Port Orford Success Story By Evan Kramer

The 2011-12 Oregon Dungeness Crab season is about to get underway at the Port of Port Orford and the rest of the Oregon, Washington and Northern California coasts. All that stands in the way of the season opening on December 15 is the results of the third pick test of the Northern California Dungeness crab. The third pick test on the Oregon Coast was conducted on November 28 and 29 and Oregon Ports passed the test. The third round of tests for our part of the coast was at the Port of Brookings and the fill rate was 24.4% which is very close to the 25% that the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife is looking for in the crabs. This means a two pound crab has one half pound of meat.

Now everyone is awaiting results of the California pick tests and then the start of the season. Once it is announced, the fishermen are allowed to soak their pots in the water 64 hours prior to 12:01am on December 15 assuming the season starts on that date. Central California fishermen are already fishing for crab as their season started on November 15 with the fishermen being paid \$2.25 a pound. The results of the third Northern California pick tests are due in by Wednesday night of this week.

The last step before the boats set out with their crab pots is the agreement on price. The meeting between the fish buyers and fishermen to discuss this year's opening price will be held in Newport on December 9 and 10 and is facilitated by the Oregon Dungeness Crab Commission. Oregon Departments of Agriculture and Fish and Wildlife are also involved in the negotiations.

The 2010-11 Oregon Dungeness Crab season brought in 49 million dollars to Oregon's fishermen with landings totaling 21.2 million pounds according to Oregon Dungeness Crab Commission Director Nick Furman. Furman said that last year's total was the "second most valuable crab season in history." Port Orford fishermen landed 869,782 pounds of crab in a season that began for them on January 15, 2011. The late start added to the value of their crab harvest as they were paid more for the crab as the price had gone up significantly by January 15. They made approximately \$300,000 more than if they had started with the rest of the coast.

Meanwhile at the Port of Port Orford on Monday afternoon the electrical motor for the 25 ton commercial boat hoist was being replaced. It did not burn out as was reported but there was an electrical problem in the panel box which

could have caused problems down the line. The Port Commission chose to avoid trouble and replace the existing motor now and then pay to rebuild the old one and have it as a spare in case of an emergency. The Port uses a company called Hydraulic Problems? Inc. out of Days Creek, Oregon to maintain their two boat hoists and the goal on Monday was to get the new 100 horsepower motor installed in time for the boats coming back in that evening (they were done by 5:30pm). Hydraulic Solutions had some help from Port Manager Gary Anderson and hoist operator Fred Calligori who are not afraid to get their hands dirty. The new motor cost the Port \$4,500 so with installation, rebuilding the old motor, and other costs it will amount to about \$7,000 and it will help insure a smooth running Port during the upcoming and very busy Oregon Dungeness Crab season.

The Port just wrapped up the North Beach Chinook salmon fishery. ODF&W opened up the fishery also known as the bubble fishery for the entire month of November with some restrictions placed on fishermen. Hallmark Fisheries bought 3,390 Chinook salmon from fishermen with the largest one of the bunch coming in at 37.8 pounds was

caught by Port Orford fishermen Scott Mecum and it was worth \$266 to him at \$7 a pound. Hallmark paid between \$6 and \$7 a pound for the salmon. The minimum size fish had to be at least 24 inches long with a limit of 20 fish per day per boat and a rule that all fish caught in the North Beach fishery from Cape Blanco to Humbug Mountain must be landed at the Port of Port Orford and not at other Ports. The statewide salmon fishery was held in October. Aaron Longton with Port Orford Sustainable Seafood also bought some of this season's Chinook salmon from the Port Orford dock.

The Port of Port Orford is the main economic engine for the City though agriculture in North Curry County no doubt brings in even more money and from a lot more sources.

Welcome To College 101

There will be 700 high school juniors from throughout the SWOCC district on campus December 13 for Welcome to College 101. Students from Marshfield, North Bend, Reedsport, Bandon, Brookings, Gold Beach, Pacific, Myrtle Point, Coquille and Powers will all be attending short classes in a variety of locations on campus. Twenty five college instructors are volunteering for the "Welcome to College Day." This is sponsored by Talent Search and Upward Bound which are federally funded TRIO programs through the Department of Education for first generation college bound students.

"This experience helps them make connections with instructors at the college and helps them prepare for all the decision they will need to make during their senior year in high school," said Sharilyn Brown, Director of Talent Search and Upward Bound.

Talent Search and Upward Bound serve nearly 1,200 students and their families

in the SWOCC region. Participants attend college at more than double the rate of their peers from the same population.

Upward Bound serves Marshfield and North Bend high schools. A typical academic year consists of an after school program, monthly activity sessions, in-school academic advising, tutoring and support, and College campus visits.

Talent Search-Central serves the two local school district high schools and middle schools, while Talent Search-Satellites serves eight school district high schools along the southern-most 125 miles of the Oregon coast. The program focuses on small and large group activities addressing academic advice for college, career exploration, financial aid opportunities, college campus visits, and cultural exposure.

Groundfish Regulations Set

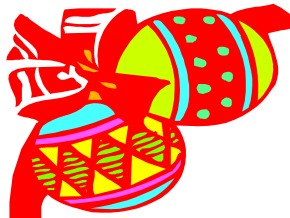
The Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission set the 2012 groundfish seasons today at its meeting in Portland. The harvest specifications and season structure for groundfish in ocean waters had earlier been set by the Pacific Fishery Management Council. The Commission adopted concurrent regulations for commercial and recreational groundfish fisheries in Oregon and state harvest levels for commercial and recreational nearshore fisheries. (The nearshore fishery extends from the shoreline out three miles.)

The Commission also adopted two changes to the sport groundfish seasons for 2012 that are aimed at providing more predictable seasons and reducing the number of early season closures. The first restricts the harvest of groundfish to waters less than 30 fathoms from April to September. In the past, the groundfish fishery was restricted to less than 40 fathoms from April to September in order to reduce impacts on yelloweye rockfish. The second change closes the cabezon season during the winter months of January through March and October through December.

A third change to the sport groundfish fishery regulations implements two in-season management lines, one at Cape Lookout and one at Cape Blanco. In the event that in-season action is needed in the fishery to reduce impacts to yelloweye rockfish, these lines may be used to provide relief to areas on the coast that are disproportionately impacted by depth restrictions.

The Commission approved rule changes that will clarify and simplify the submission of commercial fish tickets, which are used to verify the species and weight of commercially harvested fish.

The Commission is the policy-making body for fish and wildlife issues in Oregon. The next scheduled meeting is Jan. 6 in Salem.

Letter To The Editor,

I am very lucky to currently be working relief at S'Nipped, the low cost spay and neuter clinic in Coos Bay. I have been a veterinary professional since 1977 and have been impressed from the first with the cleanliness, high quality veterinary care, and respectful, humane treatment of all of the animals that come through the doors, from beloved pets to feral cats.

Birds perhaps suffer most, for even roaming housecats can't resist them, and feral cats depend on them for survival. The Audubon Society estimates that cats kill 100 million birds yearly; some estimates go as high as 1 billion.

S'Nipped offers free pickup and delivery of cats and dogs from our area and their prices are amazing. Feral cats are only \$40.00 for spay or neuter, vaccines and flea treatment. This is important because

it goes a long way toward protecting you and your pets from diseases, like rabies, to which feral cats have a greater risk of exposure.

You can support it by: spaying and neutering your pets, trapping and neutering feral cats (we can lend you a trap!), or by donating money in any amount, small or large, at B and B and other places around town (you'll see the sign!) It's tax deductible and 100% of the money goes to the cost of spaying or neutering a feral cat who will then be re-released at its previous location, unable to reproduce. Soon there will be many fewer cats.

Ocean Sport Crabbing Remains Closed

With the commercial Dungeness crab season delayed until at least Dec. 15, the Oregon Department of Fish & Wildlife reminds recreational crabbers the ocean is closed to them also.

Recreational harvest of Dungeness crab in Oregon's bays and estuaries remains open.

"Sport crabbing in the ocean is delayed along with the commercial season," said Justin Ainsworth, ODFW shellfish biologist. "We wanted to remind people of the delay because it's pretty nice out there right now and weather forecasts are good into next week."

The ocean commercial Dungeness crab season on the Oregon coast normally opens on Dec. 1, but can be delayed to ensure a high-quality product for consumers. Testing in November showed that crab in the majority of test areas coast wide did not meet minimum quality criteria. Fishery managers in Oregon, Washington and California decided to delay the opening at least until Dec. 15 to allow time for the crabs to fill out with more meat.

About the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife: ODFW's mission is to protect and enhance Oregon's fish and wildlife and their habitats for use and enjoyment by present and future generations. The Department's
