This recent weekend Port Orford played host to a successful Arts and Seafood Festival. The weather even cooperated and the rain occurred after hours.

I started my festival fun on Saturday morning by going over to the Port Orford Community Building for a cup of delicious clam chowder at the Soft Shell Café. Last year I arrived at the American Legion Hall only to find the clam chowder sold out so this year I took no chances and showed up early.

I toured the junk art show in the American Legion Hall and cast my vote for the best of the sculptures. It turned out that the sculpture I voted for won – Ernie Gordon's truck made from old television and refrigerator parts. Gordon's prize was two \$7.00 gift certificates for the Curry Transfer and Recycle Station.

Then I went into the Community Building to see what the craftspeople had for sale and came away with a piece of the old wooden Port Orford dock. I bought a pen and pencil holder made by Charles Hollowell from a piece of one of the

wooden planks and have it on my desk. Valerie couldn't resist the birdhouses that sported a big cat face (and a small mouse) on the front. She apologizes but she was too excited by her purchase to make note of who made it. A total of 600 people went through the Festival Center on Saturday and another 400 on Sunday.

Please permit me to gush a bit now. I want to say a few things about the Arts and Seafood Festival chairperson, that being Tobe Porter. This was her third year as festival chairperson and she oversaw a very successful event once again. I volunteered to sell sweatshirts and tee shirts for the Arts Council down at the albacore barbecue and got to overhear what some of the people were saying in line. One woman was down here for the festival from Astoria because she had read about it in the local newspaper. I call that music to my ears. Tobe Porter understands the importance of publicity and especially getting the word out to a large geographic audience and that's what happened. She really did our little town a great service as head of the Arts Festival committee and deserves a big thank you.

Tobe does all this work on behalf of the Arts Festival in her "spare" time. Her day jobs include being librarian at both the Port Orford and Langlois libraries. The Langlois Library is getting closer to

building a new 3,100 square foot building and needs another \$80,000 to make it happen. Tobe's goal is for the library building to be rebid in January 2001. The Friends of the Port Orford are saving money for a new Port Orford Library.

I spoke with Tobe on Tuesday afternoon and she said she was thrilled with how the festival went. She summed it up by saying what it was all about to her was knowing people enjoyed it.

Valerie and I hosted a show of the art, poetry, sculpture and Star Trek models of Will Van Dorin at the Fun Zone. One problem we had this year as well as last with his show is we can't move all the videotapes out of the way so most of his work is displayed "on high," above the videos, in the store and it caused a bit of confusion. Thanks to all of you who came by and saw some samples of Will's work once you figured out where to look. I'm proud to own several of Van Dorin's works and count him and his wife Jan as good friends.

Sunday the decks were cleared for an all day adventure with the Arts Festival. I started with lox and bagels and hot coffee provided by the Chamber of Commerce at the Soft Shell Café and then it was on to the Rotary Club Show 'n Shine Car

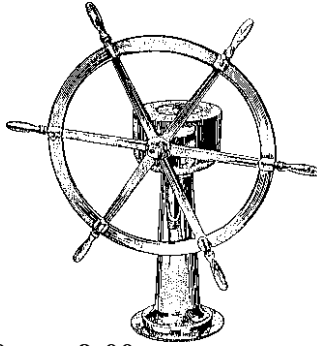

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Thoughts on Generations By Graeme Graydon



One of the biggest surprises, when I came to this country, was to find a pronounced separation of generations. There was a distinct culture according to the age of people. It was most evident with the teen-agers, (who by now are parents of teen-agers themselves). The hardest thing to understand however, was that the seniors, for whatever reason, were well separated from their families except for the usual Christmas and Thanksgiving formalities - which raises a tricky question. If, in the course of years an elder gathers some wisdom or understanding, how can s/he share it with young minds, still eager to learn, when the generations don't want to talk or listen to each other. In this country more than any other I know, it hasn't been OK to be old. Other cultures value their elders, they have a place of prestige in the community, respected and sometimes honored by all, and they do not live completely separated from them.

The separation has become so great, that retirees do their best to get away from their families, and we are now having to build special facilities for teen-agers to keep them amused and occupied. Taking care of children for mothers and caretaking of seniors for families, are both thriving industries - and very expensive to maintain.

I believe that people need people. Babies need the confident arms of older people, children need to appreciate the process of growing older joyfully by knowing people who are already there. Teen-agers need the opportunity to question the hearts and minds of respected elders other than their parents. Young parents need their children to teach them to be parents, and the encouragement of an elder generation who have survived parenting. Elders need young, clean minds around them to keep them on their toes and teens to keep them from being stuffy and complacent. Young ones need to see age and understand that death is as natural as birth. Old folk need to see birth to remind them of their own to come.

My favorite person, when I was 10, was a very old gentleman, Tom Cox, who

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greeted me once a week at church. He always made me feel good - Granny Proctor, (who wasn't related at all), lived all alone in a tiny cottage with a magic garden halfway between the home of my parents and the first farm I worked on. She was in her 80's when I was a late teen with a big BSA motorbike. I loved to drop in on her, she was so special. At high school, we begged our teachers to tell of their experiences in the war, things they wanted to forget but we wanted to know. I learned about sex, not from my peers, but from older, married men who respected me and their own sexual expression

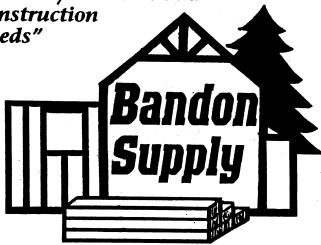
Now that I am an elder, (I suppose), I don't expect younger people to take much notice of me, but when they do, it makes me feel that I am as young as they are, there's really no generation separation at all.

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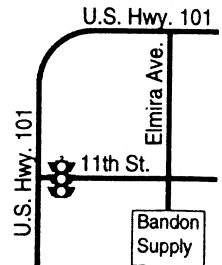
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Cranberry Festival Coronation

To all patrons of the Port Orford Rural Fire District.

Reason for my personal choice of resignation v/s recall election.

1. The first reason is after inquiring of the Curry County Elections office, I am told the election would cost \$1,000 and even though several friends have advised me to challenge or contest this problem I personally feel the taxpayers of this fire district have a better use of fire protection dollars than spend the money on a recall election that law required the fire district to "foot the bill."
2. To have pursued this course of battling politically to hold an unpaid position plus create hard feelings among patrons pro and con for my recall it seems to me the right and proper thing to do is resign.
3. It is my hope that all patrons of this fire district who are interested in the progressive improvement to their fire protection seek the truth and actual facts of some serious problems that exist within this community.
4. All patrons in the fire district who are interested in their fire protection need to understand the various rea-

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sons past and present Boards planned, cleared, and built the fire station at the Cedar Terrace location.

5. The chief petitioner Lu Cobb and her group were on the past board of the Port Orford Rural Fire District and were part of planning for this necessary improvement in locating fire apparatus more central throughout the district.
6. Serving on the Port Orford Rural Fire Board, and originally carrying the petition to help form the district in its beginning has been a great feeling of accomplishment for myself to have been involved with these twenty three years of both board service and fire service.
7. I plan on keeping very interested and with optimism that both city and rural negotiating teams can come up with a new set of business like contractual agreement that fits both entities and the net result be all parties, city council, fire department and rural district working in harmony in the very near future.

Saving Water Tips

Never put water down the drain when there may be another use for it such as watering a plant or garden, or cleaning.

Verify that your home is leak-free, because many homes have hidden water leaks. Read your water meter before and after a two-hour period when no water is being used. If the meter does not read

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exactly the same, there is a leak.

Repair dripping faucets by replacing washers. If your faucet is dripping at a rate of one drop per second, you can expect to waste 2,700 gallons per year which will add to the cost of water and sewer utilities, or strain your septic tank.

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Voters' Pamphlet

Secretary of State Bill Bradbury prepared Oregonians for the size and breadth of the November Voters' Pamphlet. "The Voters' Pamphlet will be two volumes, one for candidates and one for measures. We are expecting the measure volume to exceed 360 pages," Bradbury stated. "It will be the largest pamphlet the Secretary of State has ever produced."

The size of the Voters' Pamphlet is due to a record 607 arguments purchased on the 26 ballot measure voters will decide in November. The previous record was 365 arguments in the November 1996 pamphlet. Each argument costs \$500 and the

state poses no limitations on how many arguments can be submitted.

"This year's measure pamphlet will look different to voters," Bradbury said. "Since it is so thick, it cannot be stapled, so it will be bound like a phone book and will be about as thick as the white pages for Eugene and Springfield."

"I don't want voters to be scared off by so much information, so I will be clearly labeling the impartial explanatory committee statement, fiscal impact statement and text of each measure," Bradbury said. "The impartial information will be marked with a printed tab so voters can go right to it and it will be immediately clear

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what is impartial information and what is paid political advertising."

Bradbury made the decision to go the phone book style, called "perfect binding," when it became clear that the measure book would have been divided in two if it were stapled. The separate candidates' volume will be stapled and will look more familiar to voters. "By binding the measure pamphlet like a book we are not only eliminating the confusion of having three pamphlets, we are also making this tool more user friendly," Bradbury stated.

"It is important to me that the elections process remain as accessible and understandable as possible and these improvements are a step in the right direction," Bradbury stated.

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Letter to the Editor,

The Democratic Party of Coos County wants to go on record as being in opposition to Ballot Measure 97, which would ban trapping. It would prohibit the use of leghold traps and other body-gripping traps to capture mammals and would prohibit the sale, purchase, barter or exchange of raw fur from mammals trapped in Oregon.

Here's why the Democratic Party of Coos County believes this Measure just doesn't make sense. First, it would ban common mole and gopher traps. Second, it would require a permit for trapping nuisance animals. Third, violations

could result in a Class A Misdemeanor with fines up to \$5,000 per animal and one year in jail. Furthermore, head gates, which are used to hold cattle, sheep and horses while receiving essential lifesaving medical treatment, could be banned. Lariats used to rope cattle at rodeos could be banned. Finally, snares and catchpoles used by animal control officers to restrain vicious dogs could also be banned.

To conclude, if Ballot Measure 97 were passed it would limit resource management decisions by professionals and turn the decision-making process into a complicated system of bureaucratic red tape. It would increase crop and livestock dam-

age causing significant economic hardship to South Coast farmers and ranchers and would create an additional crime, which would tax our already overworked District Attorney. Vote NO on Ballot Measure 97.
