The Port Orford Fourth of July parade featured over 50 entries and everyone was a winner. The parade committee hands out awards to all participants including First,

Second and Participant ribbons. There are also three Judge's Choice Grand awards. This year they went to the colorfully decorated Fishwives/Fishermen's association float, the Jensen Family Band, which was towed along the parade route on a flat bed truck and provided delightful musical entertainment during the parade; and the wonderfully kinetic Bicycle Ballerinas Defending the Bill of Rights. Participants may pick up their award ribbons at the Battle Rock park visitor center. A complete list of winners will be posted at the post office.

One of the participants in this year's parade was Roy Cheney driving his 1958 blue and white Nash Metropolitan. I've admiring these little sports cars, made in England under the Nash banner from 1954-1962, for years. Cheney gave me a ride in his Nash Metropolitan before the parade got underway and it was a real treat.

There was something for everybody in this year's July 4 Jubilee celebration. After the parade was over people had their choice of things to do. Some of us, like myself, walked over to Campbell Realty for their annual July 4 open house and a chance to win a color television set. But the real prize there was to try out some of Helen Smith's excellent pastries – I had three. The lucky winner of the television set was the "other" Pat Campbell, George Armstrong won the eagle, Donna Smith won the two dolls and Andy Wait the chair.

From there it was a short walk to the Grantland Mayfield Gallery and the Port Orford Public Library Sheep Show. The Library Foundation had gathered all the little sheep into one large flock for public display. Previously each one had been at a different business in town. For ten dollars a person could buy a ticket on the artistic creation they wanted to win. There was no limit to the amount of tickets you could buy. On Sunday afternoon at 3:00pm the raffle ticket winners were drawn and winners called. Nancy Anglesco, a member of the Port Orford Library Foundation told me on Monday that 450 people had visited the Grantland Mayfield Gallery to see the Sheep Show and the total amount raised in the drawing was \$2116.60. All the money goes to

the new library building fund. The idea for the sheep and a fundraiser based around them came from local artists Bill Gaetjens and Joyce Spicer Kinney.

At Battle Rock Park several food vendors were dishing out the chow from barbecued ribs to hot dogs while the Port Orford Fishermen's Association dinghy races took place below them in the surf. Other than the howling winds it was delightful.

Other happening places during July 4 were the Port Orford Community Building and Driftwood Elementary School. The Quilter's Corner sponsored a quilt show in the Community Building and had over 40 quilts on display. Gifford and Dottie Barnes spent a lot of time on Friday putting up the "scaffolding" to display the quilts on and their efforts paid off with the appreciation of those taking in the quilt show. Sharing the building with the quilt show was the Port Orford Arts Council's photo exhibit featuring photos taken on June 7, 2003 – a day in the life of Port Orford. Across the street from the Community Building things were anything but dull. The Sunset Garden Club put on an impressive flower show in the hallway at the school proving once again there are a lot of people with green thumbs in Port Orford.

Bill of Rights Resolution

The Port Orford Bill of Rights Defense Committee held a public meeting on the Bill of Rights on Wednesday night with Jann Carson as the guest speaker. Nearly 100 were in attendance for the meeting. Carson gave a history of the Bill of Rights. She spoke about the Patriot Act, which Congress passed 45 days after September 11, 2001. She said there were parts of the Patriot Act, which contained Sunset Clauses but that the Domestic Security Enhancement Act or "Patriot 2" would make them permanent. After finishing her talk she answered many questions. Carson said that 130 cities and three states have passed Resolutions regarding the Bill of Rights.

Member of the Bill of Rights Defense Committee Norm Leeling read a Resolution, which is being presented to the Port Orford City Council for consideration at their July 21 meeting. A subcommittee

of the Bill of Rights Committee wrote the Resolution. It reads as follows:

Resolution in which the City of Port Orford defends the Bill of Rights and the Civil Liberties of its Residents.

The purpose of this resolution is to protect the civil rights and liberties of all people as expressed in the United States and Oregon Constitutions and ORS 181.75 and ORS 181.850, and to ensure that local law enforcement continues to preserve and protect these fundamental liberties.

Whereas, all members of the city council, City of Port Orford, have sworn to defend the United States and Oregon Constitutions, and;

Whereas, the City of Port Orford has been and remains committed to the protection of the rights and liberties of its residents as guaranteed by the United

States and Oregon Constitutions and ORS 181.575 and ORS 181.850.

Be It Resolved That the city administrator is instructed to direct the chief of police and all city officials to continue to work to preserve freedom of speech, religion, assembly, and privacy, as well as; those other rights contained in the Bill of Rights of the United States Constitution and similar provisions of the Oregon State Constitution and to expend no city resources or funds for law enforcement activities not supported by the United States Constitution; Oregon Constitutional provisions, or Oregon Revised Statutes, which violate these freedoms. These "activities" include, but are not limited to; monitoring political and religious gatherings exercising free speech, obtaining library records, bookstore records or website activities, conducting covert investigations without prior court approval.

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**Conservation Easement

The Curry County Commissioners held a public meeting in Port Orford on Monday regarding the purchase of a conservation easement in the North Fork of Hubbard Creek watershed.

Commissioner Marilyn Schafer said the process had taken two years. She said the City of Port Orford had previously purchased the lower portion of the watershed. Schafer said Title III money was available for purchase of this conservation easement and that the county had been working with Sorenson Logging (owner of the 140 acres) on an agreement. The easement is being purchased for \$150,000 paid for by Title III federal funding.

Schafer said the county planned on turning over the conservation easement to the City and then added that Sorenson Logging will give the land to the City. Schafer read from a list of activities allowed under the easement and it reads: The only activities allowed shall be those directly related to restoration and maintenance of the watershed for the purpose of producing high quality, unpolluted,

uncontaminated, potable drinking water. Allowed activities include projects to establish a fully-functional forest ecosystem as the essence of watershed health; planting trees, thinning trees, and reducing brush competition with chain saw and hand tools.

The commissioners took testimony from the public on the easement purchase. Norm Leeling told them it was a no brainer and that the purchase portends a lot of good for the city watershed. He endorsed the conservation easement approach.

South Coast Watershed Coordinator Harry Hoogesteger thanked the commissioners and called what they were doing a "visionary approach." Hoogestader said the watershed group was prepared to help plant trees on the property. Frank Fiore, a resident of Salal Drive, noted that the street he lived on was an access to the property. He said there had been a lot of woodcutting on the property and traffic going by on Salal Drive. Fiore asked if Salal was the only access to the property.

Jerry Becker told the commissioners he was very much in favor of the conserva-

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tion easement. He thanked the commissioners particularly Marilyn Schafer. Becker said the access road from part of the city owned watershed (former Bussmann property) could provide an alternate access to the property.

Ann Vileisis, representing the Kalmiopsis Audubon Society commended the commissioners for making the easement process work. She said the group was interested in the monitoring process.

Harry Hoogesteger said the purpose of the conservation easement was to protect the water supply. The watershed councils have planted 150,000 trees in Curry County over the past eight years. Port Orford Mayor Gary Doran thanked the commissioners. He said the City had taken steps to control access of the lower portion of the watershed. He said he didn't want to see a lot of activity in there. Norm Leeling told the commissioners the 140-acre Sorenson property had already been planted with Douglas Fir and that some of them were already 6-7 feet tall. He said the areas that had been logged were thoroughly planted on 15-foot centers.

The Commissioners including Marilyn Schafer, Lucie La Bonte and Ralph Brown voted to approve the purchase of the conservation easement from Ken Sorenson Logging, Inc. Their presence in Port Orford was much appreciated.

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Hike Old-Growth Wonderland

Curry General Hospital invites walking enthusiasts to join Pam Tracy, RN, outdoor enthusiast and emergency room nurse, when its monthly *Sole Pursuits* program features a one-mile amble along the Schrader Old Growth Trail east of Gold Beach, Saturday, July 19.

Participants should meet at 11 a.m. at the entrance to Lobster Creek Campground, about 10 miles up the south bank of the Rogue River, also known as Jerry's Flat Road. From there, Tracy will lead a caravan up a winding road to the trailhead.

Suitable for walkers of all ages and outdoor experience, the scenic old-growth trail spotlights towering Douglas firs that germinated before Columbus discovered America. The path unfolds over gurgling streams and alongside of woodland flora including wild rhododendron, deer fern, salal, the inside out flower, Oregon oxalis and the red huckleberry. Forest service pamphlets provide a free botanical interpretation of specific plants.

Those parking at the trailhead must display a \$5 day pass or a \$30 annual pass (\$15 for drivers 65 and older). Alternatively, drivers can substitute a Golden Age Passport. Forestry passes are available from the Chetco or Gold Beach ranger district offices or the Rogue Outdoor Store in Gold Beach. Hikers can avoid purchasing a pass by riding with drivers who already have one.

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Hikers are encouraged to join Tracy and other guides for a picnic at Lobster Creek Campground on the Rogue River following the hike. Bring a sack lunch or plan to use the grills provided at the picnic grounds.

Organizers suggest that out-of-shape walkers bring a buddy to help them back to their cars, if needed.

Sole Pursuits is an incentive walking program organized by Curry General Hospital. Volunteer guides lead monthly hikes along the shore, through woodlands and in the Siskiyou.

Upcoming hikes include:

August 9; Azalea Middle School coach JoAnn VanDerschaaf leads hikers across the river at low water and up the forest service's Chetco River Gorge Trail.

Sept. 13; explore the Woodruff Estate, 16 miles east of Gold Beach, with historian Walt Schroeder.

October 4; tour the upper cliffs and banks along the Rogue River with guide Jim Coffee. Walk 12 miles from Foster Bar to Paradise Lodge for dinner, bed and breakfast. Jet-boat home. The \$110 registration fee helps raise money for the hospital's cardiac rehabilitation center.

November 1; Ed Gross, retired forest service scientist, leads a stroll along the Winchuck River Redwood Trail near the Oregon-California border.

December 13; join music producer Tony Kalhagen for the Nesika Beach Art Walk. The walk concludes with a bonfire and potluck.

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Grassland Reserve Program

USDA announced that the signup for the Grassland Reserve Program (GRP) began June 30, 2003. This is a new program contained in the 2002 Farm Bill. This program recognizes the value of grassland, rangeland, pastureland, shrub land and certain other lands and provides protection for those lands and assistance for rehabilitation. The goal is to conserve vulnerable grasslands from conversion to cropland and other uses and will target those areas that are most vulnerable to conversion, support grazing operations and maintain plant and animal biodiversity.

GRP offers producers several enrollment options: permanent easements, 30-year easements, rental agreements that are of 10, 15, 20 or 30 year duration, and restoration agreements. For permanent easements, USDA makes a payment based on the fair market value of the property less

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the grazing value. For 30 year easements, the participant receives 30 percent of what would be paid for a permanent easement. For rental agreements, USDA pays 75 per cent of the grazing value in annual payments for the length of the agreement. Restoration agreements compensate the participant for up to 90 per cent of restoration costs on land that has never been cultivated and 75 percent for land that once was cultivated.

Signups will be taken on a continual basis in all USDA Service Centers by Farm Service Agency and Natural Resource Conservation offices until September 30. Eligible applications are subject to a competitive ranking to determine which applications will be funded. Due to the limited amount of time left for the 2003 rankings and the limited amount of funds available, those that require restoration agreements will receive a lower ranking for FY 2003 funds. Applications submitted by August 1 will be considered for funding in the 2003 fiscal year. Those submitted after that date will be considered for funding in FY 2004.

Offers submitted for ranking must contain at least 40 contiguous acres and must be privately owned. Eligible land includes rangelands, improved pasturelands, shrub lands, riparian acres and wetland that are included with other eligible lands. Once the land has been selected for participation it may not be used for production of crops (other than

hay), fruit trees, vineyards or any other agricultural commodity that requires breaking the soil surface.

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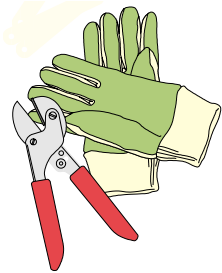

New Library Making Progress By Evan Kramer

The Port Orford Public Library fund raising effort has been very successful. The Library Foundation started on June 11 with \$10,000 that had been donated in \$1,000 amounts by 10 people. The goal of the fundraising effort is to raise \$10,000 in matching funds. I spoke with Librarian Tobe Porter on Tuesday morning and she said \$8,000 had already been received in matching funds as of July 8. At this rate the goal will be met well before the ten weeks is up. Once this fund raising effort is completed the next big library fundraising effort will be as part of Port Orford’s bargain Holiday the first Saturday in December as part of the Christmas Bazaar.

Tobe showed me another Library fundraising effort, this in the form of a quilt book. The way this works is a group of local and out of town quilters have volunteered to sew and donate the materials

for a book quilt for the new library. You can purchase your name on a book in the quilt for \$25. The quilt when completed will be hung in the new library forever. There are 130 “books” available on the quilt and of those 77 are already sold. (Now 78). Forms are available at the library for the quilt book.

Tobe Porter said the Library Foundation would be sending in grant applications including one to the Rose E. Tucker Foundation. She said that currently Oregon State lottery funds are not available for construction purposes (they were for the Langlois Library) and that the Ford Family Foundation is not accepting grants for the next 1-2 years. These are two unexpected and not positive developments. The Library Board and Foundation had been aiming for grants totaling \$400,000 from these two entities.

Porter said the library board and foundation board wanted to keep the public informed about how the money is raised

including the successes and failures. So far the Library Foundation has raised \$200,000 for the new library plus they have been given a large piece of land at Highway 101 and Fifteenth Street. Porter said the Foundation was now in a position to ask for outside money thanks to the community. The estimated cost of the new library is \$1,400,000.

Architect Rich Turi is working on a set of floor plans for the new library and has received a lot of input from the library staff. Porter expressed pleasure with the quality of the drawings and floor plan and yes it does look wonderful.

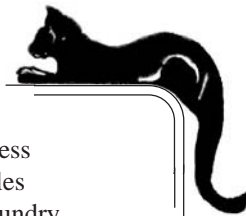

Busy Day for Firefighters

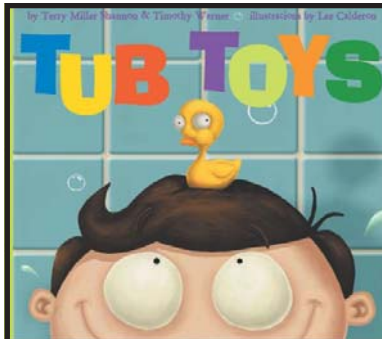
Three fires that started along the Central Oregon Pacific Railroad train tracks north of North Bend and a fourth fire near Bandon kept local firefighters hopping Wednesday afternoon.

The Coos Forest Protective Association, North Bend, North Bay and Hauser fire departments responded to the fires near the railroad tracks shortly after noon. The first fire started in the Simpson Park area near the North Bend bridge. It grew to about 40 acres before North Bend FD and CFPA firefighters gained control. The second fire occurred in the Jordan Cove area and was held to under two acres by North Bay RFD and CFPA. The

third blaze erupted near Boxcar and burned 1/4 acre. All three fires burned in beach grass and heavy brush. No structures were threatened and no injuries occurred during suppression activities. The cause of the fires is under investigation.

The fourth fire broke out shortly after 4:00 p.m. one mile south of Beach Loop Drive near Bandon. CFPA and Bandon Rural Fire Department knocked the flames down in less than 30 minutes and contained the fire to 1/8 acre of gorse. Cause of this fire is also under investigation.

The high fire activity is a strong indication of the dry conditions that the entire state is facing. It serves as a good reminder to outdoor enthusiasts and forest workers to take extra precautions when working or recreating outside. CFPA fire managers say that the minimal amount of rainfall received in May and June has primed the forests for a severe fire season. Fire managers say that they are currently experiencing August like conditions similar to last summer when the Biscuit Fire and other major fires throughout the state burned over one million acres.
