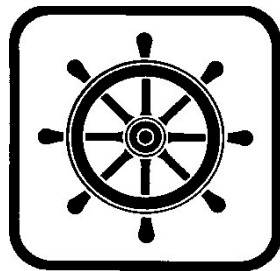

Black Cod Season Opens By Evan Kramer



The 1999 black cod season, or "derby" as it is also known, began at 3:00am Monday morning as Port Orford fishermen headed out to sea. They were

allowed to start casting their baited hooks for black cod at noon on Monday. By Tuesday morning fishermen were bringing back the first of the black cod to the dock at the Port of Port Orford.

This year the season lasts for a total of nine days. Port Manager Gayle Paige shared with me some statistics on the black cod harvest the previous two years. In 1998 fishermen landed 235,000 pounds of black cod with a value of \$262,756. In 1997 fishermen landed 646,000 pounds of black cod with a value of \$1.2 million. Paige said that through June of this year there has been nearly one million dollars worth of product landed at the Port.

Fishermen participating in the black cod derby work around the clock until they fill their allowed catch. Based on their past performance, the fishermen are grouped into one of three tiers and their permissible catch is limited according to the tier they are in. I spoke with Wayne Streeter of Carvalho Fisheries who is one

of the three fish buyers on the dock. (The others are Hallmark Fisheries and PPS.) Wayne gave me the prices Carvalho is paying for black cod. They range from \$1.40 for 1-2 pound fish to \$2.10 for 3-4 pound fish and \$2.80 per pound for fish over 7 pounds. The weight is determined after a "J" cut is done on the fish and the head removed. Streeter said the fish is sold to Japan.

The fish are caught on hooks baited with frozen squid. There are about 160 hooks per line or tub full. One side effect of black cod season is many people are employed baiting the hooks and make \$8 a tub.

Next year's black cod season will see major changes with fishermen going to IQF's (individual quotas) and they will be able to catch their quota over a six month period of time.

Blessing of the Fleet

The Port Orford Fishermen's Association and the Women's Fishery Network hosted a dedication ceremony for the Fishermen's Memorial last Saturday afternoon. The Fishermen's Memorial is located next to the boat parking area known as the "Boneyard." There are several parts to the Memorial including several dozen bricks with various names engraved in them laid along the outside of a concrete

slab. Attached to the concrete slab are three benches and the centerpiece which is a ship's wheel. The wheel has not been permanently fixed to the concrete slab but was temporarily placed there for the ceremony. Women's Fishery Network representative, Cecil Ashdown, said one element of the fishermen's memorial that hasn't been completed yet is the marble slab listing the names of the fishermen whose lives were lost at sea from the 1890's to the present.

The dedication was well attended by members of the fishing community and general public. It began with posting of the colors and the pledge of allegiance led by Frank Smith and Boy Scout Troop 101 members Ian Ranney, Shane Rangel, Justin Merryman and Jason Royal. Leesa Cobb spoke next and said the intention of the Memorial was to honor those fishermen lost at sea by placing their names on a plaque. She reminded people to take a look at the old wooden dock as it was going to be coming down soon to make way for a new dock. Christen then sang Amazing Grace. Gary Anderson gave a moving prayer and was followed by Rob Ashdown reading a poem. Pastor Doug Jamieson concluded the moving ceremony with a blessing of the fleet.

Doctors Resign

Curry Health District Administrator Randy Scholten has informed this newspaper that Doctors Donald Venes and Victoria Webb are resigning from the Curry Family Medical Clinic in Port Orford effective September 17. The other doctor working at the clinic, long time Port Orford physician Dr. Thomas Pitchford has expressed interest in leaving the clinic at the end of this year. At this point he will stay and help the clinic for a while longer during the interim.

Curry Family Medical Clinic manager Judy Scholten said Venes and Webb had written a letter of resignation to the clinic in July giving them 60 day notice. They stated that things weren't working out and it wasn't a good fit. They will be pursuing other endeavors. The clinic is currently looking for another doctor.

Blanco Step Dancers

On Saturday, July 31, the Blanco Step Dancers won the KURY \$1,000 talent competition at the Curry County Fair in Gold Beach. 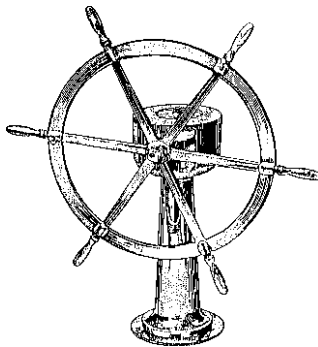

Science or Dignity Graeme Graydon



For several years before I left New Zealand, I was director of a small museum which presented one thousand years of the history of the local Maori people. They were never one people but rather members of one tribe or another always fighting each other for the most trivial reasons. My own farm and many others in the district had been the scenes of full-scale battles, the latest fought about 1820. When human remains of these conflicts were found, it would spark bickering between the tribes over who had jurisdiction over them. So when a farmer inadvertently uncovered human bones, the police would call me to "take care of them". I never found a proper burial. It was always someone who had died in that spot from some kind of violence and the bones were all that were left of the ancient drama. There was no way to know which tribe the bones belonged to, so after I had made my investigation, I discretely and respectfully buried them in places known only to me with appropriate ceremony.

However, there was one time that tested me beyond anything I had known. The museum received word that a farmer was willing to allow us to check out an undisturbed, pre-European battle site on his hill-farm. All battle sites become "tapu" or holy to the Maoris; once the killing is done - no Maori, even today would return to such a place. We were led to an exquisite, fortified village in a bush-clad gully. I could see the paths, the trenches, palisades and home sites. Our team got to work, getting an overview, taking some measurements. I climbed down below the fortifications to a dear mountain stream and saw little heaps of human bones everywhere, each one being the remains of one human. All the skulls were fractured or smashed in. The evidence revealed a secure community that had been surprised, run down and murdered in one terrible morning raid. It was awesome to stand in such a beautiful place surrounded by the remains of people who, either dead or dying, had been thrown from the ramparts above.

One of our team called out that he had discovered the food storage pit, an ingenious root cellar found in all village sites. It was a chamber hollowed out in a hill-

side with a very narrow entrance at its 94 roof". I squeezed through the narrow hole trusting the guys outside to hold my feet and hung down into it. My flash-light revealed the semi-preserved bodies of several people. The last body thrown in, I judged to be a woman. Her long black hair was matted with blood from a head wound. I felt such a surge of compassion for this woman - I wanted to reach out and touch her hair tenderly, but I disturbed nothing, recorded as much as I could visually and signaled to be pulled out. Scientifically, it was my job to investigate, to measure every trace of human endeavor. But we didn't. Nothing was gathered, no photos taken, no report made - nothing published I was unable to disregard the enormity of the abuse to these people. I could feel their sad presence still, unaware that they had died, waiting for the next attack which never came. We left them there in that quiet place, to the ferns, the stream and the birds of the New Zealand bush - at least I thought I did, but that's another story.

Letter to the Editor,

The Point Orford Heritage Society recently acquired the rights to a Decommissioned Coast Guard 36-foot motor launch thanks to the cooperation of the Bandon Port Commission.

Attempts to bring this historic vessel home have been frustrating, to say the least. Problems have cropped up all along the way. The big problem is the bronze keel. The ship was designed as self-righting, which is a very essential feature for a life saving vessel, as more likely than not the ship is working under adverse conditions in heavy surf removing persons who find themselves struggling for life against hostile elements.

What this means is that the ship is very heavy, almost 10,000 lbs. Which translates into the fact that it takes more than just hopping into a pickup and hauling it 20 some miles down 101 to its home here in Port Orford.

The problems seem to get bigger the closer it gets to actually getting the ship here. Once the ship finally gets down here another problem raises its ugly head. Understand that this ship was a gift from the Port of Bandon to the Point Orford Heritage Society, which is to say that it belongs to the people of Port Orford and the Society is entrusted with deciding how and where to display it.

It should go without saying that it would be best to have it in the near proximity of

Recreation Fee Protest

Nearly 180 coast-lovers braved threatening weather to protest federal recreational fees for access to the shore at three coast locations on Saturday. Organized by the Oregon Shores Conservation Coalition, the protesters were there to express opposition to the Recreation Fee Demonstration Program, which has imposed charges throughout the Siuslaw National Forest, for the entire Oregon Dunes National Recreation Area, and at Yaquina Head.

The coastal protests were part of a national Fee Protest Day against the federal program, with hundreds of demonstrators turning out at more than 30 locations around the country.

Some 90 protesters were on hand at the Dunes Overlook, waving signs and handing out flyers. Many took turns at a bullhorn, giving personal testimony against the fees. One was North Bend Mayor Lee Golder, who argued that "Fee-Demo," as the program is called, is harming tourism and economic development in his area. "I get calls weekly, sometimes daily, at city hall, at work and at home, from citizens who are irate about the fees," Golder said.

"This is a battle in which public education is the key," said Oregon Shores Conservation Coalition's Phillip Johnson. "Most people don't know about the hidden agenda behind the Fee-Demo program.

They don't realize that this is the beginning of an effort by the commercial recreation industries to privatize public lands, to turn them over to more and more developed recreation run by private concessionaires who want to turn nature into a theme park.

"When people realize that this could lead to commercializing the very experience of visiting the natural world," Johnson added, "we will see overwhelming public opposition to fees charged for access to our public lands."

Free Immunizations

If you have private insurance or have OHP we will bill your insurance company. If you have no insurance coverage the immunizations are free to you.

This is a perfect time to get your kids up-to-date before school starts. Please call your doctor or local Curry County Health Department for more information about immunizations in Port Orford 332-4041, Gold Beach 247-7011.

Letter to the Editor,

I am writing this letter in support of the proposed law enforcement levy which is on the ballot for September 21, 1999.

In the three years that I have been in office, I have watched the numbers in law enforcement budgets dwindle while spending on other programs increases.

When I campaigned for office, I promised that I would be tough on drugs. After building a team with local public safety officers and their professional assistance, we have been putting drug distributors and manufacturers into the prison system at a rate ten times that of my predecessors. This is addition to maintaining a full county jail.

Additionally there is a major problem in the area of child and spousal abuse in the county. This has grown to a magnitude to where my office has added an additional abuse advocate and designated a deputy district attorney to specialize in this area. This is being paid for with grant funds.

However, these functions may cease to be available if the sheriff's levy doesn't pass. The amount of time necessary to investigate these and other crimes is

growing while the resources are decreasing. Increasing the number of road deputies will help insure a good safe environment for all of us. The small increase in our property tax rates will be more than offset by an increase in property values and the lowering of our theft and vandalism insurance costs.

I encourage you to study the pending levy, calculate exactly the impact (both pro and con) on your personal life, and vote FOR peace of mind in September.

2CJ - Registration

Registration for students attending schools in Port Orford-Langlois School District is scheduled for Thursday and Friday, August 26th and 27th from 9am to 12 noon and 1pm to 3pm. Students who reside south of the Elk River and are entering pre-school through grade five should register at Driftwood Elementary in Port Orford. Students residing north of the Elk River entering pre-school through grade five should register at Blanco School in Langlois. Students entering grades six

through eight should register at Blanco School. Students in grades nine through twelve will be registered at Pacific High School. The first day of school is Tuesday, September 7th.

Students registering with the district for the first time should bring immunization records with them at the time of registration, and pre-school and kindergarten students will also need to present proof of birth. The first day of school for all 2CJ students is Tuesday, September 8th.

School activity fees for students are as follows: Sixth, seventh and eighth grades - \$10.00, ninth through twelfth - \$10.00 for student body and \$7.00 for towels.

The Port Orford-Langlois School District participates in the national school lunch and breakfast programs. Free and reduced-priced meals are available for students unable to pay the full price for meals. The household size and income determine eligibility. Application forms and a letter explaining the program will be sent home with all students registering in the district. No child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap.

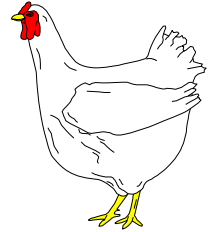
