

Heat Wave Port Orford Style By Evan Kramer



Last week's half inch of rain that fell in Port Orford was a brief respite before the Oregon coast version of a heat wave hit this past weekend and continued

through Monday. Temperatures on Sunday soared all over the west coast of the United States and hit 107 degrees in Escondido, California (thanks Ron Cohen for the info) to 96 degrees in San Francisco. Temperatures in Port Orford varied from the beach inland up Elk River where it always seems to get hotter and also rains in greater quantities. The City of Port Orford Public Works Department keeps a daily record of the high and low temperatures in the city plus the daily rainfall which they record at the water treatment plant in Buffington Park. Sunday September 30 the City recorded 77 degrees, which was the second highest temperature of the month. On September 8 it got up to 84 degrees. The Public Works Department recorded 0.24 inches of rain for September so the City of Port Orford water restrictions will remain in effect.

Sixes resident DeBoyd Smith keeps weather statistics at his house and shared

them with me for September. Sunday September 30 the temperature at his place was 88.7 degrees while the high for the month was recorded on September 8 when the thermometer hit 95.7. DeBoyd said he recorded .35 inches of rain in September at his place which is seven miles east of Highway 101.

Sunday was a great day to get outdoors and that's what many people did, from hunters to hikers. The parking lot was crowded at Paradise Point in the afternoon with those taking in the massive waves. Malcolm Young and I and Honeybear the dog set out from Paradise Point State Park and walked north almost to the mouth of the Elk River. Along the way we saw a couple of other people walking dogs and several folks out enjoying the weather on ATV's. Walking on soft sand is tiring for me and by the time we got back to the truck and headed for home my feet were sore and it felt good to sit for awhile. Honeybear drank too much ocean water with her fresh water though she was the only person or animal brave enough to go in the water and get soaked.

Library Book Sale





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Pearl Harbor II By Ian Ranney

Heads fall and tears cover the ground as the United States mourns over the numbers of people who died due to the terrorist attacks upon our nation.

Early in the morning on Tuesday, September 11, the nation was under attack. Terrorism wreaked havoc upon our country. Four planes were hijacked and put on a course of mass destruction and chaos. The World Trade Center and the Pentagon were both struck by hijacked planes.

Two of the hijacked planes struck the Twin Towers. The first one hit and the second one abut 20-30 minutes later. Shortly after the buildings were struck by hijacked planes, they crumbled to the ground. Wednesday morning the City of New York announced there were 41 confirmed deaths and 6 survivors pulled from the remains of the two buildings. Approximately 400 firefighters went into the buildings before they collapsed and an estimated 200 of those firefighters perished when the buildings turned to rubble.

The fourth, fifth and sixth corridors of

the Pentagon were struck by the third hijacked plane. There is expected to be approximately 800 casualties from this incident. This made a major blow to the nation's military. Marine Corps Recruit Depot in San Diego, California went on lockdown. No vehicles or personnel were permitted to enter or leave the base. Many military installations across the country took the same or similar precautions against another.

The terrorism did not affect only the military, but it also had a huge impact on the civilian world. The stock market closed along with Greyhound Bus services, Disneyland, Sea World, and Disney World. All airlines in the United States and Canada were placed on hold. The planes about to take off were stopped on the runway and evacuated. The planes were not even towed back to the base of the airport.

Another hijacked plane en route to Camp David crashed into a field in Pennsylvania. Although the plane did not complete its objective, it still claimed lives and added more devastation to the nation.

The island of Manhattan was shut down by the crisis. All bridges, tunnels, and

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subways leading into or out of the island were closed.

All major league baseball games were postponed until further notice. Federal buildings across the country were shut down, colleges and universities nationwide also shut down.

So as the nation wakes up from the dream of invincibility, tears begin to pour, and tensions grow high as revenge rages through the minds of the victims' families and concerned citizens across the nation.

This sudden attack upon our country has been called a modern reenactment of Pearl Harbor.



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
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Sunset Garden Club

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Travel Notes By Graeme Graydon



The Azores are a scattering of nine small islands spread out over 400 miles. They are the tips of great underwater mountains, born of volca-

nic violence from the Mid-Atlantic Ridge, some 800 miles west of Portugal and 2.800 miles from Boston. A commuter aircraft carried me from San Miguel, the largest island, to my present home, an outrageously lush, dot-on-themap, the 10x13 mile island of Faial. The most hair-raising part of my whole journey was the ride from Faial Airport in a taxi. The driver, who fancied himself as a Motor Rally driver, maintained a steady 50-60 mph regardless of the road surface, (awful), the very narrow, winding village streets, people, homes or other vehicles. It was white knuckle time all the way. Surprisingly, I have little sense of being on an island. High cliffs rise massively out of the surf. There are very few beaches. The land sweeps up in the center over 3,000 feet to a mile-wide green crater. The houses, city buildings and churches, underneath their immaculate pastel stucco, are solidly built of lava blocks or today's concrete blocks with roofs of bright orange tile – it looks very Mediterranean. But the attention-getter is the patchwork quilt of hedges, fields and gardens. The fields are tiny, really small, hedged with a 12 foot tall reed almost like a bamboo. Every hedge, roadside, is crammed with hydrangeas, millions of them, just past their fullflowering, giving cause for Faial to be named "the Blue Island." In 15 years, this Asian import has suppressed a large percentage of native plants. What gorse is to Curry County - hydrangeas are to Faial.

I live on a steep road that drops to the ocean. There are a few dozen modern villas, some old cottages and some ancient farm structures – but the gardens. I have to tell you about the garden. There are bananas and rose, grapes and geraniums, kiwi-fruit and dahlias, mangoes, avocadoes, hebe from New Zealand, Norfolk pines, beautiful chestnuts, bougainvilleas, cabbage, guava, pumpkin, figs, rubber trees, maize and sweet corn, wisteria and hibiscus. Four o'clocks are regarded as roadside weeds and morning glory is simply an invading menace.

Amaryllis lilies, like some exotic weed are poking up everywhere with their strident pink trumpets. It is as if all the world's favorite plants have migrated here and gone crazy. There are plantations of Japanese Cryptomeria – used for framing, floors and cabinetry, forests of Australian Pittosporum, Eucalyptus and Acacia.

The island exports cheese – there's a good sized cheese factory and a lot of wine is produced, much of it distilled into a local specialty, by just about anyone. It is called angelica, a kind of brandy that varies according to the skill of its maker from mild to potent. I was shown a still today, built into the concrete wall of a shed. Its owner uses "just about everything" from his extensive gardens to make a batch. I noticed a new copper still in the hardware store.

Along with the modern tractors, busses and Japanese imports on the narrow roads, I've seen people riding side-saddle on donkeys and horses. My hosts drive me around in a Citroen-Mohari – a small yellow plastic jeep powered by a BMW motorcycle engine. We carry rain slickers to wear in the car so that we can arrive reasonably dry.

A neighbor popped in today after work, (I'm painting the house) and casually mentioned that a hurricane was on it way. When? Oh, tomorrow sometime. Guess where all the hurricanes go after they're beaten up on the U.S. East Coast? Felix clipped the island just a week ago.

Oregon Fall Beach Cleanup

In keeping with calls from President George Bush and Governor John Kitzhaber for all of America to continue on in spite of recent tragedies inflicted upon our Country, SOLV has asked that this year's Fall Beach Cleanup be a national demonstration of civic engagement.

"Volunteerism and community are basic foundations which help define America and its people", says Jack McGowan, SOLV's Executive Director. "Activities like Oregon's famed Beach Cleanups can now be viewed as demonstrations of our collective resolve to continue on as a healthy society in spite of these acts against our country. Let's make this year's Beach Cleanup one of the biggest ever."

Saturday, October 6, marks the day for the 18th Annual Great Oregon Fall Beach Cleanup. Thousands of volunteers who care about Oregon's livability are needed to help at the state's beaches from 10:00am to 1:00pm to clean the entire coastline between the Washington and California borders. Volunteers are asked to check in at one of 40 meeting sites, pick up a bag, and head down to the beach to do their part in improving our coastline for wildlife and visitors. Coordinators of the event suggest volunteers bring gloves, and wear sturdy shoes. Complimentary bags will be furnished via beach cleanup coordinators. Groups of 20 or more are asked to register in advance with the appropriate Zone Captain.

We want to emphasize Volunteer Safety this fall more than ever," says Jack McGowan. "Knowledge of beach safety and adherence to some basic guidelines can help reduce the potential for accidents and injuries." Volunteers are requested to be aware of these safety tips while on the beach:

Don't turn your back on the ocean-watch out for sneaker waves. Don't play on or around logs. Exercise extreme caution on rocks and cliffs.

During the Great Oregon Spring Beach Cleanup, 4,000 volunteers removed nearly 16 tons of debris from our beaches. Last Fall's Cleanup attracted 6,000 volunteers who removed 17 tons of trash. This event, started in 1984 in Oregon, has spread to 55 states and US territories and 90 foreign countries. In 2000, 844,000 volunteers picked up 13.5 million pounds of trash from 20.000 miles of coastline worldwide.

SOLV is a statewide organization founded in 1969 by Governor Tom McCall and other community leaders to act as a catalyst in linking business, government, and citizens in preserving the livability of Oregon. SOLV's mission is to build community through volunteer action to preserve this treasure called Oregon.

The meeting site in Bandon for Zone 12 is at "The Barn" in City Park. The meeting site for Zone 13, which covers the area south of the Sixes River to Ophir, is Battle Rock Park.
