Public Fishing Pier

The Port of Port Orford held a town hall meeting on Thursday night, April 2, and heard a variety of questions from members of the public.

The meeting was chaired by Port manager Gayle Paige and included comments from David Pearce and Todd Nottingham from the engineering firm of Peratrovich, Nottingham and Drage, Inc. who have designed the new dock structure.

The new "open cell sheet pile dock" will have two boat hoists including one for commercial fishermen and one for sport fishermen. The sheet piles, which make up the walls of the new dock are scalloped shaped. The approximate cost for the new dock will be 4 million dollars for construction and one million dollars for engineering, contingency fees, legal fees, etc. Gayle Paige said a public fishing pier would be located off the end of the new dock and that it would be built with Port labor to keep the costs down. She said the new dock would offer 18,000 additional square feet of space.

Todd Nottingham said a temporary dock would be built for use while the old wooden dock is torn down and rebuilt. He said the new dock would take 3-4 months to build.

In response to a question about a concrete or wood pile dock Paige said it would be more expensive to build than the open cell sheet pile dock. Nottingham said the open pile dock would have an indefinite life if maintained and properly treated. This means placing anodes on the sheet pile walls to prevent rust.

Gayle Paige answered concerns about shoaling at the Port and said wave action would scour at the face of the dock and wash the sand away. She said the dock was in bad shape because the Port cannot get the good, old growth wood that went into the pilings and the planks don't last as long. She said money has been put aside for major repairs.

Malcolm Young spoke to Paige and the engineers and told them how important it was for the people to know the public fishing pier will be built.

David Pearce said the contractor would have to factor in potential cost overruns.

The existing buildings on the wooden part of the dock will either be torn down or removed and rebuilt by the leaseholders not the Port District. Gayle Paige said one of the leaseholders; Cal-Shell will rebuild their buildings.

The Department of Environmental Quality standards for rainwater run-off will

require an oil-water separator for rainwater run-off on the dock.

Paige said anyone could lease part of the 18,000 additional square feet of space on the new dock and put up a structure with a restaurant, dive shop, and gift shop or whatever in it.

Paige said the disposal of the old dock materials including piling and planks would have to be considered hazardous waster and disposed of legally.

The goal is to complete the engineering report this week with grant funding finalized this year and construction beginning in spring, 1999.

Rebuilding Begins

City public works director Jerry McNurlin was gracious enough on Monday afternoon to fill me on progress towards a new wastewater treatment system outfall. I have had many people ask me what's happening with the outfall and the drain field. The City of Port Orford has issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) for engineering design services to replace the wastewater system drain field at Agate Beach, which was destroyed this winter by high tides and an intense ocean surge. The City has advertised the RFP in the Oregonian as well as sent copies directly

Hubbard Creek

In an effort to improve the quality of Port Orford's two water sources construction activities are planned within local wetlands. Dredging of the Hubbard Creek impoundment has been a normally required maintenance effort every 10 to 15 years. Line pipeline from Hubbard Creek is in the advanced stages of deterioration and needs to be replaced. Replacement along the existing alignment (most cost-effective route) will require construction within wetlands along Gold Run Creek, approximately 40 cubic yards. To construct a new water intake on Garrison

Lake a small amount (8 cubic yards) of lake shore excavation will be required. In all three locations impacts to the wetlands will be temporary and will be minimized during construction. There will be no net loss of wetlands as a result of this project.

Executive order 11986 requires a determination of the practicability of alternatives to having the project in the wetland area.

To make this determination, we will analyze the following factors: 1) natural environment including topography, habitat and hazards; 2) social concerns including aesthetics, historical and cultural values

and land use patterns; 3) economic aspects including costs of using alternative routes than through the wetland, and 4) legal constraints including easements and deeds.

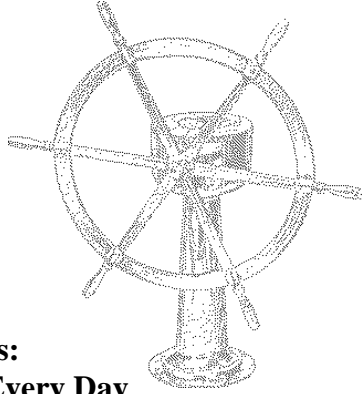
Easter Sunrise Service

Citizen Review Board **By Mark Creighton** Sheriff Candidate

After the televised debate of the Sheriff's candidates on Falcon Cable, I have been deluged with calls wanting more information about my plan to establish a Citizen Review Board. I believe the other candidates will agree with me that the Review Board is long over due in our county. If they don't agree, I believe public pressure will change their minds for them. Let me explain the function of the Citizen's Review Board and how it works.

Because of the public's cry for police reform and accountability across our nation, communities have been trying to find a vehicle that will provide a prompt, just, and expeditious handling of complaints regarding conduct of employees. No longer are communities accepting review of citizens' complaints only by the sheriffs or chiefs of police without any safeguards to insure accountability. The fox guarding the hen house theory has not and will not continue to work. Historically complaints such as those in our Sheriff's Office go unanswered, or delayed leaving the citizens feeling deserted,

and alone not supportive of the Sheriff's Office. Some Chief and Sheriffs are opposed to this type of system of checks and balances because they do not have control over the outcome of complaints. They cannot sweep complaints under the rug by using the scapegoat that they cannot reveal departmental actions to the public. We have heard this type of reasoning in our country in the past. When our administrators investigate a citizen's complaint, the investigation is sometimes done by friends, and the results are not divulged to anyone except the administrators. The public never knows the results or what has happened.

A Citizen's Review and Advisory Board is an independent citizen board. It will provide timely, fair, and impartial investigations of complaints brought by individuals against Deputy Sheriffs, or employees of the Sheriff's Office. The Board also provides for citizen participation in reviewing the Sheriff's Office policies, practices, and procedures. It also allows the citizens an avenue for input.

The Board will consist of lay citizens from different geographical areas of the county. No board member will be a law enforcement officer, an employee of the

County, or have been an employee of the County within three years, nor any family members or a county employee.

The review board's primary function is to hear appeals on complaints filed by citizens through department channels, or to listen to, and cause an investigation into an alleged complaint. The board's responsibility is as an oversight committee. The board has the authority to investigate any complaint. This system not only protects the citizens, but also the deputies who have conducted themselves properly in the discharge of their duties.

I believe Curry County is long over due for such a Board and believe it needs to be put in place as soon as possible.

Oregon Coast Trail

Two new sections of the Oregon Coast Trail between Yachats and Florence will be dedicated in separate ceremonies on the coast April 11.

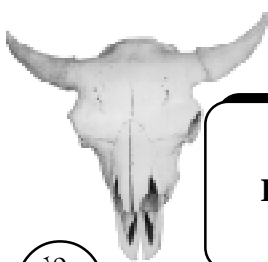

How Does Your Garden Grow?

We've been planting the seeds, plants and herbs I'd ordered from the "wish-book" catalogs I'd been perusing during January and February. Can't wait for them to start growing. I'm planting lettuces, what with all the rain California's been receiving. I'm sure prices will be going up and I'm planting veggies I can't find here radicchio, frisee, celeric and bulb fennel. I'm also starting yellow-pear tomatoes. They remind me of when I was a child, my sisters and I would raid our neighbors garden (my parents didn't plant such "exotics" as yellow tomatoes.) Bare-footed, we searched the tomato patch, looking for the ripe, golden little gems. Biting into the sun-ripened little tomato all warm and juicy with a sweet-tart flavor, was sheer joy, to be experienced again and again. (We had a very kind neighbor.) So I shall see if they taste the same as I remember them, planting for homegrown taste and partly for nostalgia. I'll let you know. We've also put in an asparagus bed, a beautiful Port Orford cedar enclosed raised

bed. It was a lot of work, for Sigg, not me. I just planted the crowns, but it will be harvestable for many years. And we're still planting flowers and shrubs, testing which ones the deer seem to relish and which they turn their noses up, and avoiding. There are some that they do avoid, sometimes for years, then deciding to eat the whole plant one night. Did I mention our vegetables are being planted on the inside of fences? The one tried and true method.

Letter to the Editor,

When the Wayfinder was proposed I had mixed feelings about it. I feared my favorite beach would become too crowded for my daily walk but I decided this was a selfish attitude in light of the benefits to local businesses.

I chose to support the Wayfinder after attending ALL the public meetings and hearing favorable comments. Some people spoke against it and an effort was made to address their concerns. Those in favor greatly outnumbered those against. The rest of the people now demanding removal of the wall didn't attend to support those who did speak.

Demanding removal of the wall at this stage is unrealistic and unreasonable. Last year was the time for opposition which might have been successful. Will you pay the cost of restoring the parking lot to its previous state? Will you reimburse ODOT for expenses incurred and the contractor they have to pay whether the Wayfinder is built or not? The City of Port Orford can't afford to pay. It has the sewer drain field to worry about. Do you think it will be easy for the city to get grants and low interest loans for the sewer problems if this project is aborted?

Someone pointed out to me that there seems to be a lot of conflict in our little town. People are defending their rights, challenging authority,

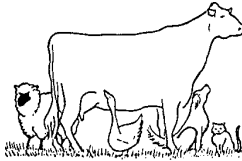
blame is being thrown around like a beach ball – if only God could be sued. The funny thing is that everyone has probably done the best they could in their own way.

property taxes) would be a significant problem for them.

- (2) Many owners of property in Curry County don't live here. Thus, they may feel they'll be paying for the medical needs of others, not theirs.
- (3) A property tax that is not an equal amount per property is not a fair burden. To illustrate, one who owns property valued at \$75,000 (not unusual in this area) would pay about \$60 per year, while the owners of property valued at \$300,000 would pay over \$200 per year. One cannot justify this cost difference in terms of the services that might be provided. There is just no correlation! Likewise you cannot justify the difference on the assumption that owners of higher valued property "can afford it." What if a property's value has gone up substantially, but its owners' personal assets and income have remained flat, or even declined?

Please pursue your desires in some other way – not at the expense of many who can't afford it!

to some engineering firms. The City must receive the engineering bids no later than April 17. They will then be evaluated and the city council will choose an engineering firm no later than May 17, 1998. The engineering firm then must have its predesign report completed before July 15, 1998. This report has to be submitted by that date to the Oregon Community Development Department and the Department of Environmental Quality for approval. According to the RFP the engineering firm's report will be based on the "Wastewater Master Plan completed in 1992 which explores all effluent disposal options including: ocean outfalls, irrigation systems, water re-use, and other innovative solutions that may apply to Port Orford's situation." One question McNurlin would like answered concerning any new system is the life expectancy of the system and the maintenance costs over 20 years.

The good news is the rebuilding process has begun and we'll do our best to keep everyone current on the progress.

Jerry spoke to me about the test water well that had been dug at Buffington Park. He said it didn't produce enough gallons per minute to make it worthwhile and the well had been closed off and the casing pulled out. He said the city would explore more sites to drill test wells. The city spent \$2,900 on the Buffington Park test site. I asked him if the city had switched over to Hubbard Creek water and he said not yet but we could expect that to happen soon once the heavy rains eased off.

Cycling the World for AIDS consists of a bicycle ride across Canada, Europe, Africa, the United States, Australia and Japan, where cyclists will travel through approximately 200 cities, accompanied by their support teams. Parallel fundraising events will be organized in the cities covered by the tour in collaboration with local cycling associations and AIDS groups. The general population will be invited to join the worldwide tour's team of cyclists for a bicycle ride of a few kilometers as they approach the town areas, giving activities a family perspective.

The money raised will be managed by the Cycling the World for AIDS Foundation (CWA Foundation), a non-profit organization founded by the promoters of the project.
