Fishermen Voice Concerns by Evan Kramer



The Port of Port Orford Commission heard concerns from local fishermen at their Tuesday, February 17 meeting.

Port Manager Gayle Paige met with State Ports Commission Jim Coker about a one-stop meeting in Salem about the permanent dock project. Gayle said the Port was having trouble getting information from the Port tenants about their utility needs. She said the goal was for construction to begin on the new dock in 1999.

Sandra Anderson spoke to the board about the fisherman's memorial. She said they want to put it on Port property. She asked if the Port commissioners had any restrictions on the memorial. They said no and commission president Bill Oleson told Anderson to come up with something concrete and the commission would vote on it.

The Port received a letter from Curry County Planning Director Chuck Nordstrom concerning the boundary line of the Port and whether it is or is not located within the Port Orford City limits. Nordstrom stated in his letter that the dock was intended to be within the city limits. The Nordstrom letter will be for-

warded to the city council for their consideration.

The Commission moved into new business with Fishermen Association president Rob Ashdown telling the commissioners he wanted them to acknowledge the problems caused by the shoaling or sanding in of the dock. Ashdown said the fishermen have only had five windows (days) to fish in the previous 39 days and called that a disaster. Bill Oleson said the dredgers would be here the next morning. Ashdown said the fishermen feel the Army Corps of Engineers is wasting their time with the current dredging method and the Port needed help with the legislators. He requested that the Port Orford dock be listed as a disaster area with the governor's office. He threw out the idea of requesting the Port defer the dockage fees until this time next year for the months the fishermen couldn't get in the water.

Fisherman Tom Keeler said he had called Representative Ken Messerle about disaster relief for the dock. Keeler volunteered to help the Port with removal of the old dock material when the new dock project begins.

Fisherman Chris Aiello told the commissioners we need to start pumping the sand over the dock, across the parking lot and out into the cove. He said he wants to see

the bureaucrats here at the Port meeting answering questions about the dredging problem. Gayle Paige told him the Corps of Engineers works with the direction of the federal legislators including Representative Peter DeFazio and Senators Ron Wyden and Gordon Smith. Aiello told Paige this is the last winter he could survive here. He urged the commission to seek an emergency disaster proclamation from the governor.

Gayle Paige said that regarding pumping sand over the jetty the Port would have to restore the area where the sand is transported.

Lisa Cobb made a motion asking for an immediate and long-term solution to the shoaling problem and requested Gayle write a letter to Governor Kitzhaber asking for an emergency declaration. The commission passed the motion unanimously. The resolution asking for an emergency declaration will first be sent to the Curry County commissioners and will include damage estimates. It has been assigned an emergency incident number.

Bill Oleson read a letter from the Port that is addressed to the Army Corps of Engineers about the storm caused damage to the jetty. The letter expresses concern about the situation and states the financial

anti-depressants that leave St. John's Wort in the shade, anti-virals, anti-tumors, antiseptics that discriminate between our cells and those of disease. They confront every ailment, support every system including the balancing of emotions.

If you are tempted to use essential oils, they must be 100% pure by independent analysis. Anything less, even though labeled "pure" is perfume, not medicine until passed otherwise.

Next week. Why frankincense and myrrh?

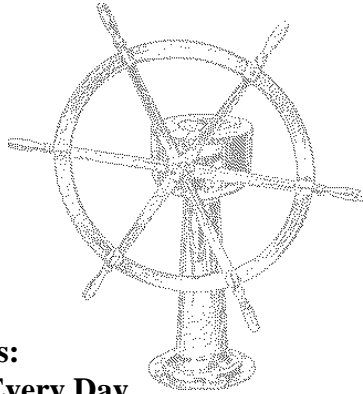

Hospital Bond Issue

Port Orford ambulance personnel and Curry General Hospital administrators traded concerns and information on recruiting a full-time resident physician, emergency services and the Curry Health District's upcoming bond issue when the district board met Wednesday, February 18, at Port Orford City Hall.

Diana Bussmann said she is glad the hospital exists and is grateful for the care it provides "because without it, the impact on Bay Area Hospital would be an overload. We must have Curry General Hospital." She also stated she was glad that there is a new CT scanner down south.

The district is actively pursuing a permanent doctor for Curry Family Medical Clinic – currently two part time Coos County doctors staff the clinic. A Brookings physician also has filled in. They are looking for a doctor who is willing to live in Port Orford. Both Drs. Pitchford and Webb are being used now.

"This is probably the worst time ever to ask Port Orford voters to approve a bond," Randy Scholten, district chief executive officer for Curry General Hospital said.

He listed a variety of hardships that recently have beset the town, from sewer and water problems to an inability to fish commercially because of storms and storm damage. "Historically, though, the hospital has always been here. The hospital has written off hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of free care to those who have needed it. That's where the bond can continue to help – to keep our open door policy where we offer treatment first and deal with finances later."

"Also, since the mill is no longer here and fishing commercially is becoming harder and harder, it may be that the retirement community will be all we have left."

Linda Foster mentioned our need for radios and Scholten assured her that if the bond passes, the district would be able to help with capital equipment purchases, such as radio communication devices.

Association. The classes will be Saturday, February 28 and Sunday, March 1 and Saturday, March 7 and Sunday, March 8 from 8:00am-5:00pm at Pacific High School in Port Orford. Participants need to attend both weekends for the complete class.

Introduction to Fire Behavior (S-190) is designed to provide identification of factors that affect, start and spread wildfires. The student will develop the basic skills of detection and burning effects of forest fires. The knowledge includes analyzing potentially hazardous situations and control operations.

Basic Wildland Fire Management (S-130) covers basic fire suppression methods related to forest fires. Skills include equipment usage, fire behavior, safety and mop-up. The student will have the ability to understand the value of safety and self-protection techniques in suppression of wildland fires. The workshop will also cover standard survival techniques.

The instructors are Mel Wann, Stan Hodney and Larry Minnich. Certified Training through BPSST and there is credit available from Southwestern Oregon Community College. There is no charge to volunteers.

Now, on to the future - March 1st at 2:00pm will be the birthday party. All are welcome birthday or not.

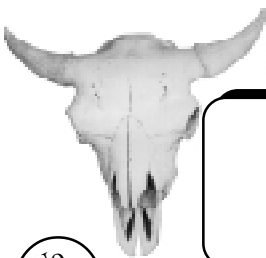

Summersville

(Credit is due the Max Brainard collection of records of Curry County residents in the 1930's and 40's.)

Summersville, Sommersville, Somersville or Summers' Diggings...few remember the Sixes River surrounding of Ralph

Erastus (Jake) Summers who located 13 miles up river in 1857.

He came to Curry County with Captain William Tichenor in June 1851, landing at Battle Rock with a party of nine and married Betsy in 1856. She was born in 1839, died in 1904, and they are reported to have produced six boys and five girls. In 1902 "Jake" was listed at age 87 in the Voter's List. He died in 1909. "Jake", his wife Betsy and one son, Ralph were buried in Floras Creek but on Decoration Day 1937, the graves were moved to Battle Rock.

Located at the head of the Sixes River on the main stream below the South Fork, "Jake" Summer's discovery of gold in 1885 nearly decimated the population of Port Orford. A fair sized settlement developed around this site.

Scout around the old diggings and you may find some rose bushes and fruit trees. There is still flake gold to be taken and, in season, recreational mining is allowed with pan or dredge.

An improved Bureau of Land Management (Department of the Interior) campground is near the site.

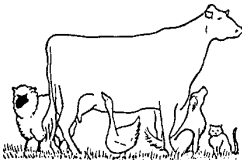

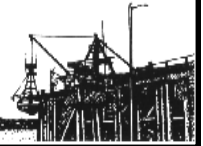

Just Look At Me Now by Jane Cramer for the CRT

Perhaps you've noticed it on one of your trips to the post office. It's the quaint little white house at 600 Jackson Street named The Holly House.

What a difference David Quaife and Francie MacLeod have made since they bought the building in 1989. The changes have come little by little over the years. What had been a trash filled lot overgrown with blackberries and brush has become a well kept yard with new trees, shrubs and flowers. Fresh paint and a porch have brought new life to the building. The changes aren't just cosmetic though, as what was a neglected eyesore is now an attractive addition to tourist services offered in Port Orford.

David finds it interesting when someone comes in to tell how they or a friend or relative used to live there or when he learns something new about the history of the house. He's not sure just when the house was built, but thinks it was about the same time as the Masterson house across Jackson Street. It might also have been one of the first homes in Port Orford to have indoor plumbing. The roses bor-

dering the property along Jackson Street are said to have been brought to Port Orford by wagon. Can anyone help him determine the accuracy of these stories?

When David was remodeling the downstairs he removed a couple of layers of tile. When he got down to the wooden floor beneath the tile he found ink and oil stains which led him to believe a printing press had been operated in the house. This information was verified by Lucile Douglas, who told me the Port Orford Post had been printed there in the early 1920's.

The house was rented by the Olson family in 1935 when they lived in Port Orford for a year while Mr. Olson and his partner built the boat house in Nellie's Cove for the Coast Guard. Other people rented the house over the years. Originally a one story house, an upstairs was added and the house was divided into several apartments after a fire in the late 1950's

David and Francie began by fixing an apartment for themselves to use when they were in Port Orford. They were careful to preserve the character of the house and in the case of the downstairs kitchen, were able to retain and restore

the original wooden drain board of the sink.

About three years ago they recognized the need for family vacation rentals and opened the upstairs as a fully furnished rental. This apartment, which sleeps four to six people and has a full kitchen, is in an excellent location for families wanting to spend some time visiting Port Orford beaches and shops. Some residents have found it useful for the overflow of visiting friends or relatives when guests outnumber the resources of their own homes.

Last year David and Francie opened an antique shop downstairs and David often shares hollyhock seeds with people who stop and admire his plants. He says he sometimes feels like Johnny Appleseed only with hollyhocks instead of apples. They decided to locate here in Port Orford because they like living in a small town and hope to help others enjoy visiting here. Although they are eager to share our beautiful town with others, they hope mainly to help preserve and protect the quality of life we all enjoy here.

Permanent Dock Project

the next step in the funding process is to schedule another One Stop meeting with the State and Federal Funding Agencies. The Port Division will host and coordinate this meeting which has been scheduled for March 3 at 1:00pm in Salem, at the OEDD office.

Work continues on the final engineering of the project, and the Port plans to have another town hall meeting to look over the engineering plans prior to final approval of them. A date has not yet been set for this meeting.

The permit for construction has been submitted to the Division of State Lands and Army Corps of Engineers. After they review the permit, the project will be put out for Public Comment, prior to its approval.

Geological History Lecture

hardship caused by the dock being shoaled in.

Bill Oleson announced that port commission member John Spurgeon has left Port Orford because of lack of work and resigned from the commission. The vacancy will be advertised and a new commission member will be chosen at the March meeting. Oleson said to qualify you had to be a registered voter and live in the Port District.

Dredging Begins

Dredging to relieve the shoaling problem at the Port of Port Orford began on Saturday, February 21. The privately owned portable dredge is set up adjacent to the boat hoist. The dredging operation has been contracted to extract up to 5,000 cubic yards of sand under the hoist with costs paid for the Corps of Engineers. A slurry of sand and water is dredged up by the equipment, which then transports up via a pipeline to a disposal site on the beach. Gayle Paige said the disposal site would be filled with 3,000 cubic yards of sand by Wednesday, February 24. She said approval has just been received from

the Department of Fish and Wildlife, Department of Land Conservation and Development, and Corps of Engineers to pump the sand over the jetty. The area will not be the one originally proposed but about 150 feet south of the rocky area and closer to the jetty. One fishing boat went out on Monday ending a dry spell that began on January 9. The first two months of 1998 have been a disaster for the fishing community. Between the dock being shoaled in and continuous winter storms the fishermen have been put out of business for nearly two months.

Ocean Claims More Dunes by Evan Kramer

The situation at the drain field on the dunes at Agate Beach continues changing daily. On Tuesday of this week the siphon vault tank was no longer visible and has been completely buried in the sand. Erosion of the dunes has worked its way back to the leech field and now parts of that are being exposed and carried away by the ocean. The drain field has been out of service since February 7 when the siphon vault collapsed and slid into the surf. Late last week with no dunes to protect it the leech field started eroding

into the surf. The \$280,000 drain field is quickly becoming a total loss.

The part of the dune protecting the outlet creek from the ocean continues eroding north. It has left the Mouchawar property at Agate Beach vulnerable. The bluff on his property overlooking the ocean is being badly eroded now that there is no foredune to protect it. To add insult to injury a large log was washed up what's left of the outlet creek and took out the wooden foot bridge that many of us have used for years to get across the creek.

The \$9,000 temporary road from the Agate Beach Trailer Park to the beginning of the drain field is close to ruin in some sections. On Tuesday morning only a couple of feet of dune separated the ocean from the rock road in one section and part of the temporary road is expected to wash out this week. Meanwhile wave overtopping of the dunes or what's left of them north of the drain field was bringing thousands of gallons of seawater into the lake. The seawater brought with it lots of sand and now the dune is extending east toward Lakeshore Drive.

The next step in this situation will be for the city council to decide what they are going to do with the treated effluent water. Currently it's draining into the ocean as a makeshift ocean outfall. Three suggestions for replacing the drain field have been a permanent ocean outfall, wetland treatment system involving a reuse of the treated water, and placing a new drain field in a different location. The city council has its work cut out for it and some decisions to make. They have received confirmation of a grant from the Oregon Economic Development Department for a \$10,000 grant for engineering costs on developing a new drain field or alternative. They will have to vote to accept the grant at their March 9 meeting and then, once an engineering firm has been chosen, the road to recovery can begin.
