We left Abilene, Kansas with a renewed respect and appreciation for President Dwight D. Eisenhower and continued west on our way

back to Port Orford. We stopped in Russell, Kansas for lunch. Russell is famous for being the boyhood home of the 1996 Republican presidential nominee Bob Dole. We stopped with more of an interest in eating than seeing the Dole family home. That's what happens when you finish second. However, Russell is justifiably proud of Bob Dole and a big sign on Interstate 70 makes it clear where the Kansas Senator is from.

Southwest Kansas had a sign that read "Stand on a tuna can and see 100 miles". We had seen signs for a place called Prairie Dog Town and looked forward to a visit. Besides being home to hundreds of the cute and loveable prairie dogs Prairie Dog Town is home to several other animals including raccoons, foxes, coyotes, pheasants, buffalo, geese, loose goats and two deformed steers – one with five legs and the other with six. Looking at the deformed steers made me sick as well as the lone fox too tired or bored to look up at me from within his cage. One of the owners of Prairie Dog Town gave us a spiel about the prairie dogs, claiming they had all but vanished from Kansas. I noted the complete lack of vegetation within the animal compound and was told prairie dogs don't live in areas where there are trees or tall bushes because they need to spot predators.

We left the interesting to watch and very cute prairie dogs and continued on to eastern Colorado which looked like more of Kansas to me. The land was flat with no trees and no water. But that all changed as we approached and drove through Denver. We were in the Rocky Mountains, a world away from the Kansas plains. The pass out of Denver on Interstate 70 topped off at over 11,000 feet and the van didn't take kindly to the elevation. The long descent on 70 into Grand Junction was a spectacular ride. We stopped in the ski resort of Vale for lunch. I was surprised to see the miles of luxury condominiums and apartments. You can always tell when a city is rich and fancy. The signs for the McDonald's and Wendy's and other fast food restaurants are smaller than in regular places. They allow them but only under subdued conditions. The drive through Glenwood Canyon was spectacular. I had been through there once on the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad on my way to Salt Lake City but this time I got to stop, get out of



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the van and take a look around the canyon and the Colorado River.

We drove over 500 miles on this day. One thing that helped pass the time was a number of good radio shows. We listened to a farm report talk show, a business talk show, a consumer advocacy talk show, and of course, Dr. Laura Schlesinger. You learn a lot of odd things listening to such shows. One show talked about RLS - Restless Leg Syndrome. Sounds funny, but not to someone who has it. Some people have pains in their legs such that they have to keep moving them to try to stay comfortable. Of course we also enjoyed some good classic rock stations and a variety of others. Really makes us feel deprived with the limited radio service here in Port Orford.



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
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Two Thirds Mile of Books




The process would be more palatable if we at least spent this money at home.

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Hughes House

Members of the Friends of Cape Blanco are readying the historic Hughes House for their Christmas Open House to be held on the weekends of December 6th and 7th, and 13th and 14th from 2 to 6pm. The Friends and their supporters are baking cookies, gathering holiday greenery and creating Victorian decorations for the annual event, which attracts visitors from throughout the area.

Candles will glow in the windows of the house, an old Irish tradition dating back to the early occupancy of the country by the British, who, wishing to impose their Protestant Church upon the Irish, forbade the saying of Mass. Priests secretly traveled the countryside, and a light in the window of a house was a signal to them that the people inside were Catholics who wished to hear Mass.

Patrick and Jane Hughes, from County Tyrone in Ireland, came west in 1855.

After several years of searching for gold in California, Oregon Territory, and Canada, they came to Langlois where they eventually settled in 1860 on land along the Sixes River.

Patrick was a progressive and prosperous dairyman. He built his ranch from the original 80 to nearly 2,000 acres, employing as many as 14 ranch hands. From over 100 cows, he produced a high quality butter for barter and sale locally as well as in San Francisco. He also sold and traded other ranch products, such as smoked and cured meats, milk, and fish.

Constructed in 1898 by P.J. Lindberg, the Hughes House was a celebration of 38 years of hard living on the river bottom for Patrick and Jane. A fine example of the Eastlake Victorian style, the two story, eleven room house is solidly framed of 2 X 8 inch old growth Port Orford Cedar. It stands on a terrace with a vista of the distant hills, th Pacific Ocean, the Sixes River and the fields above and below. The Hughes House is located in Cape Blanco State Park near the mouth of the Sixes River. The 1,800 acre park not only contains the historic Hughes House, but also the original cemetery, spectacular ocean views, hiking trails, access to beaches on both the north and south sides, a campground with 58 electric campsites, a horse camp with riding trails and a marvelous view of the Cape Blanco Lighthouse. Built in 18700, it is Oregon's oldest continuously operated light.

During the Christmas celebration, the Hughes House will be filled with the scent of cookies and spice, and each room will be decorated with turn of the century style decorations. Many local community groups join with the Friends of Cape Blanco in making the Christmas celebration at this historic house a very special Holiday event.



From Grand Junction we continued on Interstate 70 and entered Utah and headed for Green River. The spectacular Book Cliffs were to our north as we drove west and for a change we were in the right place at the right time of day. The sun was setting and that's when these and other Utah rock formations are their most beautiful. I haven't been to every state in the union but so far Utah is the most spectacular of all.

I had a case of mistaken identity in Green River. After checking in at a motel and washing the van I took a walk back to the "Colorado" River. I crossed it and walked over to the John Wesley Powell visitor center, which was closed. Then I walked back across the river. In the morning I repeated the effort and discovered I had been walking across the Green River. I never did have a good sense of direction.

it wasn't open for public tours. I asked him how much the gas tax was since all of sudden the price of gas had shot up, as compared to Ohio. He didn't know the amount of tax but did say Nevada has no state income tax. Nevada has six and a half-percent sales tax. It was easy to see that in large part the millions of tourists that visit Nevada each year pay for the residents' state income tax. With all this information fomenting in my brain we left and drove off until we arrived in the small city of Battle Mountain. We decided that was enough driving for one day. I liked the name and the small town feeling of Battle Mountain. It kind of reminded me of Battle Rock. We ate at the Owl, one of the two casinos in downtown. It was Friday night and the casino featured an incredible all you can eat seafood buffet featuring Alaskan King crab legs for the low price of \$7.95. I entered the restaurant prepared to do battle. Though I ate and ate my debris plate of crab legs was no match for several other of the hearty eaters. These local hard working people were celebrating Friday night out with a big meal out. Everyone knew everyone else in the restaurant and casino, just like it is in Port Orford.

Early the next morning we headed out for Reno and planned to stop, eat lunch and enjoy playing some real slot machines. I've always loved Reno from the first time I visited and despite the amount of growth in the last 25 years still enjoy it. We overate again at a particularly sumptuous buffet at the new El Dorado Hotel and Casino and then cashed in a travelers check for several rolls of change and went at it. I left with more quarters than I started with and enjoyed hearing them drop into the bin. We left Reno and crossed into California. There was no snow going over Donner Pass and the drive was pleasant.

On our way to Interstate 5 we drove through the fields of Colusa, California. We stopped for two reasons. One the oil light went on. The other less stressful reason was huge flocks of geese in the sky. So many that it was impossible for us to ignore them. The sky was thick with them while down below on the ground flying bugs attacked us. We continued on to Red Bluff where we spent our last night before arriving in Port Orford. We saw too much road kill on this trip and on Sunday on our way home to Oregon Valerie spotted a dead bear in the shoulder of Interstate 5 south of Dunsmuir. We are truly blessed in this country.

Holiday Shipping Information From Sea Breeze Florist

Our best shipping advice is to ship as early in December as possible. Remember that East Coast packages will take longer to arrive than those closer to home. Last year UPS was ahead of schedule all season, but weather can be a factor.

It is important that you pack your packages carefully and well. Any breakable items should be wrapped well in bubble wrap or paper. Several inches should be allowed between items and the box. 
