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RVs Welcome Here By Evan Kramer



The Port Orford City Council met on Monday night and began with Mayor Gary Doran speaking about this being National Work Zone Awareness Week. The

mayor reminded people to be aware of workers out there working in street right of ways and slow down for them.

Councilor Jane Cramer asked about the status of the temporary public works utility worker to replace Nick Paige. Public works director Allan Wagner told her the city had received three applications and he and city administrator Martha Weaver would schedule interviews soon.

Wagner said two security lights had been installed at the south end of the tennis courts in Buffington Park and added they were dark skycap equipped. Wagner's written public works report said that 4.527 million gallons of water had been produced at the water treatment plant in March. The sewer plant treated 3.304 million gallons of waste water in March.

The council considered the police department report and councilor Robert Warring said that the department priorities needed to be reconsidered. He said they weren't fulfilling the basic project, which he said was to regulate traffic. Police officer Milo Arnesen responded to Warring and told him the department was legally obligated to respond to any criminal matter. Arnesen said traffic couldn't take priority over criminal. Warring said maybe we ought to just quit if we can't focus on traffic. Warring said he had seen a log truck speeding through town at 40 miles per hour that morning. Arnesen said the fastest he had ever clocked a truck at in town was 42 miles per hour while he had clocked cars at up to 65 miles per hour. Jack Pruitt suggested the department get a device that flashes your speed as you drive by it. Police Chief Bill Rush said he had looked into a radar trailer detector and they cost from \$3,000 to \$5,000. He said the one in Gold Beach had been subjected to vandalism.

The first item on the agenda under old business was the visitor information signs and RV parking at Battle Rock Park. A couple of weeks ago when ODOT put up the Visitor Information signs they also installed signs under them saying "NO RV Turnaround" but they were taken down within a few days. The city did not request these signs be placed there. Councilor Carl Eskelson said he and Allan Wagner had inspected the area at the south end of town and there were a lot of confusing signs. Shell Shack owner



Paula Dearing told the council she was not in favor of the no RV turnaround policy. She was concerned it would have a tremendous effect on the businesses located at the Wayfinder/Battle Rock Park. Dearing said the sign was not welcoming. The council had received a letter from the Port Orford Chamber of Commerce recommending vehicle length restrictions with longer length vehicles parking elsewhere. John Ineson reminded the council it had many infrastructure problems and in reference to the signs asked them why fix something that is working. Ineson said he had seen a 45' moving van with a sleeper rig turn around in the park.

Pricilla Harris, a volunteer at the Visitor Center, said that if the parking lot was full it was a problem. She recommended restricting RVs to the east side of the parking lot spaces. Councilor Norm Leeling said he would like to see signs painted in the RV spaces saying "RV parking" and a sign that said "limited RV turnaround in park." He was also against time limits for parking. Councilor Jim Campbell said we needed a sign which said certain length vehicles don't go down there but didn't say how long. Councilor Emily Francona asked about the insurance claim against the city. Martha Weaver



The Little People by Graeme Graydon



I heard a radio-columnist weaving a tale about the Little People. For sure, she had a good helping of the Irish in herself, but she reminded me of the incredible, lost

world of the unseen that we live in. I can't go to any point in my life where I could sav - "the first time I considered elves or gnomes," because they were always there for me - I was born that way, most children are – after all, a child has recently returned from the unseen world and has innate knowings that adults have been made to forget. I never actually saw one of them, but I was quite sure that they were there, busy and important in the quiet, secret world of Nature. I can remember wriggling or climbing into some exquisite hide-away, maybe a dell in a garden or a shaded pool in a creek – there was no question that I was intruding, that I had startled someone, interrupted something and that I had to be very respectful. Later on, when I took to climbing mountains, I hiked through remote places where I

knew that I was watched, like an unwelcome invader. I could feel their collective sigh of relief when I moved on.

The most wonderful moments at Primary School were story times with Miss Glover, tales of adventure, struggle, magic and triumph. They were peopled with friendly elves, somewhat proper fairies, overbearing trolls and grumpy but wise, gnomes. I loved that the hero, who was just like me, always got the girl of his heart. I knew real fairies from the phony ones – the tooth fairy was my mother, Santa Claus was a no-show and of course, lifeless characters like Superman were just figments of the adult-erated mind.

I knew a lady who was a seer, she could see into the unseen world. From childhood she lived in full awareness and communication with the Little People. Her father, a missionary in China at the time, beat her severely enough to leave scars on her back – trying to get the Little People to go away. It is important to remember that elves and gnomes have a place in our world. They are the guardians and overseers who know a lot more about Nature than we do. Most of what we do is threatening or disturbing to them, they tend to leave when we show up. If you were an



elf, and your job was to take care of the micro-organisms in a garden soil, and your human threw Muriate of Potash all over the place, which is deadly to your microbes, what else could you do but leave – it would be heart-breaking.

When I became aware that there was nowhere left for the Little People to live on my farm, I made a pond, built a fence around it with no gate, and planted all kinds of trees and bamboo for them. Today, their private domain has become a place of wonder. Wild duck have their babies there, pheasants and quail make their nests. If you are very respectful, a young gnome may approach and invite you to sit quietly by his pool, to watch with him, over his Little Creatures.

A local celebration of a Season for Non Violence was observed in Port Orford on Tuesday, April 3. Smith had walked from Brookings to Gold Beach the previous day but that day had driven from Gold Beach to Port Orford to give his body a rest. The group then walked over to the American Legion Hall for a delicious vegetarian potluck dinner followed by homemade desserts and music provided by Ed and Nancy Dowdy, Tracy Carter and Sandy Shely.

The Season for Non Violence is a 64-day campaign held between January 30 and April 4 – two dates which mark the memorial anniversaries of Mahatma Gandhi and Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. The purpose statement of the organization is as follows: Our purpose is to create an awareness of nonviolent principles and practice as a powerful way to heal, transform and empower our lives and our communities. Through an educational and community action campaign, we are honoring those who use nonviolence to build a community that honors the dignity and worth of every human being. We are demonstrating that every person can move the world in the direction of peace through their daily nonviolent choice and action.

Smith was walking to raise awareness of the vision of non-violence. He was greeted by a gathering, which he will long remember at the American Legion Hall, which had been wonderfully decorated. About 25 people of all ages shared the potluck dinner with Smith. He hadn't been met with a reception in Gold Beach or Brookings so Port Orford's warmth and generosity of spirit made a huge impression on him.


Whale Watch Report

Reporting from Battle Rock Park whale watching point were our trained volunteers Jim and Mechelle Billings. They reported that even though 5 of the 8 days visitors had to contend with rough seas or fog for viewing the migrating whales, there were still 228 visitors who signed in for the whale watch. The Oregon Coast spring whale watch officially ended on March 31.

Signing in were people from as far away as the United Kingdom and Sydney, Australia. The furthest away in the United States came from Dallas, Texas and Pillsburg, Missouri.

During these 8 days there were 37 whales spotted from this viewpoint. A pretty good count considering the weather was not on our side.

Although the whale watch season is officially over for the spring season you can still spot whales on their migration movement. The visitor center volunteers will be more than happy to let you know of any whale activity in the area, and don't forget the beautiful view the park has to offer.

said a person driving an RV at the park had damaged the steering mechanism in trying to turn it around. The city's insurance company had paid the claim against the city.

The council took no formal action on this matter. Allan Wagner will check with ODOT about what they allow and ask for their recommendations, and inquire about size limits on RVs at the park.

Mayor Doran appointed Kenneth Hansen to the Emergency Planning Committee and Wayne Westley to the Parks Commission. Jane Cramer made a motion for the council to accept the mayor's appointments and it passed 6-0.

The council considered the renewal agreement with the municipal court judge Howard Lichtig. Councilor Leeling made a motion to instruct the city administrator to check with the city attorney about a few questions the council had in the agreement. The motion carried 6-0.

Councilor Leeling made a motion the council approves Coos Curry Douglas Business Development Corporation as the grant administrator for the Community Development Block Grant sewer outfall project and it passed 6-0. CCD will be paid a \$15,000 fee from the grant.

The council heard a lengthy presentation from city treasurer Joyce Hodge concerning a proposed resolution making Port Orford a part of the PERS (Public Employees Retirement System) pool for city and county governments. She said the main purpose of rate pooling by local governments was to manage rate fluctuation. Martha Weaver said once the city elected to pool its rates it couldn't get out of the pool. Hodge said Bandon and Myrtle Point had elected to join the pool while Coos Bay and Gold Beach had elected to stay out. Councilor Leeling made a motion for the council to adopt the default schedule (as opposed to joining

the pool). The default rate is currently 8.68%. The council in the only close vote of the evening voted 3-2 in favor of the motion with one abstention.

Jane Cramer made a motion to accept the recommendation of the city administrator and give the utility clerk a raise effective April 1 (to \$7.50 an hour). Cramer said Patty Clark does an excellent job. The council passed the motion 6-0.

Norm Leeling made a motion to accept the city personnel subcommittee employee mid-year evaluation form and time frame for employee evaluations and it passed 6-0.

Jane Cramer made a motion the council adopts the job descriptions for the police chief, officer and clerk with the following changes. Instead of General Purpose change to General Duties. It passed 6-0.

Norm Leeling made a motion the council adopts the personnel subcommittee recommendations regarding the police chief evaluation and it passed 6-0.

The council made progress on the sewer outfall replacement project. Martha Weaver recommended sending a Request for Proposal for the design work to two of the companies, which had submitted Statements of Qualification for Design Engineering. The two companies are West Yost and SHN. The motion carried unanimously.

Some of the councilors gave liaison reports starting with Emily Francona. She said the Parks Commission had no volunteer for secretary. Norm Leeling recommended the commission use a high school student for work experience. Jane Cramer said the next Port meeting was on Tuesday, April 17. She recommended people attend the meeting and take more of an interest in the Port. Norm Leeling said April 22 would mark the twentyninth anniversary of Earth Day. He said that in conjunction with that the watershed council was holding a work party on Friday, April 20 to remove non-native vegetation in the city wetland interpretive center site. This is located between 16th and 17th streets on Highway 101.

Mayor Doran spoke about attending a foster parent conference (not related to city business) and spoke about the serious problems with fetal alcohol syndrome.

Jane Cramer said Martha Weaver was doing an excellent job with the funding agencies. Cramer said this is what the council had wanted when they hired the city administrator.

Emily Francona discussed the citizen attitude survey she has been working on with Martha Weaver. It will be a onepage form with many questions about city services.


