Citizens Concerns

I received an e-mail from Port Orford Mayor Jim Auburn on Wednesday, January 26, the day Port Orford Today was distributed last week. Auburn says, "I noticed that your reporting

on my statement regarding citizen concerns in future council meetings was incomplete in your January 27 paper and would like to make things clear for the record. You reported: Mayor Jim Auburn announced that citizen's concerns would be at the end of the meeting in February.

What I actually said is reflected in the minutes of our January 18 meeting that are available on-line on the city's www.portorford.org website.

...beginning next month Citizen Concerns that relate to business on the Agenda will be heard at the beginning, but citizen concerns that are unrelated to the Agenda will be moved to the end before Staff, Council and Mayor Considerations.

Mayor Auburn explained, again, that his intentions were to allow anyone to speak at the beginning of the meeting on anything that was on the current agenda, but if they wished to speak on a subject not

on the agenda they must wait until the end under citizen concerns.

A citizen asked how one does get on the agenda. The city recorder informed her that one can send a letter to the Mayor or bring it into the office no later than the Tuesday before the meeting dates, which is generally the third Monday of the month; i.e., almost a week before the regular meeting.

In summary, there are three ways citizens can express themselves at council meetings. 1) They can send a letter the week before the meeting requesting to be put on the agenda. 2) They can sign up at the meeting to speak on a subject on the current agenda at the beginning of the meeting under Citizen Concerns. 3) They can bring up a new subject at the end of the meeting under Citizen Considerations before and along with Staff, Council, and Mayor Considerations.

Point well taken Mayor but now it's my turn. I have been attending city council meetings since Mary Yoder was Mayor in the early 90's and have followed the council regularly during the term of Mayor Delaine Kennedy and the eight years of Mayor Gary Doran. Citizen Concerns have always been at the front of the agenda. I assume this has been so people who had something to say didn't have to wait until the end of the meeting.

In my article about the January 18 city council meeting I wrote that the Mayor was moving Citizens Concerns to the end of the meeting and also included City Recorder Beverly Manes' comments to Mary Loan about how to get on the agenda. I didn't mention that people with citizens concerns related to the agenda would speak at the beginning of the meeting. For the past twelve years people have been allowed to speak on agenda items (before the council makes a motion) as they come up on the agenda. But the Citizen Concerns, which has been moved to the end of the meeting, is a valuable part of the agenda and one that gets a lot of people participating. It is the free form and I think important part of the meeting where residents of Port Orford can express their concerns on a variety of subjects from increasing water and sewer rates, the police chief situation, and the difference between general obligation and revenue bonds. The new city council rules, which have not been voted on yet, show a change placing the Citizens Concerns toward the end of the meeting after departmental reports, council liaison reports, old and new business and the consent calendar. They were presented to the council at the first meeting of this year when they took their oath of office.

I'm opposed to moving Citizens Concerns to the end of the meeting and have spoken to a few councilors about it. I thought they had to vote on the changes to the council rules before it was a done deal.

Other public bodies like the Port of Port Orford Commission and the Port Orford/Langlois 2CJ School Board let the public speak at the beginning of the meeting on any subject. On the other hand the Coos-Curry Electric Cooperate Board meetings place citizen concerns at the end of the meeting. One of their meetings I attended and wanted to speak at the Board broke for lunch at noon and to speak would have meant to come back after lunch and spend three or four hours to make a point. No thanks.

Please check out the city recorder's draft minutes on the City website. You'll find

a 16 page document that runs a total of 7,850 words and is a comprehensive account of the council meeting done by listening to the tape, short hand notes and transcribing what was said. The City Recorder's minutes can be accessed by typing in www.portorford.org. Then click on the government link in the left hand top corner. The next page up shows our Mayor and under him is a link to the minutes. Click on 2004 regular sessions and you'll find the January 18, 2005 minutes. These are draft minutes until the council approves them on the consent calendar at the February meeting.

My articles on the council meetings are not the minutes and are not complete. I do the best I can to focus on what I think are the important issues so the citizens of Port Orford and the surrounding areas can get some idea of how their city is running.

Arctic Refuge Defenders

On January 25 at the Port Orford Community Building the Kalmiopsis Audubon Society hosted award-winning photojournalist Amy Gulick and Gwich'in tribal leader Sarah James, who shared images and stories of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge. A crowd of over 50 people attended.

Gulick began by showing images of the Arctic coastal plain, the heart of the refuge, where the 129,000-member Porcupine River caribou herd comes each year to give birth. The early greening vegetation offers much nutrition for exhausted mothers and young calves, and its winds offer relief from Alaska-sized mosquitoes, which are so plentiful they can kill new-borne calves. Making one of the last great migrations on earth, the Porcupine herd travels hundreds of miles each year from Canada to the coastal plain in the Arctic Refuge.

Sarah James explained that the Gwich'in nation was one of the last tribes in North America contacted by white people. Still largely a traditional people, the Gwich'in hunt and fish for their subsistence. About 75 percent of their diet comes from the caribou they hunt during the yearly migration. For this reason the tribe is extremely concerned about what will happen if the coastal plain is developed for oil. James explained that the Gwich'in call the area "the sacred place where life begins" because it is the place where the

caribou that nourish her people are born. James appealed to all women and mothers to help protect this sacred birthing place.

The center of the controversy, the Arctic Refuge is currently threatened by proposals to drill for oil. According to Gulick and James, such development would devastate the caribou and other wildlife and destroy the Gwich'in way of life, but by the most optimistic estimates, would provide only a 6-month oil supply. Americans could save this amount of oil simply by maintaining proper air-pressure in the tires of their cars and trucks.

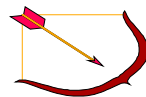
Curry County Fair, and help maintain its uniqueness for generations to come.

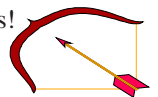

School Zone Speed Law

The Oregon House of Representatives is now considering a bill which would rescind the law which made the speed limit for driving in certain school zones 20 mile per hour twenty four hours a day, seven days a week. The law effects school zones where the speed limit is 30 miles per hour or less like the Driftwood School Zone and the one in front of Bunker Hill Elementary School in Coos Bay. School zones where the normal speed limit is 35 miles per hour or more were not affected. The law as currently written can be found under ORS 811.111.
