**Police Department
Workshop**

Police Department Workshop By Evan Kramer



The Port Orford City Council held a workshop session on Tuesday, August 3 regarding the police department. All councilors, the mayor and the city administrator were present as well as several members of the public.

City Administrator Ken Knight set forth the guidelines for the workshop. He called it an information gathering session to discuss the future of and expectations for the police department. He had prepared a questionnaire in advance for the city council with several things for them to consider in advance. Number one was the expectations for a two-person police department. Mayor Gary Doran asked what it would take to have 24-hour coverage in Port Orford and was told by Ken Knight it would take six officers plus the chief to provide 24-hour/7 day a week coverage. This takes into account vacations, sick leave, jury duty, etc. Councilor Jim Campbell asked police chief Bill Rush how many hours a week he puts in and Rush responded 50 hours a week. He said officer Scott Halse works 40 hours a week and if he works overtime then he gets comp time off later. Campbell asked

how many calls for service the department receives in a week and Rush told him 4-5 calls a day during the peak summer season. Councilor Ed Beck asked how much time is put in on traffic patrol and he was told 2-3 hours a day.

Rush told the council that the Department of Public Safety Standards has put in new rules regarding reserve officers. Reserves can not be put out on the street by themselves unless they have the equivalent hours of training of a regular officer. Rush said it takes 2-3 years to train a reserve officer. He did note that if the department found a retired officer willing to serve as a reserve they could go out on the street alone right away.

Mayor Doran said the original COPS grant, which got the department going again seven years ago had a focus on traffic. Rush said that traffic is a criminal offense in that a fine is involved and a jail sentence can be imposed. Rush said traffic was the number one priority when he joined the department.

Ken Knight said Port Orford was above the level of police service considered "industry" standards which are 1.25 police per 1,000 thousand population. We have two police for 1,200 people.

Chief Rush said you work by yourself here and that the department doesn't

often have the luxury of back-up help. Councilor Emily Francona asked about the police department response times and Rush told her in the daytime it was short and in the evenings long. He said a lot depends on whether the crime is happening at the time of the call (crime in progress) or has already happened. He said the department could respond within 20 minutes for a crime in progress (this if they were off duty) but would respond the next morning for a crime that had already occurred when it was called in. Ed Beck asked Rush about how many hours he spends on the road and he was told 60% of the time.


Ken Knight asked Rush if county dispatch was well trained enough to know when to call him and Rush said they were very good at it. Rush said he was available 24 hours a day for emergencies. Rush told councilor Carl Eskelson that when he went on vacation Scott Halse and the county sheriff's department worked the city.

Rush told the council the department enforces the juvenile curfew, which is 10:00pm in Port Orford but the State law is midnight.

Councilor Jerry Steinhorst asked Rush if the drug free zones are productive. Rush

said what the zones do is enhance the sentence for a drug crime. A drug crime committed within the drug free zone (within 1,000 feet of the school) would kick up the sentence.

Ken Knight talked about the new 20 mile per hour law in the school zone (all the time). He said some people in town thought it was a Port Orford law but it was enacted by the Oregon Legislature and covers the entire state.

Ken Knight reviewed how the police department is funded. Over half of the budget comes from the police levy (\$109,000) out of a total budget of \$203,000. \$70,000 comes from citations and the rest from the general fund and grants. Of that \$70,000 in potential citations nearly half is distributed to the state and county and other agencies. Bill Rush said the city makes more on citations

when the person is driving more than 10 miles above the speed limit. The higher the speed the more the city keeps.

Rush said that new state law mandates that "fix it" tickets for things like broken taillights that used to be dropped if the person proved they were fixed now have to also pay a fine. He told the council the contractor is making progress on the speed trailer.

Rush told the council that Scott Halse is not a certified police offer yet but he was getting real close. Ken Knight said people had asked him if the department needed a chief and Rush told him by state law the city has to have an administrator for the department.

Rush told the council the department has three reserves signed up right now. He said the department could use community help also and that the department needed to become proactive and not be a reactive department.


Rick Francona asked the council if the police levy was the normal way police departments are funded. Ken Knight told him the city could put on the ballot a permanent tax rate base for the police and then it wouldn't have to be voted on every four years.

The council entertained a request to hold a town hall meeting for the public and discuss the police department and the upcoming four-year police levy on the November ballot. They liked the idea and when it happens it will be well publicized.

Letter to the Editor,

As most local residents know, the Elk River fish hatchery is a cornerstone of the Port Orford economy. The salmon caught by commercial fishermen off the mouth provide a substantial portion of the revenue earned by this industry, while the sports fishermen keep the town alive during the stormy winter months. Although many of the salmon caught are raised by the Elk River Fish Hatchery, half to two-thirds are wild.

A high percentage of the wild salmon spawn in the North Fork of the Elk. The North Fork Elk fishery is considered by many fisheries biologists to be possibly the most productive salmon fishery in the Lower 48 States. This is due, in large part, to the fact that the extremely steep and unstable watershed of the North Fork is still virgin old-growth forest. Protection of this watershed, all of which is national forest land, is of utmost importance to the Port Orford community. For this reason the watershed of the North Fork Elk, as well as portions of the South Fork Elk and the Middle Fork Sixes (also a productive fishery) have been proposed for protection for wilderness.

The proposed Copper Salmon Wilderness Area has been unanimously endorsed by the Curry County Board of Commissioners. The City of Port Orford has endorsed the proposal, as have former Governor Kitzhaber, Secretary of State Bill Bradbury, Congressman Peter DeFazio, the Port Orford Chamber of Commerce, the American Fisheries Society, and a host of other organizations and local businesses. For the past several years the community has asked Senator Ron Wyden to introduce legislation creating the Copper Salmon Wilderness. His usual response is that he'll look into it. The last time he was in Port Orford he stated, to the great satisfaction of most people in the room, "We're going to get it done!" However, Senator Wyden has just introduced legislation to designate the Mt. Hood Wilderness but he refuses to add Copper Salmon to the bill unless Congressman DeFazio first introduces it in the House. Peter is in a very difficult race against a Republican challenger heavily financed by Roseburg Forest Products and the Republican Party. These folks have already been successful in stripping away the protection the proposed wilderness had under President Clinton's Roadless Area policy. The last

thing Congressman DeFazio needs to do right now is to give them additional ammunition by introducing wilderness legislation.

This strikes me as a mean-spirited thing for Senator Wyden to do to his fellow Democrat and to the community of Port Orford. He's quite safe introducing wilderness legislation in the huge liberal city of Portland, but down here in Curry County it takes guts to stand up for what's right. It's crucial to the local fisheries-dependent economy of Port Orford that we protect Elk River and Senator Wyden needs to go to bat for us. 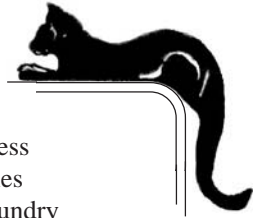

Letter to the Editor,

To those of you who expressed concern over our son Noah, who was assaulted on July 4th, his first \$3000 operation had little success and it looks like it will cost a minimum of \$12,000 more to restore some semblance of normal breathing and restore his prolonged disfigurement. Parents of juvenile assailants can only be sued for up to \$7500.

We thought we had experienced the bulk of trauma and mental distress from this incident, however, when I received the report done by the Port Orford Police (not from them) which took 18 days to complete instead of the normal 2-3. I found I was once again wrong.

My late dad, a lifelong NYPD officer, would have called it in New York slang: "a piece of garbage". It contains numerous provable factual errors, the least of which is that all of our names were spelled wrong. It includes graphic anti-homosexual statements attributed to my son by his assailant (who apparently is not "gay") undoubtedly designed to antagonize the Curry Co. D.A.—and vehemently denied by my son. Not surprisingly, the D.A. insists the case be prosecuted as a juvenile misdemeanor rather than the Measure 11 Assault II case it should be.

My son's bloodstains can still faintly be seen across from Battle Rock. The winter rains will wash it away—but not the stain from this town.

Excellent health care also includes taking an interest in our patients' worries and concerns that lead to stress and physical ailments.

One such concern that eats away at many of our aging friends, neighbors and loved ones in Curry County is financial need. The elderly in our communities don't talk about it much, but sometimes the cost of medications far exceeds one's retirement income.

When patients have to choose between lunch or pills, quality of life tends to take a dive along with one's health. What can we do about it? At least two programs are in place now to help patients get the medications they need at a price they can afford.

Currently, the Curry General Hospital Health Network trains volunteers who help patients, one-on-one, fill out applications for a new program that will significantly reduce the costs of their pharmacy prescriptions. Patients can call for appoint-

ments in Brookings — at the Chetco Medical Center; and in Gold Beach — at the Curry General Hospital Annex. It's free, and there is nothing to lose. As a physician, I can refer my eligible patients to this free service by making the appointment for them. Those who want to inquire on their own can phone 1-800-445-8085, ext. 160 or 541/247-3160.

The other program is the Medicare Prescription Drug Card. Next week, the hospital network will sponsor two free seminars for Medicare users who are totally baffled by the new rules. The first is set for 6 p.m., Thursday, Aug. 5, in the Rare Books Room at the Biscuit Building in Gold Beach. The seminar will be repeated at 11 a.m., Friday, Aug. 6, in the Chetco Community Public Library.

If you or someone you know could use help with his prescriptions, it would be worth checking out either of those free programs.

Rainwater to Stormwater

"Rainwater to Stormwater – Can we handle the flow?" a forum will take place at the Harbor Water/Fire Hall on Wednesday, September 1, beginning at 7:00pm. The forum is being co-sponsored by the Southwest Resource Conservation and Development and Rural Resources Alliance. Speakers will include: Grant Young

(County Public Services Director), Leo Lytle (City of Brookings water), Craig Harper (Rogue Valley Council of Governments rainwater specialist), Larry Anderson (Brookings City Councilor and Developer), and Dianne Snow (City of Brookings Planner). Other speakers may be included. Curry County Commissioner Lucie La Bonte will be moderating the discussion.

Each speaker will speak for about 10 minutes on what they are working on to handle water flows from rainwater with the increase in development. Craig Harper, rainwater specialist RVCOG, will give a short ten-minute power point presentation showing examples of what the homeowners can do to modify construction to address water and problems created if rainwater is not handled. The meeting will then be opened to the public for questions and discussion.

Both Curry County and the City of Brookings Planning Department are addressing the issue through ordinances and land use requirements. This meeting is open to the public and the public is encouraged to come and participate.

Mr. Bradbury said that Moore stole his title and changed the numbers without ever asking him for permission.

Ray Bradbury said that Moore is a horrible human being.

Why would a small coastal town want to show a film that is slanderous lies and has a stolen title? Stolen from an 84 year old gentleman who has authored over 500 published works.
