The Port Orford City Council spent two hours discussing the Chamber of Commerce's future operation of the Visitor Center in Battle Rock Park on Monday morning.

The council was responding to a letter from the Chamber regarding the Chamber termination of its operation of the Visitor Center as of April 30 with the stipulation that would run it for May and June for \$1250 per month paid in advance.

Chamber board member and past president Jay Stoler gave the council an overview of the situation since 1997 when the Chamber signed a contract to running the visitor center. Stoler told the council the Chamber has spent no money on advertising since September 1999 and that the Chamber was now paying to keep the center open. Councilor Nathaniel Wander asked Stoler for clarification about the differing functions of advertising and of keeping the visitor center open. Stoler told him the center was for everybody describing it as a "Unitarian" approach. Stoler told the council it takes more than the \$9,000 per year the city gives them to

keep the center open. He told the council the Chamber didn't keep separate bank accounts for city bed tax money and chamber money. Wander explained to Stoler that this was a clear violation of the city's contract with the Chamber. Councilor Robert Warring asked Stoler what benefits the Chamber receives for operating the visitor center. Stoler told him the Chamber is the only group in town whose only job is hospitality and that through the center it makes contacts with people. Councilor Norm Leeling asked Stoler if the Chamber kept separate records for operating the visitor center and regular Chamber business. Stoler told him the monies go into the general fund.

Wander asked Stoler if there was any documentation of benefits to the City from the visitor center. Stoler said the bed tax receipts could show a trend but city administrator Martha Weaver-Britell said the figures had been flat. Those figures for the past three years are as follows:

1997-98	\$24,437
1998-99	\$29,828
1999-00	\$26,813

Councilor Warring said that the city has recognized the visitor center is important to the city but then asked if this was

enough of a priority to pay more money to the Chamber. Councilor Ralph Donaldson said in his opinion the sole purpose of the operation of the visitor center is to promote businesses and the sale of goods and services. He went on to add the business environment is important to everyone in the city. Donaldson noted the city had missed an opportunity to beautify Highway 101. Donaldson reminded the Chamber of their opposition to the Copper-Salmon Wilderness, which he thought could be a bonus for the area. He asked for a joint committee of council and chamber members to discuss ways to improve the business environment in Port Orford.

Councilor Jim Campbell reminded the council that the Chamber was a victim of their own success. He said Port Orford would be going in the wrong direction if the council didn't keep the center going. Councilor Warring said it was no business of the City to support the Chamber or local businesses. He said the city should spend more on the police and infrastructure. Councilor Norm Leeling asked if the visitor center was essential to the City. He said the council needs to determine how much money to put in the Chamber but noted the city has other problems including the watershed. Councilor Wan-

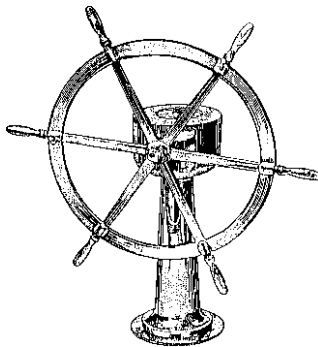

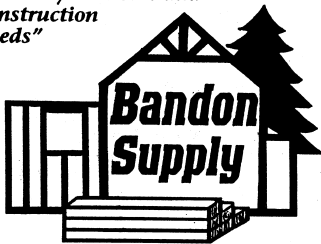

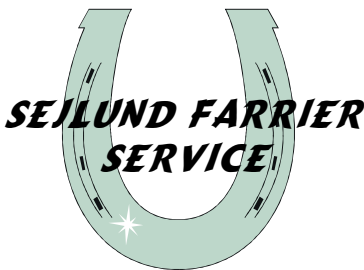

Fair Share Asked

In response to rising oil prices, Representative Peter DeFazio introduced legislation on April 13 to decrease the cost of maintaining the U.S. military presence in the Persian Gulf. The Persian Gulf Security Cost Fairness Act will require allies in the Gulf Cooperation Council to assume 75 percent of the burden of maintaining U.S. military protection in the region.

“As a world power, we have leverage over OPEC members,” said DeFazio. “Why should we continue to support the oil barons that colluded to raise the price of oil, and in turn hike up prices at the pumps.”

The cost of the U.S. presence in the Persian Gulf was \$1.64 billion in 1998, \$1.24 billion in 1999 and is estimated to be \$1.04 billion in fiscal year 2000. The majority of the costs are attributable to the enforcement of “no-fly zones” over northern and southern Iraq. According to a 1999 Department of Defense report, the U.S. OPEC allies only defray these costs by about 25 percent.

Countries receiving U.S. military assistance, who are also OPEC members, include Bahrain, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, and the United Arab Emirates.

der said it was his priority to keep the visitor center open. He suggested the possibility of running it with a city employee and using city equipment. He said the contract between the Chamber and city should be upheld. Wander said comingling the funds was illegal and a major violation of state law. He then scolded Jay Stoler for speaking out of order when Stoler spoke without being recognized by the chair.

Councilor Warring said the bed tax funds are city monies and that bed tax funds can be expended wherever the council designates. Councilor Wander asked the city administrator if the city could operate the visitor center for the rest of the fiscal year. Martha Weaver-Britell said the city can operate the center by putting city recorder LaRae Liston down there but how much they keep it open depends on the amount of volunteers.

Councilor Jane Cramer said she thought the brochures the Chamber sends out don't do a lot of good. She said people stop at Battle Rock Park to use the restrooms and because of the pretty view and easy beach access. Both Cramer and

Nathaniel Wander made motions to deal with the situation but both of them were withdrawn. Mayor Gary Doran asked that the council work out the situation. Councilor Warring said the city was not at fault for this situation and they had acted in good faith. Councilor Wander offered a second motion. This being the council require the Chamber of Commerce to fulfill their contract with the city through June 30, 2000 in exchange for which the city pay for the operating expenses and salary but not the cost of mailing brochures. The vote was 4-2 in favor of the motion with Donaldson and Campbell voting no. Campbell had objected to the use of the word "require" in the motion.

Then the council turned its attention to paying for their motion. Martha Weaver-Britell told the council the cash carryover for fiscal year 1999-2000 was at the uncomfortable level of \$30,000. Chamber president John Ineson told the council the chamber letter was very explicit in stating if the city didn't pay the \$1,250 in advance that the chamber was getting out of the visitor center. Councilor Warring said this was a bad precedent for the city to be getting into and the Chamber shouldn't be dictating to the city.

Councilor Wander made a motion that the council agree to pay the Chamber \$1,250 a month for May and June to keep the visitor center operating and ultimately the council will modify the bed tax ordinance so that the money will come from the bed tax.. The vote was 5-1 in favor with Robert Warring voting no.

The Chamber was instructed to send a letter addressed to Mayor Gary Doran if they intend not to renew their contract for 2000-01 to operate the visitor center. The city council will consider the bed tax ordinance in its entirety at a special meeting on May 15 at 7:00pm.
