The second decade of the twenty first century begins on Thursday night and with it a continuing increase in the speed of change in our lives. But for now let's look back at the last year in the first decade of this century for what stood out in North Curry County.

Local author Ann Vileisis presented a talk on her new book "Kitchen Literacy: How We Lost Knowledge of Where Food Comes from and Why We Need to get it back" on January 14 at the Port Orford Public Library. You may not have heard the talk but the excellently written book is available for check out at the library and can be purchased from Amazon.com.

The Port Orford Police Report had an item about a wild turkey acting strangely on January 13. Fortunately he and the rest of the family are doing well and can be seen around Port Orford regularly.

Valerie and I headed north to Quinault, Washington at the end of January and enjoyed our three days at the Quinault Lodge and exploring that part of Washington State.

Theater 101 opened a three week engagement of "The Kitchen Witches" on

February 6 and it provided much needed humor in Port Orford. That same night "Paul Blart: Mall Cop" opened at the Savoy Theater. The Port Orford Arts Council presented Kelly Thibodeaux and Etouffe at the Community Building on Valentine's Day.

The Port Orford Library Free Speech Room was full to capacity on Monday, February 16 for a presentation about the Oregon Main Street Program hosted by the Arts Council.

Blue Suede Shoes Productions presented the return of Elvis in the form of Pahrump, Nevada resident Dan Bighaus at the Community Building on February 22. The show co-starred his now wife Venita Frederick doing a fire dance.

The Port Orford City Council met on February 20 and they decided to place a measure on the May 19 Special Districts election ballot for a local option levy to pay for the police department. The levy in November of 2008 was defeated by city voters by a 61-39 margin. Council president John Hewitt read a letter from Mayor John Roorbach saying he was taking a temporary leave of absence for health reason and naming Jim Auburn as acting mayor.

On February 27 there was a ribbon cutting at the Port Orford Skate Park in Buffington Park to celebrate the finishing up on the Phase II portion of the park.

Railroad funding for the Coos Bay-Eugene rail line was secured by Congressman Peter DeFazio. He helped deliver \$8 million federal dollars to help the Port of Coos Bay buy the CORP rail line. CORP had shut the line down with little advance notice in September of 2007 leaving several big shippers scrambling for alternate transportation for their goods.

The Copper Salmon Wilderness became a reality on March 25 with the passage

in the United States House of Representatives of the Omnibus Public Land Management Act of 2009 This bill included a provision for the establishment of the 13,700 acre Copper Salmon Wilderness along the North Fork of the Elk River. The Omnibus Bill had passed the U.S. Senate the previous week and the Public Lands Bill was signed into law by President Obama on March 30.

Port Orford-Langlois School Superintendent Ruby Price announced through a letter to the editor that on March 26 she had been hired to serve as the next superintendent of the Creswell School District. She will begin working for that district on July 1.

The school based Health Center opened at Pacific High School on April 7 and is dedicated to helping students understand how to take care of their own health needs.

The Port Orford City Council held a town hall meeting on April 16 regarding the upcoming police levy. This time

around the levy amount is for \$1.31 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation rather than the \$1.41 it has been.

Catherine Powers, the new Curry County Animal Control officer, introduced herself to county residents through a letter to the editor in April. She has made a tremendous difference and all are welcome to go down to the animal shelter, visit the dogs and of course consider adopting one. She has the support of many dedicated volunteers and the shelter was even open on Christmas day of this year.

The second Port Orford Water Festival took place at the American Legion Hall and Community Building on Saturday, April 18. It seemed like nearly every K-8 student in the local school district was there along with many parents and others for the Port Orford Ocean Resources Team sponsored event.

The Thursday April 30 paper was full of letters to the editor and ads regarding the upcoming special districts election on May 19. Good news for the newspaper business!

On Wednesday, April 30, the Gold Coast Apartments opened with a public ribbon cutting at the corner of Highway 101 and Madrona. The Umpqua Community Development Corporation built the six apartment, two story, two building complex. The land was donated by the Curry County Commissioners on a site that was once the "dream" of several people to build a permanent building for the Common Good. Umpqua CDC never did complete the landscaping part of the project fronting Highway 101.

Vin Diesel and Paul Walker returned to the fourth installment of "Fast & Furious" which opened at the Savoy Theater on May 8.

The annual Coos Curry Electric Co-op meeting was held in Port Orford at Pacific High School on May 2. Ed Dowdy, Cheryl McMahan and John Herzog were elected to the board. Dowdy and McMahan had been appointed to the board and this was their first election. Herzog won a second three year term. Jim Kolen defeated one term incumbent

Gary Schlottmann outspending him by a huge margin.

The North Curry and Port Orford Chamber of Commerce held their monthly meeting at the Paradise Café on Monday, May 11 and named Totally Cellular as the Business of the Month.

Port Orford observed Memorial Day weekend with a series of events including Memorial Day services honoring our veterans as well as the Port Orford Cedar and Fine Arts Festival.

The results were tallied in the May 19 Special Districts election. The two attention getters on the ballot were the Port Orford Police Levy which passed by a 61-39% margin – a near reversal of the vote in November which saw the levy go down to defeat. The Port Orford Rural Fire District had three hotly contested races for seats on that board. Brice Wagner, Joe Marsh and Ken Fliszar were elected with Marsh having run as a write-in. Wagner formerly served on the board and was one of the people who helped form the district.

The Senior Class at Pacific High School graduated on May 29 and school let out for all students on June 3.

Dredging at the Port of Port Orford began on Monday, June 15 with the arrival of the clamshell barge, sand barge and two tug boats operated by American Construction, based in Tacoma, Washington. Their contract was to remove 30,000-40,000 cubic yards of sand from the Port harbor and take it to the “spoils” site just past the jetty.

Remodeling work began at Driftwood School as the School District closed Blanco Middle School at the end of the school year and is consolidating all K-8 students at Driftwood at the beginning of the 2009-10 school year. The Driftwood playshed was scheduled for a major makeover including framing the in-



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side of the building, insulation, plywood walls, a new wood floor to cover up the concrete floor, backboards for playing basketball and a new room for lockers and storage.

The Port Orford City Council met on June 18. The council had been presented with a letter of resignation from Mayor Roorbach which they accepted. Then they voted unanimously in favor of appointing Mayor Pro Tem Jim Auburn as Mayor. His term goes through December 31, 2010.

A household hazardous waste event was held in Port Orford at city hall on June 20 and 194 residential homeowners and renters dropped off enough waste material to fill a 40 foot long truck with everything from car batteries to paint and anti-freeze.

Several organizations and local businesses gathered at the Port Orford Public Library on June 22 and signed a Declaration of Cooperation for the Port Orford Marine Economic Recovery Plan. This regards the grant proposals for \$10 million in grant requests from the Federal Stimulus Plan for several new buildings at the Port.

Salvation Army Bell Ringers

In both sun and rain, the people who volunteered to ring the bell for the Salvation Army, were there with a smile, a thank you and sometimes music and a song. The organizations whose members helped in this annual holiday fundraiser were First Community Church, Port Orford Christian Center, St. Christopher’s Episcopal Church, St. John’s Catholic Church and William Rebahn, who came forward to offer two hours of his time. Ray’s Market graciously allowed the bell ringers to use their facilities again and the ladies at Sterling Bank cheerfully helped to count the money, down to the penny.

This year, even though times have been tough, the people of Port Orford generously contributed a grand total of \$2150.86, a record amount for our town. The money collected will be used by the Salvation Army all over the world, but some will come back to our community in the form of vouchers for food and bus fare and other assistance in emergency situations by those traveling through town, as well as our own locals in need. Our community may be small but it has a very kind heart.

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Sheriff's Report

On December 23 at about 5:49pm, the Curry County Sheriff's Office Dispatch Center, received a 911 cell call from a driver who was north bound on U.S. Hwy 101, following what he perceived as an intoxicated driver. The caller stated he saw the vehicle almost hit the guardrail and collide head on with a vehicle, the caller also stated the vehicle was driving at a very slow rate of speed.

Gold Beach police and deputies responded and located a vehicle matching the description given by the caller stopped with the engine running at the intersection of Hunter Creek Road and U.S. 101. Upon contacting the female driver, officers observed the driver was having a difficult time unlocking her vehicle, and was not responding to questions appropriately.

The driver was known to Deputy McAllister and the plate number confirmed the vehicle belonged to James and Marlyn Schafer. During the contact with Mrs. Schafer complained of medical issues. An ambulance was requested by Deputy McAllister, and Mrs. Schafer was taken to Curry General Hospital.

Deputies accompanied the ambulance to the hospital and stood by until Mrs. Schafer was medically cleared and released from the hospital at about 8:30pm. After her release, Deputy McAllister continued his DUI investigation, which resulted in Mrs. Schafer's arrest for Driving under the Influence of Intoxicants. Mrs. Schafer then submitted to an intoxilyzer test, the results of which indicated a Blood Alcohol Content of .21% which is almost three times the legal limit under Oregon law. Mrs. Schafer was cited and released to a family member. The investigation will be referred to the Curry County District Attorney for further prosecution.

Other students may experience a high level of stress and anxiety during this time. The staff at Pacific HS is well aware of the mix of emotions that the holiday season brings on and is supportive of the students who may view the holidays as a time when they are uncomfortable.

The fall has been good to the Pacific students and staff, despite our set-back of the fire and vandalism that occurred in October. Our fall sports made a strong showing. Soccer competed very well in the class 4A Farwest League with a very young squad. Cross Country was highlighted by a good turn-out of runners and Wren Carter qualifying for the 3A/2A/1A State Meet. A few PHS students took advantage of the opportunity to compete on the Bandon/Pacific football team in the 3A Sunset Conference and were steady contributors. A group is working on estuary restoration at Hubbard Creek and will be transforming the jogging/hiking trail on the PHS campus into an interpretive nature trail, as well as maintaining and improving condition of the trail. SOCYL hosted the major youth summit in SW Oregon at PHS in late October. The event attracted over 300 high school students for a day of liberating activities based on making responsible choices. Letter to the Editor,

Our state government is asking some of us, who earn more money, to pay a bit more in taxes. Facing a \$3.7 billion shortfall in the 2009—2011 biennium, the Legislature made cuts of \$2 billion in state government agencies and dipped deeply into reserve funds. They have tried to balance the reduced budget, but still fell short, at the cost of education, health care, and public safety; the big items in the General Fund.

Corporations – even multimillion dollar businesses – have paid a minimum tax of \$10 yearly since 1932. Measure 67 raises that to \$150; more if a C-corporation with no profit has more than \$500,000 in sales. The amount goes up according to income and profits.

Most of us will not see an increase in our taxes. Individuals who have a taxable income over \$125,000 a year (\$250,000 for jointly-filing couples) would see a slight increase. Those with double that amount of income would have a slightly higher rate. Measure 66 would also eliminate taxes on the first \$2400 a person receives in unemployment benefits.

Oregon currently rates third lowest in the nation in total taxation, considered as a per centage of the Gross State Product. Isn't it time we supported our state services at a higher level? Vote Yes on Measures 66 and 67 in January.

They really need the bright light in their parking lot, as they have been robbed way too frequently. And, it is so easy to drive or walk a couple of blocks off the main highway and find no lights on the streets at all. A community should have a presence at night, just for safety and security. Of much greater concern to me is our leaky water delivery system! That could bear some extra "light on the subject".

Ballot Issue Town Hall

Five local legislators will converge on the Southwestern Oregon Community College campus on Jan. 4 to discuss the state tax measures 66 and 67 with employees during their scheduled in-service. The measures refer to two tax bills passed by the Oregon State Legislature on June 11, 2009 and signed by Gov. Ted Kulongoski on July 20, 2009 to voters for a January 26, 2010 special election ballot.

The morning session will begin with a one hour town hall meeting format. Invited and expected to attend are Rep. Bruce Hanna R-Roseburg; Rep. Wayne Krieger, R-Gold Beach; Rep. Arnie Roblan, D-Coos Bay; Sen. Jeff Kruse, R-Roseburg; and, Sen. Joanne Verger, D-Coos Bay.

According to information on the House Bills, the corporate tax bill (HB 3405) would generate \$261 million in new revenue for the state. The bill would increase the corporate minimum tax, other corporate taxes, and certain Secretary of State fees.

The personal income tax bill (HB 2649) would make temporary and permanent changes to Oregon's personal income tax structure, generating an additional \$472 million in new revenue for the state. The taxes only affect those making more than \$125,000 (\$250,000 if filing jointly). The bill also eliminates state income taxes on the first \$2,400 of unemployment benefits received in 2009.

The tax bills were passed to help the state legislature balance their budget without making further cuts during a recession already experiencing high unemployment. The Oregon Department of Revenue estimates that about 5% of corporations and 2.5% of individual income tax filers will be affected by the higher tax rates.

The town hall format will provide for a question and answer period for the employees in the audience.

The in-service is scheduled to start at 8:30 a.m. in the Hales Center for the Performing Arts on the Coos Campus.

Port Orford Flu Clinic

The Curry County Health Department will hold a flu clinic on Thursday, January 7, at the Port Orford Senior Center, 1536 Jackson Street. The clinic will be open from 10:00am – noon and from 1:00-3:00pm.

The Health Department will bill Medicare, Regency Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Oregon and Oregon Health Plan. Those people with Medicare, Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Oregon or another insurance there will be no cost to you (Free). If you have no insurance or another insurance there will be a \$30 admit fee. The Health Department will provide you with a receipt so that you may submit it to your insurance company.

The Health Department will have the pneumonia vaccine available for \$55. Please check your record to see if you have had one.

H1N1 vaccine is available to persons six months and older. For all children under 9 of age who received their first dose of H1N1 should receive a second dose of H1N1. The Health Department will bill your insurance. There will be no charge for persons who can not afford the vaccine.

To avoid catching the flu, the Health Department advises the following:

Wash hands frequently

Try not to touch your eyes, nose or mouth

Avoid close contact with people who are ill

Stay home when you are sick

Seniors who haven't had a pneumococcal vaccination should get one now. Pneumonia is a serious complication of the flu.

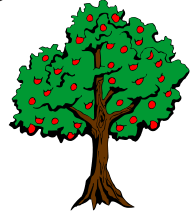

Town Hall Meeting

State Representative Wayne Krieger and State Senator Jeff Kruse are holding a town hall meeting in Port Orford on Tuesday, January 5, 2:00pm, in the city hall council chambers. Both elected officials will discuss the past legislative session and take questions from the public.
