

Theater News By Evan Kramer

Thanks to all the various groups who put on events this past weekend during the Arts and Music Festival including the Port Orford Arts Council, Rotary Club, Chamber of Commerce and Theater 101.

The Theater 101 group held a fundraiser at the Community Building with the presentation of the play "It Had to be You" on Friday night. The next time Theater 101 puts on a play it will be in their new playhouse located at 1320 N. Highway 101. The theater will seat approximately 60 people and opens on Friday, October 12 with the play, "Sylvia" by A. R. Turney. It is a modern romantic comedy about marriage...and a dog. Theater 101 will present "Sylvia" on Friday and Saturday nights and on Sunday for a matinee for two weekends in a row and possibly a third. The well decorated theater lobby is located between the Port Orford Arts Council's office and the Carleton Law Office. The lobby boasts a number of colorful posters from a variety of plays. It's worth it just to go take a look at the posters. The Arts Council office was the hub of much activity this past weekend between the display of paintings and photographs and open houses they held.

Curry County has its first multiplex theater. The Redwood Theater in Brookings has expanded and added a second movie theater adjacent to the original theater. The new addition is small but cozy and seats 38 people in stadium seating fashion. Last Thursday they were showing Michael Moore's new movie Sicko in the new theater and The Nanny Diaries in the larger room which now has new seats and a smaller seating capacity. Gold Beach's movie theater, the Chinook, burned down in the early 90's and has never been replaced. Besides the theater the building housed Ethyl's Restaurant where the fire started. All that remains today is a hole in the ground and the foundation.

The Savoy Theater hosted one of the Arts and Music events with a showing of the Humphrey Bogart classic Casablanca on Sunday afternoon. This was a benefit for the SMART program at Driftwood School SMART stands for Start Making a Reader Today. The showing highlighted some of the difficulties in showing older movies in theaters. You might think for a movie that has been played in theaters, television, VHS and DVD for years that renting it for a benefit performance would be inexpensive but no. Savoy Theater owner Chris Speed told me it cost \$250 to show the movie and Warner Brothers

which owns the film doesn't send out a 35 millimeter print included with rental fee. The theater owner has to go out and get their own copy of the film on DVD and show it with the DVD projector. More and more theaters are going digital and many like the Savoy have both a 35mm projector and digital projector. So if you wonder why theaters don't show the oldies but goodies very often that's why. Later on that afternoon Valerie and I went to see the Simpson's Movie and got several good laughs out of that one even if Homer Simpson does mock the theater audience for paying to see what they can see for free on television. By the way Homer, television isn't free.

Valerie got her first look at Port Orford's skate bowl on Sunday afternoon. Several local skateboarders put on a show for the crowd including one skateboarder named Happy who was four and a half years old. There is a group that is raising money through a variety of efforts to build an addition to the Skatepark more suitable for younger and less experienced skateboarders. They are holding a raffle for a Hugh McKay glass sculpture and selling t-shirts and of course accepting donations. The McKay sculpture is now on display at the Fun Zone. The skate bowl at Buffington Park is quite an advanced set up and it will be a well-

Sports Talk

Boston Red Sox legend, Hall of Fame second baseman Bobby Doerr, and Philadelphia Phillies and Baltimore Orioles catcher Clay Dalrymple, will headline an afternoon of sports talk at Gold Beach Books this Sunday, September 9 at 3:00pm. Afterwards, the two will sign memorabilia to benefit the Gold Beach Senior Center.

While playing his entire 13 season Major League career with the Red Sox, Doerr racked up 2,044 hits and 1,247 RBI's, and once held the Major League record of 414 fielding chances without an error. During his career, he played on nine All Star teams. An injury forced Doerr to retire in 1951 while still in his prime. In 1986, he was inducted to the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, New York, along with Willie McCovey. Doerr has resided in Agness for many

years and can often be seen fishing the Rogue River.

Dalrymple was a Phillies stalwart from 1960 to 1968, before joining the Baltimore Orioles, where he played on three consecutive World Series teams from 1969 to 1971. Dalrymple's playing strengths included his arm, as he led National League catchers in throwing out baserunners in 1963, 1965 and 1967. In 1964, Dalrymple also led the National League in sacrifice fly balls; and he set league records in 1966 and 1967 with 99 consecutive errorless games. Dalrymple retired from baseball in 1971 and now makes his home in the Gold Beach area, where he serves as a Commissioner for the Port of Gold Beach.

Sunday's event will include a question and answer period. Doerr, who was a close friend of the late Boston star Ted Williams, is expected to field queries

about his playing days with Williams and the other great stars of his era. Both Doerr and Dalrymple will offer their opinions about how professional baseball has changed over the years.

Memorabilia on hand will include baseballs, photos and hats. All proceeds from the sale of those items will be donated to the Senior Center. Also available will be copies of David Halberstam's book, *The Teammates*, which chronicles Doerr's enduring friendship with Williams, Dom DiMaggio and Johnny Pesky. Offered in addition will be the book, *The 1964 Phillies* by John Rossi, about Dalrymple's Philadelphia team which had the National League pennant in its grasp before a late collapse.

Admission is free. The bookstore is located at Pacific Highway 101 and First Street in Gold Beach.

Run to the Rogue

The Confederated Tribes of the Siletz will hold their 13th annual Run to the Rogue in mid-September.

An important event for the Siletz Tribe, the run retraces the route their ancestors traveled when they were removed from their coastal ancestral homes and sent to the Siletz Reservation in the 1850's. As well as being a "trail of tears," the run also celebrates the strength of their people's perseverance.

The 234-mile run from Siletz to Oak Flats on the Illinois River is done as a

relay, beginning on Thursday and continuing non-stop until arrival at Oak Flats on Saturday afternoon.

Approximately 250 tribal members, including elders, runners, and support team members will be stopping in Port Orford on Friday September 14th to attend a community potluck from 5:30-8:30 pm at the Community Building,

hosted by the Port Orford Arts Council and the people of Port Orford. The potluck will feature Native American dancing by the Jack-Falls-Rock Troupe of five dancers and four drummers.

We invite everyone in the Port Orford community to welcome the Siletz and recognize the significance of this event. Please bring a dish that will feed approximately 10 people, so we will have sufficient food for everyone, and come enjoy an evening of food, fellowship, fun, and culture.

This event is sponsored by the Port Orford Arts Council and a grant from the Coquille Tribal Community Fund. Founded by the Coquille Indian Tribe, the Tribal Community Fund has distributed close to \$2 million to support projects in the areas of education, health, public safety, arts and culture, problem gaming treatment, and historic preservation in a five-county region of Southwestern Oregon. 

School Loading Zone

There have been several changes made in the Driftwood School drop off zone for students. There is now a bus loading and unloading zone marked with red lines adjacent to the north entrance door to the school. Next to the bus loading an unloading zone is a lane for parents dropping off students. This is marked with yellow lines and is separated from the bus zone by a short concrete barrier and fence.

The City of Port Orford has approved the conversion of Thirteenth Street to a one way street going east and Tichenor from Thirteenth to Fourteenth as a one way street going north. The School District is working with the Oregon Department of Transportation on the signage for the one way streets so as of Tuesday it wasn't marked one way. The School District worked with the community on a plan for changing the loading and unloading

of students as well as parking for teachers and volunteers and came up with one that was the least intrusive. Most of the work on the project was done by School District Maintenance Supervisor John Penifold with the help of some family members and Jack Pruitt. Good job.

Now that school is session the speed limit on Highway 101 in front of the school is back to 20 miles per hour when the lights are flashing. Drive carefully and safely.

Hike to Headwaters

Sole Pursuits, Curry General Hospital's free walking incentive program, invites hikers to accompany naturalist Cathy Boden to Snow Camp Meadow, a geologically and historically diverse jewel bordering the Kalmiopsis Wilderness, Saturday, Sept. 8.

Carpoolers can meet to caravan to the trail head at 9 a.m. at the Curry General Hospital Annex parking lot in Gold Beach; or 8:15 a.m. at either Coastal Cardiology in Brookings, or the Port Orford Visitor Center in Port Orford.

Suitable for intermediate hikers, the four-mile walk will begin at Fairview Meadow where participants can pass through a forest recovering from the 2002 Biscuit fire that devastated much of the area.

The trail from Fairview Meadow to Snow Camp Meadow contains interesting geological formations. The soils change colors along the way, and support different types of plant life, including Darlingtonia or pitcher plant.

Hiking into Snow Camp Meadow, walkers will note a meandering waterway known as Meadow Creek that forms the headwaters of Pistol River. Hikers also can explore the large meadow for vestiges of earlier times, such as deteriorating building materials and fence posts. The meadow was used by cattle ranchers including Pistol River old-timers, the late Elmer Miller and the late Zahnie Crockett.

Harve Timeus, retired now from the US Forest Service Chetco Ranger District office in Brookings, says he remembers finding an application by Crockett to graze his cows in the meadow after Miller, a neighboring rancher, was killed in a bear accident. The application was dated 1938.

Timeus also said that the meadow was the site of a former Civilian Conservation Corps camp during the Great De-

pression. The outfit was known as Alpine Glade Camp. CCC workers probably worked on the roads and trails in the area, Timeus says. The Biscuit fire burned the nearby Snow Camp Lookout that had been built in 1958. It has since been replaced with a new tower for recreational use.

Boden will co-lead the hike with Al Collinet, botany and bird buff, who coordinates the Muscle Busters Hiking Group.

Bring lunch, plenty of water and weather-proof gear.

Upcoming Sole Pursuits hikes include:

Oct. 13, Vickie Brower, a Curry General Hospital manager and native Curry County resident, leads a beach-river-mountain-town walk above and about Gold Beach

Nov. 17 Jim Coffee, trail-maker extraordinaire, gives a tour of his hand-hewn Old Coast Meditation Trail. The trail features bas relief tree trunk carvings on live trees.

Dec. 8, Cathy Boden leads the second annual Elk River Salmon Walk up Elk River, featuring a clear view of spawning wild salmon nesting in the river bed.

Anyone can join Sole Pursuits. Hikers who log in at least one hike through the rest of the year are eligible for an incentive offer provided by the Redwood Hostel.

Mixed Use Planning Meeting

The Curry County Planning Division will be discussing the proposed new county zoning designation: Mixed-Use Master Plan (MUMP) zone with the Port Orford Planning Commission at its regular meeting on Tuesday, September 11, 2007.

The new zone is designated to be applied to residential areas where a variety of housing types and densities with limited commercial office and retail uses to serve the surrounding residential neighborhood may be appropriate. This zone is intended to be applied only within Urban Growth Boundaries (UGB) identified by Curry County. As the new zone may affect growth within the Port Orford UGB, this is the purpose of the informational meeting with the Port Orford Planning Commission.

Formal hearings on the proposed new zone will be held by the Board of Commissioners at a later date. The three city planning commissions affected by the new zone will be given the opportunity to comment on the new zone prior to those hearings.
