School Superintendent Leaving By Evan Kramer



Port Orford-Langlois 2CJ School District Superintendent Marv Ott is leaving the district at the end of June. Ott has been working on a oneyear contract with the school district, which expires on June 30 of

this year and he has chosen not to renegotiate the contract. Ott has taken a job as superintendent of the Banks School District, seven miles north of Forest Grove in Oregon. Ott said his leaving the 2CJ District was not at the school board's request and that he had high recommendations from them.

The Banks School District has 1,400 students and an elementary, middle and senior high school, each with their own principal. Ott's job with the Port Orford-Langlois District includes being superintendent and principal of all three schools.

Ott spoke about wanting to be closer to his large family last Friday. He has five children and nine grandchildren in the Corvallis to Portland area and wants to be closer to them and his parents.

Ott spoke about turning some things around in our District during his nine months as superintendent. He said student attitudes have gotten much better and that there were higher expectations of the students in the three schools. He said the staff is coming together as a team

Ott talked about the money to run the district getting shorter, a problem the next superintendent will inherit.

Marv Ott distinguished himself in many areas but one in particular was his participation in student activities. He attended nearly all the home games for the sports teams, as well as the dances and concerts, and cooked breakfast with some help for the entire student body of Pacific High School last December. He called them a great bunch of kids and said he enjoyed going to all their events. Ott said he really enjoyed his time here and the support he received from the community. He mentioned the community support that came together in painting Driftwood Elementary School last year.


Ott said the Port Orford-Langlois school board could use a list provided by the Oregon School Board Association if they want to hire a temporary superintendent while they are conducting a search for a permanent one.

Lottery Dollars Benefit Salmon

The Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board (OWEB) awarded a grant of \$212,000 to the Elk River Land Trust for purchase of land in March of this year. The grant was used by the Land Trust to pay off 75% of the loan for the purchase of a 163-acre parcel of land on the north side of Elk River. The land was purchased from the Coos Head Lumber Company and is at Milepost 6. The property connects a Forest Service roadless area to the Elk River. The property will be held as a conservation easement in perpetuity by OWEB. The property was sold to the Land Trust for \$261,000 plus about \$5,000 in bank fees. The property was purchased last April with loans from the Norcross Wildlife Foundation and Shorebank Enterprise Pacific who hold title to the property.

Jerry Becker, president of the Board of the Elk River Land Trust and executive director of the organization said they are working on getting the remaining \$58,000 from other sources to pay off the loan. They have received donations of up to \$1,000 from local people. There are 60 dues paying members of the Land Trust. They are looking for other grants to pay the loan off or a "conservation hero" to

pay it off. Becker has put in \$30,000 worth of time on this project, which is a labor of love for him. The Elk River Land Trust goals for this 163-acre property are to protect the water quality of the Elk River, protect the salmon habitat, restore marbled murrelet nesting habitat, protect the eight acres of floodplain that abuts the property and the one half mile of river riparian zone on its border. Becker called this conservation easement "one of the best conservation projects in Oregon."

The 1999 Oregon State Legislature created OWEB "to promote the restoration and enhancement of Oregon's watersheds". Oregon voters approved Ballot Measure 66 in November of 1998, which provided dedicated lottery funds to support watershed enhancement, and in the 1999-2001 biennium awarded over \$32 million for various projects.

The way Ballot Measure 66 was written seven and a half percent of the lottery money goes to OWEB for watershed enhancement projects and restoration and another seven and a half percent goes to Oregon State Parks. OWEB Deputy Director Ken Bierly said the two agencies each will get approximately \$50 million for the 2005-2007 biennium or \$25 million a year. OWEB's emphasis has been on stream enhancement projects focusing on coastal drainages that affect salmon runs.

LWV Candidates Debate

The Curry County League of Women Voters (LWV) presented a Candidates Forum on Monday, April 11 at City Hall in Port Orford. The event featured contested seats on the Educational Service District (ESD) and the Port of Port Orford. The attendance was little more than a dozen citizens, many of them elected officials. Georgia Knowlin was the moderator with help from Milt and Shirley Nelson and Ann Younger.

Only five of nine candidates for the Port Commission showed up. The candidates present were John Mobley, Michael Bulaich, and Scott Luhr, all vying for Position #1, and Robert Mielenz and Paul Hewitt vying for Position #3. None of the four candidates for Position #2, Chane Fullmer, Ron Sperling, Jeff MacFarlane and David Rickel were present. In summary, here is an overview of the Port candidates:

Port Position #2

 Robert Mielenz has experience as a former board member of the Vellejo Yacht Club, which had a 1.6 million dollar budget and had to deal with dredging issues. Mielenz said he would like to see the Port District boundaries expanded, would like to see the Port a "destination" and said that "on the surface," he was in favor of an RV park at the Port.

• Paul Hewitt has many years of experience in construction and is currently working with a number of Fishermen at the Port. Hewitt has attended dozens of Port meetings and familiar with the issues and while he would make the Port more visitor friendly and have the Port sponsor more events. Hewitt wants to see the public fishing pier that was promised. He said he was not in favor of an RV park at the Port.

Port Position #3

- John Mobley has just recently become interested in the Port. Mobley said he sees a lot of work to be done. He did not have a definite position on the RV park.
- Michael Bulaich said he likes to fish and is very concerned about the Port.
 Bulaich said he would like to fix up the old cannery building and "draw the public" to it. He said he was not in favor of an RV park at the port.

• Scott Luhr said he has 30 years of business experience and has been an employer of three people. He says the first priority is making the Port solvent. He said he was in favor of an RV park at the Port.

All of the candidates expressed familiarity with the current Port strategic business plan. It must be noted that all the candidates expressed concern for the fiscal condition of the Port but were hesitant about how they would go about making the Port self sufficient without first looking at all the inside paperwork.

ESD Candidate

Jacqueline Cook was the lone ESD candidate. Crook said she was against Senate Bill 765 that would allow the Department of Education to merge School Districts Crook said she was against a possible merger with Roseburg ESD. She said that she has seen two mergers in her career and neither one saved any money. She said she did not want to see all education centralized in Salem.

Fellow citizens, I wish to announce my candidacy for the position of Port Commissioner for the Port of Port Orford, (Position #2). My relationship with the Port has been a casual one, mostly as a third party observer. In addition I am in favor of continuing the effort to try and attract a research institution to the Port. Research Institute (MBARI) and the Long Marine Lab associated with UCSC. I was able to see first hand the enrichment and opportunities such institutes can bring to a community. I believe Port Orford would benefit greatly from this endeavor.

Lastly, I am interested in reviewing the areas available for public access on the dock, and how they may be increased. Again, I would only look to ways that would not decrease the effectiveness of commercial activities.

Welcome Home Pete Legg

Port Orford resident Pete Legg has returned from a one-year tour of duty in the Oregon National Guard serving in Iraq. Legg served in the Alpha ACO 2162 company.

Corporal Legg was stationed in Baghdad for his tour of duty. His battalion stayed at an old Iraqi police academy that had been modified by the Americans. The walled in compound they stayed within had many of the comforts of home for the Guardsmen including Internet access, satellite television, a café, and a PX. Legg said they were fed very well including having lobster and steak on a few

occasions. Legg went on several what he calls "sweat missions" where the National Guard battalions were used to provide protection for other solders whose mission was to provide information to Iraqis on water and sewer systems and find out if they needed help.

His battalion also pulled security duty in schools and did a lot of patrolling in the streets and securing hotels. Legg said seven or eight of the over 800 Oregon Guardsman who were deployed in Iraq at the same time as he were killed in the line of duty. Legg was not injured during his time in Iraq.

Legg said when he first got to Iraq they were using Humvees which they had to modify to protect themselves. This included shielding the interior with sandbags. He said later on they got the armored Humvees.

Legg said the people in Iraq were pretty nice in general but related that sometimes after giving the kids lots of stuff like toys and candy the Guardsmen would be pelted with rocks when they left.

Legg is currently a member of the Oregon National Guard and is in the process of switching back to active duty in the United States Army. He will be stationed in either Hawaii or South Carolina but anticipates it won't happen for another two months while he waits for the paperwork to be completed. His wife Theresa and two sons Pete and Michael will accompany him when he gets his next posting.

Legg has five years in the National Guard and wants to make a career out of the Army and plans on spending 15 more years serving in it. Welcome back home Pete Legg if only for a few months and know that your community appreciates you.

Dog Poisoning Update by Michael, Jodi, Ripper and Rudy Bulaich

We would like to thank all of the people that have been so supportive in helping us deal with the poisoning of our dog "Ripper". Riper is not out of the woods yet. He will be tested this week to determine the amount of permanent damage that was done to his liver after ingesting warfarin, the main ingredient in rat poison.

We have been in contact with the U.S. Humane Society, Pacific Northwest Regional Offices. They are willing to help both with increasing the amount of the A.C.E. Fund Reward and other resources that have been used to solve similar cases in other areas. We will have word from their Regional Manager early this week.

The community support has been overwhelming. We would like to thank everyone who has donated to the A.C.E. Fund, and all of you who ask us daily how our dog is doing.
