### Election 2000

The doomsayers are disappointed as the new century arrived last weekend safely and smoothly. Computers continued working and electrical power was uninterrupted.

Banks are returning the extra cash to the Federal Reserve they had on hand for a run on withdrawals. The water, batteries and gas many of us stocked up on will come in handy. The biggest news item on New Year's eve was the resignation of Russian president Boris Yeltsin.

The year 2000 is a presidential election year and after eight years Americans will choose a successor to Bill Clinton. They begin voting in a series of presidential primaries on Tuesday, February 1 in New Hampshire. State law in New Hampshire requires their primary to be the first in the nation. As other state primaries have been moved up earlier in the year New Hampshire has had to keep one step ahead.

There are several local races up for grabs this year. Curry County Commissioner positions numbers 2 and 3 are up for election. The incumbent in position number 2 is Lloyd Olds and in number 3 Bill

Roberts. Roberts told me on Monday afternoon that he is seriously considering running for reelection but wants Lloyd Olds also to run again. I spoke with Olds on Tuesday and asked him what he plans on doing. He said he may reconsider his earlier statements that he wouldn't seek a second term. Olds said, "I have said I had no intention of running again but I'm getting a lot of pressure to run." He has received many phone calls and faxes supporting a run for a second term. Olds continued that he didn't want to see the things he and Roberts accomplished fall apart including changes in community corrections and animal control.

Other county positions up for election are county clerk, county assessor and district attorney. County candidates have until March 7 to file for office. The Oregon primary election will be held on May 16.

Two candidates openly running for county commissioner have filed political action committees. They are Lucie LaBonte and Port Orford City Councilor Nathaniel Wander. They have not declared which position they will run for in the Democratic primary. Gold Beach Mayor Marilyn Schafer has thrown her hat in the ring for Commissioner position number 2 in the Republican primary and has taken out her prospective petition.

The positions of State Representative and State Senator are up for election this year. Incumbent State Senator Veral Tarno (District 24) has announced he will not run for reelection. State Representative Ken Messerle has announced he will run for the State Senator position on the Republican side. Two candidates have announced they will run for State Representative District 48 including Ophir tree farmer Wayne Krieger on the Republican ticket and Bandon city councilor Barbara Dodrill on the Democratic ticket.

All elections, including the upcoming primary are now "vote by mail." There will be a drop site at Port Orford City Hall for the primary election.

Much later on in the year the City of Port Orford will hold an election. The filing deadline for city council positions is September 7. The council election coincides with the presidential election on November 2. Four positions are up for election including three city council seats and the office of mayor. If you want a job where you attend many meetings, are not paid and don't receive the public appreciation you deserve go right on and apply. But seriously these people do a great job (even the ones I disagree with) and make many important decisions for our city and community. They deserve a pat on the back once in awhile.

**Hospice Memory Tree**

The season for the annual Light Up A Life celebration has come to a close for Curry County Hospice. The holiday themed memorial event was the most successful ever, according to organizers.

More than 300 individuals were remembered although at press time donations and remembrances were still being received by the agency. Final numbers will be released later in January.

The Hospice Memorial Tree was located at Buck's Sentry Market in Port Orford this year. The commemorative ornaments displayed the names of those remembered and were printed on recycled CD's, designed by a local hospice volunteer. The ornaments will be sent to the individuals who requested them at the time of donation.

This annual event is made possible by the financial support of local businesses, including Klamath First Federal Bank,

Chetco Credit Union, Freeman Marine, Bay Printers, and Coast Auto Center. Proceeds from the project are used for Hospice services to patients throughout Curry County, including medical care, medications, supplies, and equipment for terminally ill individuals. This assures that all individuals who are eligible for these services are able to receive them, regardless of financial or insurance circumstances.

**Letter to the Editor,**

I would like to ask anyone who is interested in light pollution (glare, light trespass, sky glow, energy waster) to take a

few moments when traveling around town in the daytime to look at the various types of fixtures that light our streets, yards, and parking lots. That way you can note the types of lenses or shades (or lack of). Example: There are two types of overhead street lights on Highway 101 in Port Orford, provided by Coos Curry Electric Cooperative. Both types are called cobra head fixtures. One type has a flat slightly recessed lens (Good) that cuts off the light and the second type has a drop-lens (Bad) that produces glare and uplighting. The next time you are out after dark you can spot the Bad lights immediately from a great distance by the excessive glare, noting the difference when passing the flat lens type. You will appreciate the difference and begin to judge other fixtures for the way they have been engineered to direct light. This concludes our first self guided Dark-Sky field trip.

The anger doesn't go away, it goes into storage all raw and pissy, somewhere inside me- one anger after another. As it builds it gets harder to contain and begins to show in nasty little ways. So the Ego , ( whose duties include keeping me out of trouble), calls for a lower-back pain, sciatica, fibromyalgia, tendonitis, whatever as a highly efficient focus to distract any attention from the bottled feelings. "I did

But the point is - I got angry with good reason, I expressed it and it was over- clean, nothing stored. Alas, such moments of truth were rare and I continued to store a lot of stuff in order to be a good boy, husband, father and farmer

The most dubious resolve that I made as a kid was to '~never get angry with my wife when I grew up.'" Can you imagine how much went into storage with that promise? It leaked out like toxic waste disguised as - I'm too busy, or, by being late, or, I have to do this *first*, or by not caring. Before I was forty, I had upper arm weakness that came and went for several years, becoming so bad that I had weekly treatments right up to the time I left New Zealand. On the day I flew, the pain disappeared for 15 years. Now that was interesting. During a stressful time in 1984, I developed crippling pains in the sole of my foot. The best treatment that I could get in New York City gave a day or two of relief The morning I flew to Martinique to start a new business, the pain stopped and has never returned- - another clue. There was nothing wrong with my foot, it was just keeping me from noticing the emotional mess that I was living in.

These days, when pain flares, the first thing I do is to look at what is bugging me, to see if there is anything I have to change or to understand- then I think about a remedy or a service. I suspect that my old teacher was 100 % right when he said - "One day, science will understand that all disease springs from the emotions."

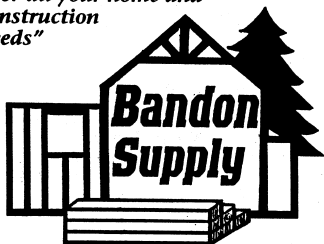

### **Watershed Meeting on Gravel**

Riparian gravel removal on rivers in Curry County will be the topic of discussion at the January 6, 2000 combined meeting of the South Coast Coordinating Watershed Council and Lower Rogue Watershed Council. The meeting is scheduled to begin at 7 PM at the newly renovated Gold Beach City Hall.

Dan Crumley, Curry County Roadmaster and representatives from Freeman Rock and Tidewater will be discussing how gravel is removed in the riparian areas on the Chetco and Rogue rivers and on Hunter Creek. There will also be a representative from Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife to explain how gravel removal is accomplished with considerations for fish populations

Recently the Curry County Citizen Involvement Committee voted the following motion; "Curry County shall work

towards the elimination of riparian gravel removal and its replacement with upland mining to the extent such gravel mining is required to meet the economic and social needs of the county". The County Commissioners will have the final vote on whether Curry County should make regulations more restrictive than state and federal regulations.

The South Coast / Lower Rogue Watershed Council Meeting is open to the public and the public is encouraged to attend and participate.

### **Pretty Park.EXE Warning by Valerie Jean Kramer**

I received an email last weekend which had the program "Pretty Park.EXE" attached. Most people just think of computer "viruses" but there are many different kinds of programs that try to do things to your computer which you do not wish done. Pretty Park is a rather famous version of the type of program known as a "worm". It does several things:

- 1) It insinuates itself into your system so that it will regain control of your system after a reboot or power off/on.
- 2) It sends a copy of itself to everyone in your email directory every 30 minutes so that it can take over even more systems.
- 3) It provides a "back door" through which others can enter your system and get information about you and your computer including any passwords you may use.

This last aspect is the most dangerous feature. As we do more and more business via the web, we have more and more at risk should someone gain access

to our credit card numbers, bank account passwords, etc.

The good news is that the Pretty Park.EXE file (or any other EXE file) doesn't do anything to your system unless you run it. In my case, I knew the name and would not have run it anyway but it wouldn't have mattered even if someone had changed the name - it was caught immediately upon receipt by my anti-virus program which checks each email as it comes in.

Should you be so unfortunate as to get this program and execute it, you will need to remove it as quickly as possible. It's a rather tricky process and goes like this:

Using REGEDIT (Start / Run / Regedit) navigate thru the entries as follows:

The Health and Human Services Administration for Children and Families announced that the Head Start program received the highest score of any government agency and private companies, even surpassing the ratings of Mercedes-Benz and BMW, in the latest American Customer Satisfaction Index (ACSI) released recently by the President's Management Council. The 1999 overall customer satisfaction index for the Head Start program is 87, based on a survey of Head Start parents, 15 points above the current national average score of 73.

"The outstanding results of this customer satisfaction survey show us that we are certainly on the right tract in the Head Start program," said Betty Albertson, South Coast Head Start Director. "It is gratifying that parents whose children are getting the benefit of Head Start's early education feel respected, included and satisfied with this program's place in their lives."

Parent's satisfaction with the program was measured by asking questions about Head Start's benefits for the child and questions about its benefits for the family. Two other components were major drives of satisfaction. The first is the customer's expectation of the quality of Head Start before he/she had experience with it and the second is his/her overall

perception of the quality delivered after experience with Head Start.

Further the survey found that on a scale of 1-100 for parent trust of the program, Head Start rated an outstanding 94. The parent trust rating is derived from responses to two questions: 1) How confident are you that Head Start will do a good job of providing preschool education to children in the future? And) 2) How willing would you be to recommend Head Start to other parents of preschool children?

## Family Community Leadership

Oregon State University Extension is recruiting volunteers to participate in the Family Community Leadership (FCL) Program. FCL is an Extension volunteer program which focuses on leadership, public policy and group process.

FCL teams are active in 24 Oregon counties with goals for educational improvement, increased participation in public affairs and strengthened effectiveness for community leaders. The partnership of volunteers and OSU Extension staff offers workshops and leadership services of local interest and concern. All but one of Oregon's 36 counties have participated in the FCL program. Teams from Oregon Soil and Water Conservation Districts, and Oregon Commission on Children and Families have also participated in the leadership institute in past years. About 20 percent of the participants are high school students from around the state. Evaluations have shown that youth and adults enjoy working together on leadership activities.

Four applicants selected from Curry County will join approximately 100 others from around the state at the FCL State

Training Institute, which will be held March 7, 8 and 9, 2000 on the Warm Springs Indian Reservation in Jefferson County.

"In exchange for the training, each team member pledges 200 hours of payback on project activities," explains Rayma Davis, who will be working with the Curry County team upon completion of the training.

There is a \$50 registration fee for which participants receive a comprehensive OSU Extension Leadership Training Manual. The program pays lodging and group meals at the State Training Institute.

The FCL program is open to anyone interested in leadership training for community involvement regardless of age, sex, race or religion. Applications will be accepted until January 19. A mandatory orientation meeting will be held on Thursday, January 20, from 3:00-5:00pm at Southwestern Oregon Community College's Brookings Center at 420 Alder Street, Brookings.
