Looking For Volunteers

It is nearly halfway through the summer vacation for students in the Port Orford-Langlois School District with big changes for them coming when school opens this September.

Last year the School Board voted to close Blanco School and move all the students to Driftwood School starting with the 2009-10 school year. There is already a lot going on at Driftwood to get ready to accept all the extra students from Blanco. On Monday afternoon School Superintendent Mick Lane graciously gave Port Orford News reporter Brice Wagner and me a tour of Driftwood and an update of what's going on at the school as it gets remodeled for an influx of additional students. The tour also became part history lesson as Brice Wagner, born and raised in Port Orford, had attended Driftwood in the 50's so gave us a historical overview of what the school was like back in the mid 1950's.

We started at what used to be known as the "playshed" which is being remodeled into a gym. The building which was not much more than a simple pole building was framed, insulated, and received a plywood wall and another wall on top

of that. The building is 50' by 75' and is getting a new state of the art multipurpose plastic floor to cover up the concrete floor. Lines will be painted for a basketball court and backboards added. On Monday a couple of Pacific High students were painting a red stripe along the four walls. The flooring comes in on Wednesday and if you read this in time they need volunteers to snap the floor pieces in place.

A new high efficiency heating and cooling system has been installed. The heating and cooling system will total 13 heat pump units with eight on the roof of the main hallway building and five on the other wing. The chimney will be demolished, the boiler taken out of service and the diesel storage tank removed.

Adjacent to the gym on the playground a storage room is being built as well as two 14' by 16' changing rooms for the students. For now they won't include showers but if funding becomes available in the future maybe it will happen. The playground will get a facelift with some new equipment including the swings from Blanco and a new wooden play structure which will replace most of the one that is there currently. In the area between the playground and the main hallway there will be raised bed edible gardens, tables for eating and socializ-

ing, and a 40 foot long portable storage structure butted up against the building. There will also be some tetherball courts and a badminton court installed.

The baseball field will be moved to the southeast corner of the grassy field. The sprinkler system will be revitalized and the lawn kept green all year. The bleachers will get restored and repainted. Much of this work will be done by the Port Orford Rotary Club.

A big change will be in the flow of bus traffic dropping off and picking up students. As long as the School District gets ODOT approval, and they are 99% certain of it, the school buses will enter Eleventh Street from Highway 101, turn left on Washington and then left into the school between the asphalt playground and grassy field and proceed west to just before Highway 101 where students will be picked up and discharged. The hedge will be removed and a breezeway will be built between the bus drop off zone and the school entrance. Students will exit the buses and then enter the school from the Highway 101 entrance while buses then will pull out onto Highway 101 on a new driveway. A local engineer has volunteered his time to design the plan to meet ODOT requirements.

The front chain link fence at Driftwood will be moved in by about six feet and a planted area will be between the new fence line and the sidewalk. It's not a done deal but the school district has been talking to a local stonemason about using some of the glass brick from the front walls of the school to make a more decorative fence. The current bus drop off zone will be decommissioned with the concrete divider removed and more parking for staff created.

Sounds like a lot going on but that's just the outside of the school. Then we walked inside for a look at all the interior changes and they're too numerous to name them all. The school is getting a new computer lab with 25 computers and a speech and conference room. Some of the computers are one year old models coming from Pacific High School. Mick Lane explained many of the design ideas for the new paint schemes, lighting changes and other interior changes had come from local de-

signer Gary Robertson who donated his time for the project.

All the glass block walls/windows will be replaced in the rooms facing Highway 101. This includes 37 windows and they will be replaced by windows as big as the current glass block walls at a cost of approximately \$1,000 per window. They will all have sliders allowing air circulation. The contractor will try and salvage as much of the glass block as possible for use later on the decorative wall.

The paint scheme in the main hallway will be much darker which will deemphasize the block wall construction. The cafeteria which serves Pacific as well as Driftwood will get a paint job. There will be several lighting changes in the hallway including canned lighting pods.

Mick Lane said the school board had been very supportive of him and the project. The improvements are being paid for through the school district general funds thanks to the district having an ending fund balance, stimulus money, contributions from the com-

munity, grants, and lots of volunteer labor from the community and service organizations. Mick Lane said they are ready now for all you volunteers who would like to help with painting and landscaping and with the playground. You can call him at the District office at 348-2337 and go to work as soon as you you're ready.

The first day of school at Driftwood this year is on Tuesday, September 8, the day after Labor Day, and the District expects 160 K-8 students enrolled at Driftwood at the beginning of the school year.

Be careful what you ask for when you contact your legislators to complain about government spending. Once you inform them that you are from Curry County, Oregon they might remind you that residences in our county are heavily subsidized by the State and Federal government.

Are we taxed enough (already) for services provided the by the city of Brookings and Curry county? Not really. Local property taxes provided \$3.4 million to the county and city of Brookings combined \$100 million recently approved budgets. Our local tax dollars barely provide the health insurance premiums of over \$3 million a year for around 240 county and city of Brookings employees!

Am I advocating that we pay more taxes? No. But as a member of the county and city of Brookings budget committees I am perplexed at the lack of concern demonstrated by local residents who are happy to organize and protest about national spending.

I attended three full days of county budget hearings and three evenings at the

city budget workshops. Only one person from the general public showed up at each of the events.

Even though public notices were published in our newspapers - public apathy is not entirely to blame. A tough economy has limited the resources of our local newspapers. Members of the media were also a no show. As a consequence the taxpayers were informed of the passage of the budgets after the fact.

Rescue at Humbug

On July 7, 2009 at about 6:07pm, the Curry County Sheriff's Office received a 911 cell phone call from a 17-year-old male from Klamath Falls, Joseph Gardner, who was climbing rocks at Humbug Beach and had fallen. The teenager reported he was stuck on a rock ledge approximately 50-75 feet above the water and had injured himself in the fall, receiving a deep cut on his arm. Gardner stated he couldn't climb up or down from his location and needed help.

Curry County Search & Rescue personnel responded to assist and U.S. Coast

Guard assistance was requested because of the inaccessibility of the location to a ground approach. A Coast Guard rescue helicopter responded from Coos Bay and the crew's rescue swimmer was lowered to the location and hoisted Gardner from the ledge. The helicopter then landed on the beach and Gardner was transferred to ground ambulance where he was evaluated and released to his guardian.
