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

Port Stimulus News

Last week we reported (in the city council meeting article) about the May 28 meeting in Portland regarding the nearly \$10 million plan of investment for the Port of Port Orford. Councilor and Port Commissioner Scott Luhr said he was going to a meeting in Portland regarding the Oregon Way Advisory Committee and the proposal for new cannery and administrative buildings at the Port.

The Oregon Way Advisory Group that met that day recommended the project to Governor Ted Kulongoski "for his consideration and support" as a signature project. The project is known as the Port Orford Marine Economic Recovery Plan. The Oregon Way Advisory Group will work with other state partners to apply for "federal competitive grant opportunities provided through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act also known as the stimulus act. Governor Kulongoski's support is important but the final say so in funding the \$9.7 million grant project is up to the federal government.

The Port Orford Marine Economic Recovery Plan has been spearheaded by the Port of Port Orford, the Port Orford Ocean Resources Team (POORT) and

the City of Port Orford. One of the main goals is to make Port Orford a "center for sustainable fisheries and a showcase on the South Coast for both Oregon's first marine reserve and for green technologies that enhance the local economy and create jobs. The project will create facilities designed and constructed using the LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) green building rating system, dedicated to ocean sustainability." According the Oregon Way Advisory Committee news release on the project "it will include a "state of the art facility for high-value live fish processing center; a marine research field station with a dormitory and work space for visiting scientists, a "Green" Port complex including a working waterfront and retail space; and a marine interpretive center."

Information released by POORT Director Leesa Cobb concerning the Thursday meeting in Portland was very positive. One person who spoke forcefully for the project was Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife Director Roy Elicker. He "told the committee the ODF&W needs this project to be approved, and that Port Orford is years ahead of any community on the coast for our work in the marine environment and the marine economy."

The POORT, Port, and City will now have to compete with many other organizations for the federal stimulus money so nothing is guaranteed but Thursday's actions took the project one step closer to becoming reality.

A landmark was reached on Thursday, May 28 in the Oregon Legislature when the Oregon House of Representatives passed the Marine Reserves Bill HB 3013 by a unanimous 51-0 vote with nine members not voting. This bill establishes two pilot marine reserve projects; one at Otter Rock in Depoe Bay and one at Redfish Rocks in Port Orford as well as detailing the process to evaluate the potential for marine reserves in four other areas of the coast. Representative Arnie Roblan (Coos Bay) carried the bill on the House floor and expressed excitement for the potential of the bill. The bill still has to pass the State Senate and be signed by the Governor.

On Sunday afternoon the Port of Port Orford was a busy place. Boats were lined up to be hoisted back on the dock as both a large number of commercial fishing vessels and sport vessels took to the sea earlier that day. It was one of the busier days I've witnessed and was heartening. The number of boats out on Saturday, May 30 was 23 commercial

and 11 sport boats while on Sunday, May 31 the number of boats out was 27 commercial and 18 sport. Both days two of the sport boats were six seat charter boats.

Some of the commercial fishing boats fish for and bring in live fish to the Norcal buying station while others bring in fresh fish which is mainly sold to the Hallmark Fishery. Norcal leases most of the bottom space of the cannery building where it has numerous tanks to keep the fish alive before it is trucked out of Port Orford down to the Bay Area. They will move into the new building if and when it is constructed.

High School Graduation

Twenty-one graduates of Pacific High School received diplomas at the commencement exercise held on Friday, May 29, 2009. This year's class was the recipients of nearly \$40,000 in scholarships from local donors. In addition to that amount, a SOCC endowment for \$6,500 and a Ford Family Foundation Scholarship worth approximately \$60,000 were presented.

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Rate Discussions Underway

Pending legislative initiatives, the cost of wholesale power and the increase in the price of electricity expected to take effect later this year were again topics of discussion with the Coos-Curry Electric Cooperative, Inc. (CCEC) board of directors at their May 28 meeting. The cooperative has been conducting a cost of service study which will provide the background for the in depth discussion about rate design that the board expects to have late June or early July. “We know the Bonneville Power Administration (BPA) will raise wholesale power rates in October,” Roger Meader, General Manager/CEO told the board. “Our retail rates will have to be adjusted as well to absorb the BPA wholesale power increase and cover our own increases in the cost of doing business.” A cost of service study is a key tool in rate design and is used to identify costs associated with providing power to various consumer account types or “classes” of service. “We’ll clear our June board meeting agenda so we can focus on rates,” Pete Radabaugh, Chairman of the Board said. “Hopefully BPA will firm up their rate increase by then so we won’t have to prolong our decision any further.” Cooperative staff and board members expect to hold special meetings with the membership over the summer months to discuss rates.

Scott Corwin, Executive Director of the Public Power Council (PPC), provided insights on the pending BPA rate increase. PPC, an organization created in 1966 as a forum for consumer-owned utility customers of BPA to work toward reasonable solutions on BPA-related issues, has been intimately involved in discussions about the pending rate increase. “Originally, BPA announced that they would need a significant rate increase because they were projecting a \$250 to \$300 million loss due to a poor water year and poor pricing for electricity purchased on the open market,” Corwin told the board. Since then, water projections and forecasted prices of power have improved and BPA has cut some costs. “Hopefully, that will shrink the size of the rate increase,” Corwin continued. The other major component, representing over 30 percent of the cost of wholesale power, is the cost of fish and wildlife mitigation required under the 1980 Northwest Power Act and Endangered Species Act. States, tribes, federal agencies and river interest groups have spent years developing a plan for river operations that would not only protect fish, but more effectively utilize the region’s emissions-free hydropower resource. “This most recent plan, called a biological opinion has a price tag of approximately \$1 billion over 10 years that electric consumers such as CCEC members will be asked

to pay,” Corwin said. “Unfortunately, there are some entities who want more.” The final outcome now rests with U.S. District Judge James Redden and the Obama Administration.

Mentoring Program

The 2009 Rural Design Collective Mentoring Program is about to begin, and this year our project centers around the public domain and ebooks.

The Rural Design Collective was recently granted a hardware donation from the One Laptop Per Child Foundation. Six XO laptops were granted to us through the OLPC Contributors Program - and we will be filling up the hard drives with public domain books for kids from the Internet Archive Children’s Library (IACL)! These six computers will be returned at the end of the program and the IACL books will be distributed to other XO laptops. OLPC has a group of volunteers assisting in the librarianship, and we will also be documenting our progress on the web so other people can benefit. It is an exciting program, and we are honored to be involved.

Free Fishing Weekend

Fishing, crabbing and clamming are great Oregon traditions, and on June 6-7 Oregonians can do it all for free.

June 6-7 is Free Fishing Weekend and on those two days you won't need a fishing or shellfish license to fish, crab or clam anywhere in the state. You also don't need to buy any additional tags.

(But all other current fishing and shellfish regulations will still apply.)

"If you've never been fishing, or if you've always wanted to try clamming or crabbing, Free Fishing Weekend is a great time to discover how much fun they can be," said Rick Hargrave, Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife deputy administrator for information/education.

To help beginning anglers get their feet wet, ODFW and its partners are offering over 30 free fishing events throughout the state. At most events there will be free loaner equipment for novice anglers, special events for children, and lots of volunteers to help. Public Hearing

The Port Orford Ocean Resource Team and the City of Port Orford have teamed up to protect the City's water resources in order to maintain and improve water quality to sustain healthy nearshore fisheries including crab, salmon and rockfish, and to make City land development regulations easier for property owners and developers to understand.

The proposal is to amend (update) the current City Ordinance that manages stormwater (Chapter 17.18 of the City code) to align it with the City's Engineering Standards that developers follow during construction. These Engineering Standards are construction requirements for developers and builders to assure that construction is sound and will not damage neighboring properties or cost taxpayers money to fix problems in the future caused by inadequate stormwater control. The current code does not relate well to the Engineering Standards and the ordinance should be updated so the two documents work well together.


Stormwater originates during precipitation events. As it travels across sur-

faces such as roads and roofs, it picks up pollutants such as oil, sediment and pathogens. The current Engineering Standards and the proposed ordinance use recommended measures from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to manage and treat stormwater. The EPA suggests the use of Best Management Practices (BMPs) as the best method of preventing stormwater degradation and improving stormwater quality. BMPs improve water quality by capturing, holding and treating stormwater. Many BMPs, such as bioswales, filter stormwater naturally through the roots of native plants.

The Draft Ordinance will be discussed at a Planning Commission Public Hearing on Tuesday, June 9, 2009 at 6:00 pm in the City Council Chambers. After discussing the merits of the Draft Ordinance and taking into account public opinion, the Planning Commission will decide if the Draft should be forwarded to the City Council for review.

If the Planning Commission approves of the Draft, the City Council will hold a public hearing on this draft ordinance amendment on August 6, 2009 at 3:30 pm.

A State Mobile Training Officer, Donna Wilson was on hand to teach new methods of patient extrication from vehicles. A car had generously been donated by the community by Gary Nuechterlein and Deborah Buitron and both agencies spent hours together, practicing various methods of extrication. It is rare to have a vehicle that we can cut up. We practiced multiple scenarios with "patients" (firefighters) in the vehicle as we cut it up. Motor vehicle accidents often result in entrapped and injured occupants. The biggest challenge is to quickly remove the patients while providing emergency medical care at the same time. We were fortunate to have a practice vehicle And a State Training Officer in Port Orford at the same time. These long hours of hands on training together result in the best possible response when we are called out to motor vehicle crashes.

Free Fishing Weekend

Elk River Fish Hatchery will host the 14th annual Free Fishing Weekend event on Saturday and Sunday, June 6 and 7, 2009. Each fishing day will begin at about 8:00 am. Young anglers will be allowed to fish for rainbow trout in a special hatchery pond that is stocked with 800 legal size fish (8-12 inches) and 400 whoppers that will weigh from 3-8 pounds each. The hatchery will provide rods, reels, bait and tackle for the kids to fish with. The bag limit is the first three fish caught. There will be no "catch and release", so please bring a large plastic bag to carry your catch home.

The event is limited to the first 100 children 10 years old and younger that sign up in person on each day (100 for Saturday and 100 for Sunday). Sign ups will not be carried over from one day to the next. Upon sign-up, participants will be advised of the approximate time when it will be their turn to fish. 

Crab Molts

After consulting with Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW), it is highly probable that the large amount of crab seen on the beach was merely empty shells. The Dungeness Crab life cycle includes a series of shedding of it's hard exoskeleton shell followed by a period of growth. This process is called 'molting'. Starting in April and continuing into May and June, large numbers of the discarded shells appear along the beaches as the females of the species begin molting.
