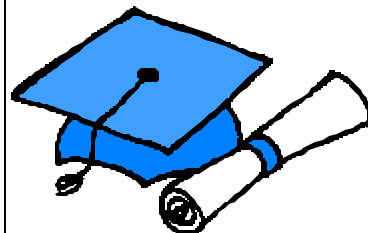

Port Orford Shines

Things came up great for the City of Port Orford last week. The Revenue Bond, which was strongly supported by the City, won by an 80 to 20 percent margin at Tuesday's Special District's election. The sewer outfall project is proceeding full speed ahead. On Friday the property sale between Camille Mouchawar, owner of Agate Beach RV Park, and Oregon State Parks was finalized and ownership of Agate Beach RV Park changed hands. The property is now an Oregon State Park. Port Orford Mayor Gary Doran made it official that the sale had gone through on Friday.

Oregon State Parks Manager Frank Eckley said that the people living at Agate Beach RV Park would be given time to relocate and assistance in moving. He said the first thing Parks would do is start working on a management plan for their Agate Beach property. Eckley said it would be a day use park and for the time being not have an entrance fee. Dave Wright, manager of the resource and planning division for Oregon State Parks, said on Monday that State Parks had paid \$1,415,000 for the property and that it had been a cash sale. Mr. Mouchawar

has kept 5 acres on the hilly south end of the property with state parks buying the other 35 acres. Wright said the park would be a day use park and they would keep the status quo for now. Wright said state parks would work with the seven tenants at the park and give them through summer to move.

Port Orford residents and visitors were treated to something very special on Saturday with the display of kites at Dock Beach during part of the Wild Rivers Coast WindFest. Words aren't adequate for this job – you had to see the large number and variety of colorful kites flying in the air to appreciate the scene. Some of the kites including one of a bear were very large and to top off the spectacle there was a triple arch of kites forming a rainbow at Dock Beach. The crowds at the Port Overlook were impressive as the view from there was awesome dude! Sweet!

There were lots of things going on last Saturday including a going away party for Leo and Mildred Welch at the Port Orford Senior Center. The Welch's are moving to Rancho Cucamonga next month to live with their daughter Patricia. Many people came by the Senior Center to say goodbye, take photos and in some cases say or sing something. Mary Yoder read a poem entitled "Fare-

well is not Goodbye". Mary then reminded people that there will be a potluck at the Center on Saturday, May 31 and hinted that she wouldn't mind if someone brought deviled eggs.

Leo and Mildred Welch have lived in Port Orford for 24 years and on July 4 of this year will have been married for 62 years. Before moving to Port Orford they both lived in Ontario, California for 52 years and attended Chaffee High School where they met. Leo did much of the work back in 1986-87 building the Senior Center along with lead man Lee Heyl and Henry Kron. The main Center building is made from five mobile units from the Coast Guard, which had been located at Houser. The Center paid \$5,000 for the units and then \$3,000 to move them to Port Orford. Leo told me he put in 5,000 hours working on the Center, which celebrated its Open House on January 30, 1988. In his "spare" time he refinished antique furniture.

Mildred Welch was Queen of the Port Orford Jubilee in 1987 and served as vice-president of the Center. Leo served in the Navy during World War II as an aviation machinist mate. He said on Saturday that both he and Mildred will miss these people and that they had made a lot of friends here.

**May Port Meeting

Commissioners Gifford Barnes, Ed Dowdy, Evan Kramer and George Welch as well as Port Manager Gary Anderson were present at the regular May meeting of the Port Of Port Orford Commission on May 20.

Kramer asked for an update on the Port's new tenant, Pac NorWest Charters. Anderson responded that the business would open on Thursday for the upcoming Memorial Day weekend.

Under new business, Anderson advised of proposed changes to Employee Health Insurance benefits which are necessary because of budget constraints in the coming fiscal year. Dowdy moved and Kramer seconded a motion to follow Anderson's recommendation. Gifford Barnes abstained due to a conflict of interest and the motion was passed unanimously by the other commissioners.

Anderson mentioned a need for Workers' Comp coverage for volunteers at the Port. This could be obtained at a rate of \$353 for 520 volunteer hours per year through Special Districts. Several questions were raised during the discussion that followed and Anderson said he would come back with more information at the next meeting.

The next item of business concerned charging camping fees for people who camp at the Port. During the discussion which followed, commissioners were unsure whether or not Ordinance 96.1, Section 3.8, which prohibited camping at the Port, had ever been rescinded. Consensus was that the final action had not been taken. Kramer stated that he felt the Port should not be in competition with local RV parks. Bill Oleson said the matter had been discussed for 20 years and agreed that the Port should not compete with local businesses. Dowdy moved and Kramer seconded a motion to rein-

state Ordinance 96.1, Section 3.8 if it had been rescinded and that appropriate signage 'No camping' and/or 'No Overnight Parking' be installed. Motion passed unanimously.

An agenda item that generated a lot of discussion concerned a proposed discount card to encourage sport launch activity. The object was to generate immediate increased cash flow and encourage more sport boat activity. Dowdy moved and Kramer seconded that the Port sell a punch card for \$150. After the card is filled with ten punches, the boater will be awarded one free lift. The motion passed unanimously.

Next commissioners considered a proposal from William Rebhahn to purchase some Port property. The commissioners concluded that they were not interested in the proposal.

Under Old Business Anderson informed commissioners that summer dredging with a clamshell dredge would begin the first week in June. More discussion followed regarding preparation of a proposal for the Port to do it's own dredging with equipment provided by the Army Corps of Engineers. No action was taken at this time as more study is needed.

Dowdy reported on Windfest plans, particularly the portion that will occur on Port Beach.

Anderson reported on a meeting with ISSCO regarding the outstanding bill and the problems with the hoist. After several suggestions such as having the Port's attorney write a letter, having Anderson write a letter and asking that Laskey-Clifton's attorney write a letter to ISSCO, it was finally decided that Anderson should contact Laskey-Clifton about the invoice and billing to see if they will help with the ISSCO problem.

The commissioners voted unanimously to accept the Principles of Operation of the Planning Committee and to reinstate

the Planning Committee with Dowdy as Chair.

After reviewing the Manager's Report and Financial Report, the commissioners adjourned into Executive Session.

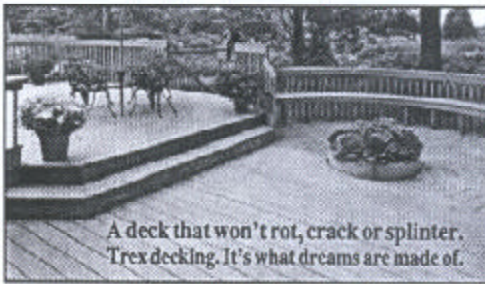

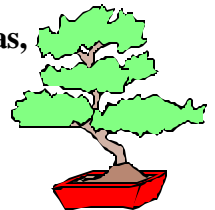

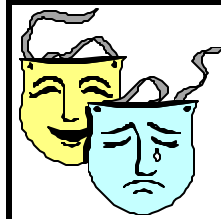

Do you have old batteries in a drawer? Old paints in the garage? Old weed killer that you will never use? Then get rid of your household hazardous wastes on Friday, June 6 at Buffington Park from 4:00 to 7:00pm.

Examples of household hazardous waste are old paints, old batteries, antifreeze, brake fluids, herbicides, kerosene, rust removers, solvents, turpentine, weed killers, wood preservatives and mercury thermometers.

Reasons why these things can't get thrown in the trash with everything else are household hazardous wastes have toxic elements. If they are incinerated, the toxins will be released into the atmosphere. If they sit in a landfill, the toxins could leach into groundwater. Once toxins are released into the environment, they are harmful to human health and

Residents of Curry County may dispose of a wide variety of their household hazardous waste items free of charge at a collection event scheduled from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at Curry Transfer & Recycling, 17498 Carpenterville Road, Brookings, Oregon.

Curry County & Curry Transfer & Recycling is holding the event in conjunction with the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality.

Common items to be collected include aerosol cans, antifreeze, engine cleaners, fluorescent tubes, herbicides, household batteries, mercury products, motor oil, paints, pesticides, solvents, thermometers, weed killers and wood preservatives. These items should be kept in their original containers if possible. Persons should **NOT** bring waste items such as explosives or products that contain radioactive waste, such as smoke detectors.

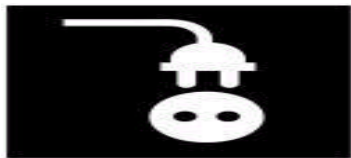

Tom Pitchford, M.D., and Carol Milne, FNP, providers with Curry Family Medical clinic in Port Orford, are reviewing options with the state and other agencies that will help restore pharmacy services to patients in northern Curry County, according to Ginny Hochberg, chief executive officer for the Curry Health District.

Prompted by the unexpected closing of Port Orford's only pharmacy, Wednesday, May 14, the closest pharmacies now are 30 miles to the north or south, in Bandon and Gold Beach.

Milne states that getting to the out-of-town pharmacies is difficult for nearly half of the clinic's patients who are "over 65, with 30 percent underinsured or uninsured, and with tenuous transportation."

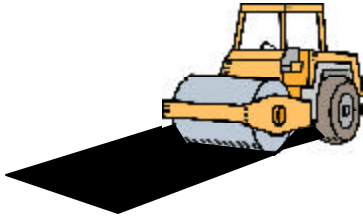

Biscuit Fire Aftermath Hike

Curry General Hospital invites you to investigate the aftermath of the Biscuit Fire in the Kalmiopsis Wilderness with Skye Sieber, U.S. Forest Service recreation planner, when its monthly *Sole Pursuits* program hooks up with historian Walt Schroeder and botanist Fred Bowen, Saturday, June 7.

Participants should meet at the Southwestern Oregon Community College parking lot in Brookings at 8:30 a.m. for orientation and carpooling. Organizers will distribute free walking cards for those who wish to track their walking time and enter free prize drawings. Those who hike the entire loop can expect to return about 5 p.m.

Unlike other guided hikes, this one requires more than an hour of driving to reach the trailhead. Once there, the group will amble along trails in the Siskiyou, identifying trees, flowers and shrubs — including the rare *Kalmiopsis leachiana*.

Power hikers who don't mind walking up steep terrain can opt to loop past Vulcan Lake and up the slope to the trailhead. Those preferring an easier trail can backtrack easily to their vehicles before the pace picks up. Organizers suggest that out-of-shape walkers bring a buddy to help them back to their cars, if needed.

Sole Pursuits is an incentive walking program organized monthly. Volunteer guides lead hikes along the shore, through woodlands and into the Siskiyou. Schroeder and Bowen guide hikers into the Kalmiopsis annually every spring. For more info, 1-800-445-8085, ext. 187.

Please Touch Sculpture

How many times have you been to an art gallery or museum and seen signs commanding people not to touch the artwork? If you're like me you want to touch the goods. The first thing that hit me when I walked into the Johnson Gallery on Saturday morning was the marble sculpture entitled "Mary of Light and Dignity with the sign in front of it saying "Please Touch Sculpture." The Johnson Gallery features the marble sculptures of Eric Johnson. He and his wife Sherry run the gallery, which is located on Eighth Street across from The Joan of Arc vacation rental and in back of the Savoy Theater. You know you're there when you see the large Madonna marble sculpture in the front yard. Eric Johnson uses white Colorado Yule marble and gray alabaster in his stone sculptures. The white marble comes from the appropriately named Marble, Colorado. This type of marble was used in the Lincoln Memorial and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. Johnson said this is the purest and whitest marble available. Some of the marble sculptures are translucent, letting light in. Eric Johnson emphasized that the sculpted pieces need to be touched and if they weren't touched they might die for lack of affection and love.

If marble looks heavy it's because it is. Eric has one piece in his yard weighing in at 3,200 pounds. He said marble weighs 178 pounds per cubic foot while granite weighs 202 pounds per cubic foot.

The Johnson's are very friendly and welcome people to visit their gallery. Eric said he doesn't mind having visitors while he works on the sculptures. The Gallery features other artists including paintings by Karen Auburn. The Gallery is planning on hosting a show in September of this year featuring Russian sculptor, Vladimir Tishin.

The Johnson's operated the Redstone Art Center in Redstone, Colorado from 1982 to 1996 when they moved to North Bend. They are a wonderful addition to the Port Orford arts community. Now go over and touch and feel the sculptures.
