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Democrats Host Sadler By Evan Kramer



The Curry County Democratic Party held their annual dinner Saturday night at Honey Bear Campground and played host to guest

speaker Russell Sadler.

Several candidates for county positions attended the dinner and were introduced including commissioner candidates Cheryl Thorp and David Wilken, sheriff candidate Mark Creighton, surveyor candidate Jerry Floyd and treasurer candidate Patty Ingersoll.

Democratic Party chairperson Martha Weaver-Britell said the party supported opening the Democratic Party primary to voters registered as independent.

She introduced Russel Sadler as having a syndicated radio show for 27 years, trained quarter horses and a licensed soccer referee. He also teaches at Southern Oregon University in Ashland. Sadler's daily radio commentary can be heard locally on the Jefferson Public Radio morning news and the Jefferson Daily on KSOR 89.3. He also writes a monthly column for the Jefferson Public Radio program guide and was a columnist for the Oregonian for ten years. He moved to Oregon from Cleveland in 1965 and has immersed

himself in the politics of this state ever since.

Sadler warmed the large crowd up with a few jokes including what follows two days of rain in Oregon? – Monday. He referred to kelp as the state flower.

Sadler's talk centered around problems with the initiative process including the rural-urban split. He said Oregon was the first state to pass the initiative process and the second state to implement it in 1902. He said in the last four years that one half the initiatives that have been passed have been challenged in court. He made a point of stating that the Portland area is increasingly dominating state politics. He talked about the lawsuits against Measure 16 (physician assisted suicide) which passed in 1994. He said national interests were unwilling to stand by the will of the Oregon voters.

Sadler gave a couple of examples of early initiatives including one regulating the size of hotel sheets and another outlawing smallpox vaccinations.

Sadler said lobbyists have now taken over the initiative process using paid signature gatherers. Sadler called the state legislature a "balanced brawl" as opposed to the initiative process, which he called just a brawl. He then went back to the subject of the Portland area versus the rest of the state. He said Measure 5, which was voted into effect in 1990 passed in 13 counties including all eleven northwest counties. He said as a result of this initiative and shift in school funding from local school districts to the state all the educational policy is now made in Salem.

Sadler said in a recent poll that only 45% of the voters say they should be able to vote for anything that gets on the ballot; a figure which has been shrinking steadily. Sadler's opinion was that the initiative process couldn't survive if only 45% of the people believe in it. He said lobbyists have taken over the initiative process. He ended his speech on that remark.

Port Elects New Officers

The Port of Port Orford commission met last Tuesday night and elected new officers for the remainder of the year.

Lisa Wagner-Cobb served as temporary chairperson at the beginning of the meeting in place of Bill Oleson who resigned at the March meeting.

Port Manager Gayle Paige told the commission and the public that the Port has received a \$10,000 grant from the Oregon State Marine Board (OSMB) to fund replacement of the fuel storage tank at the dock. The Port has been notified it can



There are people who, at the first sign of a problem in their life or their body, sit down quietly and ask "what is going on in my life, what am I allowing/choosing

Several people have expressed concern over affording the additional taxes being requested by the Health District.

Hospital management is sensitive to lower income families. Policies allowing free care were put in place for families at poverty levels. Tens of thousands of dollars of unpaid charges are incurred annually for patients on public assistance. Liberal payment plans are available.

Management and employees of the Health District worked tirelessly to do everything possible to avoid more taxes. Major accomplishments have been made including reducing expenses by 9%. The quality of service increased. Employees are better trained and more "customer sensitive". New physicians and expanded



diagnostic capabilities were added. But it is not enough.

When it became evident that temporary financial assistance was needed, an extensive list was pared down to 1.5 million dollars, or only 50% of the projected needs during the next five years. The employees will need to work extremely hard to generate the other 1.5 million dollars. It will be a significant challenge to accomplish. Many sacrifices have and will be made by employees.

The hope is that the temporary tax increase will be perceived as a small sacrifice for insuring that healthcare services continue. The vote will certainly send a message to the management and employee team at Curry General and Curry Family Medical, and will set the course for the future of healthcare in Port Orford and Gold Beach. It could really be a matter of life and death. Everyone needs to vote!

The Curry Health District Special Bond Request for 1.5 million dollars was defeated by a slim margin. Taxing districts aren't accustomed to taking No for an answer. As a consequence they will resubmit their request for the additional funding on the next scheduled election date of May 19.

Uncharacteristically, the Hospital district has resorted to the use of strong arm tactics to induce Port Orford residents and other No Votes to cast their vote in the affirmative by threatening to shut down the Curry Family Clinic and the Gold Beach Emergency Room if the second bond issue fails once again. That's the wrong approach since our tax bill currently reflects payment for these medical services. Besides pressuring the County with facility closure tends to infuriate Curry Residents strengthening their resolve not to be intimidated. The Hospital District has not verified the necessity for the 1.5 million. They are presently operating on a 320,000-dollar tax base. which increases by 3 percent a year plus their annual revenue.

Singling out Port Orford and Gold Beach for punitive measures if the May Bonds issue fails drive a wedge between the Hospital District and Curry residents. Closure would in effect dissolve the Curry Health District and in its wake trigger a refund of taxes for services not received. Curry Health already takes a significant bite out of our Tax Dollar. Voters should not be browbeaten into changing their vote because of the improbably threat of closure.



Tom Pitchford, M.D., and Curry Health District administrators have agreed to merge the two medical clinics in Port Orford. Dr. Pitchford and Randy Scholten, the district's chief executive officer, met last week in Gold Beach to discuss details. Dr. Pitchford has practiced in the area for the past dozen years. The health district has operated Curry Family Medical clinic in Port Orford since the mid 1980s

Dr. Pitchford will join Curry Family Medical clinic's staff of rotating physicians and will begin seeing all his patients there by mid-May, Scholten announced.



Dr. Pitchford and the district have been working for several months on the merger, Scholten added. Dr. Pitchford currently uses the laboratory and x-ray facilities at Curry Family Medical.

Curry Health District operates Curry Family Medical in Port Orford and Curry General Hospital in Gold Beach. In 1996, the district restructured its leadership. Currently, a three-member council manages the district. Besides Scholten, the council members include Dr. Reg Williams, medical administrator; and Millie Bird, clinical administrator.

An open house will be scheduled for the public to tour the clinic, and meet the physicians and staff in early May.





draw up to \$75,000 in grant money from the Department of Environmental Quality for the new fuel storage tank. The Port would have to do a 25% match with the DEQ grant and they could use the OSMB grant as part of that match.

A House of Representatives committee has approved a 1.5 million-dollar allocation for the new permanent dock project. The allocation for the 1.5 million is in a Senate conference committee.

New port commission member Cecil Ashdown nominated Gifford Barnes to fill the position of president of the board. The motion passed 3-0. She then nominated Scott MacDonald to fill the vicepresident spot and that motion passed unanimously. Lisa Wagner-Cobb holds the secretary-treasurer position.

The commissioners discussed the vacancy created by Oleson's resignation. Gayle said there were three more years left on his term. The vacancy will be advertised in the newspaper. You need to be a registered voter in the port district to be eligible to serve on the Board. The commissioners approved a motion transferring the Coastal Aquatics lease at the dock to Corvello Fisheries.

The commissioners approved a motion for Gayle Paige and all the members of the board to be able to sign checks. They set May 28 as the day for their budget committee hearing.

Gayle Paige said she has heard nothing back from the State regarding the emergency status request because of this past winter's storms. She said it would be at least a year before any assistance was offered.

Watershed Council

The Watershed Council has received confirmation from County Road Department Director Dan Crumley that changes in the local road spray program will continue this year. Last year's program, negotiated between the Watershed Council and Crumley, eliminated the chance of County applied herbicides ending up in the City's water supply. The following County roads, which effect both the Garrison Lake watershed and the North Fork Hubbard Creek reservoir, will not be sprayed: Arizona Street, Paradise Point Road, Garrison Lake Road, Port Orford



Loop, Silver Butte Road, Knapp Road, and Hensley Hill Road. Property owners along these County roads are responsible for weed and conifer removal to keep the rights-of-way from becoming overgrown and hampering driver visibility.

Other County roads will be sprayed, as usual, this spring and fall. Property owners along these roads can enroll in the Road Department's "No Spray" option by calling the office at 247-7097 and requesting the necessary form to file. The Department will mail the form, which must be completed and returned, and then will mail special signs to be posted at both ends of the "NO Spray" stretch of road. Those opting for the program become responsible for weed/conifer removal.

Watershed Council Chairman Dave Wilken said, "Dan's cooperation in this matter has been very enthusiastic. He is aware of the need to eliminate any chance of the County contaminating our water supplies, and is looking at the entire County road system for similar opportunities. He is to be commended for his efforts."

Regarding the past success of the agreement, Wilken said, "Most property owners were diligent in keeping up our end. It's a small price to pay, pulling or cutting a few plants, to keep our water supplies and our roads safe. The Watershed Council urges everyone involved to keep up the good work, and help, or encourage, their neighbors to comply. We encourage those who live on other County roads to enroll in the other "No Spray" program. Wherever we can replace chemical control with hand weeding, we should. Even the so called "safe" chemicals carry some risk to humans, wildlife, and desirable plants."
