Empowerment Zone Meeting By Evan Kramer



The Port Orford City Council met in special session on Monday night primarily to deal with hiring procedures but did close the public portion by setting a date for the empowerment zone meeting.

First up on the council agenda was "approval of hiring procedures for City Administrator." Mayor Gary Doran noted that the city had received a number of applications for the position. Councilor Norm Leeling said he wanted the hiring procedures clarified first. Councilor Ralph Donaldson said the city has two major projects starting and continued that we have a real divided community and an unusual situation. (The two major projects are the water system improvements and the replacement of the sewer drain field). Councilor Jim Campbell said he wanted to go into executive session and pick the top three candidates and then have the council interview them. Councilor Robert Warring said he is looking for a person with a program for the city, not personalities. City recorder/treasurer Norma House reminded the council that city attorney Randall Tosh said to be careful in the hiring procedure. Jay Stoler spoke from

the public and said the council didn't have time to train anybody. Warring disagreed and said that small town problems are similar throughout the world and that Port Orford's problems would be familiar to the candidates. Gene Haynie told the council they had taken all the powers away from the city administrator. Donaldson told him the city runs under a city council form of government. Warring asked which are we going to employ - a city administrative assistant or a city manager? Mayor Doran said the job description, which had been advertised in the newspapers, was for the position of **city administrator**. Norma House speaking as a private citizen asked the council how they could go forward when they don't have a job description for city administrator. Councilor Warring suggested the candidates for the job write their own job description. Councilor Leeling recommended the city get a job description first. Mayor Doran said the next order of business was to get the existing job descriptions for city manager and city administrative assistant and review them. Councilor Warring said the council couldn't deal with the applicants until the city had a job description. The council decided to look at the job applications in an executive session at the end of the regular meeting. (Editor's note: if this all

seems confusing to you don't feel bad, it was confusing to me and to others in attendance).

Next up on the agenda was the resignation of city recorder/treasurer Norma House. She has resigned from the city effective August 14. She said the city has advertised the job opening and would like someone chosen soon so they can get training. Mayor Doran reluctantly accepted Norma House's resignation.

The council then moved on to the hiring procedures for the city recorder/treasurer. There has been one application turned in so far. Norma House recommended city auditor Rob Wall help with the selection process.

Next up but not on the agenda was a presentation from Ed McQuade. He talked about the empowerment zone survey results, which will be completely tabulated after July 22 when the surveys are due back at the collection locations. McQuade said he will need a commitment from the city council after the survey results are released on whether they will vote to join or not join forces with the other partners in the empowerment zone application. He said the Curry County commissioners won't take action without the support of the Port Orford City Council. The coun-

Fair Entry Day

Exhibitors in all departments except livestock bring their handmade and home-grown goods to the Curry County Fair on entry day, Tuesday, July 28, in preparation for the Curry County Fair and Rodeo which will be in full swing July 30-August 2 at the fairgrounds in Gold Beach.

Tuesday is entry day for Hobbycraft, Floral, Needlecraft, Art and photography, land products, fruits and vegetables and culinary baked and canned goods.

Department superintendents and assistants will receive entries on Tuesday, from 9:00am until 9:00pm.

Livestock entries will arrive on Wednesday, July 29. Livestock and 4-H pre-entries are already completed. "There are so many livestock entries this year that we will have to borrow pens and panels," says Ron Crook, Fair Manager.

"It will be interesting to see how many vegetables and fruit are entered this year," Crook continues, "The weather has been challenging!" "The \$25 cash prize for the largest zucchini should draw some good entries from the local gardens," Crook says of the contest sponsored by Del Cur Supply.

Entry forms may be picked up and prepared at home for delivery on entry day along with the exhibits. Entry numbers and forms are available in Brookings at Mory's and in Port Orford at the office of Coos-Curry Electric Co-op, at the Langlois Market, and in Agness at Cougar Lane Store as well as the fairgrounds in Gold Beach.

Superintendents and assistants will help with completion of entry forms and tags on entry day, answering questions regarding categories, placement of tags and such.

Those who are at either end of the county and cannot get to the fairgrounds on entry day may leave their exhibits at drop-off sites on Monday, July 27, at either Mory's in Brookings, from 8:30am-5:00pm, or at Sea Breeze Florist in Port Orford, from 10:00am-5:00pm.

Volunteers are invited to call or come in to the fairgrounds and sign up for assisting superintendents, especially for entry day, Tuesday, July 28, and for judging days at the various departments. There are several four-hour shifts every day, Tuesday through Sunday in the three exhibit buildings and the livestock pavilion which are open from 10:00am-10:00pm during the fair.

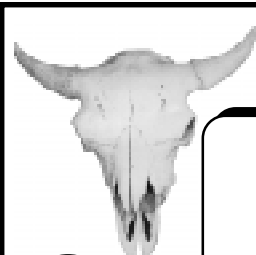

Letter to the Editor,

The North Curry County Community Survey regarding the Empowerment Zone, put together by the Empowerment Program Committee (Ed McQuade, John Phillips, Jay Stoler, Frank Smith, Evan Kramer, Dave Wilken) has an obvious mission. There is no place on the survey to indicate a "yes" vote. Mr. Stoler, who will tabulate the results, will only be able to count "no" votes and the prioritization of community needs. The survey asks people to "help decide the priority of listed community needs". **Nowhere does it say that the prioritization is the same as a yes vote.**

It asks people to "choose all of the community needs you think are necessary for the survival and growth of our area". Again, nowhere in that statement does it say that that is a "yes" vote. The survey has no place to mark "yes" for the Empowerment Zone Program. The "Empowerment Program Committee" cannot assume that the "prioritization" they ask for is an endorsement of the Empowerment Zone and all its rules and regulations. To assume anything would be a complete misrepresentation of the survey and the people who filled it out.

Since people who are opposed to the EZ program had a chance to look at the survey before it was mailed and have had their say in altering it, why did they not point out there wasn't a place for a "yes" vote at that time? I voted **yes** when I filled out the form and prioritized the community's needs.

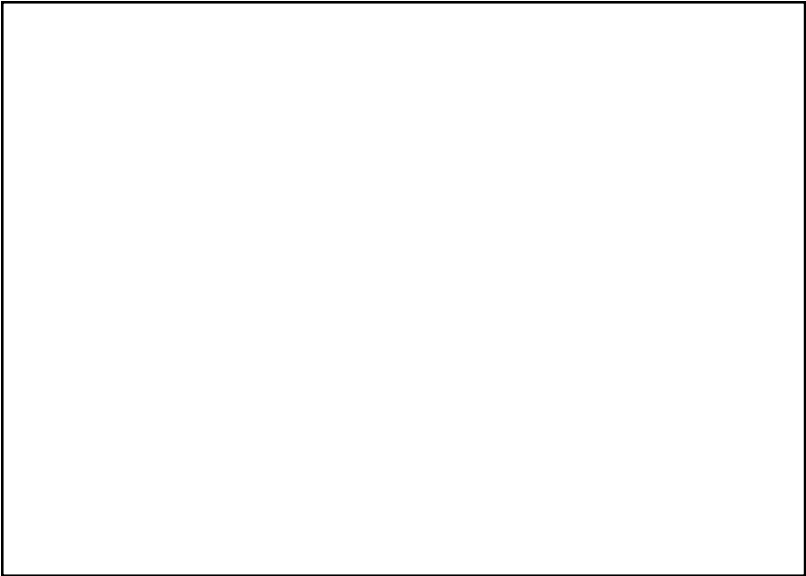

Letter to the Editor,

Consensus – We hear it at meetings, see it in print. Its usage is of recent vogue. What does “consensus” mean?

In the 1828 Noah Webster’s American Dictionary of the English Language consensus is the Latin root word for our English word consent. And consent is defined as “agreement of the mind to that which is proposed or stated by another; a yielding of the mind or will. We give consent when we yield that which we have a right to withhold”.

By the 1940’s “consensus” began showing up in a lesser-known dictionary which let “consensus” to be an accepted word in and of itself to mean “general opinion”. The American Dictionary says consensus means simply “agreement. American Heritage Dictionary on the computer defines consensus as “an option or position reached by a group or a whole or by majority will”.

Let us be clear about the evolution of consensus. It means we yield that which we have a right to withhold. We consent. It is not the same as a vote where we can change our minds and vote differently another time. When we yield, when we

consent we have give up or signed over rights to others which can not be retrieved! A vote an issue can be changed if need be but a consensus does not permit that safeguard. Consensus is a dubious, uncertain, bogus word because its origin is the Latin word for consent. That is why so much confusion arises each and every time consensus is used.

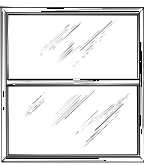

**Answer to Dinsmore Letter

Ms. Dinsmore certainly does seem to have a lot of confusion. Perhaps she should invest in better dictionaries. I’ll take my definitions from the Compact Edition of the Oxford English Dictionary (the OED.)

First, Ms. Dinsmore’s definition of “Consent” is irrelevant. Although one might guess that Consent and Consensus both come from the same root, they do not.

The word “consensus” is from the Latin “consensus” meaning agreement, accord, sympathy, common feeling. The word “consent” is from the Old French cusconsentir meaning to feel together, agree, accord, harmonize. It is from “con”

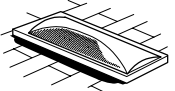

(together) and sentire (to feel, think, judge, etc.)

The OED gives two definitions for “consensus.” The first applies to physiology: “General agreement or concord of different parts or organs of the body in effecting a given purpose; sympathy.

The second definition is the one important for our concerns: “Agreement in opinion; the collective unanimous opinion of a number of persons.”

In other words an attempt to find a consensus is an attempt to find a solution that we ALL can live with.

The Empowerment Zone Survey is not a binding vote. It is simply an opinion survey to provide information to the City Council who will then have to make a decision on whether and/or how to pursue matters. While it is likely they will give serious weight to the results of the survey, they are not bound by it. If, in their opinion, the best course of action runs contrary to public opinion, they are free to make that choice. Of course, they will have to face the consequences of such a choice at election time. On the other hand, a representative who acts solely on opinion surveys reflects the worst of a democracy in that the masses are free to act irresponsibly and vote themselves bread and circuses while the representative should consider the costs, benefits, and side effects of their decisions.

Healer Extraordinaire By Graeme Graydon

The most famous natural healer of our time, Maurice Messegue (Mess-a-gay) was born into a peasant family in a remote village of Gascony, France in 1921. Up to age 11 his father taught him a system of healing with plants which had accumulated over many generations of his family. To go to the doctor was reasonably regarded by the villagers as a step towards death, buying a medicine meant the same thing so it was natural to look for healing in the weeds and vegetables that grew in the area and had been known forever. Even the local doctor came secretly to the older Messegue for treatment

and no one ever paid a fee – maybe a chicken or eggs. Young Maurice spent most of his time following his father as the herbs were gathered, prepared and eventually administered to the sick. After his father's death, the young boy continued to collect and study the herbs as he knew his father would have wanted.

This passion set him aside from the other boys and although he never actually treated anyone for many years, he kept all the skill and knowledge of use of some 40 local plants that he had been taught. Some inner guidance drove him to study, first his classmates and then any others around him, noticing their skin colour, mannerisms, particularly their emotions and he would guess what organs were out of whack and what herbs his father would have used. He knew who would need Buttercup or Nettle or Artichoke leaves. It never occurred to him that he could make a living as a healer, it was just something he needed to know all about, and it somehow kept his father in his life.

In his early 20's, in occupied France he was asked to treat the senior French Admiral. Was he not the son of Camille Messegue, a famous natural healer?

Trusting his herbs and his father's wis-

dom, Maurice, not too professionally attended to the Admiral and a long-standing, painful condition was relieved.

This experience, after a few false starts decided Messegue on a career as a healer. He healed tens of thousands of people always with the same approach, commoner or celebrity alike – first he would know the patient enough to treat the patient, never the disease, then he would use the herbs, the same way his father did, promising only to help, not cure the person. His success was such that he was confidant to many of the statesmen and politicians of the time, Presidents, kings, prime ministers and even a pope-to-be were his clients but he always gave the credit to the Good Lord who gave him the plants to work with.

Yes, he was from peasant stock and we automatically feel superior but he was also dedicated, meticulous, honest and passionate in his dream to bring safe effective healing to everyone. Without his peasant stubbornness, his message would never have been heard.
