Utility Bills Draw Attention By Evan Kramer



The bi-monthly water and sewer bills were delivered to residents of Port Orford last week and they drew more attention than normal because of the higher amounts.

The water-sewer utility bills went up for two reasons. The base rate for the sewer portion of the bill went up by \$17.33. This is to pay for the Revenue Bonds recently passed by city voters to replace the sewer outfall and make improvements to the sewer treatment plant on Arizona Street. The other reason many bills went up is the meter reading was for the July-August period. This is the driest time of year, when people are watering their gardens and yards.

The water-sewer bill changed in the amount of detail it shows this month. The categories for water loan repayment fund, water construction fund, water equipment fund, bonded sewer debt fund, debt reserve fund and sewer equipment fund are all followed by an amount of 0.00. According to city clerk Patty Clark those categories will disappear completely in the bill for the September-October

period. All that will remain on your bill will be three categories. They are one for previous balance, one for water and one for sewer. The city still maintains the categories for the different funds but they are now to be found in the annual budget.

Wonder how to figure out how much you're paying for water and for sewer usage. The base rate for water is \$29.91 for each two-month billing period. This base rate includes the former water construction fund and water equipment reserve fund which amount to \$5.66 per billing period. On top of the \$29.91 base rate water consumers pay \$2.38 per thousand gallons of water used.

The base rate for sewer usage is \$36.60 per two-month billing period. In addition to this users pay \$3.91 per thousand gallons of water used. Sewer usage fees are based on water used. Each thousand gallons of water used costs the consumer \$6.29 between the water and sewage usage fees.

There is a partial solution to the cost of sewer usage fees in summer. Port Orford residents can purchase a water-metering device from the City for \$36.75 and either install it themselves or have someone install it for them. The \$36.75 represents the City's cost plus 10%. Fittings


to attach the water-metering device to an outside faucet can be purchased at McNair True Value Hardware or Coos-Curry Supply. The water-metering device is made of brass and is numbered. Three or four have been purchased by city residents and public works superintendent Dave Pace says he has more on order.

How will a water-metering device save money? The city water meters register all water going to a property. With a water-metering device in the yard the city crew would then read both the city meter and the resident's water-metering device. For example if your city water meter reads 10,000 gallons and the water-metering device reads 2,000 gallons the consumer would pay the base sewer rate of \$36.60 plus 8,000 gallons of water at \$3.91 for a cost of \$31.28. The consumer would also pay the base water rate of \$29.91 plus 10,000 gallons of water at \$2.38 per thousand gallons for an amount of \$23.80. The savings by having a water-metering device would be \$7.82. According to city clerk Patty Clark the billing periods of May-June and July-August see the highest amount of water usage. The water-metering device could pay for itself in one to three years for people who garden and want to have a green lawn.

Walt Schroeder to Lead Hike

Curry General Hospital invites walking enthusiasts to join Walt Schroeder, Curry County historian and trail enthusiast, when its monthly Sole Pursuits program features a two-mile walk through the Woodruff homestead east of Gold Beach, Saturday, Sept., 13.

Since the trailhead is off the beaten track, participants should meet at 9:30 a.m. in the parking lot east of the hospital emergency room. Carpoolers can follow Schroeder about 16 miles up the south bank of the Rogue River to the former Woodruff acreage. The hike is set from around 10 a.m. to noon.

Those wishing to carpool from Brookings can arrange to leave The Brookings Clinic parking lot at 9 a.m.

The Woodruff Homestead is "relatively easy," but with a couple of steep spots.

Hikers will loop through woods and meadows on property first homesteaded by T. Huntley about 1890. The homestead was 27 acres but the occupant often grazed cattle on the forest lands, according to Schroeder.

A cabin was built in a 24-by-35 foot dugout space using cedar posts, debarked Douglas-fir poles and 1-by-6-inch boards attached with square nails. Some house debris is still there. At one time the place included horse stalls, animal pens, garbage dump and fenced pasture. The homestead was abandoned about 1948.

Organizers suggest that out-of-shape walkers bring a buddy to help them back to their cars, if needed.

Sole Pursuits is an incentive walking program organized by Curry General Hospital. Volunteer guides lead monthly hikes along the shore, through woodlands and in the Siskiyou.

Upcoming hikes include:

October 4; tour the upper cliffs and banks along the Rogue River with guide Jim Coffee. Walk 12 miles from Foster Bar to Paradise Lodge for dinner, bed and breakfast. Jet-boat home. The \$110 registration fee helps raise money for the hospital's cardiac rehabilitation center. Few spaces remain open for this adventure.

November 1; Ed Gross, retired forest service scientist, leads a stroll along the Winchuck River Redwood Trail near the Oregon-California border.

December 13; join music producer Tony Kalhagen for the Nesika Beach Art Walk. The walk concludes with a bonfire and potluck.

Blanco Trap Club News

Residents of the Port Orford area can take their minds off the recent water/sewer bill by attending (free of charge) the annual Pacific International Trap Association trap competition at Cape Blanco's Trap Club September 12, 13 and 14. Our club facilities are located off Grassy Knob Road, first driveway to the left after leaving Highway 101.

Trap shooters from across the Pacific Northwest will be here competing along with those of us who live in Coos and Curry County. The Pacific International Trap Association (P.I.T.A.) is represented in Alaska, Hawaii, Montana, Idaho, Washington, Oregon, California, Nevada, and Arizona plus Western Canada. There are 14 trap clubs in Oregon associated with the P.I.T.A. Almost as many trap clubs in Oregon do not belong to P.I.T.A. However, many of their members do shoot the P.I.T.A. circuit. It requires considerable membership effort to sponsor and run a P.I.T.A. trap meet.

Visitors can expect to observe the 50 pair Doubles competition beginning at 5:00pm September 12. This activity

features two targets thrown at the same times at approximately 38 mph.

Saturday, September 13, starting at 8:30am features the beginning of the 16-yard Singles event. Only one target is thrown at a time at 46 to 47 mph. All targets are monitored with a speed gun similar to law enforcement speed checks. Visitors should provide themselves with adequate hearing protection. The Handicap event will start at the close of the Singles event. Shoot offs between ties are held after the Handicap. An exciting feature, Saturday evening, is the 60 target Draw Backer featuring teams of two trap shooters each competing under the lights against targets thrown from the 27-yard line.

Cape Blanco's trap club is fortunate to be supported by a number of local businesses including: Breuer Construction LLC, The Downtown Fun Zone, Brush Prairie Farms (George Bussman), the Sea Crest Motel, Port Orford News, Castaway Motel, BNT Promotional Products (North Bend).

Fire Danger Reduced

The continued rain showers in the area have allowed Coos Forest Protective Association to lower fire restrictions. CFPA announced this morning (September 9) that it will go to Industrial Fire Precaution Level (IFPL) 1 on all private, county, state and BLM lands in zones CS-2 and CS-5. Zones SK-1 and SK-2, private lands within the Siskiyou National Forest, will drop to IFPL 2.

The drop to IFPL 1 allows workers in wildland areas to operate throughout the

day as long as they have fire tools and an adequate water supply. A firewatch service of no less than one hour after the operation shuts down is also required.

Industrial Fire Precaution Levels regulate those working in forested areas with power driven machinery.

CFPA’s Regulated Use Closure, which restricts certain public activities in wildland areas, has been suspended in zones CS-1 and CS-4. The Regulated Use Closure remains in effect in all other areas.

Weather forecasts are calling for warmer weather towards the end of the week, which could tighten restrictions. Fire managers advise residents to continue to exercise caution when working or recreating in wildland areas and to follow all restrictions set by local authorities. Burning permits are still required and can be obtained by calling the nearest CFPA office in your area.

Utility Bills Draw Attention

The base rates for water and sewer do not include any usage. If you don't use any water during a two-month billing cycle you will still pay a base rate of \$66.51. This base rate applies to single-family houses and each unit in a duplex, triplex or apartment building. RV parks and business buildings are counted for one base rate. The amount of water used does not affect your base rate with low end and high end users paying the same.

Patty Clark gave me an information sheet put out by the Oregon Association of Water Utilities on water conservation. According to the publication "the biggest single cause of high water bills is a leaking toilet. It can waste hundreds of gallons water per day." The publication states that a leaking toilet can waste 200 gallons of water per day. The publication recommends several indoor water conservation techniques including turning off the water when shaving or brushing your teeth, taking a five minute shower (saves 21-26 gallons of water), installing a low flow shower head (saves 20 gallons water every five minutes) and most im-

portantly "repair leaks as soon as they occur.

Dave Pace said that he had checked the city reservoir on the North Fork of Hubbard Creek and that it was full. This was before Tuesday night's rainfall. He said the city had hired a company to do leak detection testing on the water system and that they would begin that work later this month.
