
In keeping with the spirit of the evening the City public works crew were named as the employees of the month. City Administrator Martha Weaver said the public works crew worked until 11:30pm one night to fix the big water leak on Lakeshore Drive. Public Works Director Allan Wagner thanked the crew for their hard work.

Mayor Doran moved into appointments and started with the Planning Commission. Doran said that Rick Francona had resigned from the planning commission to serve his country and appointed Doug Jamieson to fill the vacancy. On a motion by Councilor Ralph Donaldson the council sustained the mayor's appointment. Doran reappointed Joyce Spicer Kinney to the planning commission for another term. Doran appointed Tom Hamilton to the 5-year water-sewer budget committee and that appointment was also sustained by the council.

Mayor Doran said he would like to represent the City on the CEDAC (Curry Economic Development Alliance Corporation) and on a motion by Ralph Donaldson the council sustained the appointment of the mayor to the CEDAC board

The council heard a skate park update from Mark Scott of Dreamland Construction and Diego Cruz. Cruz said they needed five days of no rain to pour concrete. Mark Scott said he wanted to start on the skate park, which will be located in Buffington Park the Monday after Thanksgiving. Martha Weaver spoke about a proposal to have the Dreamland employees work as city employees during the skate park construction to save money on bonding, insurance and reporting on the construction. She said the city had received a \$29,000 grant from State Parks for the project and besides

#### One with the Wind By Graeme Graydon



Often when I have been parked above the Port in a good southerly - good enough to rock my old van and make the roof panels tweak noisily, there

has been a bunch of seagulls sailing madly in the updraft. The stronger gusts rock them around a bit, but they slide sideways or do a steep little climb, knife point wings smoothing the turbulence, moving, always moving. They keep together in a wide column, wheeling in and out and around for no other reason I'm sure, than pure enjoyment - dancing on the wind. From time to time, one will peel off from the dance and sweep back to make a rather abrupt landing in another group of gulls who are hunkered down on the road. Now you would think that dancing-in-the-wind at the Port would be reserved strictly for seagulls. Not so, there has been, for years, an outsider who does things quite differently, right in the middle of the dance. It is easy to see – just look for the speck that doesn't move – it is a hawk. I thought it was a Red Tail but

I'm assured on authority that it is a Swainson's Hawk. I don't know if it is a male or female, so I'll call him "her." Today, I saw her again, this time above the motel, maybe 30 feet above the office roof – I drove up to get a closer look. She was riding on a moderate southerly updraft - pinned in on spot - absolutely fixed there. I watched for 10 minutes, she didn't move more than 2 inches in any direction, seemingly suspended in midair. Quite amazing! Hummingbirds hover but it takes wing-effort, white shouldered kites do a sort of helicopter thing, beating the air with their wings. This hawk doesn't seem to do anything to float in the wind. Around her, the gulls have tight, professional-looking flightsuits, with never a feather out of place. She however, in blatant contrariness, looks a bit tatty around the edges, keeps her 'elbows' tucked in close to her body, - a blocky wad of untidy feathers with a small tail that flips up and down like some mechanical gadget. But she does this incredible thing, she stays totally unmoved in the teeth of the wind.

So there she is, a minority of one, joining the others in the wind. They dance all over the sky, she just hangs there. I sus-

pect that when the gulls socialize at the water's edge, they make remarks about this one who doesn't know how to dance, who is not like them, and who doesn't go away. And then I saw this incredible metaphor. Jonathan Livingstone would understand. As a proper seagull grows up, it first has to fight the wind, and eventually gets to master it and finally, conquers it. But for all of its life, it must match itself against the wind. The hawk on the other hand, like some old, enlightened sage, hasn't just mastered the wind, she has become One with It. She doesn't fight, doesn't match herself against anything - she joins in effortless communion, she absorbs it, is not separate at all. And there she rides in the midst of constant change - unchanged. It must feel like being in the center of the cyclone, total calm with all hell raging around. Perhaps she is in meditation and finds stillness there. One of the things that I want to do after I die, is to take the body of a seagull and dance in the wind - right here on our Coast. Now I want to go one step further - I want to feel what that hawk feels - to be One with the Wind.

#### **Recycling Awareness Week**

This is an important year to celebrate because this year marks the first time since the Department of Environmental Quality has been calculating Oregon's recovery rate that the generation of trash and the amount disposed has declined. The year 2001 marks the fourteenth anniversary of Oregon's Recycling Awareness Week.

Oregon now has goals to prevent the total amount of waste generated from increasing by 2009 and also to prevent the amount of waste generated per capita from increasing by 2005. In order to reach the new waste prevention goals, Oregonians will need to practice as many sustainable behaviors as they can such as borrowing or renting items that are not frequently used; repairing broken items instead of replacing them; and continuing to practice good recycling and composting habits at home, school and the office.

Consumers can impact the environment in both positive and negative ways through the choices they make. Some of the questions we must ask ourselves when looking to make a purchase are:

Do I really need this or is there a more productive way to spend my money. Can I borrow, rent, or buy this used rather than new?

Is this product made to last? Can I repair it if it breaks? Will the manufacturer take it back to use the parts when it can no longer be of use? Is this product recyclable when I no longer can use it?

Is the product made locally, does it have excessive packaging, is the manufacture of it harmful to the environment?

Think carefully about what you buy; packing materials make up 19% of the material in Oregon's landfills. Almost 52% of the material in the landfills is unwanted products.

#### **Langlois Fire Department**

The Langlois Fire Department along with 30 other agencies participated in the Curry County Tsunami Warning Exercise on October 30, 2001. This practice drill was the first full scale exercise to be done countywide. Langlois Fire Department participation included using emergency vehicles and traveling to all of the low lying areas that would be affected by a tsunami generated by a Cascadia Subduction Zone earthquake of magnitude 8-9. These inundation zones have been determined by a computer generated digital model and printed on maps by the Oregon Department of Geology and Mineral Industries. In the Langlois Fire District, the inundation zones include the areas surrounding Floras Lake, and several private ranches west of Highway 101. The fire department determined that, in case of a warning, it would take approximately two hours to notify all of the affected residents of the need to evacuate. If you have questions concerning your home in relation to these inundation zones, you can contact Curry County Emergency Services Coordinator Mike Murphy at 541-247-3208, or stop by the Langlois Fire Hall next to the Library on December 11, from 7:00 - 9:00pm to view the maps.


#### **Common Good Holidays**

that between \$1,200 - \$2,500 was in the skate park bank account. Mark Scott said he was doing a favor for Diego because his company usually charges more for skate parks. Councilor Jane Cramer made a motion that the council directs Martha Weaver to employ Mark Scott and Dreamland as city employees for building the skate park. The motion passed 4-0.

Enterprise Zone (EZ) representative Ed McQuade updated the council on the Zone. He said the EZ was a state program designed for rural areas that need help. They provide zones for companies to invest in and give them a three-year tax abatement on property improvements. Retail businesses are not eligible for Enterprise Zone tax abatements. Mc-Quade said our EZ expires on June 30, 2008 and that he is having problems getting people to relocate to the EZ. He said he can't get leads and that most leads want to be located on the I-5 corridor. McQuade said the EZ is in the County Strategic Plan and that next year he hopes to have a better report for the council.

Lon Berubi spoke to the council under citizen's concerns. Berubi is a resident of King Street in Port Orford and was speaking to the council about the change of addresses for homes on King Street. The issue with changing King Street addresses began when the fire department responding to a call on King Street went the wrong way because of the numbering system. Berubi said people living on King Street have had their addresses for many years and that the change would be costly to residents. Berubi suggested an alternative, which would be changing two of the addresses on King Street. Martha Weaver said the addresses were being changed in accordance with the city ordinance but Berubi reminded her that many other streets in the city are not in accordance with the ordinance. Gayle Wilcox said the fire department would be happy to do whatever is best for the residents of King Street. She said the department just wants something that makes sense. The council concluded the discussion and will send letters to the residents of King Street that they are reconsidering the renumbering. Martha Weaver will get together with some of the residents of King Street, the fire department and work on a new proposal.

Mayor Doran read a Recycling Awareness Proclamation. Doran said we need to encourage people about recycling. He said that curbside recycling is provided free of charge.

Martha Weaver spoke about the Adopt a Street Program. She said the town needs basic maintenance and that the city has a small public work's department. The council will consider Weaver's draft document of the Community Partner Program before taking action.

Jane Cramer said the council had a mess last year at budget time regarding employee health insurance benefits. She said she wanted an early start on dealing with health insurance benefits for next year's budget. A health insurance committee was formed to look at the issue consisting of Jane Cramer, Jim Campbell, two city employees and staff. City Recorder LaRae Liston will set up a meeting in mid-December.

The council considered a recommendation from the Council Personal Subcommittee to contract out janitorial services. One of the city public work's maintenance workers has resigned and this is one way of not replacing him for now. Ralph Donaldson made a motion to authorize the city manager to advertise for a person to perform janitorial duties for the city on a contract basis and it passed 4-0.

Ralph Donaldson said the council meetings were too long. He said candidates were needed to run for council next year and that people have been saying the meetings are too long. Donaldson suggested holding workshop meetings to discuss issues in advance of the regular meetings.

Ralph Donaldson made a motion that the council have the attorney file a notice of appeal in the Camille Mouchawar case. The motion passed 4-0.

The council's next regular session is on Monday, December 10.
