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

Mayor Thanks Veterans

Mayor Gary Doran led the Monday night Port Orford City Council meeting off by thanking all veterans in honor of Veteran's Day for doing their duties for our country. He then thanked everyone who voted in the recent election and congratulated the winners.

City public works director Jerry McNurlin said the salinity in Garrison Lake is the same as last week. It was .7 at the outfall, .6 at the 12th Street boat ramp and .5 at the intake valve. He estimated we would be faced with the salinity problem all winter. He said the lake is clearly saturated with salt.

Fire Chief Frank Barrows issued a written report for October that showed one grass fire, one car in a ditch and that 10 weeks of basic fire class for new firefighters had just ended.

The police department has started a "police log" which will show date, time and a brief description of each call and the disposition. The log will be made available to the local media. Chief Bill Rush reported 23 calls for service in October as well as 6 traffic citations and 8 new cases

including 2 felonies, 4 misdemeanors and 1 misdemeanor arrest. He said he has been patrolling the area around Driftwood Elementary School at the beginning and end of the school day regularly.

The Parks Commission issued a Port Orford Parks Master Site Plan, which was included in the council packet. It reflected a lot of work and thought on the part of the commission.

David Darnell spoke under citizen's comments. He mentioned the police levy had gone down to defeat. He recommended taking the 95% of the bed tax money the Chamber of Commerce is receiving and giving it to the police department. Chamber president John Phillips got up to speak and correct Darnell's statement. Phillips said the Chamber has a lease agreement with the City to run the visitor center in which the Chamber is paid \$9,000 or **30%** of the bed tax money per year.

Pat Buffington told the council work had begun on Spyglass Hill Road and wanted a report on what they were going to do. Alice Pfand asked if Garrison Lake has been tested regularly for salinity the last few years. Jerry McNurlin said no, just the last few months. He also said ocean water is coming into the lake more consistently now. Councilor Robert Warring said he wants an expert on this issue.

Mayor Doran appointed John Luthie to the watershed council and Nancy Phillips to the bed tax committee. The council voted 4-0 to sustain his appointments.

Councilor Ralph Donaldson recommended the council have an open meeting where they lay out the most important issues facing the city and solutions to the issues. Public input would be invited. Councilor Norm Leeling asked that a public meeting be set to discuss the KCM engineering report concerning replacement of the sewer outfall. Ralph Donaldson insisted on having a member of the Department of Environmental Quality present at that meeting.

The council has hired Ellen Mondell for the position of police/court clerk. City Administrator Johnny Alexander recommended she be paid \$7.00 an hour. The council passed a motion approving this recommendation. South Coast Business

Whale Watch Training

Training for winter whale watch week volunteers will be offered the weekends of Dec. 5-6 at the Mark O. Hatfield Marine Science Center in Newport and Dec. 12-13 at Nehalem Bay State Park near Manzanita.

Hours for both training sessions will be 8am – 4:30pm on Saturday and 8:30am till noon on Sunday. The registration fee for the two day training is \$10 per person.

Volunteers who complete the training will be stationed at 31 "Whale Watching Spoken Here" sites along the Oregon coast from Saturday, Dec. 26th through Saturday Jan. 2nd to help visitors spot whales and provide information on the annual gray whale migration. They will be on duty during "watch hours" from 10am to 1pm each day.

Saturday workshops focusing on the biology and natural history of gray whales

as well as their migrations will be conducted by Bruce Mate of Oregon State University in Newport and by Bob Bacon of the Haystack Rock Awareness Program at Nehalem Bay. The Sunday morning sessions will include on-site field trips and instruction on interpretive techniques.

Charter boat cruises will follow the Sunday sessions at both locations from 1-3pm, weather and ocean conditions permitting. Costs for the cruises will be \$12 per person at Newport and \$20 per person at Nehalem Bay.

Pre-registration is mandatory for the training. Early registrants for the Nehalem Bay classes will have the opportunity to stay for free the nights of December 11-13 in one of the park's 12 yurts, which are currently reserved, for whale watch training participants. Nehalem Bay State Park is off US 101, three miles south of the highway's Manzanita Junction.




A year ago Monique and I went on an adventure to the very south of Arizona at the hottest time of the season. It was so hot that once, while wearing shorts, I burned my behind on the car seat. 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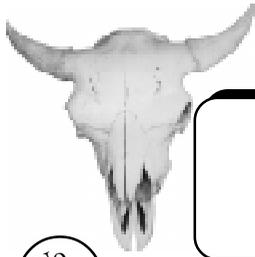

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She currently chairs the Curry County Diabetes Coalition, a group of local health care providers and community members dedicated to improving public awareness of diabetes through promoting community resources and disseminating information on diabetes management.

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Canopy Project Bids

Curry County and the Board of Directors for The Canopy Project are seeking proposals from qualified firms or teams to perform architecture, engineering and related services in the preconstruction design of infrastructure for The Canopy Project. The request for proposals was released on October 23, 1998. Written proposals are due November 20, 1998. Proposals will be opened at a public meeting on Friday, November 20, 1998 at 4:00pm at the Courthouse Annex, 94235 Moore Street, Commissioner's Hearing Room, Gold Beach, Oregon. Selected proposers will be invited to present their proposals at a live presentation on December 2, 1998. The time and place for this public presentation will be announced as soon as the arrangements are made. The award for the contract will be made by December 11, 1998, with the contract completion date being March 12, 1999.

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The initial notice was sent to more than 160 firms. Thirty-seven of those firms have expressed interest in submitting proposals. 

The comprehensive health survey is sponsored by Curry County Community Partners, a group comprised of countywide organizations striving to bring well-being to all Curry County residents. The votes have been counted and the election is now over. Congratulations to all ten of the Port Orford City Council candidates who ran for the four open positions. You all made it much more interesting. Those ten candidates represented one percent of the population of Port Orford which made them a special group.

Last week's paper had the early election results but even with all the ballots counted no results changed. The four elected councilors are Jane Cramer, Norm Leeling and Robert Warring for the four-year terms of office and Nathaniel Wander for the two-year term. Ballot Measure 9 – the police serial levy and Ballot Measure 10 – the highway 101 Master Plan both were defeated.

Cheryl Thorp defeated TV Skinner for County Commissioner and will join Bill Roberts and Lloyd Olds in Gold Beach. Patty Ingersoll won the job of county treasurer. Kent Owens will be the first new County Sheriff in ten years replacing outgoing sheriff Chuck Denney.

Watershed Stewards

The topic of the next free Watershed Steward workshop will be "Upland Evaluation and Enhancement". There will be a Thursday night lecture presented at Oregon State University Extension on November 12 from 5:30pm – 7pm at the Fairgrounds in Gold Beach. That is followed by a field trip Friday, November 21 from 8am – 12pm.

The lecture discusses the upland process and their effects on the watersheds. The field trip evaluates stream crossings and their potential sediment deposits in the waterways. This workshop is part of the Master Watershed Steward Program that includes monthly lectures and field trips. These programs are open to the public.

The workshops are presented by South Coast/Lower Rogue Watershed Councils in cooperation with Curry Soil and Water District, OSU Extension and Southwestern Oregon Community College.

MOST NEEDED:

- Baby Food, Formula
- Disposable Diapers (all sizes)
- Milk - Powdered or canned (only)
- Drinking Water
- Canned Food (fruit, tuna, sardines, tomato sauce, tomato paste, vegetables)
- Corn Flour (Masa Harina available in all supermarkets)
- Beans (packaged red beans, preferably)
- Rice
- Vegetable Oil (not in glass bottles) or vegetable shortening or lard
- Sugar
- Pasta
- Salt

SHELTER/EQUIPMENT:

- Flashlights, lanterns with batteries
- Tarps, tents, plastic sheeting
- Cots and folding beds
- Cooking utensils and dishes (metal or plastic)
- Can openers
- Portable (gas) stoves, grills
- Blankets, sheets, sleeping bags
- Soaps
- Detergents
- Chlorine bleach
- Mosquito Repellent
- Charcoal
- Cleaning supplies

MEDICAL SUPPLIES:

- Anti-diarrhea
- Decongestants
- Antipyretics (to lower fever)
- Pain relievers: Aspirin, etc.
- Cotton Balls, pads
- Distilled water
- Soaps
- Disinfectants, alcohol, ointments, hydrogen peroxide
- Rehydration salts

CLOTHING:

Remember that winter clothing is needed in very few areas:

- Clothing for adults and children.
- Protective gear such as heavy gloves, rubber boots, face masks, goggles, etc.

Note: Be careful about packaging items that are considered dangerous goods for transportation. Chlorine bleach is a needed item for purifying water, but is dangerous and shipments must be properly marked.

PLEASE BRING YOUR DONATIONS IN CLEAN, STURDY CARDBOARD BOXES.

All items that are donated will be delivered to the Consulate of Honduras in Los Angeles. If you want your aid to go to El Salvador, Guatemala, or Nicaragua, mark your box 'Hurricane Mitch' and the name of the country you want it to go to.



**Council Agrees to Re-Bid

The Port Orford City Council met in special session last Wednesday night concerning re-bid of two portions of the water treatment master improvement plan.

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The two parts of the treatment plan being discussed were Schedule A (water treatment plant) and Schedule D (reservoir on Deady Street).

Dick Norad, from H.G.E. Engineering firm was present. He presented the council with a list of figures for the re-bid process. He estimated it would cost the city \$8,250 to re-bid Schedule A & D. He said H.G.E. would absorb \$2750 of what should have been a total cost of \$11,000.

Councilor Ralph Donaldson said the problems with Schedule A were the fault of H.G.E. Norad disagreed with his assessment. Councilor Jim Campbell asked Norad why the City should pay \$8,000 for something that wasn't right to begin with. Ralph Donaldson said it was half our fault because the Schedule D bids had come in too high and it was the city that wanted to re-bid them.

City Administrator Johnny Alexander said the Schedule A bidding process was flawed.

Councilor Donaldson said H.G.E. deserved \$4,125 for the Schedule D re-bid. Johnny Alexander said the city needs the water treatment plant to handle increased tur-

bidity "soon." Donaldson made a motion authorizing the city to pay H.G.E. \$4,125 for rebidding Schedule D. It passed 6-0.

Donaldson asked Norad if he would consider a compromise on Schedule D. Norad said he would go down in price \$1,000 or he would turn the matter over to his attorney, Jerry Lesan of Coos Bay. Donaldson then made a motion to pay H.G.E. a total of \$7,250 for rebidding Schedule A & D. The council voted 5-1 in favor with Jim Campbell dissenting. The first motion was cancelled.

Johnny Alexander spoke about a recent public works commission meeting where the problem of turbidity at the water treatment plant was discussed. He said Matt Grey of H.G.E. had mentioned other water treatment plants can handle much more turbidity than Port Orford's plant. They can handle 50 National Turbidity units as opposed to Port Orford, which can handle 5 or 6 units.

Dick Norad recommended the City look into getting advice from other water treatment plant operators at a cost of \$45-\$50 an hour. Norad said he would come up with recommendations for the City.

Employment Corp pays for the majority of her salary. A liquor license for Salsa Rita's was unanimously approved. The Chamber of Commerce requested a change in hours at the visitor center to 9:00am-4:00pm. Robert Warring commended them for the excellent work they have done at the visitor center. The council voted 4-0 to approve the change in hours.

Chamber office manager Nancy Phillips told the council the Chamber was going to throw a community Christmas party on December 6 from 5:00-6:30pm at Driftwood Elementary School. The \$500 to pay for the party is coming from Pepsi and was promotional money left over from the Cape Blanco Airport auto races.

The council then considered two ordinances, #99-01 and 99-02 dealing with rules and procedures for the operation of the City of Port Orford municipal water system and municipal sewer system. Ordinance 99-01 dealt with water service shut off for lack of payment ninety days after the account is past due and Ordinance 99-02 dealt with sewer shut off of

lack of payment ninety days after the account is past due. The council voted 4-0 to approve both ordinances.

The council then considered Resolution 99-01 to set fees for use of the Community Building. The issue turned into a lively discussion of who should pay and who shouldn't have to pay to use the building. Community members favored waiving the fee for non-profit local groups. The council decided not to vote on the resolution and will continue to do business as usual. This means non-profit groups desiring to use the Community Building for free will have to appear before the council with their request.

The council set the KCM engineering meeting for Tuesday, November 24, at 7:00pm. The interpretive watershed meeting will be held on either December 1 or 2. The council workshop on priorities, problems and solutions will be held on Saturday, December 12, from 10:00am to noon.

The council adjourned to an executive session to discuss hiring of a city recorder and city treasurer.

The council adjourned back into regular session and chose Joyce Hodge for city

treasurer and Doreen Rangel for city recorder.
