## **City Reaches Milestone**

The City of Port Orford reached a major milestone on Thursday, December 23. The city public works department did the last pumping of treated effluent water to the former leach field north of Agate Beach at

10:00am before switching to the ocean outfall. There were a few witnesses to this occasion including councilor Carl Eskelson.

The city started pumping treated effluent water to the ocean outfall at 2:00pm that day. The water travels from the sewer treatment plant past the ponds and then under California Street to Agate Beach Road where it turns right and follows a fairly straight course out to the ocean.

The project engineer for the sewer treatment plant upgrades and ocean outfall is Steve Donovan from SHN Engineering in Coos Bay. On Thursday afternoon Donovan drove down to Port Orford on his own time (not billing the city) to give a group of us a tour of the sewer plant and explain the \$1 million plus upgrades to the plant. No one from the city council showed up but both newspapers were represented with Willowsong Hall re-

porting for the Port Orford News. Hall understood the process as much as Donovan did because of her degree in biology.

Donovan started the sewer treatment plant tour with where it all begins once the wastewater reaches the sewer treatment plant, which is located west of Arizona Street and between Twelfth Street and Agate Beach Road. He explained the preliminary treatment of the wastewater. Plastics and other solids are forced through an industrial sized grinder before going into the large cement tank for aeration and treatment with bacteria. Donovan called it a "living environment" and the whole process was likened to brewing beer. The results are called "mixed liquor". The solids and grease are settled out and then the whole mixture is piped into the clarifier where the sludge (solids) is separated from the water. The sewer treatment plant will have two clarifiers to further provide redundancy for the system. One of the clarifiers is part of the sewer treatment plant upgrade and is almost completed.

The sludge is taken to the storage pond, which is the one of the three ponds nearest to the sewer treatment plant. When the sludge pond reaches capacity the material will be dredged out of it and taken to a land application site, which is a nearby ranch. The sludge pond has 15-

20 years worth of material stored in it and has about 50% more capacity before it will need to be dredged. The other two ponds, which attract a lively share of ducks, date back to before 1967 and were put in place in case there is a breakdown of the sewer treatment plant.

Wastewater gets to the sewer treatment plant with the aid of nine pump stations located around the city. The wastewater from seven of the pump stations is then directed to the two main pump stations, one Idaho Street and the other on Wyoming and from there the wastewater is pumped to the sewer treatment plant.

One of the requirements that the Department of Environmental Quality made to the city to allow an ocean outfall was that they stop using chlorine to disinfect the treated wastewater. Now all treated waste-

water leaving the clarifier then is piped through a tank, which uses UV light filters to disinfect the water. Wastewater treatment plant lead operator Rick Rogerson showed us the UV lights, which you don't want to stare at for very long. Once the treated wastewater passes through the UV tanks it becomes disinfected and then makes its way via the various pipes to the ocean off Agate Beach. Donovan said it is a two-day process for wastewater from the home to the ocean.

Donovan spoke about some of the problems that can go wrong with the sewer treatment plant and the worst one would be for someone to flush a methamphetamine lab down the drain. He said this would prove toxic to the bacteria which breaks down the materials. He said grease can also clog the system but noted that all

restaurants in the City now have grease traps, which has proven beneficial.

The sewer treatment plant processes on average 112,000 gallons of wastewater a day. The plant has been upgraded to handle a peak flow of 1,000,000 gallons of wastewater a day, which could be reached by the year 2023. (approx. 14% growth per year)

Donovan said he expected final completion of the sewer treatment upgrade project by the end of January. He said another goal for the city was to close out the U.S. Department of Agriculture loan by the end of February. He talked about the city replacing the Pinehurst pumping station.

Donovan called the ocean outfall "benign" to the environment. The treated water is disbursed into the ocean through a six port diffuser unit located well above the ocean floor. The diffuser is bolted to

the rocks and anchored in place with hundreds of bags of cement.

The sewer treatment plant will be upgraded for the next 20 years when construction is complete at the end of January. The current sewer treatment plant was built in 1994 but according to Donovan technology has changed a lot and many things, which are state of the art now were not available then. The city had to do some upgrades to get DEQ to approve an ocean outfall.

Donovan said on Monday that the city had issued a letter to the DEQ on December 23 requesting satisfaction of the MAO (Mutual Agreement and Order). The letter requests the DEQ acknowledge the city has now complied with the terms of the MAO. DEQ has 60 days to respond to the letter and lift the MAO. When this milestone is accomplished the moratorium on sewer and water hookups will be over.

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**December Port Meeting

Commissioners Gifford Barnes, Dave Knapp, Evan Kramer and George Welch, as well as Port Manager Gary Anderson were present at the December 21 regular meeting of the Port Commission. Commissioner Ed Dowdy was absent.

As there was no public comment, the commission proceeded directly to approval of minutes and then on to the first item of Old Business, which was the Oregon Bait Company lease.

Roger Fry presented a petition to the commissioners requesting that the Port actively seek to get a full time fish buyer for the third product hoist. The petition was signed by people representing about 20 of the boats on the dock. Anderson and the commissioners acknowledged the importance of having another buyer, especially during crab season when some of the boats are put on limits by the current buyers. The main question seems to be whether or not there is enough product coming in at other times during the year to support another buyer.

Anderson advised he has a list of all buyers and would be willing to work

with a committee to see if any of them are interested in locating in Port Orford. If any are interested, the next step would be to meet with the owners of Oregon Bait Company and see what can be worked out with regard to the third hoist.

A committee was formed including representatives of the Fishermen's Marketing Association, commercial fishermen, port commission and the port manager. They will report back at the January meeting about any progress they have made toward bringing in another buyer.

In the second item of Old Business, commissioners approved Resolution 2004-3 creating the necessary appropriation in the budget for fiscal year 2004-2005 to use the \$25,000 grant from Curry County Rural Investment Board in payment for Ice Production Equipment

The final item of Old Business was a discussion of recent correspondence concerning dredging appropriations and opportunities.

Under the first item of New Business, Anderson provided a list of options to consider in raising the dockage price. While no one wants to see a price increase, the Port has to bring in an addi-

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tional \$20,000 per year to be able to make loan payments to the state and to pay for insurance. David Knapp moved and George Welch seconded a motion to raise the rate to \$200 per month beginning in January, 2005. Knapp, Kramer and Welch voted "yes" and Barnes voted "no". Current price is \$170 per month.

Commissioners voted to send Anderson to an Oregon State Marine Board (OSMB) Boating Facility Grant Workshop on February 1 and 2.

The third item of New Business was an inspection by Special Districts Association of Oregon (SDAO) and the recommendations that were made as a result of the inspection.

The Manager's Report covered problems with the Electrical Building. Although some problems were resolved by recent modifications, moisture is still getting into the building through the cement block structure and a sealant will need to be applied during dry weather.

After a review of the Financial Report, the commission adjourned into an Executive Session.

**Shark in the Harbor**

Port of Port Orford manager Gary Anderson reported that a Great White Shark had attacked and eaten a harbor seal on Sunday afternoon adjacent to the floating dock area at the Port. The attack was witnessed by one of the fishermen.

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**Paradise Point Left Turn**


Lee Sparks, Assistant District Manager District 7 for the Oregon Department of Transportation reminded us last week that the Highway 101 left turn lane at Paradise Point Road is still in the works. ODOT failed to get the left turn lane constructed last summer because the bids for the project came in too high. ODOT planners went back to the drawing board and reduced the scope of the project including reuse of material already at the site. The project is now with the Department of Justice, which by law has to review all bid contracts over \$100,000.

Sparks says ODOT will put the left turn lane project out to bid again in spring and wants it completed before June 30, 2005.

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
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## **Coos-Curry Budget Approved**

The Board of Directors of Coos-Curry Electric Cooperative (CCEC) approved the cooperative's 2005 budget on Dec. 22. According to Chairman Terry Hanscam, "This budget is yet another signal that we have turned the corner." CCEC in June of 2004 undertook a three-pronged strategy to ward off the application of increased interest expense by the cooperative's lender the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corporation (CFC). Concern by CFC had been the direct result of Board efforts to reduce the negative economic impact of higher electric rates upon the South Coast;

electric rates had been kept artificially low, operating the cooperative utility at a loss for the most recent three years.

In response CCEC furloughed 10% of the then existing workforce (7 positions) sharply reduced/deferred other expenses and raised electric rates and other fees. "This strategy was successful in that we are making the ratios and performance requirements set by our lender. We will not incur the associated penalties," said Werner Buehler, General Manager/CEO. Buehler was quick to point out that meeting the lender's requirements was a hardship that was shared not only by the six furloughed employees whose positions

are not in the 2005 budget, but by the members who paid higher rates and the remaining employees of the utility who picked up the additional loads.

The 2005 budget is \$26,580,083 and represents a 12% increase over the proposed 2004 budget. Hanscam pointed out this budget not only includes increases in wholesale power costs, but also catching up on those construction projects and tree trimming deferred in 2004.

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## Garrison Lake Report

The following is part of Commissioner Lucie La Bonte's report from the Association of Oregon Conference.

We had a meeting on Garrison Lake on November 23 with all of the affected agencies and staff from State Parks from all of the departments that we will need expertise from for the permanent solution. The last time we got together we recognized that the in-land solution was the preferred alternative. The on beach solution has been aiding in erosion of some very important cultural resources. Footings and floors from old buildings in the old village site as well as bones from mammals have been discovered there. There was a push from a few agency people and a local to proceed with deepening the channel on the beach.

State Parks stepped in and is maintaining a ditch with a dune constructed from local sand coming out of the ditch but it is now being viewed as a "short term solution". State Parks will contract out to do engineering and design for two more solution scenarios. One is an open ditch through the old RV Park area. The concern is that it would have to be 160 feet wide for proper sloping due to depth. The preferred solution is a covered culvert approximately 300 feet long through the same area. The overflow from the lake would then flow into established wetlands and a small lake and drain into the old creek bed into the ocean. The culvert would allow fish passage of native cutthroat, pedestrian access through a traditional access area and the least destruction of cultural resources. The draft designs are to be completed by June 2005 with a completion date of Decem-

ber 2005. The County has said we will participate in looking for funding and the commissioners have put it at the top of the Needs and Issues list.

The Corps of Engineers had a representative there to discuss any permitting pitfalls. Everyone is now on board. The one problem that is occurring is illegal ATV use in the area. Motorized vehicles only are allowed. State Parks is working on a solution for disabled and seniors to be able to be permitted for ATV use as well as how to accommodate recreational users. The problem seems to be folks doing wheelies in the dunes. We are asking people to stay out of the sensitive areas. It is illegal at this time and destruction of cultural resources is a serious offense people need to be made aware of. State Parks would like any feedback as of how to remedy the situation. They are working on a public education piece.

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
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### Response to Mayor By Evan Kramer

Port Orford's outgoing mayor Gary Doran had two letters in last week's paper.

In one, he criticized people who have been writing letters about the police chief situation. He said, "there is much more to being a good chief than being a local and nice guy." The mayor doesn't mention whom he is talking about but it is Mark Creighton, one of the two people interviewed for the interim police chief position. Mark Creighton has basic, intermediate and advanced certifications for police officer. These certifications are

current, unlike the amiable candidate the city council personnel subcommittee (Jim Auburn, Emily Francona, Carl Eskelson with Gary Doran sitting in) recommended be hired for the position. Creighton has 23 plus years of law enforcement experience, the majority of which was served with the Curry County Sheriff Department. He served as both a road deputy and detective with that department. Creighton also has 1,875.5 hours of law enforcement classes he took and passed during his career. Creighton is more than a local and nice guy, and yes Mayor he does know our area and the people well.

In Mayor Doran's second letter he graciously thanks the city staff for the article they wrote about him for the previous week's paper. Then he goes on to talk about the public making "harsh, wrong, misinformed, unaware of the facts comments" during the Dec. 6 council meeting. This remark was made as weak justification for city administrator Ken Knight losing his temper at the meeting. I attended the meeting and thought the public was well spoken and in my article included many of their comments. If the Port Orford city council and especially the city administrator can't take the heat from the public then they ought to get out of the kitchen.

Mayor Doran has done an outstanding job for the past eight years in my opinion. Most of what he has done is behind the scenes in the many meetings he attended representing the city, and time he spent at city hall. I'm disappointed he needed to take his parting shots at Mark Creighton and the public before bowing out as Mayor of Port Orford.
