Council Discusses Rates By Evan Kramer



The Port Orford City council met on Monday morning at 9:00am in a workshop session to discuss sewer rates. It may not sound exciting but it's a money issue and not one to ignore.

Mayor Gary Doran started the workshop by asking for comments from the public. Norm Leeling told the council it was important that the rates they set recognize the difference between residential and commercial users. He said they needed to be fair.

Al Affonso said it wouldn't be equitable to charge for each space (in an RV park) because they weren't always full. He said no other utility charges by the space. He said he would be in favor of RV parks being charged as commercial users. Affonso said that we missed the boat with the General Obligation bond (it was defeated 208-207) and that the only councilor who supported it was Carl Eskelson. He said the councilors hadn't represented the whole community.

Martin Myhre asked if there was anything prohibiting another vote on the GO bond. City administrator Erna Barnett

said yes we can. Later on she said we couldn't vote on it again until September 2003. Myhre recommended another vote on the GO bond. Myhre owns the Shoreline Motel which he said varies in occupancy rate from 10 to 85 percent. He asked the council what they were looking at this morning and was told they were looking at seven options to fund the sewer operation and maintenance and pay for revenue bonds for the new outfall. Ken Williams told the council they need to adjust their rates for winter and said they have incomplete data.

Caroline Clancy urged the council to put the GO bond back on the ballot.

Marvin Daniels, owner of Evergreen RV Park, said he didn't mind paying a little more but would have trouble competing if the rates go up too much.

Mayor Doran reminded people there are many time frames the city has to meet and that the outfall project has to have a revenue stream.

The public input ended and the council took up deliberations. Councilor Emily Francona said she's wished she had seen as much interest from the public as at previous meetings. She said this wasn't an us versus you situation but a situation driven by things out of our control.

Mayor Doran said the \$1 million dollar grant from Rural Utilities Service for the sewer outfall project was important to us. He said RUS needed to know the City was sincere and that the City needed a flow of funds back to the loaning agency.

Councilor Ed Beck said the council needed to determine the rate structure and that he hadn't seen any on the list he liked. Councilor Jim Auburn spoke about the horrendous bill to pay and said we needed to find the fairest way to spread the pain around. Ed Beck asked if the council was going to have a flat rate or a base plus consumption rate and that issue needed to be resolved.

Erna Barnett said if the revenue bonds pass RUS will proceed with funding for the outfall. Barnett said she would go with the consultant's recommendation (Ray Bartlett) who recommended option #1. Councilor Carl Eskelson said the rates weren't written in stone and he would go for trying option #1. Jim Auburn said the base rate was the same for a house and a commercial user and it wasn't equitable.

Option #1 would include a base rate of \$36.60 by July 1, 2003 increasing to \$51.65 one year later. This is a bi-

**New Light on Old Traditions

Easter and Passover are considered, by most, to be the Holiest of Holidays. They share many of the same beginnings in antiquity, which are both intriguing and mystical. The date changes from year to year for both. Both Easter and Passover revolve around new beginnings, family, food, spiritual studies and the observance of a higher power at work in our lives.

Easter celebration begins with Lent and Ash Wednesday for the Christian and concludes with Easter Sunday, a total of forty-six days. The formula to determine the day of Easter Sunday was created by the church Bishops, at the Council of Nicea, in 327 AD: the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Spring Equinox. Prior to this time Easter was linked even more closely to the festival of Passover than today.

Passover is an eight-day observance beginning at the full moon nearest the Spring Equinox. The Hebrew Passover is a celebration of escape from Egyptian slavery and the return to the Holy temple. Upon returning to the temple, it is told, they had just enough lamp oil for twenty-four hours. But the lamp burned brightly for eight days. Hence the modern eight-day Festival.

Some of the modern Easter traditions have their influence from non-Christian traditions and folklore. For example, the brightly colored eggs of Easter: The egg is a symbol of fertility in many cultures. Also, in the early church during Lent, people were forbidden to eat eggs until Easter Sunday. Additionally, the practice of dyeing and decorating eggs is said to come from the Middle Eastern Spring Festivals and spreading to Europe during the time of the Crusades. The colors represented the profuse colors of spring in nature.

The tradition of an Easter Bunny is Teutonic in origin: A hare - a prolific breeder came to be associated with the lying of Easter Eggs - as found in the emblem of Eostre, the Teutonic Goddess of Spring. The root origin of the name Easter is said to come from the Teutonic Goddess' name, Eostre.

Another Easter tradition, not so widely practiced today but certainly in this author's youth, is the wearing of new cloths Easter Sunday. Remember the Easter Parade and those new Easter Bonnets? This can be traced to pagan and primitive Spring when people chose to shed the old and put on the new. Certainly plants and animals still do this.

Metaphysically Easter and Passover both are times to focus on letting go of thoughts, habits, feelings and things, which do not serve the soul well and to celebrate putting into practice gratitude and all higher thoughts and actions. Two beautiful, powerful holidays to be sure.

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Square Dancing Hijinks By Patty Reese

In the early 1950's the local weather was at least as daunting and the rains were worse than they are today. That didn't seem to stop the Beachcombers from traveling south to Ophir, Gold Beach and Pistol River and north to Bandon, Coos Bay and Coquille (really that's northeast).

With logging in full swing, area mills were running long hours to produce lumber and plywood for a burgeoning housing industry. The south coast was bursting at the seams with young families, eager for a good time with new friends. Square dancing offered just the right amount of activity, laughter and social interaction. What started out as a Saturday night outing became by 1957-58 a major part of evening and weekend life for many. Classes were held on Sunday nights, round dance lessons on Wednesday nights, and workshops were in session each Friday evening.

Evidently the Club membership included a group of couples who enjoyed going the extra mile for a good time. In early 1958 a series of clippings in the scrap-

book chronicle their escapades. It seems after dancing until midnight in Ophir on Saturday night "a bunch of Beachcombers junketed back to Andy Gribbles and tanked up on coffee and changed into p.j.'s. They leaped into their cars and went charging out through the Hamlet and picked up Lloyd and Mary Bates." (Lloyd later served as mayor and Justice of the Peace in Port Orford.) By this time it was about 2:30 a.m. They roused the sleeping Conrad and Doris Colson from bed. Good-natured Connie emerged from his room wearing a robe and carrying a shotgun, looking "like a Kansas farmer keeping kids out of his watermelon patch." They made Connie call while the intruders danced in his living room. The party broke up at 4 a.m.

Billie Smith relates a similar incident she was involved in. The Smiths and three other couples drove to Gold Beach to pull the same trick on a caller there. That night we were experiencing a Port Orford winter storm featuring lots of rain. Dressed in pajamas and raincoats, the dancers stopped a policeman to get directions to the Mitchell's home. After a few strange looks the officer gave directions and the plan proceeded without a

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hitch until the return trip home. It seems the rain had caused a slide in Humbug Canyon and the carload of pajama clad, sleepy dancers spend a few hours waiting for the road to be cleared.

These two episodes and more like them were examples of activities required for becoming members of "The Idiots Club". It was quite a big deal during that time among square dancers nationally. Callers would do the same thing to dancers by going to their homes or calling on the phone to request the dancers get to the dance hall for a middle of the night dance. They all earned "Cuckoos" badges and ended with breakfast and lots of laughter. I wonder if the reaction would be the same today or have most of us forgotten it's all about having a good time with friends?

Speaking of having a good time, several Beachcombers traveled to Coquille last weekend to dance with the Sets-In-Order. Venturing out from here were Jean Shank, Marty McDermott, Gene Butts and Bob Berry. Saturday night we join the Saints 'N Aints for their birthday celebration in the Tioga Ballroom in Coos Bay.

The flag is flying at half-mast at Port Orford City Hall in honor of volunteer fireman Jim Garwood who died of a heart attack on Saturday. His boots and helmet are placed at the base of the flagpole in his honor.

Jim Garwood was a member of the Port Orford Volunteer Fire Department since he moved to town in 1990. He and his wife Kay built a home on Lakeshore Drive. Garwood was 72.

Jim Garwood retired from the Long Beach Fire Department before moving to Port Orford and brought with him a wealth of fire fighting experience. Volunteer Fire Department Assistant Chief Gayle Wilcox said of Garwood "he was our most valuable player." Garwood served at different times as the department training officer and assistant chief.

Wilcox said Garwood taught department members things every day including this past Saturday. That day the department participated in a burn-to-learn on Knapp Road and Jim Garwood took part in that fire fighting exercise. Wilcox said Garwood was always there for department members. Editor's note: I was a member of the volunteer fire department for a few years in the early 90's and Jim was particularly helpful to me. 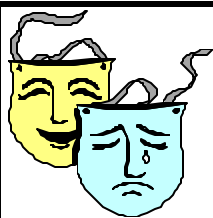
Lee's Silver Door, which they closed ten years ago but is not the least bit forgotten.

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Windfest Wind Surfing

One of several activities happening during the Wild Rivers coast WindFest on May 24 will be a variety of wind surfing events at Floras Lake and the adjacent ocean area. Both traditional wind surfing demonstrations and kite surfing demonstrations on both the lake and the ocean will be featured throughout the day and wind surfing lessons provided by the Floras Lake Wind Surfing School will be available for anyone interested in learning the sport. "The Floras Lake area is the second most active wind and kite surfing area in Oregon," said Wind Fest Windsurfing Chairperson Chuck

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Schaumburg, "and Memorial Day Week-end is one of the busiest times at the park."

Free shuttle busses will be running every twenty minutes throughout the day connecting the wind surfing activities at Floras Lake, the radio controlled airplane demonstrations at Cape Blanco, the professional kite flyers at the Port Beach, the children's kite flying area and booth areas in front of the Port Orford Community Building and other activities. A "Taste of the Town" Dinner Dance with live music, cash bar, and food from ten participating restaurants (all for one ticket) will be held on Saturday evening at the Community Building and a special WindFest breakfast will be provided at the Beachcombers Dance Club on Sunday morning. All events are part of the Wild Rivers Coast WindFest sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce of Port Orford and North Curry County.

In addition to the wind surfing events at Floras Lake, hiking trails to Blacklock Point and the Cape Blanco Airport will be open and interpretive signs will be available to guide guests to various wildlife areas. Bureau of Land Management personnel will be on hand to discuss recreational opportunities in the North Curry County area. Public boat launching, day use picnic areas, and campsites are also available at the park.

A 16-page WindFest Program Guide is in production and WindFest logo sweat-shirts and tee shirts and Taste of the Town tickets are on sale at several area merchants. May 1943 – June 1946 aboard the U.S.S. Escambia AO-80

Introducing the Escambia AO-80 commissioned in 1943 and de-commissioned in 1946. In her two years of World War II service, the Eskey Maru as she was affectionately dubbed, developed a personality and legends quite unique for a naval support ship. That's because Escambia and her sister fleet oilers were no ordinary tankers. They were designed for the vital and perilous job of refueling ships of the fleet at sea, far from land bases. They were so essential to naval strategy, particularly in the Pacific, that extra care was taken to staff them with men of above average skills and intelli-

gence and guys of that character are characters. Escambia had more than its share. Swapping tales of shipboard life at annual reunions or wherever two or more of the guys get together is just something.

Our thanks sir!

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first of a series of fast Fleet Oilers known as Escambia Class. The Escambia was 532'6" in length, 68' beam, 30' 10" draft, and 15-knot speed. She was at sea 321 days from November 13, 1943 to November 17, 1945. She fueled 389 ships of the fleet, 231 at sea, without a serious incident.

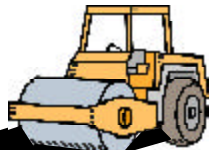

Council Discusses Rates Continued from Front Cover

monthly fee. This figure reflects that 60% of sewer fees would come from the base rate and 40% from commodity or water usage by July 1, 2004. The base rate would go up to \$64.90 by July 1, 2007 and is not affected by how much water you use.

The council then got on the phone with Ray Bartlett from Economic and Financial Analysis and he answered questions from the councilors. Bartlett said that option #1 included a dramatic increase in the base rate for residential and commercial users. He said there were very few large size meters in the city. He said when the commodity rate kicks in for large water users it would produce an equitable set of bills. Erna Barnett asked Bartlett the rationale behind the base rate and asked why not go with a commodity based rate. Barnett said the city wanted to eliminate the variance in revenue they would receive each billing period with a commodity-based rate. He said the commodity rate distinguishes the big from the small users.

Bartlett was asked about the groundwater or irrigation usage and that the

commodity rate penalizes people who do gardening. Bartlett said in some other cities people get a second meter for irrigation uses and then don't pay sewer rates for the irrigation water.

Councilor Beck asked why apartments and duplexes were picked out for a change in the way the rates are applied. Bartlett said he looked at the data and said that their water consumption looked as high as for a single-family house except during summer. Councilor Jerry Steinhorst asked Bartlett if a factor for commodity rate for summer use would be applicable and Bartlett said it was possible. Bartlett said the council would find inequities in all options and he had looked for an option where people pay for proportional use.

Councilor Auburn said the bottom line is that Bartlett recommended option #1 and Bartlett agreed. He said it accomplishes the most equity across the customer classes. Jim Auburn asked if RUS would accept option #1 and Bartlett said yes. He said the current rate structure the city has is pretty equitable. He said with the base and commodity charges the people would still have some ability to control their bills referring to year round residences. Bartlett said the public should vote for the Revenue Bonds.

Mary Corey said she was a duplex owner and asked if option #1 was chosen who would pay for the extra meter (her duplex has one meter). Corey said the fixed base rate doesn't take into effect the conservation efforts people have made. Bartlett told her a second meter wasn't necessary and that the duplex would pay the base rate for two units plus the commodity rate. Corey challenged Bartlett's figures and told him it was now personal.

The council took up the Port of Port Orford issue. Erna Barnett said she has spoken with Port manager Gary Anderson and found that one of the Port accounts that should have been paying a sewer fee wasn't. The utility bill for the

Port restrooms has not included sewer fees but according to Erna Barnett the city now charges them sewer fees.

Councilor Jim Campbell talked about people installing irrigation meters for water and asked how much it would cost them. Erna Barnett said \$250 but that she didn't know if there would be System Development Charges (SDC's). She told Campbell she would get back to him and added the residents would have to have to meter installed and plumbed.

Mary Corey thanked Ed Beck for his efforts. She told Emily Francona it was hard to get to the meetings because she is a working woman. Corey said as the rates go up she will have to increase rental rates. She told the council they weren't considering low-income people and asked them to take them into consideration.

Marvin Daniels told the council that he didn't think residences were subsidizing businesses and the current base rate was fair. Martin Myhre thanked the council for holding the workshops and for their effort. He said he hoped they chose option #1.

Councilor Beck said he was happy with #1 except the change of duplexes and apartments to one hookup per unit. Beck saw it as an inequity and asked why RV parks shouldn't pay more of a base rate. Beck said he wouldn't vote for that part of option #1. Jim Auburn said the large users would pay more as a percentage of water usage. Jim Campbell said option #1 was as close to equitable as can be.

The council was in workshop session but the near consensus was to go with option #1. It will be presented to them at the council meeting on Monday, April 21, 7:00pm, so they can vote on it.
