Board to Meet with Members By Evan Kramer

The Coos Curry Electric Coop (CCEC) Board of Directors met on the final day in January for their monthly meeting. All six board members were present as well as a decent number of owner-members.

The board begins its meetings with board chairman Daryl Robison going around the room and having guests introduce themselves and if they had any questions or statements they made them then. Paul Stephan thanked the board for being hard working and dedicated and thanked them for lowering the rates at Christmas time.

Dale Thomas asked for a cost of service study. He said he was concerned that nonprofits, schools and churches did not get to participate in the recent rate decrease and that it only went to residential users. He requested the board re-review the rate decreases.

Don Jenson asked about the tree trimming budget which the board went into later on the meeting.

The board was asked what their guidelines were for conducting executive sessions and also what the salary schedule and benefit packages were for the managers of the Coop. The general manager will work on a letter providing this information.

Rick Hazzard asked the board about any progress on net metering and renewable energy and was told the board would be discussing these matters at their February meeting.

Chief Financial Officer Doyle Eden gave a review of the Coop's 2006 fiscal year. He said that CCEC was started in 1939 and serves all of Curry County, and parts of Coos and Douglas Counties. The Coop has 1,624 miles of primary line and 442 miles of underground line. The CCEC territory covers 3,000 square miles with the largest number of members in Brookings/Harbor. The Coop has 24,000 power poles, 17,000 meters and 15 substations. Eden said of the 17.000 electric meters there are 3.600 AMR (automated meter readers). The Coop has two executive officers, six managers, 27 employees in operations, 11 engineers, 14 employees in member's services and eight employees in corporate services for a total of 68 employees.

Revenue for CCEC was 28.6 million dollars in 2006. For 2005 it was 26.6 million dollars and 2004 was 24.1 million dollars. Eden said the cost of purchased power was 3.29 cents per kWh in 2006 while in 2005 it was 3.68 per kWh. The Coop's operating margin was \$2,392,103 in 2006 and \$853,503 in 2005.

There have been questions about the tree trimming budget and Eden gave a historical report on it. In 2005 the Coop budgeted \$1,389,190 for tree trimming and spent \$1,304,367 while last year the Coop spent \$1,705, 352 on tree trimming on a budget of \$2,056,137. Eden said the tree trimming budget affects the maintenance budget in that tree limbs and falling branches can take power lines out. Eden said in 2005 that 83 miles of line were cleared. For the past ten years the Coop has spent \$12,164,404 on tree trimming.

Board member Grant Combs will attend the Oregon Rural Electric Cooperative Association meeting on February 9.

The policy review committee recommended changes to Policy Bulletin #66. It deals with the revised policies concerning the Coop attorney; delineating responsibilities of the attorney and manager. A motion was made and passed to accept the revisions to Policy Bulletin #66.

The Board of Directors will conduct four public meetings in February to give the Coop owner/members a chance to meet with their directors and ask questions of

them. The meetings will be held in Gold Beach on February 13; Brookings on February 15, Coquille on February 20 and in Port Orford at the Coop headquarters on February 26. The meetings will begin at 7:00pm and be advertised to get out a good turnout.

A timeline for this year's Board election was handed out at the meeting. The board will schedule a committee to review the by-laws at the February meeting and recommend by-law amendments. The nominating committees for board members will be made at the February meeting. The nominating committee reports and petitions are due by May 2. A candidate for the board can be named by the nominating committee or get on the ballot via petition signatures. There are three board members up for election this year. They are David Itzen in District 2 (Brookings), Daryl Robison in District 4 (Port Orford) and Pete Radabaugh in District 5 (Bandon), Robison was elected to the board last year but for a one year term of office since he was finishing up

the term of office that Jean Shank has been elected to three years ago. Board directors are elected to and normally serve three year terms of office.

The annual meeting will be held on Saturday, June 16, at Brookings-Harbor High School in Brookings.

In other words you can go to prison for Five years on a Class C Felony if you discharge a firearm in violation of this statute.

This is training we need every year, and I'm glad someone stepped up to the plate to provide our community emergency services personnel with that training locally. You might not know this, but we have some very well trained emergency personnel for such a small community as ours.

Responding to Vern Kolen's letter "Clearing up Co-op facts" in a recent issue.

Information published in the Ruralite is furnished by and paid for by CCEC.

There is little difference between what was spent in 2006 and what was approved for the 2007 tree trimming budget. The numbers are quite interesting and were discussed at the January board of directors meeting.

There are still four contract crews for tree trimming on the distribution line. still trimming by CCEC employees and a trimming crew on the transmission line. In 2006 \$1,703,532 was spent for tree trimming, in 2007 the approved budget is \$1,629,304. That is a difference of \$74,228. The 2006 amount exceeds the highest amount paid by more than \$300,000 in the past ten years! The 2007 amount is the second highest. The higher number being debated comes from the PROPOSED (or suggested) budget for 2007. The board is doing an excellent job approving expenditures in a reasonable and responsible manner.





Nearly 75 people turned out to the Community Building in Port Orford to mingle with the policy makers who had come from almost every port on the coast, and some representatives from the Governors office.

There were plenty of local dignitaries on hand to meet the meet the members including Mayor Jim Auborn, Councilors; John Hewitt, Steve Abbott and Jake Marshall. Former Mayor Gary Doran was there as well as Gary Anderson, Port manager and Port Commissioners Ed Dowdy, Scott Luhr and Evan Kramer. 

From Hellhole to Rebirth By Evan Kramer

When Valerie and I went to Las Vegas in January we passed through the City of Eureka in northern California and as is the case with me I picked up all the local papers I could get my hands on. The headline in the January 6 edition of the Times-Standard screamed out, "Chief: Eureka becoming a 'hellhole'. The remark was made by interim Eureka police Chief Muri Haarpham, after a group of three suspects in a series of seven armed robberies were arrested or in one case killed by the police in a shootout. The chief blamed the armed robberies on methamphetamine use and was upset about the effect methamphetamine users were having on a certain part of the city. His exact quote was "It's turning our community into a hellhole." There have been four officer involved shootings in Eureka in the past nine months.

Flash forward to Saturday, February 3 and instead of being called a hellhole the citizens of Eureka were celebrating the rebirth of the Loew's State Theater on G Street. The façade of the theater bears the name of the man elected as mayor of Eureka in 1878 (Richard Sweasy) and

also includes the date of construction - 1920. It remained the Sweasy Theater for one year and it was sold to the Loew's Theater chain in 1921. It opened as a vaudeville theater showing silent movies. The theater survived two fires over the years and closed for good in 1973 and became Daly's Department Store. After Daly's closed in the 1990's the building sat vacant and was owned by Humboldt State University. It was purchased and rescued by Rob and Cherie Arkley in 2003 and restoration efforts began. The Arkley's spent \$5 million dollars bringing the theater back to life and in exchange got the name changed to the Arkley Center for the Performing Arts.

The now 767 seat theater (down from 1,100 when it showed movies) reopened on Friday night, February 2 with a sold out performance by Kenny Rogers. The next day the theater opened its doors to the community for a look see along with free performances, food, and tours. That's where I found myself on Saturday afternoon at 1:30pm, well in advance of the open house starting time of 4:00pm. It paid to be from Port Orford as I told one of the numerous security guards that I had driven 160 miles to see the theater. She

arranged for one of the other guards to take me inside for a brief tour. Then to my luck one of the theater managers gathered me and several other people for an in depth tour of the theater including the backstage area, the green room, the kitchen and remodeled bathrooms in the basement. We got a peak at the state of the art lighting and sound equipment and were all a pack of oohs and aahs. The former Loew's State Theater no longer has a projection booth and will be used almost exclusively for live performances – a DVD projector is in the works. One block on H Street sits one of the most beautiful theaters in the United States - The Eureka Theater. The 1938 Streamline Moderne masterpiece is also undergoing a renovation by a group of local citizens but at a slower pace than the State Theater. My advice to the Eureka Theater is don't take out the projection booth. Have it both ways.





Windows Vista By Valerie Jean Kramer

Microsoft's new operating system, Windows Vista, became available on January 30. All you really need to know is, "Don't bother," but for the curious, here's a bit more info.

There are at least four flavors of Vista that you may see for sale. The minimum system requirements for the "Home Basic" version include at least a 1Ghz CPU, 512Mb RAM, 15Gb free disk space, and a DVD-ROM drive. Fancier versions may require a minimum of 1Gb of RAM. As one reviewer put it about Microsoft's minimum system claims, "They lie like rugs." There is a big difference between being able to run Vista and actually having a useful computer system! The rule of thumb is that if you bought your computer more than a year ago, it probably won't run Vista satisfactorily. Newer computers may or may not be sufficient. You also need to have devices that are compatible with Vista and that opens a whole 'nother can of worms. Support for devices is a little erratic though will probably be better eventually.

Once you get Windows Vista running you need to find software that will work with it. Quickbooks has already warned its customers that only the 2007 version is compatible. There are likely to be problems with other programs as well. You should plan to upgrade all your other software as new Vista-capable versions become available.

Now that you've spent \$100-400 for Vista, \$1000 for a new computer, and another \$500 or more for new software you're ready to enjoy the new features, right? Oh yeah, what new features? Some versions of Vista have a spiffy new "Areo" interface but it doesn't actually let you DO anything you can't do now. Microsoft has supposedly made hundreds of minor improvements (translation hundreds of things that don't work the way you're used to) but again, they don't necessarily let you do anything new. Microsoft claims the new Windows is their most secure platform yet. Yep. It took the hackers almost a whole day to crack it. By the way, don't be surprised when you find you can't play some music or videos on Vista. Vista incorporates a lot of copy protection and "DRM" (Digital Rights Management) software to prevent you from using any stolen software or media files. Unfortunately this "protection" also often prevents you from running legitimate files as well.

Microsoft no longer provides security patches for Windows 95 and 98 so they are not safe for Internet use. Windows ME was never a very satisfactory operating system. Linux is a great alternative and it's free but most people aren't comfortable with it yet so, unless you enjoy solving problems, your best strategy is to stay with Windows 2000 or XP for now.

Letter to the Editor,

In 2004, when the Coos-Curry Electric monthly Residential Class base rate was increased from \$14 to \$33, the monthly General Service Classes also increased from \$17 to \$35 for 1 Phase and from

\$19 to \$45 for 3 Phase to cover losses on the electric business. Most churches, nonprofits, cities, ports, hospitals, schools, volunteer fire departments, small businesses and the county government are in the General Service classes. When the Residential base rate was lowered from \$33 to \$22.75 in December, the General Service base rates remained at the 2004 increased levels. The latest Cost of Service Study shows that General Service 1 Phase base rates produce 12.6% more than cost while Residential rates produce 1.61% more than cost, an eight fold difference. Unfortunately, many members of the General Service Class have financial problems and many, like schools and cities, have multiple meters.

For the second month, my requests at the Coos-Curry Board meeting to treat members of the General Service Class as fairly as the Residential Class have not been addressed. Chairman Daryl Robison says that Board plans to address them at some later time. Contrary to the facts, Port Orford based "We Own Coos-Curry' claims that there is no unfair subsidy of the Residential rate by the non-profits and small businesses.

Member meetings will be held by Coos-Curry in February (Port Orford - February 26). If you feel that non-profits and small businesses deserve equal and fair rate treatment, please attend one of these meetings and voice your concerns.
