the consultant. Bob Houck said yes, if all the affected property owners contribute.

Councilor Leeling asked if there is any city money available to pay for the consultant. Johnny Alexander said he was not ready to answer that question tonight.

Alexander said the county had paid for half the cost of opening the lake. It has been opened ten times from December 2, 1998 to April 14, 1999 at an average cost of \$300 per time.

Robert Warring summed up two of the major points and that is the city is going to apply for a fill and removal permit and hire a consultant to help the city determine how much a solution would cost.
