Port Commission Selects Hawthorne By Evan Kramer

The Port of Port Orford Commission met Thursday night at the Senior Center. The budget committee met first and at the end of that segment of the meeting a motion was made to approve the 1998-99 budget as amended. It passed.

The Commission moved into its regular business meeting. Port Manager Gayle Paige said there would be a story on the Port Orford dock in the July issue of National Fisherman Magazine.

Paige said the U.S. Senate has approved \$1.5 million dollars for the permanent dock project as part of the Transportation Bill. It now awaits President Clinton's signature. She said the dock is in awful shape and it would be a waste of money to repair or buy any more planks. She recommended closing off the problem areas but also publicly acknowledging the problem. She said the insurance company needs to recognize the problem and officially declare an emergency situation. Commissioner Scott MacDonald made a motion giving the port manager authority to shut off areas of the dock that aren't safe and are not economically feasible to

Making the Bach Remedies By Graeme Graydon



Doctor Edward Bach devised the most simple system in the world to prepare his remedies. His dream was for a simple method of healing that would be avail-

able for the professional and the layman alike. It is so uncomplicated and child-like that analytical minds have difficulty taking it seriously.

Being a sensitive, he was able to evaluate the subtle properties of plants without a laboratory. Feeling very self conscious, with overtones of conspiracy and sorcery and avoiding the attention of my neighbors, I gathered the flowers and left the bowl in the sun. Returning after breakfast at the homestead, I could hardly wait to gather the magic potion. Armed with a clear brown bottle and a bottle of brandy I head confidently back – only to find that my yearling heifers had drunk the whole brew.

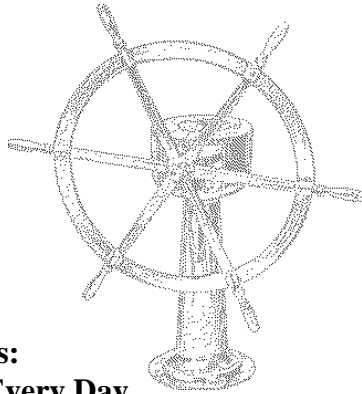
I added a line to Dr. Bach's instructions – "and keep out of the reach of livestock!"

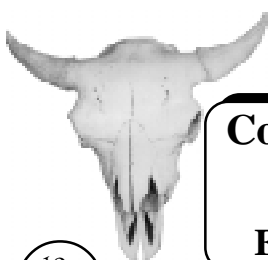

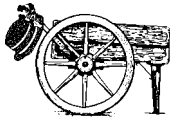

Vote By Mail

President, League of Women Voters

Were you one of the 51% of registered voters in Curry County who actually voted in the May 19 primary election? (State-wide voter turnout was estimated at approximately one-third.) Did you go to the polls or were you among the 60% of Oregon voters who used an absentee ballot? If you voted by mail, you must be in favor of having all our elections by mail. Please consider these facts:

1) We have had several years of voting by mail in Oregon and have found higher election participation. The fact that more and more voters choose absentee ballots indicates their preference for this method. A recent poll in Oregon shows 3 to 1 in favor of Vote by Mail.

2) Voting by mail gives the voter more control because you decide when you vote and you have more time to consider the choices among candidates and measures.

3) Our current law prohibits mail-in elections in the primary and general elections in even-numbered years. We have three systems: Mail-in for everyone in some elections; voting at the polls and absentee ballots at other elections.

4) Voting by mail for everyone saves more than a million dollars of your money every election. (Portland Oregonian May 21)

5) The Vote By Mail issue was presented to the Legislature last session but our representatives did not heed public pressure. They neither passed legislation nor referred the matter to a ballot measure so we could vote on it.

6) A coalition of county clerks, League of Women Voters of Oregon and others is working with volunteers (no paid signature gatherers) to get a measure on the November ballot which, if passed, would make all our Oregon elections by mail.

National fiddle champions Hanneke Cassel and Ryan McKasson will perform traditional celtic music in two concerts: Friday night June 12, at Bethany Lutheran Church in Gold Beach, and Sunday, June 14, at the Port Orford Community Building. Both concerts are at 7:30pm. Last year's Celtic Fiddle Concert was standing room only!

Cassel, age 20, just finished her second year at Boston's Berklee College of Music and is the current National Open Scottish Fiddle Champion. She has performed in twelve states across the country, and in Scotland. This past March she was the opening act for Judy Collins at Symphony Hall in Boston, and opened in May for the Wrigley Sisters from the Orkney Islands. Along with other Berklee Strings students, she had the opportunity to play with jazz great, Stephane Grappelli, in the fall of 1996, and this year she played with Carly Simon at Berklee's graduation con-

cert. She is the 1998 recipient of the Berklee string department scholarship. Hanneke will be traveling to Cape Breton this summer to perform and study traditional fiddling, and in August she will teach at Alasdair Fraser's, "Valley of the Moon Scottish Fiddle School."

Ryan McKasson, age 19, from Puyallup, Washington, just finished his first year as a viola performance major at USC in southern California. Kalmiopsis Wilderness Hike

The annual botanical/historical into the edge of the Kalmiopsis Wilderness will be held this year on Saturday, June 6. The hike is an opportunity to see the rare Kalmiopsis leachiana plant in bloom, the almost as rare Brewer or Weeping spruce, many other flowers, shrubs and trees and some historical spots. There is no charge for the hike sponsored by the Curry County Historical Society and SW Oregon Community College.

Hikers will gather at the SW Oregon Community College building in Brookings at 8:30am on June 6 to receive instructions and pool transportation.

Veva Stansell, an authority on wild flowers and plants, and Walt Schroeder, will lead the tour.

The hike is in two distinct parts. The first is from the trailhead north of Vulcan Peak about 1 1/2 miles to see the rare plants and the Gardner chrome mine. Those who wish can then backpack to their vehicles. This portion is a relatively easy hike and the group will proceed slowly. For those who feel up to it, a primitive, rugged trail will be followed from the Gardner mine over the hill to Vulcan Lake. The lake is a glacier carved lake that sparkles jewel-like with its deep blue color. The hike out from the lake is over the hill on a good trail that is fairly steep as it first leaves the lake and then "side-hills before it drops over the ridge and then gently down hill

back to the trail head where the vehicles are parked.

Be sure to bring a sack lunch. Trail parking permits are required to park at the trailhead. They are \$3.00 per day. The permits may be obtained from any US Forest Service Ranger District Office and the Rogue Outdoor Store in Gold Beach. In past years sedans have had little difficulty in negotiating the road but conditions can change so be careful as we caravan to the trailhead.

Signing up ahead of time at any SWOCC office will save time on June 6 and permit notification should the trip be canceled because of weather.

Successful Rescue

Kalmiopsis Audubon Society (KAS) has been selected as the 1998 Oregon winner of National Audubon's **Stop the Bulldozer Award** for: "successful efforts to stop old growth logging in the Siskiyou National Forest (SNF)." Also honored with distinguished service awards were KAS and Friends of Elk River member Jim Rogers and Barbara Ullian of Siskiyou Audubon and the Siskiyou Project, who works tirelessly to protect the SNF from the east side.

The past year was a productive one for KAS from the federal to the local levels, and on issues from resource conservation to community education. A highlight was the May 2 dedication of the Veva Stansell Hummingbird Garden in a former rock quarry off Quosatana Creek Road. repair at this time. The motion carried unanimously.

The port commissioners considered three letters of interest from people seeking appointment to the vacant seat on the board. The vacancy was created when Bill Oleson resigned in March. They chose Chris Hawthorne, a long-term resident of the Port Orford area. He said the dock is the heart and soul of the community and that he wants to help facilitate making the new dock project happen.

Gayle Paige talked about the new fuel storage tanks. She mentioned the \$10,000 grant from Oregon Economic Department and the 75% funding from the Department of Environmental Quality. She said the new fuel storage tank system needs to be in place before the old system is removed. She said the tanks might be vaulted and would hold less than 10,000 gallons of fuel.

The commission considered a revised crab pot ordinance for the dock. They talked about the problems with crab pots on the dock and that they can be there 10 days before the start of the commercial crab season and need to be removed three days after the end of the season. Gayle said the ordinance needs to be workable and that port employees don't have time to be policemen. Scott MacDonald will take the lead in looking at the ordinance.

The commissioners considered current and future dock space lease issues. Leesa Cobb made a motion for Gayle Paige to contact port attorney, Robert Laird, and have him begin the process of looking at the leases and examine the existing leases. The Commission will talk about the leases more at a workshop meeting.

The commission made an agreement with Wayne Streeter of Corvalho Fisheries for a short-term lease of 1,734 square feet at a cost of \$353.71 per month. Wayne said the space would meet his needs.

The commission didn't take any action on Pacific Premium Seafood's notice of intent to exercise their lease renewal option. They will wait until the attorney reviews the existing leases.

Gayle Paige said that Jana Doerr from Congressman Peter DeFazio's Coos Bay office recommended the commission turn over to Representative Ken Messerle and State Senator Veral Tarno the Division of State Lands lease issue.

The Port Commission will donate two sport boat hoist tickets to the Fourth of July Jubilee auction, which will be held on June 13 at the Community Building.
