Railroad Job

The Port of Port Orford Commission met Friday and were greeted by a nearly full house in the council chambers. Commissioners David Darnell, Dave Knapp, Tom

Hall and Gifford Barnes were present for the meeting, which had been rescheduled from Tuesday night. That meeting had been cancelled in anticipation of a lack of quorum.

Jane Cramer was the first person to speak under "persons to be heard." She said she was going to change her tune and asked the commissioners to make a commitment for the new manager to make it a priority to get the public fishing dock built including using grant writing. Cramer then asked them to explain the new lease with NorCal including the building, size and location. Interim port manager Kathy Sherbourne said she hadn't brought the NorCal folder with her but explained it was in the area where Carvalho fisheries is located and that the building will be 100 or 110 feet long and open at both ends, consisting of block walls facing the ocean and that the structure will be open for the public to go in. She said the wall would be 8 feet tall.

Jan Dacayana read a letter to the port commission reminding them the public was promised a public fishing area. She said she had been waiting for the completion of the project and hoped the commission fulfilled its promise to build a public fishing dock. Commission chairman Dave Knapp said they hadn't forgotten about the fishing pier and that it would come.

Paula Cracas showed the commission and Knapp in particular a photo from last week's edition of the Port Orford News showing the new Laskey-Clifton - Dave Knapp gravel pit signs on Highway 101. Knapp said the combined enterprise started up on August 6. In response to Cracas' inquiry about it being a conflict of interest Knapp said it was not a conflict and he hadn't voted on anything to do with Laskey-Clifton. Cracas asked Knapp if he could continue to be on the commission and he said yes. Knapp then said he was guilty of voting one time when he should have declared a conflict of interest. Then Cracas addressed her concerns to commissioner Darnell and asked him where he was on Tuesday night. Darnell explained he got back to town just before 7:00pm. Cracas said it was disrespectful to cancel the meeting. (The meeting was cancelled because neither Darnell nor Tom Hall could attend it).

Cracas then told Dave Knapp in view of his conflict of interest she felt he should resign from the commission. David Darnell then jumped in and said, "I'll assure you Dave Knapp didn't make much money off the job." Darnell continued that Knapp literally gave the rock away to help the town.

Beverly Walters told the commission the management selection process was flawed. She reminded them it was the most important decision they would make and they should redo the process of hiring a manager. Walters told them it was their duty to hire a reasonable manager with college education or a master's degree. She said the way the process was handled the commission already had their minds made up.

Then the commission moved into old business and selection of a new port commissioner. Dave Knapp said they had received five applicants for the vacant position. David Darnell made a motion to nominate Jeff Miles for the commission job. Miles lives in the Port District and is a fisherman. His fishing boat is the Keta. The commission voted 3-0 for the motion with Gifford Barnes not voting. Miles said he had lived here all his life and been a fisherman for 20 years. He said his boat is currently

I had not been to a beach for weeks – too busy with the stuff going on in my life. I had forgotten that I lived by the sea. Then suddenly, it was more important than any-

thing else to touch the ocean, to walk on its sands and to have its incessant rumble fill my ears. Once at the beach, there are some things which must be done, search for the interesting stones, wade across the river-mouth to see what could be on the other side, count the pelicans as they thread their way into the wind, check on the seals and the seagulls, and then its time to find a spot on the dunes to dry my feet, to get most of the sand out from between my toes before boots and socks go on again. I stretched out on my back in the spiny grass, just below the wind, the sun drenching me in its heat, my eyes closed, it was like soaking in a hot-tub, I was close to sleep.

I tried to think about what I had to do when I got home, but the outside world seemed so far away it was easier to let it

go, nothing there mattered any more. That world there was supposed to be my real world – where the time of day was important, where people had to be considered and all sort of things needed to be done. Just a minute, if that is my real world, what is this? I could lie here all day, I'm not worried about anything, there's nothing on my mind. This is bliss – there's nothing that I should be doing. It feels very real and my body loves it. I don't get to feel this good, not this way in that other world. Then I remembered that this is how it had been for me every vacation, until I was 15. I am the child again – as long as I lie in the sun like this, resting after the long walk, lulled into delicious release – no meals to plan, no phone calls to make – just be home by sundown.

I realized again how precious the beach is to me. I wonder what today's kids, (who I never see on the beach,) will do to clear their minds and find total relaxation when they get into their times of boredom, heavy decisions and anxiety. Perhaps the beach is my drug of choice, my escape from a world that seems to be going nuts. This is where I don't compare myself to anyone else or wonder

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why I cant be like this one or that one. I can always be happy with me here.

I know that I've got to return to that other world, but the one who returns is beginning to suspect that its not so real after all, because when I'm in there doing what I have to do, even the happy times, I'm feeling more like a visitor, and being a visitor makes it so much easier to get things done – somehow its not such a serious business, and I'm aware deep down that it wont be long before I go back to where I can feel completely real again.

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
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DeFazio Visits Port Orford By Evan Kramer

Representative Peter DeFazio visited Port Orford last Thursday starting with lunch at the Rotary Club meeting at the Senior Center. The club members and guests sat down to a lunch of baked chicken, mashed potatoes, salad, vegetable, dessert and coffee. The meeting was well attended and numerous guests were present including Curry County Commissioners Rachelle Schaaf, Marlyn Schafer and Lucy LaBonte; and Port Orford Mayor Gary Doran and City Administrator Martha Weaver.

DeFazio spoke briefly but covered several subjects before turning the meeting over to questions from the audience. He displayed a copy of Thursday's Oregonian with a headline about the budget surplus vanishing. DeFazio said he had predicted that and said the budget session ahead in Congress would be a contentious one. DeFazio said any future

budget surplus should be used to pay down the national debt.

He said we were lucky to live here and have Coos Curry Electric providing power, as they aren't raising their electric rates. DeFazio said he had voted against energy deregulation, that Congress started the process of energy deregulation in 1992 after 60 years of regulated monopolies that had worked giving Americans low cost energy, and that people want stability and reliability of power. He said Oregon was the last state in the union considering deregulation.

DeFazio spoke about dredging and said we need the Army Corps of Engineers to do dredging or ports on the south coast will close. He said there was only one private company doing dredging.

DeFazio was asked about an article in the paper, which said the tax rebate was coming out of next year's taxes. DeFazio said the tax rebate checks were "a rebate

for anticipated taxes."

DeFazio was discouraging about legislation to deal with the increased costs of health insurance other than a full deduction for health coverage for the self-employed. He said that professional sports and insurance were the only two industries not subject to the antitrust law. He spoke about trying to get the insurance industry to sell a competitive product.

DeFazio said he hadn't made a decision on whether or not to run for governor and had been receiving lots of input from people urging to stay on as congressman and to run for governor. Later on at the Heads State Park DeFazio spoke more about it and said he likes living in Oregon (and the governor gets to do just that).

When the Rotary meeting came to an end DeFazio was whisked off to Port Orford Heads State Park where he presented



A While Ago . . . By Jane Cramer

A while ago someone asked me what was so special about Port Orford being 150 years old that we needed to have a celebration. The reason to celebrate is not so much because of the number of years, but that some of them were very difficult years when there was a real chance that the town would not survive.

Some bad years came right away. The weather during the winter of 1853 was so bad, with so many violent storms, that ships could not enter the harbor to bring supplies. With no roads and no ships, the people subsisted on shellfish and game for the entire winter after staples such as flour ran out.

When the army was at Fort Orford and gold miners successfully worked the beaches, Port Orford flourished with nine hotels, several stores and many houses. In 1856 the gold mines failed, the army moved out and the town declined until one historian relates that by 1859 there were only three families left in town. The hotels, saloons, stores and



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houses were empty and gradually being destroyed by the wind and weather.

Little by little Port Orford began to grow again and then the next disaster appeared in the form of a devastating forest fire that swept across the Sixes and Elk Rivers on October 10, 1868. It couldn't have come at a worse time for Mrs. Tichenor because Captain Tichenor and his son were away. She fought the fire alone and saved their home. Only three buildings in town survived: two houses and a barn at the Knapp Hotel.

The Uican family, who lived to the north of Port Orford, escaped with their lives by wrapping themselves in wet blankets and hiding in a well until the fire passed. Mr. Burnap, the storekeeper, tried to save his merchandise by throwing it over the cliffs onto the beach only to have hot cinders fall on it and burn it away.

The hardy people of the town again rebuilt and prosperity returned. Huge amounts of lumber were shipped from here in the 20s and 30s, but the advent of World War II put an end to the lumber shipments. Eventually the mills closed and people had to find other work or move away.

Even as late as the 1960s the town suffered some setbacks that were hard to overcome. The Columbus Day Storm in October 1962 is still remembered by those who lived through it. In Pat Masterson's book he relates trying to get back to Port Orford from Gold Beach after the storm and being told by a south-bound driver that it wasn't any use to go to Port Orford because there was nothing left. He returned to find that the 150 mile per hour winds had moved some houses off their foundations and left the town a mess.

When the long awaited jetty was built, our once deep water harbor became a nightmare of shoaling and shifting sand. Conditions are often so difficult for local fishing boats that it is hard to believe that a 410 foot steamer once loaded lumber at our dock. Now new regulations are threatening our fishermen's future.

Through all the troubles – from early years to present days – Port Orford continues to bounce back and remains a wonderful place to live. This is surely a fact worth celebrating, especially when we remember the hardships of a while ago.

Walkers, runners, dogs, strollers, granies and toddlers will cinch down their walking shoes for North Curry Community Health Grant Program's second annual "Walk On!" 9a.m. to 1p.m., Saturday, Sept. 1, in Port Orford.

The six-mile course, marked by big fish, begins at the Battle Rock registration booth. Prize drawings are scheduled later in the day for lucky registrants. Coordinators also will distribute maps to help keep walkers on course, along with event t-shirts for \$5, Cathy Boden, coordinator, says.

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8:30a.m. - 6:00p.m.

Rest stations include the 12th Street dock at Garrison Lake, and the Curry Family Medical clinic on Madrona. Free water will be available.

New this year, the last leg of the course will detour through the Arts & Seafood Festival Strolling Area, Boden adds. "So walkers can enjoy art and food booths, street entertainment and live music!"

Also new, she says, will be walking cards available for those interested in keeping a personal walking log for health and fitness.

"Major medical studies have shown that walking reduces the risk of breast cancer, diabetes, heart disease, colon cancer



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and stroke. Why wait to get started?" Boden says.







moored in Bandon but he still pays dockage here. Bill Oleson told the commission they had several good nominees for the commission job and said they could have selected a non-fisherman – someone without a conflict of interest.

The commission then moved on to selection of a port manager. They had received nine applications for the job. Gifford Barnes recommended they start the process from scratch. David Darnell

made a motion that the commission hires Kathy Sherbourne as port manager and Tom Hall seconded the motion. Barnes said the commission had received resumes that far outweighed Kathy's for the job. Leonard Foster then spoke to the commission and said he had seen lots of railroad jobs in forty years and said the "entire meeting ought to be cancelled." Gifford Barnes said Tuesday night's cancelled meeting should have been voted on before it was cancelled but it wasn't as per the commissioner's handbook. The commission then voted 3-1 in favor of the motion to hire Sherbourne with Darnell, Hall and Knapp in favor and Barnes voting no.

Kathy Sherbourne then discussed the recent ODOT meeting at the Port concerning Dock Road. The grant from the federal government is for \$1 million but the port must come up with a twenty percent matching grant with ODOT being the lead agency.

David Darnell made a motion to have the new port manager look for funds for the public fishing pier and it passed 4-0.

Dave Knapp then adjourned the meeting into executive session under ORS 192.660(I)(h) pending litigation and the

large public gathering left to wait in the hallway. The press stayed behind and unless I missed something litigation was not discussed.

The meeting was convened into regular session at 8:15pm. David Darnell made a motion to get the local state fire marshal to inspect the fuel system and bring it up to code and it passed 4-0.

The commission considered Resolution 2001-02 regarding vacation of the 4th Street right of way from cliff to cliff on top of Fort Point. David Darnell made a motion to accept Resolution 2001-02. Frank Cramer then spoke to the commission and said if the Resolution passed the public would be excluded from this site. He advised against approving the resolution. Ed Dowdy suggested to the commission that they might want the property vacated to them in the future since it was adjacent to the port maintenance area. Bill Rebhahn told the commission he owned the property on both sides of 4th Street. David Darnell said he was going to withdraw his motion until they could look at the site and see exactly what Rebhahn was talking about. A motion was made and passed to table the discussion until next month's meeting.

Kathy Sherbourne gave a brief manager's report and said she had paid all the bills on time and the port was catching up with the fuel bill.

The commission then passed a motion authorizing Resolution 2001-01 regarding storage of crab pots. Crab pots may be stored as designated up to 10 days prior to crab season opening. A charge of \$1/day/pot will be assessed for any pots not removed within 10 days after being brought in on or after April 1 each year.

David Darnell made a motion to authorize all the commissioners to sign on the bank account and it passed 4-0. David Darnell made one last motion to pay the bills as they can be paid and it passed 4-0.

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
