## **Emergency Services Honored By Evan Kramer**



The Port Orford City Council met on Monday night and right after the pledge of allegiance Mayor Gary Doran asked those in attendance to observe a moment of silence for those lives lost in the September 11 terrorist attacks. Doran then turned the introductions of emergency service workers over to councilor and police and fire department liaison Jim Campbell who said he had invited the members of the Port Orford Volunteer Fire Department to the meeting. First the police department introduced themselves including Chief Bill Rush and officer Milo Arneson. Reserve Brian Cody was not present. Then fire department chief Randy Foster introduced the members of the fire department including Gayle Wilcox, Steve Rinehold, Lynda Foster, Wade Phillips, Jake Marshall, George Gehrke, Tom Smith, Jim Garwood, Ed Schriver, Bob Milens, Rob Ashdown, Les Goertz, and Dave Duncan. Foster then named those department members not present at the meeting including Dennis Gehrke, Heidi Marshall, Richard Mijs, Billy Potter and Mari Lochhaas. Chief Foster then

named those people serving as EMT's on the Port Orford Ambulance including Diana Bussmann, Lynda Foster, Richard Mijs, Kim Stang, Katrina Montgomery, Chris Speed, Gayle Wilcox, Tom Smith, Christian Walter, Mike Murphy and drivers Rich Greene, Bob Hergert and Bonnie Herbison.

Randy Foster said that the fire department would be holding a pancake breakfast on Sunday, October 21, at the fire hall.

Mayor Doran called public works department employee David Pace forward and commended him for taking on extra duties. Pace was given a certificate for being employee of the month.

Mayor Doran recommended that he serve as the OCZMA (Oregon Coastal Zone Management Association) representative on the council with city administrator Martha Weaver as the alternative and that councilor Ralph Donaldson serve on the personnel subcommittee. On a motion by councilor Carl Eskelson the council accepted the mayor's appointments.

Bob McArthur, from the engineering firm of H.G.E., spoke to the council about the water treatment plant. He said the plant, which H.G.E. designed, is now

complete other than some warranty work. Carl Eskelson made a motion to accept the water treatment plant with the warranty work to be finished in a timely fashion. Public works director Allan Wagner said the work on the plant is very good and they should accept which the council did by a 6-0 vote.

Councilor Norm Leeling made a motion to adopt Ordinance 2002-03 (Sewer system adjustments) as corrected and it passed 6-0. Leeling then made a motion to adopt Ordinance 2002-05 (False alarms) and it passed 6-0.

The council next discussed the volunteer recognition committee report. Councilor Emily Francona handed out copies of a proposed volunteer of the month nomination form for council approval. Francona said the committee recommended that the volunteer or volunteers of the month have their photo taken and that it be posted in the city hall hallway which could be called the community spirit hallway. The committee also recommended having an annual reception for the volunteers of the month to be held around Valentine's Day. Norm Leeling asked if the council hadn't already selected two groups as volunteers of the month and said they couldn't be unselected. Leeling then made a motion

the council adopt the volunteer recognition committee recommendations and we recognize the two groups already selected as volunteers of the month (Community building volunteers and visitor center volunteers). The motion passed 6-0.

Tom Hamilton then gave the council the final report on the Utility Efficiency Committee findings and recommendations. Hamilton, who served as secretary, Al Affonso as chairman, Norm Leeling and Ralph Donaldson served on the committee and had extensive help from city staff. The committee held 23 meetings and came up with five major recommendations including five-year budget planning for water and sewer and going to a monthly billing system for water and sewer bills. The quality of the work the committee did was exceptional and not possible to summarize in a few sentences in this article.

Councilor Jane Cramer said she wants the city to send the committee members a letter of thanks and wants the city to advertise for a five year planning budget committee which she turned into a motion that a five year budget planning committee for water and sewer be established with three members and with the same terms as the regular budget committee and city hall staff begin advertising immediately for the members. It passed 6-0. Norm Leeling made a motion for the council to accept the utility efficiency committee report and it passed 6-0.

The council moved on to the important subject of water or lack of water. Allan Wagner said the reservoir at the North Fork Hubbard Creek was one foot below the dam this morning. Wagner said the previous two-week trend is the reservoir has lost an inch a day. Mayor Doran reminded people the City has no secondary water source. Wagner said the average daily consumption of water is 250,000

gallons. He said there was no visual flow in the creek below the dam. Carl Eskelson made a motion the council adopts Ordinance 2002-06 (An ordinance amending ordinance 2002-04; prohibiting nonessential uses of water. This ordinance includes a prohibition on all sprinkling and watering of plants or any kind of vegetation. Norm Leeling said the ordinance puts the onus on citizens, not businesses. The motion passed 6-0. Because the council considers this situation an emergency this ordinance goes into effect immediately.

The council moved into a discussion of the community building and American Legion Hall. Jane Cramer said the roof would leak on the Community Building when it rains again and suggested the city help with providing materials or work on the roof. Allan Wagner said he had spoken to Clyde Woodley (the man who painted the outside and inside of the

## Travel Notes By Graeme Graydon



The tiny island of Faial, in spite of its beauty and apparent tranquility, reminds everyone now and again of its violent origins. There are two areas on opposite

sides of the island that were devastated in a 1998 earthquake. No one was killed but hundreds of houses, a few churches and larger buildings were either flattened or rendered unusable. Skilled labor, money and materials have been lavished in the rebuilding – this time with reinforcing steel.

I was taken to dinner at a replacement house still unfinished. The owner had elected to rebuild with wood using the locally grown cryptomeria. I picked up a fair sized board – it looks like cedar but was feather light – one step up from balsa wood. My hostess explained that she could almost press nails into it barehanded. The Government had supplied the logs and she had them cut to dimension. I saw ruins old and new in many areas that can be bought very cheaply – even with magnificent views.

I visited the latest volcano – Capelinos, which came up out of the sea in 1957. A very tall lighthouse stands forlornly among ruins gazing – not out to sea – but to the new land mass that altered everything. The old tower is about twice as high as the one on Cape Blanco – a tribute to the skill of its builders that it survived the blasts and earthquakes. I was shown a map that names three gigantic tectonic plates, the European, the North American and the South African plates all colliding under the Azores. The house paint that I have been using is designed to stay elastic enough to resist cracking in moderate tremors. Sobering thought.

After work I swim in a salt water pool at the foot of a hill. There is no beach, just a lot of jagged black lava – stark contrast to the lush greenery. A smooth concrete path threads through the outdoors to a near natural pool. It still doesn't add up – to relax and play in the refreshing water with nothing in sight but grotesque forms of black lava, caught in mid-dance when they had cooled and solidified.

From the house I now live in I look across a few miles of water to the neighboring island of Pico. This morning I watched the sun rise over the eastern flank of its 7,700 foot high volcanic cone – a graceful, spectacular mountain said to be the last remnant of the Lost Continent of Atlantis. If I dwell on that for a moment, I begin to feel how fragile – even irrelevant my tangible human presence is here. On this island, I am reminded almost hourly of the unimaginable, timeless forces that wait – seething silently below.

Two days ago, a neighbor phoned with the news that “they were bombing Afghanistan”. For weeks I have been listening to the people here. There is universal compassion for the awful events of September 11 but again and again I have heard the hope – or was it a plea – that the U.S. should think well before it does anything – that there is a time when the wisest action is to not act. A retired Royal Air Force officer quietly suggested that perhaps it was time for American to question why so many people hate her. On the way here I read Albert Einstein who quoted Gandhi – “An eye for an eye, and pretty soon the whole world will be blind.”

As I continue to live and work here – this time in a century old 3 story building in the heart of Horta, (yes, there's a ghost upstairs who hasn't figured out yet that she doesn't have a human body anymore). I am torn. It is so peaceful here, the people are warm and friendly. They

I am one of “them” who are creating more hatred. I pray that great good shall come out of the pain and the torment for all mankind.

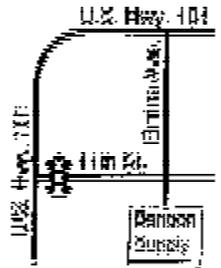

The Annual Fall Cleanup sponsored by Curry Transfer and Recycle and supported by the Curry County Commissioners was a success for area residents who took advantage of free residential drop of metal and brush and pruning clippings.

According to Curry Transfer and Recycle general manager Pete Smart 125 yards of yard clippings, leaves and grass were taken to the transfer station in Port Orford along with 90 tons of metal. 375 yards of clippings were taken in to the Ridge Creek landfill in the southern part of the county along with 260 tons of metal.

Curry Transfer and Recycle is currently working on a grant for a hazardous waste material clean up day for Curry County in the future.

## Fire Prevention Week

10. Make sure your house number is easily visible from the street.
11. The easiest fire to put out is one you prevent.

## Needs and Issues Inventory

Curry County is currently participating in the State of Oregon's Needs and Issues Inventory. The Needs and Issues Inventory is a process developed to collect and respond to locally identified needs of local governments, tribes, ports, special districts, and economic and community development related non-profit organizations throughout the state. The Needs and Issues Inventory creates a single repository of project concept information that local governments, state and federal agencies, regional partnerships, regional investment boards, private foundations, and other organizations can use to coordinate planning, technical assistance, and project funding. Local governments and organizations communicate the relative importance of project concepts by developing local, county-wide, and regional priority lists. Priority lists create a basis for strategic dialogue between local governments, agencies and other partners. Governing bodies, such as, the Ports, Cities, and County serve as sponsoring agencies.

Sponsoring agencies may contact Eileen Ophus or Gayla Oester at CCD Business Development Corporation (1-888-553-1110) regarding the submittal process and CCD due date of October 31, 2001. The Needs and Issues Inventory is a project notification process. Although submitting projects through this process does not guarantee funding, state and federal lead agencies will draw from projects submitted through the Needs and Issues Inventory process to further develop projects and to invite applications for specific funding. Curry County could serve as a project sponsor for any entities that do not fall under another sponsoring agency. Entities that want Curry County to be their sponsoring agency must submit their forms to Curry County by October 19, 2001. The Project Notification forms are available from the County Commissioner's office


**Anti-Terrorism Task Force**

The Curry County Commissioners have received numerous inquiries from citizens who are concerned about acts of terrorism that may happen in Curry County. Although Curry County has an emergency plan in place it does not address possible chemical or biological warfare.

The Federal Government is forming regional Anti-Terrorism Task Forces to coordinate and disseminate information and to aid in the development of investigative and prosecutorial strategies for dealing with terrorism throughout the country. The Department of Justice will provide clear guidance to each Anti-Terrorism Task Force on an ongoing basis and will detail the operational plan for terrorism prevention and provide briefings about the terrorist activities in each region of the country.

Sheriff Kent Owens will take the lead in forming a task force that will:

1. Serve as a conduit for information received from intelligence obtained by federal agencies.
2. Serve as the coordinating body for implementing the operation plan for the prevention of terrorism.
3. Be the standing organizational structure for a coordinated response to a terrorist incident in Curry County.

## Osteoporosis Prevention

The public is invited to attend a free presentation and tea on preventing osteoporosis through exercise, 11 a.m., Thursday, Oct. 11, in the home of Kathy Goad, Port Orford.

Under the auspices of the Curry Health District, Goad trained recently with Dr. Christine Snow, internationally recognized osteoporosis researcher with Oregon State University. Dr. Snow's studies have been featured nationwide in newspapers, journals and on television. She has shown how exercise that sufficiently "surprises" the bones over a five-year period can protect at-risk women from osteoporosis.

Goad is preparing to start such an exercise class in Port Orford. The exercises not only strengthen the bones, Goad says. "They also generally improve the tone, balance and strength of the whole body and the whole person."

Osteoporosis leads to falls and fractures that kill more women than breast cancer every year. The osteoporosis prevention program is made possible by the Curry Health District and a grant from Mindways Software, Inc.

building recently) and that Woodley said he thought the problem is with the roof ridge gasket. Wagner said the roof was only a few years old and that it had been installed by GAR Construction of Bandon but the warranty had expired. Norm Leeling recommended Wagner get an estimate on the roof.

Then the focus of the discussion switched to the American Legion hall. Wagner said he would get an estimate for replacing the siding and underpinning on the building. He said the foundation was falling away and that he could have the building inspected by the county. Susan Lincoln said she had asked Eric Carter go under the building and give her a report on its condition. Carter found the mudsills had termites and the termite situation in general bad, the crawl space under the building wasn't 18", there was no insulation in the walls, the ceiling tiles were rotten and that 105' of foundation were needed. Lincoln said she didn't think the building was worth the effort. Lincoln said POET had pledged \$700 towards the purchase of a sign for the Community Building, which would

be used for advertising events. The sign would be a free standing 4' x 8' wooden frame with baked enamel on aluminum cladding and rust proof "Read-a-Board 6" letter track. Norm Leeling made a motion the council accepts the concept of the community building sign as long as it costs the city no upfront money and it passed 6-0.

The council took a poll amongst themselves ranking the projects on the Needs and Issues Inventory local priority list. The council ranked their priorities as follows:

1. Water waste drain field replacement
2. Water source improvements
3. Garrison Lake water protection and flood prevention.
4. Community Building
5. Police Department upgrade
6. The Common Good
7. Port Orford Emergency Preparedness and Response
8. Inflow and Infiltration (I & I study)

## 9. Elk River Restoration Park

The council considered a request from city auditor Rob Wall increasing his fees. The additional cost for the 1999-2000 city audit for amending the contract will be \$5,000. Councilor Ralph Donaldson made a motion to accept the contract with Wall and Wall for the additional \$5,000 and it passed 5-1 with Norm Leeling voting no.

Ralph Donaldson made a motion that the council adopts Resolution 2002-11. This would create nuisance abatement expense to the public safety fund and transfer \$1,000. The money would be used to enforce the nuisance ordinance. Martha Weaver said the City needed operating money to pay to clean up some properties and that ordinance enforcement is a police function. The motion to accept Resolution 2002-11 passed 6-0.

## Chamber Board Meets

The Port Orford Chamber of Commerce held their board meeting Monday at noon at Bartlett's. There was a lack of quorum so no business as far as voting took place. The board and other members discussed the coming Chamber board election set for this December. The nominating committee is looking for people willing to serve on the board. There are five openings coming up at the end of this year and so far three people interested in serving on the board.

The Chamber discussed but made no decision about their annual awards banquet. They will select a citizen of the year, business of the year and organization of the year. The next regular meeting of the Chamber of Commerce is scheduled for Monday, October 22, at the Paradise Café.
