City Administrator To Go By Evan Kramer



The Port Orford City Council met in special session on June 20, 6:00pm, for an evaluation of the City Administrator Ken Knight's job performance. By Knight's request the

evaluation was open to the public rather than in a private executive session which would be more common. Knight was hired as city administrator on February 23, 2004 and given a two-year contract.

Knight began the evaluation of his job performance by saying he objected to the evaluation. He said his contract was breached by the city council on March 7 and the performance criteria were now invalid. March 7 is the day the council hired Mark Creighton as police chief. Mayor Jim Auburn said the council would use a modified job description.

The council reviewed Knight's job performance in six areas including administrative, budget, council relations, public relations, written and verbal skills, and intergovernmental cooperation. The six councilors and mayor all rated Knight in each of the categories giving him a score from one to nine in each of them. At the

end of the review the scores were added up. (For your convenience we've also computed a percentage score similar to the grades you may remember from school where 90-100 = "A", 80-89 = "B", 70-79 = "C" etc.)

Knight earned a 32 (51%) score under the administrative category. Mayor Auburn called Knight an above average administrator and gave him an eight. Councilor Steve Abbott gave him a seven and said Knight had fallen off the wagon about the police chief.

Knight scored a 34 (54%) under the budget category. Councilor Jim Campbell gave him a two and mentioned his yelling at a council member during the budget sessions. Councilor Milton Finch gave Knight a one and mentioned his outbursts at the council meeting. Councilor Ed Beck called Knight's performance satisfactory and gave him a five.

Knight received his lowest score in the council relations category earning a 16 (25%). Councilor Carl Eskelson said Knight goes off on his own and that the council wasn't overly informed.

Knight scored a 22 (35%) for public relations. Councilor Campbell said he had never received as many complaints about a city administrator as he had with Knight.

Knight received a 39 (62%) score for his written and verbal skills and a 38 (60%) for his intergovernmental cooperation.

The average score for Knight's job performance was 4.309 (48%).

Knight said his contract was not with the current council. City attorney John Trew advised the council that Knight's contract is not invalid. Mayor Auburn asked Knight what he wanted to do. Knight told him, "I'm not participating in this part of the evaluation." He then told Mayor Auburn that any written record placed in his file would be cause for legal action.

Knight told the council that on March 7 they had violated Section 2 of his contract. He said his job description said he would hire the police chief and the council had breached his contract. He said the council officially changed his job description on March 21 and that he wasn't hired under the revised job description.

He said the situation could not be tolerated.

Mayor Auburn asked Knight if it was his desire to work out an amicable separation agreement. Knight responded that he had given a set of guidelines to two council members (Milton Finch and Carl Eskelson) of what he would accept before he leaves. He said he had not seen any offers. One of the conditions Knight set forth was two months paid administrative leave.

Councilor Campbell made a motion that the council go ahead and attempt an agreeable separation with the city administrator and the motion passed 6-0.

Councilor Finch made a motion that the council appoints two members to speak with Knight and work out an amicable separation agreement and it passed unan-

imously. The council chose Steve Abbott and Jim Campbell to negotiate with Knight.

Police Report

Port Approves Budget By Jay Stoler

The Port of Port Orford met in special session on Tuesday, June 21 at 6:30pm to approve the annual Port budget of \$487,685 and levy a tax of \$63,100 to balance the budget. The Port District tax rate is just under .35¢ per \$1,000 property evaluation. Commissioner Ed Dowdy made the motion to approve the budget after reviewing it with Port Manager Gary Anderson who said the Port was in fairly good shape. The motion was seconded by new Commissioner John Mobley and unanimously approved. The regular meeting started at 7:00 pm with all Commissioners present except George Welch and only two persons in the audience.

Port President Evan Kramer moved through the light agenda approving the minutes of the previous meeting and then headed into a dredging update from Ed Dowdy. Dowdy reported somewhat joyfully, that a bill was before the US Senate at this moment to allot \$723,000 in dredging funds to Port Orford. All agreed that this would be a very good thing for the Port as dredging problems are still prevalent.

Evan Kramer noted that this was the last meeting for Commissioners Ed Dowdy, Gifford Barnes and George Welch. Kramer said he want to thank each of the Commissioners for the good, hard, productive work that each of them had done. Manager Gary Anderson then presented framed plaques expressing thanks to each of them.

Commissioner Gifford Barnes was thanked for eight years of service. He was elected in 1997 and reelected in 2001. Commissioner George Welch was appointed to the Commission in December of 2002 and Ed Dowdy was appointed in February of 2003. Dowdy and Welch both ran for two-year positions in 2003 and won. All departing Commissioners chose not to run again.

Port President Evan Kramer still has two years to go on his term and along with recently appointed John Mobely, will welcome newly elected Commissioners Scott Luhr, Robert Milenz and Dave Rickle when they take office in July.

The Commission then moved along and approved a Recreational Boat Agreement that sport fishermen will be required to sign when they first use the Port

facilities. The agreement holds the Port harmless in case of accidents and acknowledges that the user does so at their own risk.

Ed Dowdy led an enthusiastic conversation about raising Wild Salmon in ocean pens as a way for local fishermen and the Port to augment the current fisheries. The pros and cons of not employing antibiotics or steroids in the fish diet to maintain color and flavor. Currently, most farm raised Salmon are chemically enhanced. It seemed to be a topic that would be discussed on a continuing basis.

In the Managers report Gary Anderson said that he wanted to give employees a raise in the coming year of about 3 percent cost of living and an additional merit raise. Anderson said it was in the new budget.



**School Board News

The 2CJ School Board met in regular session on Monday, June 13 in the Pacific High School (PHS) Library. Board members in attendance were: Virginia Hughes (Chair), Liz Brady, Joseph Brown, Nancy Dowdy, and Gail Rathbun. Alan Brown and Shirley Van Loo were absent. (Dowdy and Rathbun will be succeeded by John Jensen and Rosario Williams on July 1.)

Mike Murray of Murray Insurance Services presented two quotes for district insurance for the coming school year. The Oregon School Boards Association quote was \$47 thousand, up \$7 thousand from this year. The Special Districts Association insures municipalities and, as of last year, also school districts. Their quote was \$37 thousand. The Board agreed to switch to the less expensive carrier.

The budget for school year 2005-2006 was approved with \$3.9 million in the general fund and a total of \$4.7 million from all sources. Resolutions approving the budget, making appropriations, and imposing taxes were passed.

The Board had the first reading of a "Tobacco-Free Environment" Policy, which must be adopted before the next school year in accordance with state law. Tobacco use will be prohibited on district property at all times.

The Board expressed complete support for the administration and staff of the high school in their handling of discipline, including exclusion from the senior trip, for students cited by police in connection with alcohol use at a gathering in April. A letter was given to all seniors in February and mailed to their parents explaining requirements for being eligible for the senior trip. Among other things, the letter stated, "Infractions involving drugs, alcohol, weapons, or arson will automatically result in the student being declared ineligible." It was important, in the opinion of the Board, for the young people to learn that their actions have consequences.

Interviews have been held for an interim Superintendent, and an announcement of the final selection is expected in the near future.

The next regular Board meeting is scheduled for Monday, July 11 at 7:00pm in the PHS library. Further information may be obtained by calling the district office at 348-2337.

Grand Marshall Bill Cobb

Local commercial fisherman Bill Cobb is the July 4th parade Grand Marshall. At 73 years old, Bill has the distinction of being the oldest active fisherman currently at the dock. He's been in the business of commercial fishing since 1967.

Bill moved from Myrtle Point, OR to Port Orford in October 1959 with his wife Lu and their three children. Originally a logger by trade, He worked 3 years for Train Construction & Logging and 5 years for Griffey and Laird Logging. After a salmon fishing trip with Jerry Crum on the F/V Marsha Lee (now the F/V Irish Rose), Bill was hooked.

In July of 1967 he purchased the F/V Rosalie from local resident, Harry White. The boat is named after Harry's mother-in-law, Rose Curry, from a local pioneer family. F/V Rosalie is a 30 foot plywood boat with one inch planking, unique by today's standards. His first trip out for salmon he used sport gear. He trolled from Red Fish Rocks to Island Rock and recalls catching 80 salmon that day.

Bill has fished the Rosalie from Crescent City, CA, to Newport, OR, for the past 38

years. He fondly remembers when the price for Silver Salmon went to 35 cents a pound straight across. Cobb jokingly said he ordered two Ferrari's when the price went up, "I thought everybody could be a millionaire fishing at that price". He has also fished for crab and bottom fish. Two winters during the 70's when crab season was slow he pulled his crab gear in the morning and worked at Western States Plywood Mill in the evening.

Also during the 70's, Cobb says he ran a "factory ship", with all three kids fishing for him during summer vacations. Son Bill recalls Daddy Cobb being a tough boss, "I remember when he fired me


three times in one day." Daughter Lynda has fond memories also, "as one of the first females to fish out of Port Orford at that time, I remember Dad being nervous about the "colorful" radio chatter from the other fishermen, the guys weren't used to having a girl on the water". Son Darrell followed in his dad's footsteps, learning a lot from his father that he uses today in his own commercial fishing career.

Cobb remarks that one of the biggest changes he has seen over the years is the number of local boats in the salmon fishery, "In the 70's and 80's there was a fleet at Port Orford, 15-16 boats would fly together. We would paint our boats in April and leave May 1st to follow the fish. After mooring at many ports during the season, we'd come back home when the fish showed up in September."

In 2004, he restored the F/V Rosalie using 3M5200 adhesive and fiberglass and polyester resin. "The old-girl could be used as an ice breaker now," Cobb says, "the hull is 1 3/4 inch thick. She'll be good for another 30 years. I can fish until I'm 103".

Bo Diddley Bo Diddley

Legendary Rock and Hall of Fame member Bo Diddley will fill the Marshfield High School Auditorium with the sounds of rock and roll and rhythm and blues on Thursday, July 7. Opening act for Bo Diddley is the Paul DeLay Band, which will also perform as Diddley's back up band.

Bo Diddley was elected to the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame and inducted in 1987. Diddley became a member of the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame the same year as The Coasters, Eddie Cochran, Aretha Franklin, Marvin Gaye, Bill Haley, and B. B. King. They were the second "class" to be inducted in the museum, following the first group, which included among others Elvis Presley, Chuck Berry, Little Richard, James Brown, Ray Charles and Sam Cooke. Diddley and Chuck Berry created the musical rhythms, which inspired and made groups like the Beatles and Rolling Stones possible. One of the

original members of the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame was Buddy Holly who copied the Diddley sound in his song, "Not Fade Away."

Bo Diddley is best known for his signature song, "Bo Diddley" which was released by Chess records in 1955, as well as "Mona", "I'm a Man" and "Who Do you Love?"

Ellas "Bo Diddley" McDaniels was born on December 30, 1928, in McComb, Mississippi, and is still making great music today and touring extensively. This is a unique chance to see one of the greats of rock and roll and not have to drive 285 miles to Portland to do it

Doors open for the concert at Marshfield High at 7:30pm and the music begins at 8:00pm. Tickets are \$20 in advance and available at Off the Record in North Bend or at the door for \$25. The Coos Bay Firefighters Association presents the Concert.


Steve Hoisington starts the evening off both Saturday and Sunday with advanced level rounds from 7-7:30 pm, with regu-

Nathan Auerbach, a member of the Rotary Club of Cota de Caza/Rancho Santa Margarita in Southern California, has embarked on a 2200 mile trek from Tijuana, Mexico, through the major coastal cities of California, Oregon, and Washington, to Vancouver, Canada. 
Nathan began his journey on May 1, and has been walking about 25 miles per day.

DeFazio Shocked By Decision

Representative Peter DeFazio responded on June 23 to a split 5-4 Supreme Court decision which gives unusually broad authority to local governments to seize private property for public benefit and economic interest.

"I am shocked by the ruling today from what I thought was a relatively conservative Supreme Court. It allows a broad intrusion of local government and violates the constitutional rights of Americans. This could also have alarming implications for local elections, as corporate developers will most certainly seek out candidates eager to condemn private property for economic development. I plan to find a remedy in Congress, to address this egregious ruling which includes the possibility of a Constitutional amendment."

In November 2003, DeFazio offered an amendment to HR 2443, the Coast Guard and Maritime Transportation Act of 2003, to prevent the siting of a Coast Guard Museum on property taken by eminent domain. The amendment would have blocked the siting of the museum in New London, Connecticut, and protected private homes from being seized by local government. Despite a Republican-controlled House, the amendment failed 199-221.

"I believe that Congress could have done something two years ago to stave off this ruling. I offered an amendment in November 2003 to protect private property rights of the citizens in this very case. Despite the conservative leanings of a majority of my colleagues, development interests prevailed and my amendment failed by 22 votes".

Editor's note: The five justices who voted yes on the right of governments to seize private property and turn it over to private developers are John Paul Stevens who wrote the majority decision, Anthony Kennedy, David Souter, Ruth Bader Ginsburg, and Steve Breyer. Those voting no were Sandra Day O'Connor who wrote the dissenting opinion, Chief Justice William Rehnquist, Antonin Scalia, and Clarence Thomas. The lesson to be learned from this decision is your home is no longer your castle. EK

Over The Rainbow program director, Mary Margaret Smith, recently completed a course of study to become a North American Riding for the Handicapped Association (NARHA) certified instructor. NARHA is a non-profit organization that establishes standards and guidelines to promote safe, quality, therapeutic riding programs. Smith attended a three day workshop in Estacada, Oregon, which included: written exams; a demonstration of her horsemanship skills; and the preparation and teaching of a lesson for two handicapped individuals. "I would like to thank Sylvia Allen, of Coos Bay, Beth Welch and Alice Pfand of Port Orford for their assistance in helping me prepare for the riding section of the workshop; and our board of directors and my family for their encouragement," Smith said. "I am excited about how the information I learned through NARHA and networking with other NARHA instructors will help us to better serve our riders."

Over The Rainbow Special Needs Riding Program is a non-profit organization that provides riding opportunities to persons with handicaps in Curry and Coos Counties at no charge. It relies on grants, fundraising events and donations. The program currently has three horses and serves riders in Port Orford, Gold Beach, Brookings and Coos Bay. 

DeFazio on States Rights

Representative Peter DeFazio voted to protect the rights of those who legally use medical marijuana in Oregon and ten other states. DeFazio voted in favor of an amendment offered by Representative Maurice Hinchey to prevent federal funds from being used to prosecute individuals who use medical marijuana in states that legally permit it. The amendment was first offered to the Science, State, Commerce, Justice and Related Agencies Appropriations Act for fiscal year 2006, and failed by a vote of 161 to 264.

DeFazio said, "What happened to supporting states' rights? It looks like my

Republican colleagues are engaged in states' rights a la carte. They'll defend states' rights until they disagree with certain policies adopted by a state."

"My state and ten others have, by large margins, adopted a law to allow people, through a regulated physician prescription, to receive medical marijuana for certain conditions for which there are few or no other effective treatments. Let's focus on the real threats to Americans rather than trampling on the rights of people who have compassionately decided to allow the use of medical marijuana."


