The forty first Port Orford Jubilee celebration came to a close with the pet show on Monday afternoon in Salsa Rita's parking lot. In true Port Orford tradition the wind was kicking up a

dust storm but had laid low on the Fourth.

The first Jubilee celebration was held in 1959 and one of the organizers of the that event is still tirelessly working on behalf of the Fourth of July festivities over 40 years later. His name is Wilbur Green. One thing you can say about him is he doesn't have an inflated ego or worry about his appearance in the parade. There he was on Sunday 40 years after the first Jubilee and what role did he play in the parade on Sunday morning. He pushed a wheelbarrow and shovel behind the Curry County Mounted Sheriff's Posse. Now that's dedication to the job! For all the volunteer work Wilbur has done on behalf of the Jubilee and other Port Orford causes he deserves to be carried down Highway 101 during the parade atop a sedan chair. I made the mistake of telling him what a good celebration it was this year on Monday before the pet show. He quickly reminded me it wasn't over and there was a pet show later. Point taken. If you're

Valerie and I started with the Rotary Club pancake breakfast on Sunday morning and then went to view the quilts and vote on our favorite entry in their contest. The bonsai and flower show was held in an adjoining classroom at Driftwood Elementary School and we were awe struck by Al Affonso's large collection of bonsai. Each one different from the other. Even the pots and other things they grow in, on, or around are unique.

We next went drove over to the crowded Dock Beach for a look at the sandcastles. There were different sand sculptures from one end of Dock beach to the other. Once again we were impressed by the creativity of those participating in this event sponsored by the North Curry Family and Children's Center. We saw crabs. mermaids, sharks, castles sculpted from sand. Then Valerie and I continued over to the Port Orford Dock to take some photos of this historic wooden structure, which is soon to be torn down, and replaced by a new dock structure. We walked under the dock amongst the pilings holding up the structure, listening to the creaking sounds above of us of vehicles and boats being moved. The old dock is scheduled to be torn down and replaced sometime later this summer or in fall.

The bricks have been set in place at the Port Orford Fishermen's Memorial. The Memorial is located next to the Port history sign at the Boneyard boat parking area. The bricks are in two different sizes. Many have the names of businesses or people while others are memorials to friends and relatives lost.

I think it's true that everybody loves a parade, judging by the fun people have in Port Orford both participating in the Parade and viewing it from Highway 101. Many groups from the Rotary Club to the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department, from the Port Orford Fishermen's Association to the Jubilee Court shined in the parade. You were all winners!

The consensus around Port Orford is the fireworks this year were better than ever. People enjoyed the pacing at which the Port Orford Volunteer Fire Department set them off and they need to be thanked for their efforts.

Untitled II By Graeme Graydon



A lovely English couple settled in Te Awamutor, the town near my farm in New Zealand. They had a quiet unassuming charm about them that gave no hint of the

ordeals that they had both been through. Before the Pacific War, they lived in Singapore, prospering in the gracious Colonial days that seemed destined to last forever. In the early 40's, it had been Japan's role to invade large areas of South East Asia which of course included Singapore. John and his wife were captured when the city was taken and were sent as prisoners to Japan where they were separated and kept in prison camps for several years. Though John never said a bad word about his Japanese hosts, I gathered that it was a pretty tough deal. His fellow prisoners were missionaries of all kinds. Buddhist leaders and an assortment of foreign professionals and business people like himself.

There came a time when it became clear that the War was not going well for Japan,

their meager food ration became smaller, there were fewer soldiers guarding them and an uneasy tension settled over the camp. One day, the inmates were ordered to dig a great pit. From the beginning, it was understood that this was to be their own grave. There were few tools, most of the work was done with bamboo sticks and fingers. Years of impoverishment had left everyone with little strength to do anything and I can't begin to imagine the thoughts and feelings that such a task would evoke. By the end of the third day, the Japanese Commander gave his formal approval of the excavation and the prisoners retired into their huts for their last time.

John had become very close with a Buddhist Monk, they had looked after each other in the day-to-day challenges of camp life and shared in long, philosophical, encounters of the mind in their quiet hours. On this last night as they lay wearily on their cots, John reflected out loud – "Well, Tomorrow is to be the Big Day." (The sort of classic understatement that one expects from an English gentleman.) His friend was obviously puzzled at John's remark, "What is so special about tomorrow?" he

added. "Well, I thought that dying was just a little out of the ordinary" (He had been raised Anglican which in those days meant that you never questioned anything, especially not death, you just went along with things and hoped that you'd squeak through somehow.) "Oh that," came the sleepy reply, "Life can't end, there will be a change or two but it goes on," and with that he went to sleep. John marveled at the absolute nonchalance of his Buddhist buddy and found himself accepting some quiet in his own mind.

The next day, the prisoners and soldiers watched in awe as a gigantic cloud, shaped like a mushroom, terrifying in its menace, unfolded high into the sky above a distant city. Within hours the prison gates were opened and the lives that had seemed so close to ending, emerged into new beginnings, each to find a new dream. John had accepted his death so completely that his sudden freedom felt like being born again, but without the veil that death grants, many of his values were changed forever.

Parks Master Plan By Kristen Stallman

On June 25, 1999, the Oregon Parks and Recreation Commission, a statewide group appointed by the Governor to oversee the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department, decided to defer any recommendations on the Draft Curry County State Parks Master Plan until certain issues regarding the Canopy Project are resolved. The Commission will meet again in November and by that meeting, the following issues should be resolved:

Whether the grantors will convey the remaining grants funds to an entity other than Curry County.

What entity would receive and administer the grants and contracts; and

Where would the required matching funds come from.

The Curry County Commission has alerted OPRD that they will complete their obligations regarding pending study contracts, but would not enter into new contracts. There is about \$300,000 in remaining grant funding available to complete a 12 month long Environmental

There will be a public meeting of the Pacific Marine Conservation Council on Thursday, July 8, from 6:30-8:30pm in the Premium Pacific Seafood meeting room.

PMCC will conduct this public meeting to acquaint people with the results of the West Coast-wide Rockfish Forum titled, "Rockfish for the Future", a solution-based, multi-disciplinary workshop and discussion convened in Monterey March 26-28 to study problems surrounding West Coast rockfish management will be under discussion.

The Forum was attended by almost 200 people representing federal and state management, commercial and recreational fishers, academia, environmentalists, scientists, biologists, and concerned public.

Rockfish comprise a large part of the groundfish fishery, which is economically

the most important fishery on the Pacific Coast. With species that can live to be more than 100 years old, bear live young and have specific habitat requirements, it is important that the public be made aware of the problems surrounding this fishery.

Did you know?

- When you buy red snapper at the store, it's not, because the West Coast has no commercially marketed snapper – it is one of the rockfish!
- If you order white meated fish at the restaurant and it doesn't say halibut, it is probably one of the West Coast rockfish.
- If you ordered or purchased a live fish from your favorite restaurant or seafood retailer, it is nearly certain to be a West Coast rockfish.





Arthur's Amazing Magical Adventure will be performing on the outdoor stage daily throughout the four days of fair and he will be roving the grounds occasionally every day, surprising fairgoers with spontaneous and close up magic. Talent Shows are planned for Thursday through Saturday, with the youth talent show for ages 15 and under scheduled for Thursday. Fire Season in Effect

As of June 30, 1999 the regulated fire season is in effect in Curry County. This means a burn permit is required for **all** open burning throughout Curry County. Burn barrel and Open burn permits can be obtained by contacting your local fire agency.

Burning is allowed by permit in burn barrels from sun-up to 10:00am and open burning by permit till 4:00pm.

The only material that can be burned is paper and wood products.

Also as a reminder we would like to encourage property owners to cut the tall grass and brush to minimize the opportunity of fire on their property for the rest of the summer.
