

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It's Fair Time By Evan Kramer

This is County Fair time in Oregon with the State Fair in Salem coming up at the end of the month to finish off another fine summer of fairs. The Curry County and Coos County Fairs were held two weeks ago overlapping each other and many people attended them and had a good time.

The Curry County Fair is a small one to be sure but this year pulled some new tricks out of the hat to make things more fun for people. The emphasis was on animals and reptiles as The Big Cats of the World from Cave Junction was a special presenter with several shows each day adjacent to the floral building. They brought three of their big cats including an ocelot, leopard and caracal to do tricks and entertain people. If you didn't get a chance to see the big cats at the Curry County Fair you can always take a trip down 101 to 197 and then 199 to Cave Junction where the cats are on display in their several acre park. The handlers put on several daily tours and have an impressive facility though no doubt the big cats would prefer living in the wild rather than being on display.

A reptile exhibit from Corvallis filled up much of the room in the commercial hall

this year at the fair and provided some hands on fun though you didn't want to touch the snapping turtle. This year's fair had an energy park with electric cars and scooters for sale but you could look but not take them for a spin around Gold Beach. These are extremely small vehicles but also very quiet.

Down below the commercial spaces on the fairgrounds were the animal barns and the young people participating in the 4-H program which to me seems like what a fair is all about though the livestock barn was far from full this year. But really what is the most popular, are the carnival rides and special events like the demolition derby or rodeos.

We also took in the Del Norte County Fair in Crescent City. This is another small county fair but considerably larger than the Curry County Fair. The 4-H program is much stronger in Del Norte County judging by the amount of farm animals on display. One of the livestock buildings was nearly full of pigs with a small space devoted to sheep. The pigs were almost all full grown and most were set to go on the auction block on Sunday afternoon. Pigs under about 225 pounds were not to be auctioned but any of them bigger than that were slated for sale. It can't be easy on the young people that raise them as the pigs are quite

friendly and all have names and personalities but each one represents the yearly "project" for the 4-H member and the auction is the end result.

One of the side amusements at the Del Norte Fair was the axe throw. Instead of darts and a dart board they have a similar looking target make out of a round from a tree and contestants throw a double bladed axe trying to hit a beer can in the dead center. The women outshined the men on this one with the two women participating drawing to a tie and defeating the two men in the contest. They had a one throw playoff to decide the winner but no one did get the axe in the beer can.

We got to the Fair at opening time so by the time the Demolition Derby and Rodeo were to begin later that afternoon were on our way to other things but by then the parking lot along Highway 101 was full of fun seekers and cotton candy eaters.

Thanks to the great working relationship we have with all emergency services personnel it makes it a lot easier to help solve these community problems and get the needed help to people as soon as possible.

Chiefs Note: On August 1 the police department was going to start work on the new police department in the old library space but because of some council concerns, that probably won't take place now. Initially we were offered the library space to utilize for the police department because we have very little room in the existing one room police department, and no secure interview room. Over a year ago the council authorized

us to move into the space but of course the problem was available money to remodel it. The estimate for remodeling was about \$37,000.00 so because of limited funding I took the initiative get things going. Our Reserve Officers decided to volunteer their time to perform the labor, and we got some vender donations for materials which lowered the cost of remodel significantly to about \$13,000.00. The plans which included a common meeting room were donated at a cost relief of about \$1,200.00, and our building permits were significantly lowered from about \$1,400.00 to \$260.00 because one of our reserves Tyson Breuer is a contractor and can oversee the volunteer work. We had also received some additional donated furnishings, office equipment and even more donated materials. All I was waiting for from the council was a written confirmation to answer the question of whether the police can actually occupy the space once we have done all the work so there will be no confusion in the near future. Whatever the reasons I guess we're stuck in the small office so on to other things. Thanks to everyone who donated and all that were going to assist us with the labor of the remodel.

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**Council Approves PD Plans

Another day another meeting and the latest one for the Port Orford City Council was a special session on July 30 to deal with the revised plans for the police department use of the library space.

Mayor Auburn had a few housekeeping items the council needed to take care of first announcing that Joyce Spicer Kinney had resigned from the planning commission. This created a second opening on that commission. Auburn nominated Phil Colozzi to fill the other vacancy on the planning commission and on a motion by councilor John Hewitt the council voted 5-0 to go along with the mayor's appointment. The council also voted to accept a grant from the DLCDC for \$5,424 to pay for the costs of the GIS (Global information system).

Then the council dealt with the plans for the police department's use of the library space with councilor Milton Finch making a motion to accept the "modified" plan. It had been changed since originally presented to the council by Chief Mark Creighton. Councilor David Smith described it as not a major

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change but Councilor Steve Abbott described the modified plan as a "significant change" saying there would be less of a meeting room with the new plans. Chief Mark Creighton told the council it wasn't his responsibility to do all this and that he had volunteered his time working on the plan. He had also coordinated with volunteers to get the work done for free and gotten some of the materials donated for the project. Councilor Abbott said he wanted room for the Oregon State Police and the Curry County Sheriff's Department in the remodeled space. David Smith said the plans are great and Mayor Auburn called the new plans a vast improvement. The council voted 5-0 to approve the modified plans for the library space as submitted by Chief Creighton.

The council discussed the appointment of Rick Rogerson as temporary public works superintendent for 6 months at an 8% pay increase. Rogerson had earlier presented the council with a letter from the city employee's union (Teamsters) saying that if Rogerson takes the position and it doesn't work out he can revert back to his current position as sewer treatment plant operator. The public works superintendent position has been open since Dave Pace left in November 2006. The city will continue to advertise for a permanent public works superintendent. Rogerson pointed out that currently only he and Duane Eckhoff can run the water treatment plant. Councilor



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Finch made a motion to make a temporary appointment to Rick Rogerson of public works superintendent with an 8% pay increase and it passed 5-0.

The reader would mistakenly now conclude that all relevant aspects pertaining to global warming have been exhausted. That perception is premature. A number of other vital indicators must also be reviewed to expose the immensity of the scope this plague will incur in the future unless remedial measures are taken.

Lake Mead might run dry in 13 years. Lake Mead is the Colorado River's reservoir. The Colorado flow is in travail with dire consequences for agriculture, dependent on its water being replenished. In a study by the Scripps Institute of Oceanography, the Southwest U.S. will experience reduced river flows triggered by climate change. Global warming may completely alter seasonal changes. Some parts of the Earth will freeze, others will be afflicted with extreme heat.

Consider this disturbing factor:

The Great Ocean Conveyor Belt is comprised of a broadband ocean current embracing the flow of 100 Amazon Rivers. The Amazon runs for 3,900 miles. This voluminous current virtually girdles the ocean and during its journey, releases its warm waters into the North Atlantic Ocean. This transfer of warm water acts as the engine for the conveyor belt whereby the concentration of salt water

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a measure election will be held in the City of Port Orford, Curry County, Oregon on November 4, 2004. The following shall be the ballot title of the measure to be submitted to the city's voters on this date: City of Port Orford, Curry County, Oregon

CAPTION: Local Option Tax Levy For Funding Port Orford Police Force.

QUESTION: Shall the City levy \$1.41 per \$1,000 of assessed value for police operations for 4 years, beginning in FY 2009-2010? This measure may cause property taxes to increase by more than three percent.

SUMMARY: The purpose of this local option tax measure is to fund the operations of the City of Port Orford Police Department. The previous local option tax revenue measure expires at the end of the 2008-2009 fiscal year. If the local option tax measure is not enacted, then the City will eliminate the Police Department, since there are insufficient property tax revenues to pay for general city operations and fund the Police Department. The local option tax imposed by this measure will be for four years, beginning with the 2009-2010 fiscal year. It is estimated that the local option taxes to be raised each year will be \$136,089 in FY2009-2010; \$140,172 in FY2010-2011; \$144,877 FY2011-2012, and \$148,708 in FY2012-2013 for a total of \$569,846. "The estimated tax cost for this measure is an ESTIMATE ONLY based on the best information available from the county assessor at the time of the estimate".

is dense enough to sink, generating and propelling the current's momentum.

The delicate balance and viscosity of water temperature and density is being threatened by global ice melts from the Arctic Poles, enhanced by Greenland's melting glaciers diluting the density of the salt water with fresh water and in turn disrupting the conveyor belt by cooling it down. All of the above reflects itself in the increased fridity of Western Europe and North America.

The ocean's temperature variations, in itself seemingly unimportant, indicates dramatically how slight disturbances in nature's physical structure can have telling consequences. According to reports from Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute and National Academy of Science, the North Atlantic experienced this paradox twice in eons past when the conveyor belt was compromised by the intrusion of a fresh water melt. Each of the past episodes lasted over a thousand years.

Free Concert

Acoustic guitarist and singer/songwriter Cory Simonson will present a free concert at 8:00pm on Saturday, August 9, at the Biscuit Showroom in Gold Beach. Laura Middleton, of the local band “Apple Barner,” will provide back-up vocals.

Simonson, moved from Portland to the south coast last year after completing a gradual transition from punk and metal bands to his own acoustic compositions. He finds his independent music difficult to categorize because it draws upon everything from 60’s folk and roots-rock to punk and modern underground independent sounds. His early influences

included a band he co-founded called “Shelter,” which played what they termed “psychedelic experimental folk music.”

According to Simonson, his goal as a songwriter “is to speak in an original voice and write songs that challenge the listener to think - even if it hurts.” He explains, “I’ve had an emotional bond with music my entire life and over time my love of music has evolved and expanded into a deep appreciation for all forms of artistic expression; my lyrics tend to focus on emotions we feel but can’t explain or fully understand, so the imagery is often as obtuse and nonsensical as the feelings themselves.”

Admission is free, but because seating is limited, concertgoers are advised to arrive early. The Biscuit Showroom is located inside Gold Beach Books at Pacific Highway 101 and First Streets in Gold Beach.

• **Natural Hazards:** Replaces existing natural hazards ordinance provisions with more comprehensive requirements to provide increased safety for residents of the City.
