

RAD Equals Fun By Evan Kramer



The RAD outdoor adventure club held a dinner fundraiser on Sunday at Driftwood Elementary School and the food was delicious and the company excellent. 64 tickets were sold for dinner making it a sellout.

I was curious exactly what RAD stood for now know and will share it with Port Orford. RAD stands for **Recreation plus Adventure equals Developing opportunities for youth**. RAD coordinator Cathy Boden spoke with me before the dinner got underway and said the program needs more funding and could use donations from the public. RAD has an account at Chetco Federal Credit Union where people can make donations. Boden talked about the recent RAD club trip to Crater Lake and said it wouldn't have been possible with Curry Public Transit. Prior to the Crater Lake trip the RAD club had to use an assortment of private vehicles to go on their trips but for this latest trip they rented the Curry Transit bus and took everyone in one vehicle at a very reasonable cost.

The dinner began with hors d'oeuvres including cut up vegetables, homemade

bread and John Shipp's delicious tofu pate of which I ate a large quantity. Dinner was served by the RAD club members at 6:45pm and consisted of manicotti, salad (one of the dressings offered was bazillion island), bread and choice of beverage. The meal was prepared by the 12 RAD club members with assistance from some of the parents as well as Cathy Boden and John Shipp. After dinner the RAD club members who had served the dinner and beverages sold desserts for \$1 each, featuring items such as chocolate chip cookies, coconut bread and cheesecake.

Once dinner was over and everyone including me was satisfyingly stuffed, the RAD club program began with Alyssa Rush reading what she had written about her RAD club adventures. She said it has been one of the best things to happen to her and that she had been on three RAD club trips. She talked about the RAD club trip to the Redwood forests in Northern California including a stay at the Redwood Youth Hostel and a 10-mile walk in the woods and one in downtown Arcata. The most recent RAD club trip was to the North Umpqua River and Crater Lake where the group learned about camping and hiked to within 20 feet of the one of the highest waterfalls in

Oregon. Alyssa encouraged other kids to join the club.

NCFCC board chair Larry Blount thanked the kids and Cathy Boden and John Shipp for the meal. He said he was proud of NCFCC and the RAD program. He thanked Tere Tronson for the job she is doing as NCFCC director. Blount gave credit to Cathy and John for being the right people for the program and said they had been involved since day one. Blount concluded by saying how much he appreciated the wonderful young people.

Strawberry Jam

When Curry General Hospital and the Child Advocacy Team stage their fundraising concert next week, ticket-holders should brace for a unique spectacle. Touted as Curry's first Strawberry Jam, the six-hour event promises a mix of "harmony, health and music" more familiar to audiences, say, in Los Angeles or New York, than in the remote seaside hamlet of Nesika Beach.

Are families from Curry County ready for spoken word art – the Hip Hop movement's rhythmic cadences akin to beat poetry? How about Breema, crystals and drumming? Producer Tony Kalhagen is betting that Curryites are not only ready. They're also willing. His eclectic revue of performers, artists, healers and food vendors will include a combination of West Coast urban friends as well as local philanthropic business owners – all donating their talents to the cause. Add to

that Kalhagen's own extraterrestrial music, school-age bubble-blowers and nimble-fingered hair-braiders, and you've got The Jam.

Kalhagen organizes complicated events with simple precision. A music producer by trade, he and his wife, Terri-Lynn, recently moved from Sacramento to the Gold Beach area. He wanted to live near the ocean as a way of reconnecting with his native Hawaiian roots. His business moniker, Makai Ohana Music, means ocean family.

Kalhagen is producing The Strawberry Jam gratis to raise money for the care and medical treatment of kids suspected of being physically and sexually abused in Curry County. But most days, at least lately, he sequesters himself in his Nesika Beach studio with singer-songwriters to produce their CDs. He also stays busy producing sound for commercials up and down the West Coast, and plans to get into creating music beds, a sort of back-

ground theme sound, for companies such as the Discovery Channel.

Playing music since he was old enough to hold a guitar, Kalhagen lived in Honolulu and Seattle before returning to Hawaii when his was 14. "That's when I met Terri-Lynn. We actually met in a club. I was 6-feet tall when I was 14, so I could pass as 21 and work in clubs," he says, laughing.

Kalhagen rocked through the 1980s together with Terri-Lynn and his high school musical group named Chastity. "Don't your remember hair bands? We were into spandex. I had pink hair out to here, and wore fishnet stockings. It was pretty comical," he says.

By the early 90s, Kalhagen had sampled Los Angeles for two months and then escaped to Northern California. "That's where I built my recording studio and

decided to get more into production," he says.

Since moving to Curry County, he enjoys focusing on the economic growth potential of the Southern Oregon Coast. Residents and visitors this year already have benefited from Kalhagen's talents. He organized a community New Year's Eve bash in Gold Beach, and produced the entertainment for the Wild Rivers Coast Seafood, Arts and Wine Festival in May.

Six years ago, in a turn toward health and spirituality, Kalhagen met and performed with New Age writers and artists including authors Gary Zukov, Marianne Williamson and Dan Millman, and Carlos Nakai, Native American flute player.

Still over 6 feet, sporting long hair, crisp Hawaiian shirts and tireless energy, Kalhagen envisions the forthcoming Strawberry Jam as a start. He imagines an annual healing arts festival in Curry County with two or three days of music and seminars, headlined perhaps by the authors and musicians he has met in his travels.

"People will come here as a destination," he says. "There's a lot of healing energy on the Oregon coast."

Curry's first Strawberry Jam is set from 6 p.m. to midnight, Saturday, June 14, in the Ophir Grange Hall, five miles north of Gold Beach, west of Highway 101 on the Nesika Beach loop. Tickets are available [\$10 for adults, \$5 for kids] from Mory's in Brookings, Soakers in Gold Beach and the Downtown Fun Zone in Port Orford, as well as at the door.


Examples of what is acceptable to be turned in on either Friday in Port Orford or Saturday in Brookings are as follows:


Please bring these items sealed. Leaking containers will not be accepted. Also not acceptable are large drums, infectious wastes or explosives.



Letter to the Editor,

Our Coos-Curry Electric Cooperative Board is still involved in trying to settle the tax issues in the sale of the satellite franchise to Pegasus for \$2.5 Million in cash and \$22.5 Million in stock certificates. Now they are planning to get into competition with Verizon. They are promoting that South Coast Satellite Cooperative, still owned by Coos-Curry Electric, put in an additional fiber optic cable from Bandon to Brookings.

On the surface it sounds terrific—faster data transmission, enough capacity to send X-rays and other medical information, faster Internet service, and more.

(But Verizon's is all ready in place.) Board discussions center around Bandon and Brookings. We don't hear about Langlois, Port Orford, Ophir, Gold Beach, or Pistol River. When asked, Board Chair Grant Combs refused to discuss what target population will be receiving services from this new fiber optic cable.

So what's going on? Expense and redundancy, risky outside ventures? Verizon already has a fiber optic line stretching from Bandon to Brookings. It's the 2-3 inch cable buried or on poles you see while driving along most of Highway 101. The Verizon cable only has one little bundle of fiber optics in it. That

little bundle will handle our needs for years. When there is more need, Verizon can put more bundles in that same cable. Why spend the money in competition when we haven't done well in outside ventures? Note also that the Coos-Curry Electric Board had to approve the 2003 budget to borrow \$7.5 Million dollars just to run the Co-op the 2003-04 fiscal year. That's in addition to the \$21 Million dollar debt/loans that we all ready have. Fiscal responsibility?

As owner/members, we can make changes. Start by voting in new Board Directors Chasar and Thomas.

Not one but three new art galleries have opened in the Port Orford in the past month including the Johnson Gallery, Boomer Dormody's Ga Ga Gallery, and the most recent addition the Art Gallery.

The Art Gallery features Finch's Custom Jewelry, Cape Blanco Art and The Ace of Gems within the store.

They are in the building, which has seen many uses the last incarnation being L & R Variety, and before that Western Auto. You won't recognize the inside of the building however, which has been painted outside and inside. It is located next door to the Paradise Café.

Some of the services and products Milton Finch offers in his Custom Jewelry shop are custom designed jewelry, jewelry repair, custom stone cutting, wax design and casting. He offers custom

rings for sale and silver and Navajo style jewelry. They also do stone faceting.

Milton Finch told me that he can repair anything including gold or silver and that nothing is sent out for repair. Finch has a complete lapidary shop in the premises and plans on holding classes for cutting and polishing stones soon.

Finch is a partner in this venture with Delmar Mathis and the Ace of Gems Russell Ucolano who has antique furniture for sale. Mathis did a lot of the work in rehabilitating the building including painting the interior, installing new carpeting, rebuilding the floor, and lots of cleaning.

The Art Gallery already features several local artists including many oil paintings by Patricia Finch. They have two original pencil drawings by Lance Cox and though they are not for sale prints of these exceptional drawings are for sale.

Residents of Curry County may dispose of a wide variety of their household hazardous waste items free of charge at a collection event scheduled from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at Curry Transfer & Recycling, 17498 Carpenterville Road, Brookings, Oregon.

Curry County & Curry Transfer & Recycling is holding the event in conjunction with the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality.

Common items to be collected include aerosol cans, antifreeze, engine cleaners, fluorescent tubes, herbicides, household batteries, mercury products, motor oil, paints, pesticides, solvents, thermometers, weed killers and wood preservatives. These items should be kept in their original containers if possible. Persons should **NOT** bring waste items such as explosives or products that contain radioactive waste, such as smoke detectors.

Fund Raising Strategy by Tobe Porter, Library Director

To build a library, we need lots of money. To raise lots of money, we need a fund raising strategy. I'm delighted to announce that the Port Orford Public Library Fund Raising Committee has developed a strategy that provides a way for everyone to help build our new library. There are often several fund raising activities going on at the same time. So, if you feel like we're always asking for money, you're right. This way we can provide an opportunity of giving that works best for you and your pocketbook.

As you know, in order to get the large grants, we need to show community support. So, the strategy starts with local fund raising activities such as Bargain Holiday, where people can purchase local goods; or be part of the Book Quilt, a lasting gift to hang in the new library; or buy a \$10 chance on an original piece of

Sheep art. (Stop by the library for a list of the sheep's whereabouts.)

Then we develop a major donor campaign in which ten individuals are asked to donate \$1,000 each. Once \$10,000 has been pledged, the community will be asked to match that amount (we're working on this now).

Next we go after even bigger money, primarily through two sources: corporate giving and grants.

In a corporate giving campaign, we identify major corporations that might have a presence (however vague) in our community and ask for a tax-exempt donation (if you have retired from a corporation, help us by asking them if they have a corporate giving program).

Most of the construction money will come from private foundations. We plan to start submitting grant proposals before the end of the summer. By that time we will have a preliminary design draw-

ing to send along with news of all the money we have raised locally (thank you very much). We will also put our hat in the ring for some of the State lottery money, but that is more likely to be given the closer we are to "good to go." And, as I've mentioned before, it could be that we will apply for a Federal Community Block grant as we get very close to total funding.

Our library is going to cost more than a million dollars. Every dollar counts, so please don't feel like you can't contribute if you don't have big money to give. We have one patron who gives a little bit every time he comes in, about twice a month. That kind of giving becomes the foundation of a new library.

Media Deregulation Vote

Representative Peter DeFazio reacted on Monday to the Federal Communication Commission's (FCC) 3-2 party line vote change the rules governing media ownership.

"Today's irresponsible FCC ruling will open the door to a world where a handful of powerful multinational companies will control what you read in your morning paper, listen to on your way to work, access on the Internet, and watch on television," DeFazio said. "The radio industry provides an eerie premonition of what's to come under total media deregulation – the suffocation and elim-

ination of independent voices. This nation was built on free and open debate of ideas and beliefs. Relaxing media concentration rules and allowing media mammoths to buy-out local radio stations, newspapers and television stations undermines public interest and the foundations of our democratic republic. I'll continue to fight the majority in Congress who are beholden to media moguls for whom this rule was written, and I'll work with my colleagues to overturn this action that hinders the free exchange of ideas, a cornerstone of our democracy."

DeFazio was one of only 16 members of Congress to vote against the 1996 Telecom Act that deregulated the communications industry. Proponents claimed that the bill would result in more choices, better quality and lower prices for consumers. The opposite has happened.

Today, these two companies own 1,451 radio stations and control everything from the play lists to local news reports of individual radio stations.


Greater consolidation in radio and other media outlet could further undermine everyone's access to independent, local media that provide them with the news and information important to their lives and communities.

Finding of No Significant Environmental Impact

The USDA Rural Utilities Service (RUS) has received an application for financial assistance from the City of Port Orford for its proposed Wastewater System Improvements Project. The improvements would address the City's need for an adequate and acceptable effluent treatment and disposal system. The City has entered into a Mutual Agreement and Order (MAO) with the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality that requires the City to bring its wastewater treatment and disposal facilities into compliance with their wastewater discharge permit. The proposed project would be completed in two phases as described in the USDA RUS *Notice of the Availability of an Environmental Assessment*. This public notice was published in the Port Orford News on April 23 and 30, 2003, as well as the local newsletter, Port Orford Today, on April 24 and May 1, 2003.

As required by the National Environmental Policy Act, RUS has assessed the potential environmental impacts of this proposed project and has determined that the proposal will not have a significant effect on the human environment. Therefore, RUS will not prepare an environmental impact statement for this proposed action.

This determination is based on analysis that indicates that the proposed project will have no significant impact to important land resources, cultural resources, biological resources, water quality, or other areas of environmental concern.




